Check the home landscape this fall and decide whether additional plants are needed either to fill in a bare place or to replace a dead plant. Maybe a rose bush has died or failed to live up to expectations. Is there a gap in the shrub border where a new plant is needed? Was the shade adequate in the outdoor living area?

Make a list of your landscape needs and be ready to take advantage of sales and selections offered to early buyers by nursery and garden centers.

Homeowners tend to put off garden chores until the spring when everything is greening up and spring flowers are in bloom. Then comes the sudden urge to plant trees and shrubs and the rush to the nursery or garden center for plants. Often only limited quantities of picked-over stock remain.

Balled and burlapped plants as well as those grown in containers may be transplanted any time of the year.

Many of the deciduous plants - those that lose their leaves each fall - are more easily handled in a bare root condition. For best results, bare root plants should be set out in late fall and winter from mid-November through early March in most areas. This provides ample time for good root development before spring growth begins.

With proper care, bare root plants can be set out as late as April, but success depends on the condition of the nursery stock and the care provided the first six months after planting.

For ease of maintenance and to reduce the amount of disease and insect damage, use landscape plants that are native or adapted to the area.

A copy of the leaflet, "How to Transplant Woody Plants", is available at the county Extension office and provides helpful landscaping tips for the homeowner.

Seeding stands of small grains are extremely susceptible to the damage caused by the fall armyworm and yellow striped armyworm. As fall temperatures begin to drop, the foliage of other hosts such as grasses, grain sorghum, alfalfa, peas and beans become less attractive and increased damage by these armyworms to stands of small grains can be expected.

The larval stages of these armyworms lasts about 20 days and their pupal stages are passed in the soil. Moths lay eggs in masses on the foliage of host plants.

When large numbers of armyworms are present, small grains stands can be severely damaged in a period of a few days. To prevent excessive stand loss, young stands of small grains should be inspected every three or four days prior to frost.

The need for insecticidal control measures should be determined based on the damage caused to the foliage of young small grain plants. Insecticides are most effective when applied against small larvae. Larger larvae (3/4 to 1 1/2" long) are more difficult to control. Several applications of an insecticide may be needed.

Information on the various insecticides that might be used to control these armyworms is contained in MP - 339, "Suggestions for Controlling Insects and Mites on Corn Sorghum and Small Grains". This publication is available in our office.

4-H CLUB

4-H continues to grow in popularity throughout Texas and in the nation as the number one youth organization. And it's growth is no small wonder, as both youth and adult leaders have injected new life into some old program areas and have also developed new programs that reflect the excitement of today's rapidly changing world.

National 4-H Week - Oct. 7 - 13 - provides an opportunity for those in 4-H to renew their efforts for more active programs, perhaps redirect some aspects of ongoing programs, and also make a special effort to recruit new members.

All boys and girls between the ages of 9 and 19 are eligible to join, and there are many new exciting programs and project areas for individuals, regardless of their interests and backgrounds.

The theme of this year's 4-H Week observance is "4-H GETS IT ALL TOGETHER".

The theme is appropriate, in that it shows 4-H as a complete program designed to aid in the growth and development of the youth of this country. 4-H is dedicated to building a better tomorrow by providing an active program in leadership and citizenship training. It also allows boys and girls to explore various career opportunities and to work toward improving their communities.

4-H is not always all work though. There's plenty of time for fun and fellowship. Activities throughout the year, such as fairs, camps, playdays and picnics, provide plenty of opportunity for recreation and "just having a good time".

4-H can provide a challenging and exciting time during the years so important in the development of boys and girls. If you aren't already "getting in" on the 4-H action, do so now by contacting the County Extension office or the secretary of your local 4-H club.

Pecan growers from Eastland County will tour the USDA Brownwood Pecan Field Station Wednesday, Oct. 10. Dan Childress, president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association, said the growers will go as a group. Everyone interested in the tour will meet at Jammie's Restaurant in Cisco at 7:45 a.m. Wednesday morning. Growers in the Rising Star and Pioneer area may meet the group on the parking lot of the American Legion Hall in Rising Star at 8:30 a.m. The group is scheduled to begin the tour at 9:30 a.m. and complete the tour at 12:00 noon.

The Brownwood Experiment Station has done some valuable work for the pecan growers in this area, County Agent De Gordon says. Many of the most important varieties were developed at the station. Some of these are Wichita, Choctaw, Apache, Sioux, Mohawk, Shawnee and eight other varieties adapted for this area. The station is doing other research work also such as root stock testing and close planting.

Childress said this will be a good opportunity for growers and others interested in pecan production to see the Experiment station. Everyone interested is welcome to go to Brownwood for the tour.

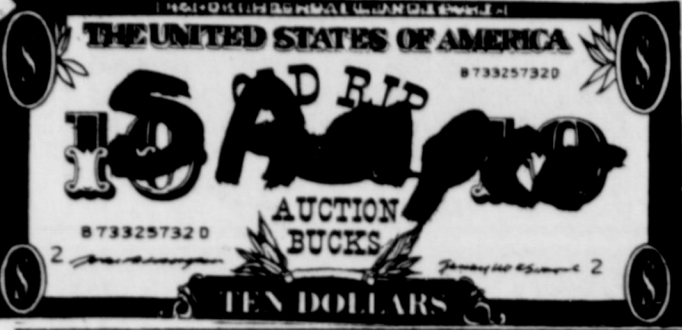
