**Gordon Spot**

Lots of hunters are getting anxious for September 1st, the start of dove season. This starts off five months of almost continuous hunting including seasons for dove, deer, turkey, and quail.

The good spring rains we had this year got us off to a good start. Nearly all farmers and ranchers in Eastland County and the Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District are reporting exceptionally large weed crops. This many weeds might not be good for their grass but it should produce some fine bird hunting this fall and winter.

The deer situation is also looking most favorable at this time. In working with Don Crawford on a one herd grazing system a few days back, we saw a number of large healthy deer during the heat of the day.

Several other ranchers like Don are reporting larger numbers and better deer than in the past.

Although weather conditions are a big part of this, many Eastland County ranchers are using modern management practices that help both livestock and wildlife. All hunters with local hunting leases on places where good grazing management is being carried out can expect better than average hunting this year.

Some good results are being obtained from coastal sprigging and grass seeding carried out this spring.

James E. Wheat of Cisco was by the office and said that he has the best stand of coastal this year that he has ever had. James attributes this to a well prepared seedbed.

Weldon Tankersley and Bob King have some excellent coastal sprigging and Weldon has a good stand of kleingrass. They also did a good job of seedbed preparation and got their grass in, in time to get some of the spring rains.

Went by Don Massingill's place the other day. The green sprangletop that he used as a filler grass or "nurse crop" with his sideoats grama and K.R. Bluestem seeding really looks good.

### Annual Beef Cattle Short Course Will Be August 20

COMBINED BEEF CATTLE AND PASTURE-FORAGE SHORT COURSE ON "INCREASING BEEF CATTLE PROFIT OPPORTUNITIES WITH FORAGE"

Worried about soaring feed costs? Wondering how to get more from your pastures and hay? Concerned about protein supplement costs and using urea? Confused about the proper choice of mineral supplements? Looking for ideas on how to put it all together? Potential solutions to these and other problems will be presented at the upcoming short course at Texas A&M University.

The 23rd Annual Beef Cattle Short Course and the 8th Annual Pasture and Forage Crops Short Course will be combined and held on August 20 and 21, 1973 at the Ramada Inn in College Station, Texas.

Past short courses have emphasized the importance of proper nutrition in improving reproduction and performance in beef cattle. This year's program is concerned with the most economic methods of supplying the nutrition required to maximize reproduction and income from the beef herd. Much of the information presented will also be of interest to cattlemen developing stocker cattle on pasture.

Among the guest speakers will be Dr. W.C. McCormick, Head of the Animal Science Department at Tifton, Georgia, who will discuss factors affecting the feeding value of several different types of bermuda grasses, and including Coastal Coastcross one and Alicia. McCormick has worked cooperatively with Dr. Glen C. Burton, the developer of Coastal bermuda grass, and knows the "cow" side of producing and utilizing grass. He will also discuss research work with winter pastures for cows, stockers and finishing cattle.

Wayne Hamilton, business manager of the Chaparral Ranch at LaPryor, Texas, will discuss improved forages which they have tried and the effect that they have had on overall ranch management.

Of particular interest to rangeland cattlemen will be a discussion of "High Intensity-Low Frequency Grazing System" by Texas Rancher Bill Tullis of San Angelo and Dr. Percy Turner of Water Valley. Both men have several years of practical experience with these grazing systems.

Dr. John Reagor, Toxicologist with the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory, will discuss the

frequency of occurrence and prevention of grass tetany, pulmonary emphysema, nitrate toxicity, bermuda grass staggers and other forage related disease problems.

Eastland County pecans are hard to beat. In fact Mr. D.B. Rainey's entry of Choctaw pecans were not beaten in the State Pecan Show held recently at New Braunfels. Rainey's pecans were named In-Shell champions at the state show. They measured 37 nuts per pound and shelled out 59.2 percent kernel. The Ranger grower entered the pecans in the Eastland County Pecan Show last December where they were named champion. They were also named champion at the regional show in Arlington.

Actually the Rainey's live in Stephens County just north of Ranger, but we claim them as Eastland County folks. The last state pecan champion from Eastland County was grown in 1969 by Mrs. C.E. Smith of Rising Star.

Better take care of your home grown pecans. It is estimated that Texas will produce only 24 million pounds this year. This compares to approximately 64 million pounds produced last year. However, the national production is expected to be considerably higher than last year. Pecans are dropping from the trees pretty bad now. Some of this is insect damage

and some is just plain summer drop. The shuckworm is working now and we found pecan weevils this past week. So, if you have a good crop of pecans and they are beginning to drop we suggest you spray with an insecticide and a fungicide.

This hot, dry summer weather can be a big pain in the eye for cattle. The reason is "pinkeye."

Pinkeye is an infectious eye disease of cattle of all ages and breeds. However, younger animals under two years of age appear to be more susceptible than older ones.

The eye inflammation occurs most often in summer and fall and is generally more prevalent in white-faced animals. Dry, dusty conditions, bright sunlight, feeding in tall grass and the presence of flies all tend to aggravate the condition.

The disease is caused

primarily by a bacteria. The eyelids swell and a watery discharge increases and thickens. The white of the eye becomes inflamed and a white, gray spot appears near the center of the eye. This spot swells and later opens to form an ulcer.

Affected animals are sensitive to light and generally stand in shade. They lose weight quickly, suffer production decreases and may injure themselves because of temporary blindness.

Although the disease generally runs its course in two to four weeks without much damage, secondary bacteria often invades and can cause permanent blindness. Therefore, treatment is important as soon as a case of pinkeye is suspected. However, a veterinarian should be consulted to diagnose the condition before treatment is begun since some eye infections result from viral

causes and will not respond to antibiotics.

Isolate affected animals as soon as possible and protect them from wind, dust and sunlight. Bathe the eye with lukewarm, mild borax solution and dust an antibiotic powder at least twice a day. This prevents a secondary infection and allows the eye to recover without complications. Although no specific drug is available to treat pinkeye, injections of Vitamin A and a cortisone product have helped in some cases.

Horse owners who have not yet had their animals vaccinated against all three types of equine encephalomyelitis in 1973 should check with their local veterinarians about a vaccination schedule.

There has been an outbreak of a disease thought to be a form of equine en-

cephalomyelitis recently in an area north of Beaumont. Seven horses have died thus far.
