Scherz Nursery in San Angelo has made this package deal possible in response to Civic League's request for

assistance. Their landscape architect, Joe Brosig, has been in Eastland making a survey before selecting the contents of the package deal. The live oak, indigenous to this area, and other items which do well in West Texas have been chosen after careful consideration by this expert.

Mr. Brosig will be the speaker at the Civic League Nov. 14th meeting, explaining planting instructions and future care of the trees and shrubs.

Mrs. McCloud suggests that home owners use this opportunity to plant these trees and shrubs as memorials, honorific gestures, new-baby gifts, Christmas gifts, etc. Clubs might want to honor members of occasions.



## Southwest Ranks First In Green Stamp Users

Nationally, seven out of every ten supermarket shoppers saved trading stamps in 1972 - but the figure was even higher for the Southwest, according to a national public opinion survey.

In the 215 cases studied, 75 percent of Southwestern households saved stamps and an additional four percent said they would save them if they were available. While statisticians say the figures could be six percent higher or lower because of the number of

people interviewed, the study suggests that the Southwest is the most industrious stamp-saving region in the country.

These regional figures are part of a nationwide survey released recently. The study, conducted by Benson & Benson, Inc., of Princeton, N.J., shows that stamp saving is a way of life in the typical American household. Some 47 million families save them.

Benson & Benson began making surveys for The Sperry and Hutchinson Company, the

nation's largest stamp company, in 1957 to help the company keep in accurate touch with the depth and extent of consumer interest in the trading stamp concept. Since then, 16 annual studies have been compiled to produce the most reliable data in the industry.

S&H's Southwestern regional manager and assistant vice president, Robert A. Sawhill, sees very little variance between regional and national trends in trading stamp

collection and redemption in this year's report.

Nationally, the figure of 70 percent stamp savers is exactly the same as it was in 1958, although there was a large increase in the mid-1960's.

As you might expect, larger families tend to save trading stamps more than smaller ones, according to national figures. But there is no more than a seven percentage point difference in occupational groups' stamp saving habits. Households classed as professional or managerial exhibited the highest saving figure with 74 percent. At a

sales and clerical level and among skilled and semi-skilled workers, the figure was 69 percent.

More American women (72 percent) save than men, but men continue to show trading stamp interest. Some 60 percent of the men either save personally or contribute to the family's stamp collection.

Southwestern states covered include Alabama, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas.

# Gordon Spot

Dr. Thomas A. Lee, Area Plant Pathologist in Stephenville, reports to us that the Web Blotch disease of peanuts caused by a fungus was identified in this peanut growing area on August 20th. This was the first time that the disease has been identified in the area this year.

New regulations on the brucellosis programs are coming up for cattlemen. In a meeting in Brownwood last Monday night cattlemen were told about the new regulations by the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Those who did not like the new regulations were encouraged to attend a statewide hearing in Austin on September 18th, 1973.

The new brucellosis testing program is expected to begin October 1st and is designed to eliminate the cattle disease from Texas. Most of the testing will be done at the livestock markets. We have several copies of the new regulations and will be glad to give a copy to any cattleman.

We have seen some beautiful

home gardens in Eastland County this year. One of the best is owned by Mr. and Mrs. I.O. Ross of Carbon. They are growing a new variety of tomatoes named the TAMU Saladette. The tomato plants grow upright and do not need to be staked. The plants are putting on a very heavy crop even in this hot weather. One thing bothered Mr. Ross, the leaves of the tomato plants roll up. We were afraid the tomatoes had some unfamiliar disease, but after sending a sample to Dr. John Larsen, Extension Horticulturist at Texas A&M, we learned that this rolled leaf was characteristic of the new variety.

Peanuts in Eastland County still look good, but the dry land peanuts sure need rain now.

## Accent on Health

If you could virtually insure your child against having five dangerous diseases, would you make the effort?

State Health Department officials strongly emphasize that immunizing children against early childhood diseases is worth both the time and expense -- for the child's health and the health of others.

Under ideal circumstances, only a few visits to a clinic or private physician are needed to complete the immunization schedule during the child's first year and a half of life.

You say it's an inconvenience? There's no real threat you say? Don't fool

yourself into thinking the "conquered" diseases are really conquered. Sure, your child is safer from disease than his or her grandfather might have been, but consider this: -- Two of the four cases of paralytic polio reported in Texas last year struck children under two years old. -- Children under the age of five were the target of almost 30 percent of the 41 cases of diphtheria and about 35 percent of the 20 cases of tetanus. -- 43 percent of the approximately 1600 cases of ordinary measles reported by age in Texas last year occurred in children under the age of five. -- Of the 185 reported cases of whooping cough or pertussis in Texas last year, 50 percent of those whose age was recorded were four years old and under.

You say your child is strong and healthy and can withstand a few days in bed with a communicable disease? Think about children still to be born. If your child has rubella and infects a susceptible neighbor, friend, or acquaintance during the first months of the pregnancy, the chances are that the newborn, if the newborn does arrive, might suffer blindness, deafness,

disease. The new Florunner variety of peanuts appears to be much more resistant or tolerant of the Web Blotch than to the common varieties such as Starr. Chemical control of the disease this season in South Texas was unpredictable at best. No fungicide did a good job of controlling the disease. The best results were achieved by growers who maintained a regular spray schedule regardless of what material they used.

Adequate coverage requires more water than most growers normally use. Nevertheless, adequate coverage is just as important as a regular schedule for good foliage disease control on peanuts.

### THE FAMILY LAWYER

#### Women Bartenders?

Do women have a constitutional right to be bartenders? Until the last few years, courts have steadfastly said no. Laws against women bartenders, when challenged as discriminatory, were upheld on two main grounds:

1) that their presence would encourage immorality in a place "where the worst passions are aroused;" and  
2) that they could not keep the peace as effectively as men bartenders.

But in several recent cases, courts have taken a fresh look at the question and come up with the opposite answer. Immorality is no more encouraged, said one court, by a woman behind the bar than by waitresses out front serving cocktails.



As for keeping the peace, another court had this comment: "The saloon days of the Wild West are long gone. Nowadays the typical bar does not provide a setting for violence and danger, if in fact it ever did."

For good measure, the court added:

"Women are as capable of mixing drinks as men."

Less innocuous activities, however, may still be subject to restraint. Another case involved a city ordinance forbidding the use of "B girls"—women hired by the management to solicit drinks from male customers. A tavern owner claimed that his women employees were being deprived of their freedom of speech and assembly.

"Their freedom of speech," he reasoned, "includes the right to talk to customers and their freedom of assembly includes the right to mingle with customers."

But a court said the rights of speech and assembly, while guaranteed in general by the Constitution, may be limited in specific situations for specific reasons. Noting the city's power to discourage drinking, the court said:

"If the regulation curtails freedom in some slight degree, the limitation is not unconstitutional. These rights are not absolute."

retardation and heart disease. Is it worth taking such a chance, when a single immunization for rubella could eliminate the possibility of your child causing such a tragedy? A 1971 state law requires that all children entering school must be immunized against diphtheria, tetanus, polio, measles, and rubella.

In those areas where no local facilities exist to provide immunization services, the State Department of Health will provide or administer the required vaccines.

As a further result of the 1971 law, Texas schools now maintain a record of the immunizations of every student in the State.

In an attempt to increase immunization among the very young, the State Health Department has implemented an Infant Immunization Surveillance Program. The program essentially involves mailing cards to parents of newborn and one-year old children, informing them of recommended vaccination times, and asking to check and return the cards. Reminder cards are issued to non-

responding parents, and field referrals are issued to local health departments and Immunization Service Aides if parents do not respond to the reminder cards.

The recommended time table for immunizations is as

follows: At the ages of two, four, and six months, infants should receive DTP injections for diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis, as well as oral polio vaccine. When the child is one year old, he or she should be immunized for measles and rubella. The DTP and polio immunizations should be repeated when the child is

between 15 and 18 months, and again, when the child is between four and six years old.

Health Department officials emphasize that parents can help reduce disease in Texas by having their children immunized early, as suggested by the time table, and responding promptly to health department inquiries.

## Christy Jolly Returns From Mexico

Christy Jolly, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. J.O. Jolly of Eastland, has just returned from a summer of working in Mexico.

She with two other young ladies was sent by Texas Baptists to inoculate hundreds of children that had never received any shots. Part of their time was used in training a midwife in each village. They traveled by burro and jeep to remote areas near the Rio Grande. Christy said the high point of her summer was getting to deliver a baby.

A massive wave of mercy that has drawn more than 50,000 volunteers to meet human need along the 900 mile Texas - Mexico border will be aired in a 30 minute documentary on television station KTXS on September 15 beginning at 9:30 a.m.

"Although the mission effort called the 'River Ministry' has been quietly expanding at our doorway to Mexico for about five years, many Texans have probably never heard of it," said Dr. T.A. Patterson, Dallas, executive secretary of the Baptist General Convention of Texas. "This is largely because it hasn't, until now, been widely covered in television or newspapers."

The film, "Rio Grande", shows Texans, including teenagers, doctors, farmers, ministers and others giving their time and talents to improve the lot of the 2½ million people along the River.

During the past five years more than 50,000 people of all ages from upstate Texas have spent vacations and other times doing everything from digging wells in desert areas to building churches where there are none.

Many doctors, dentists and other medical personnel travel to the Rio Grande regularly to give their time and talents to heal people's bodies and spirits, said Dr. Patterson. Several mobile clinics fashioned from old trucks and buses carry the doctors and their equipment and supplies into isolated areas where people wouldn't otherwise get the medical care they need.

About two years ago, Baptists launched an agricultural missions program to make isolated desert areas between Big Bend and El Paso - Juarez "blossom like a rose". Already many residents of Los Fresnos and El Comedor, Mex., downriver from El Paso have a livelihood and a better life through irrigation, and such crops as pecan trees and bee culture as well as vegetable gardens for the first time.

"To continue the 'River Ministry' and to extend a caring hand to millions of other Texans," said Dr. Patterson, "more than 4,000 Southern Baptist Churches across Texas will seek to raise \$1 million in a special state missions offering in September."

"Though \$1 million may

not seem large in a state the size of Texas," said Dr. Patterson, "when it's backed up by thousands of volunteers from all walks of life, it reaches infinitely far."

"Mix with your financial resources, people - black, white, brown, and yellow - working together shoulder - to - shoulder in Christian love and you have an unbeatable combination."

## Tips for using electricity efficiently:

# Resist the temptation to set your thermostat lower than you need to.

Air conditioning engineers recommend that thermostats be set at 76 to 78 degrees for comfort and economy. Every degree below this requires units to work harder and use more electricity.

However, if you plan to be away all day, you can economize by raising the setting five degrees. Turn off the unit when you go on vacation, unless there are items that might be damaged by the heat. If so, leave the unit on, but raise the setting at least five degrees.

Here are some other things you can do to keep your costs as low as possible:

Enjoy cleaner air and lower costs by keeping the filters clean. A dirty filter causes the unit to work harder. Check them at least once a month. If it's a permanent-type filter, clean it according to the manufacturer's directions. Disposable filters should be replaced at least every 90 days, or earlier if necessary.

Also, keep out direct sunlight with awnings, blinds or draperies. Weather-strip doors and windows, and properly insulate walls and ceilings. Be sure the fireplace damper is closed. And, when possible, bathe, cook and do the laundry during cooler parts of the day to prevent heat buildup.





## Oil Business In County Beginning To BOOM

Oil business in Eastland County is beginning to pick up. John R. Shaw and Associates of Eastland has drilled 10 producing wells and has set pipe on two other wells in this area.

The wells are located on the J.W. Barnes and B.A. Danley leases northeast of Eastland and northwest of Ranger.

One well, the E-1 Barnes, is a flowing Mississippi and is producing 2400 barrels of oil per month, Mr. Shaw said. Another well, the A-1, located on the Danley lease is also producing the allowable amount of oil per month Shaw added.

Two more wells are in the process of being drilled on the Barnes lease with surfacing set on the J-1, and rigging is being placed for K-1. A number of wells are to be drilled Shaw said and his crew is now waiting for the completion of a new rig.
