NEW DRESS CODE At the regular monthly board meeting this month, the board approved a new Dress Code for students attending the Eastland Public Schools:

Students attending the Eastland Public Schools are expected to dress in a manner that is consistent with good grooming and proper taste.

Boys are not permitted to wear a beard, mustache or hair to classes in three schools and a that is unreasonably long or

Hair should not extend over the eyes in front, below the ear lobe on the side, or below the bottom of the conventional shirt collar in the back when the individual is in a standing

Sideburns should not be extreme in design nor should they extend beyond the bottom of the ear lobe.

Shorts and cut - off jeans are not regarded as proper school

"Tank Tops", fishnet or similar attire are not regarded as proper unless they are worn with a suitable undergarment

Food Stamps To Be Issued November 1, 1973

The first food stamps in Eastland County will be issued November 1, 1973. But before the statewide food stamp program is implemented here, there is much work to be done.

Commodities is the food assistance program currently operating in this county. The 62nd Texas Legislature appropriated \$7.7 million for a statewide food stamp program to replace all county food stamp programs and com-

modity food distributions. By recipients should be eligible for November 1973 the 254 counties in Texas will be operating the statewide program administered by the State Department of Public Welfare.

Before the first stamps are food stamps will replace the present food assistance stamps. program. Most commodity

Certification for food stamp eligibility will begin at a later date. Welfare recipients will be notified that recipients aren't the only ones who can qualify for food

Local issuance offices will

sell the food stamps to all who are certified eligible to receive them. Participating households will be able to buy their stamps at the issuance office nearest them and at their own convenience. The long waiting lines which are now a problem at commodity distribution centers should be eliminated.

Food stamps, which can be used for the purchase of most foods and food products, will be accepted by many of the local grocers. Payment is made by tearing the necessary amount of food stamps from the coupon book at the time of purchase. Tobacco, alcoholic beverages and imported items cannot be purchased with food stamps.

Grocers can deposit food stamps just as they do money. Local bankers then send the stamps to the United States Department of Agriculture for redemption.

All of the various other cross overs will be opening and closed as construction progresses. These will of course, be plainly marked, he pointed out, but our motorists must heed the signs for their own safety.

The construction area will be zoned for 45 miles per hour and the Highway Patrol will be asked to strictly enforce this limit, too, he said.

The 4.6 mile project is expected to take some 400 (seven hour) working days.

Detouring and re - routing may be delayed awhile, the contractor indicated, so that his equipment can get in the borrow material before the lanes change.

Mr. Haun was especially complimentary of the contractors for this job and praised both their work and cooperative spirit.

To the public, all appeal for: "Caution through construction."

Hunts Reunion Held

The 12th annual reunion of the Hunt families of Ranger and Eastland was held at Eastland City Park on Saturday, Aug. 4th, 1973, with some 65 relatives in attendance ranging from Dallas, Houston, California, Kansas City, Mo., and Phoenix, Ariz.

Highlight of this meeting was Dr. and Mrs. Ray Rushing of Dallas,. Dr. Rushing, well known Evangelist, is a distant cousin of the Hunt twins and their families. The twins, Seneca C. and James M. Hunt's father was the late Rev. Ellis Milton Hunt, former pastor of First Baptist Church of Eastland and early - day colporter and minister in both West Texas and Northeast Texas as far back as 1860.

The Hunts migrated from Kentucky into Missouri and north Texas. The Rev. James M. Hunt, father of Ellis Milton Hunt, was ordained in one of the first Baptist Churches in Texas, the Kentucky - Town Baptist Church of Grayson County, coming to them by letter from General Baptists of Kentucky, his first sermon being from Romans 8:1. His son, the Rev. Ellis Milton Hunt was trying to make it from Texas to the Northern States to enlist since he was opposed to slavery. However, he was taken prisoner by the Confederate Army and spent the duration of the Civil War in the starvation camps of the Confederacy. One of his brothers, however, served with the Confederacy and later became a Texas Ranger, and the records show he retired on a pension of \$13 per month.

Dr. and Mrs. Rushing have spent much time and research of the history of the Hunts and have furnished the answer as to why twin boys were named-Seneca and Jim. The records show that one son was named for the father of Mrs. E.M. Hunt (Seneca Hoblett) and the other for the preacher father of the Rev. E.M. Hunt, (James M.
