Landscaping Expert Due Wednesday

Joe C. Brosig II, will be guest speaker at the Eastland Civic League and Garden Club's regular meeting on Nov. 14. Mr.

Brosig is a native West Texan with a life long interest in plants and horticulture. Since he was raised on a ranch;

special interest rests in native plants and natural appeal in landscaping.

After attending Angelo State University, he went to work for Scherz Nursery and Landscape Company in 1964. There he studied and apprenticed under Phil Scherz, the founder of Scherz Nursery, who came to

America a professional gardener from Germany and Otto E. Scherz, a graduate Landscape Architect and owner of Scherz Nursery.

In August, 1970, he became a registered Landscape Architect. He has participated in much of the Landscape design found at the Angelo State University Campus plus numerous commercial and private properties in San Angelo and the West Texas trade area. Mr. Brosig has completed correspondence studies from California based career schools and Landscape Seminar and short courses offered by Texas A&M University. Growers May Be Forced Out

AUSTIN -- Many of Texas' approximately 13,000 peanut growers may be forced out of business if the federal administrative changes announced for the 1974 crop go into effect, Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White warned.

"One farmer forced out of business by a federal program is one too many", White declared.

He criticized especially the elimination of price support for peanuts found to contain aflatoxin and the elimination of transfers by lease, sale, or by owner privileges permitted for acreage allotments.

Peanuts with aflatoxin (a mold over which farmers have

no control) have been used for making oil and for use as a fertilizer in previous years. Such use is valuable, and these peanuts should continue to be eligible for price supports, the Texas Agriculture Commissioner said.

"It's obvious what will happen to the farmer who has gone into debt to buy more equipment in the expectation of growing peanuts on additional acreage he plans to lease from his neighbor", White said. "The federal planners who thought up this change ought to face reality".

White also criticized the four other changes announced in the 1974 peanut program

Mavericks Blast Bulldogs 27-20

The Mavericks' ninth game of the season turned into one of the most exciting seen this year by Maverick fans as the Mavs scored a 27-20 victory over the Hamilton Bulldogs Friday night in Hamilton.

The Maverick team, with Tony Thomas' most outstanding night this season, led the Bulldogs throughout the game except for when both teams came up with a 20-20 tie in the third quarter and a tie of 14-14 in the second quarter.

The weather was a little chilly at Bulldog field in Hamilton but not enough to affect players or fans.

The game opened with Eastland winning the toss and electing to receive from the south end of the field. The kick landed on the 10 yard line and was brought to the 20 by B.W. Robertson. From there Thomas showed his fantastic abilities to the fans, with several running plays which shocked the Bulldogs into giving up yardage down to the 6 yard line. From the 6, Thomas romped for the Mav's first touchdown and first score of the night. With Tom Morren's extra point good, the Mavs lead 7-0.

While both teams fought desperately through the middle of the first period Hamilton came up with the ball and was forced to punt after several plays. The punt went to B.W. Robertson who showed the fans once again his tremendous quality as a punt returner as he scampered 80 yards for the Mavs' second touchdown with 1:50 left in the first quarter.

The extra point by Morren

was once again good and the Mavs moved farther into the lead with a score of 14-0.

Minutes later Hamilton put it all together for the first time and started their first drive in shallow Bulldog territory. With the end result being a 5 yard TD which featured quarterback Richard Wulf handing off to Eddleman for the Bulldogs' first touchdown. The extra point conversion was no good, and so the score stood at 14-6 in favor of the Mavs.

The first turnover in the game occurred with a fumble by Thomas on the Bulldog 30 with the Bulldogs gaining possession.

With 1:32 left in the half, Hamilton's second touchdown took place, after a drive that started on the Mavs 36 yard line with one key play made by Wulf to Blakley who ran in for the touchdown. Extra two point conversion was good. And the score was tied 14-14.

On the kick the Mavericks took possession around the 25 yard line, where Thomas and some key play calls by Quarterback Gary Wheat moved the ball quickly deep into Bulldog territory that set up the pass run play from Wheat to Brent Parker for the Mavs final touchdown going into the half.

The extra point attempt failed and so at the end of the first half the score was Eastland 20 - Hamilton 14.

With 4:10 remaining in the 3rd quarter Hamilton exercised

the well known reverse play against the Mavs which benefited with a 50 yard run by Eddelman for the Bulldogs third and final touchdown of the night. Extra points was no good.

Eastland 20; Hamilton 20. Another turnover occurred early in the 4th quarter with a pass interception by Hamilton on a pass from Wheat to Billy Daniels, which set up a first and ten for the Bulldogs on the Maverick 25 yard line.

As the Maverick's faultless defense held the Bulldogs they were forced to punt, and once again B.W. Robertson came through, this time with punt return that brought the ball to the Hamilton 2 yard line, followed by a 2 yard lunge by Thomas for the Mavs 4th and final TD for the night with 6:36 remaining in the game. Eastland 27; Hamilton 20.

One factor that played a vital part in the game was the Maverick spirit which ran at an all time high this week, topped off by a pep talk to Elvin Hill, principal of E.H.S. Friday morning.

If spirit remains high, there will be no way the Mavs will be deprived of a victory next week, as they take on the Clyde Bulldogs here in Maverick Stadium next Friday night at 7:30.

Eastland's win gives the Mavericks a 3-5-1 season mark and a 2-2 district record. Hamilton is 4-5 on the season and 1-3 in district.






COLLEGE STATION - Predator control in game management is an acceptable practice in Texas if there is enough hunting pressure to remove the resulting surplus of game animals. There are other "ifs" involved, but this in general sums up the findings of Dr. Sam L. Beacom of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the A&M University Department of Wildlife and Fisheries Sciences. Beacom, who says predator control is one of the hottest ecology issues of the day, described his research during a recent meeting of the Wildlife Subcommittee of the Texas Legislative Committee on Environmental Affairs. He told the subcommittee that the phenomenon of predation is a tough ecological problem that is difficult to interpret biologically because there are so many interacting variables to consider.



designated as Food and Fiber
Appreciation Month in Texas.
Let's look at some county
figures.

Cash receipts from
agricultural products totaled
\$18,269,000 last year. That's an
increase of \$4,218,000 over 1971.
Cash receipts from livestock
totaled \$10,329,000 in 1972 while
total receipts from crops came
to \$7,940,000.

Production expenses
mushroomed in 1972 by 23
percent over 1971. Due to in-
creased production expenses,
realized net income was down
in 1972. However, total farm
assets increased in 1972 over
1971.

Peanuts is the county's
leading cash crop. Other major
crops include grain sorghum,
small grain and hay. The
county is second in the state in
the production of peanuts and
sixth in production of turkeys.

Gross farm income in Texas
in 1972 totaled \$4.7 billion, up 13
percent from the previous year.
However, expenses increased a
total of \$3.8 billion. Thus
realized net farm income was
only \$847.4 million, 19 percent
less than in 1971. But a boost in
farm inventories put the total
net farm income at 28 percent
above that of 1971, or about \$1.4
billion.

Pasture Short Course Set In Ranger

A pasture short course for adult farmers will be held Dec. 17 - 20, under the sponsorship of the Ranger High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. James Clark, Superintendent, and Mr. Beverly Dudley, Jr., teacher of vocational agriculture.

Mr. Phillip Nix, pasture specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Soil and Crop Sciences at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Nix holds B.S. and M.S. degrees in Agricultural Education from Texas A&M University, and has also done work in Agronomy at Texas A&M. He has had nineteen years of field experience as a vocational agriculture teacher and as a county agricultural agent, where much of the emphasis was on pasture production.

"Many pasture short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Nix and all have met with outstanding success", according to Ralph Moser, area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Stephenville, Texas. Arrangements for adult education short courses in pasture and in other fields are made through Mr. Moser's office.

The short course at Ranger High School is scheduled to begin Dec. 17 at 7:00 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, Dec. 18, 19 and 20. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Nix will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Mr. Dudley.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. James Clark, or the teacher of vocational agriculture Mr. Beverly Dudley, Jr. An entry fee of \$3 will be charged. Pasture Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Nix states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as adapted grasses and legumes, fertilization, weed control, grazing management and grazing systems. The primary purpose of the course is to help farmers and ranchers make the most profit from their pastures.

"Short courses in pasture, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under a cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University", stated Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University, who coordinates the program for Texas A&M.

"This cooperative program", stated Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialists are now available in the fields of Beef Production, Farm Electric Wiring and Safety, Farm Electric Motors, Farm Arc Welding, Swine Production, Tractor Maintenance, Oxy - Acetylene Welding, and Pasture.
