MAMIE SACKETT

The following is a story and history of a rag doll, written in 1937 by Mamie Tom Matthews Gideon, the proud owner of the Willard Matthews, Wheelock, Texas.

'You are probably wondering after reading this title, just who Mamie Sackett is, and what this is all about. Well, the history is a true one, and Mamie Sackett is a rag doll, now twenty - four years old. who has traveled quite as extensively as any doll, I suppose. She is a small doll with her body made over an old fashioned darning egg, and her little embroidered face crowned with a glory of snow white Angora Goat hair.

Mamie Sackett had her origin back in the year 1912 when the writer was only a little girl. Her prenatal stage took the form of a white Angora rug reposing on the floor of a guest bedroom in Dallas, Texas. On this particular day that Mamie came to be, the owner of the rug had washed it and hung it on the line to dry, as she quite often did. In the yard was racing a young bull puppy who eyed the rug speculatively for some time. Then, after making several runs under the rug, he succeeded in leaping high enough to hang his teeth into the corner of the goat skin. So, when the owner again went to the rug, there, hanging by a small shred, was a piece of goat skin about the size of her hand, and destined to become the scalp of a small doll. Thus was the idea of Mamie Sackett conceived.

I remember well the day the package containing the doll arrived at the post office, and when I had carried it home and unwrapped it, there lay the piece of Angora Goat hair, reincarnated into the form of a doll, quite Albino in appearance, with her little embroidered face void of all expression, staring up at me. "Look, Mother", I exclaimed,

"she looks just like Miss Mamie Sackett". And, from that day on, the doll took the name of a beautiful young blond who was one of our friends. And, always, the real Mamie Sackett was never more beautiful to me than was her namesake.

Mamie was always my favorite doll. So easily could she be crowded into a grip or bag that it was she whom I always took when I went on any kind of a trip. For several years, she continued to travel, until one day I relaized that Mamie's journeys had been not a few. She had visited the Dallas State Fair, the Battle of Flowers In San Antonio, the Texas State Capitol; she had been as far West as El Paso, as far East as Galveston, as far South as the Gulf, and had crossed the line into Oklahoma

and Old Mexico. Almost overnight. Mamie became my "magnificent obsession". I decided to make her the most traveled doll in existence.

Every time I heard of anyone going to a point where Mamie had not visited. I asked them to take her, and, always, she was tucked into some corner of a grip and carried along.

Mamie Sackett's greatest achievement came in 1923 when she was given the opportunity to take a cruise around the world. I read in the paper that a couple from Sherman would leave soon for Europe. I sat down and wrote them about Mamie Sackett and asked if she might find a corner among baggage. graciously, Mrs. Brentz replied that they would be only too glad to have her accompany them. So, on November 15, 1923, Mamie Sackett, dressed in a going - away outfit of blue taffeta, boarded the S.S. Franconia bound for foreign


From November to March she was gone. Regularly, I received letters and cards from Mrs. Brentz telling me of the points of interest they had visited, and also how Mamie was standing the trip. So enthusiastic she became over the doll that she had tiny clothes made for her in several of the countries; a grass dancing skirt and "lei" from Hawaii, a white cotton jacket from Japan, and from China a beautiful blue silk costume. lined and embroidered in rich, lovely colors. So, when Mamie Sackett was returned to me, I found that she had changed her views in regards to dress. Gone was the blue taffeta going away outfit and, in its place, a coat and pair of trousers, while on her feet were two little brightly colored Chinese shoes no bigger than a thimble. (You

The years went by. Mamie Sackett's body remained the same, but her face wore out and had to be recovered and re embroidered times without

number. In her span of twenty four years, she was in nineteen states, had been on Lake Michigan and Erie, seen Niagra Falls, visited in twenty six foreign ports, not mentioning trips overland from these places, had been on Pikes Peak and gone to the World's Fair in Chicago. She has a certificate bearing the insignia of the S.S. Franconia and signed by the Purser, certifying that she was a passenger on board that ship on its cruise around the world, together with a large colored picture of the ship and its itinerary.

Due to the depression, for the last few years. Mamie Sackett has momentarily ceased her wanderings and has been packed away among her souvenirs and her memories. But, she recently resumed her journeying when she revisited the home of her birthplace and viewed the Texas Centennial.

Mamie left her home by air last Friday, April 9, 1937, to leave on the Steamship Hamburg April 14, 1937, for her second trip to Europe. She is going first to the Coronation and will be in Europe for some time. She is going with Mrs. Harry Keffer of Pennsylvania. Mrs. Keffer is National President of Our Story Telling Clubs. This was a wonderful opportunity for Mamie.



Southern Forest Institute Reports Tree Seedlings Planted In 1972-73

pulp and paper, lumber, plywood and other forest products industries planted 46,607,000 seedlings during 1972 - 73 tree - planting season, the Southern Forest Institute reports.

This total represents more than nine percent of all the new trees planted or distributed to private landowners for planting by the forest products industry in the 13 Southern states during the recent December, 1972 -March, 1973 tree - planting

All told, 46,597,000 pine and 10,000 hardwood seedlings were planted in Texas this year. 35,516,000 of these new trees were planted on land owned or leased by the wood - using companies in this state. Another 11,091,000 seedlings were distributed to private landowners for planting on their lands. Additional trees were made available to forest landowners from nurseries operated by the state forestry organization.

One million 300 thousand genetically improved pine seedlings were planted in Texas this season, including 710 thousand superior seedlings planted by industry on its forest lands. Genetically improved

seedlings - often called Supertrees - can grow taller, straighter, and healthier, up to 20 percent faster than ordinary pine seedlings.

Across the South, the forest products industry planted a record 513 million trees this year, more than eight trees for every man, woman, and child in the South!

Besides wood for more than five - thousand different kinds of useful products, the South's forest lands supply other b benefits' too, the Atlanta based forestry institute says,

"Trees give us natural beauty, places for outdoor recreation, improved wildlife habitat, soil erosion control, watershed protection, and oxygen for clean air in the fight against pollution", said Dr. Benton H. Box, executive vice

"Best of all, trees are one of Nature's few renewable resources," the veteran forester explained. "So long as a man who cuts down a tree plants new seedlings promptly in its place, there can always be forests and trees for the future," he said.

"There are more than 204 million acres of trees growing in the forests of the 13 Southern states today." Dr. Box con-

Homeowners tend to put off garden chores until the spring when everything is greening up and spring flowers are in bloom. Then comes the sudden urge to plant trees and shrubs and the rush to the nursery or garden center for plants. Often picked - over stock remain.

Balled and burlapped plants as well as those grown in containers may be transplanted any time of the year.

Many of the deciduous plants - those that lose their leaves root plants should be set out in late fall and winter from mid provides ample time for good

growth begins. With proper care, bare root plants can be set out as late as April, but success depends on the condition of the nursery stock and the care provided the first six months after planting.

For ease of maintenance and to reduce the amount of disease and insect damage, use landscape plants that are native or adapted to the area.

A copy of the leaflet, "How to Transplant Woody Plants", is only limited quanitites of available at the county Extension office and provides helpful landscaping tips for the homeowner.

Seeding stands of small grains are extremely susceptible to the damage caused by the fall armyworm and yellow striped armyworm. As fall temperatures begin to drop, the foliage of other hosts such as grasses, grain sorghum, alfalfa, peas and beans become less attractive and increased damage by these armyworms to stands of small grains can be expected.

The larval stages of these armyworms lasts about 20 days and their pupal stages are passed in the soil. Moths lay eggs in masses on the foliage of host plants.

When large numbers of armyworms are present, small grains stands can be severely damaged in a period of a few days. To prevent excessive stand loss, young stands of small grains should be inspected every three or four days prior to frost.

The need for insecticidal control measures should be determined based on the damage caused to the foliage of young small grain plants. Insecticides are most effective when applied against small larvae. Larger larvae (34 to 112 long) are more difficult to



Tips for using electricity efficiently:

Get well acquainted with the control on your clothes dryer.

Clothes come out of the dryer harsh and stiff when you over-dry them. And you use electricity that isn't needed. If you don't have automatic controls, experiment with the manual control to find the right setting for each type of fabric, then use it. Man-made fabrics, in particular, require extended cool-down periods.

These other suggestions also can help you make more efficient use of your clothes dryer and electricity.

Group clothes together by weight and texture of the fabrics to avoid running an additional cycle for two or three slowerdrying items.

When you want to fluff pillows, sweaters, knits or small throw rugs, tumble them without heat for not more than 15 minutes.

Place your clothes dryer in a heated part of your home, if possible, and have it vented to the outside. A dryer in an unheated area, such as an outside utility room or the garage, can take longer to dry your clothes in winter, because the air temperature in the drum will have to be increased.

And remember to clean the lint filter on the dryer after each load. This will help it operate more efficiently and reduce drying time.


