'Batman' Due Saturday, 10 a.m. For Easter Youth Treat Show

Following the phenomenal success of the "Batman" television series, executive producer William Dozier, whose Greenlawn Productions

produced the series for 20th Century-Fox Television, met with officials of the studio, and the decision was made to bring Batman to the wide screen in

full color and in a full-length feature.

"We all agreed on one major point," he explained. "The feature would be a major endeavor and produced with the budget, techniques and range of locations of a major enterprise, not a two-hour television show."

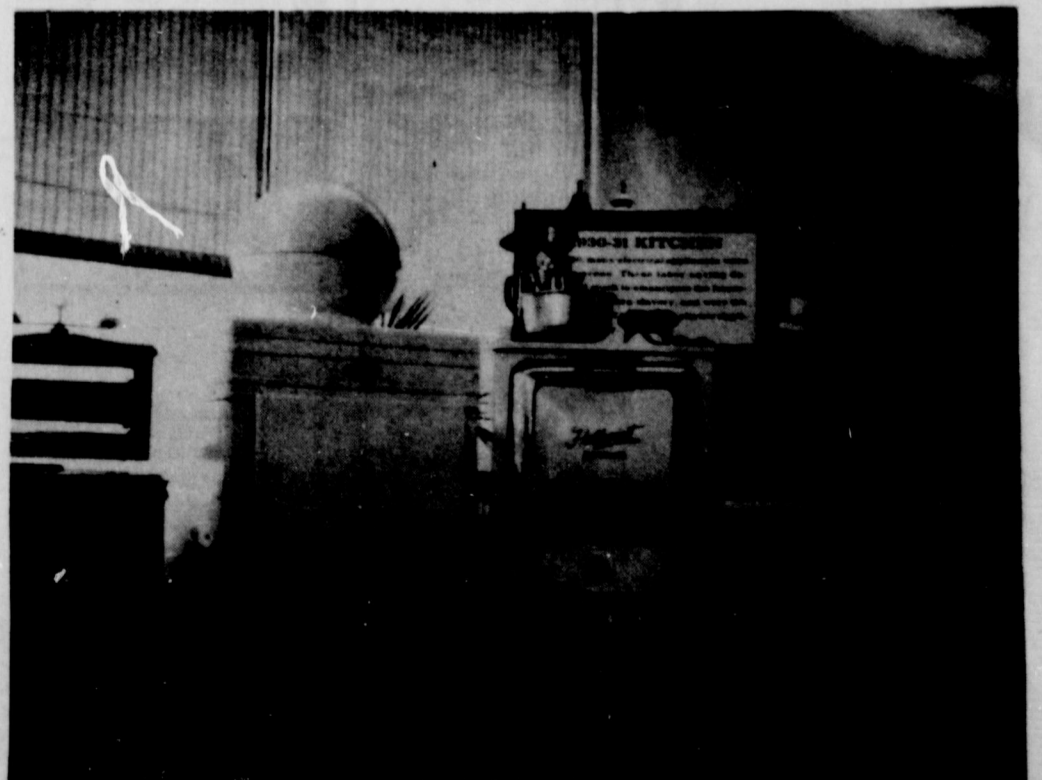
On Thursday night in Ranger, the very appropriate movie "Boom Town" will be shown with extra-added attractions to mark the occasion;

Outlook For Peanut Industry Examined at Key Meeting

Peanut grower representatives from the nation's three major peanut producing areas gathered in Washington D.C. for a series of peanut program discussions on April 10, 11, and 12. Representatives from the

Southwest area were Mr. Johnnie Rollins of Granbury, Texas; Floyd King of Eakly, Oklahoma and Ross Wilson of Gorman, Texas. Wayne Eaves of the Texas Peanut Producers Board, joined the group for a

meeting on 1973 peanut price support differentials held on April 12. They joined peanut growers on April 10 from Georgia, Alabama, North Carolina and Virginia to discuss possible peanut program changes. Following lengthy deliberations the following 10 guidelines were adopted by growers as desirable principles to be incorporated in any new peanut program:

1. Peanuts are not to be included in the general farm bill.
2. We oppose any open-ended program.
3. Peanuts produced for domestic uses are to be supported at not less than 75 percent of parity.
4. Peanut program legislation will make mandatory a sheller purchase program.
5. Shellers shall pay full support on commercial purchases of farmers stock peanuts. The difference between loan and support (\$14.52) shall be placed in a CCC fund to defray costs of supporting segregation, the purchase program and freeze damaged peanuts.
6. Proceeds from peanuts going under loan and subsequently redeemed and sold for edible use shall be distributed within the area by types to growers who participate in the loan program.
7. The 1,610,000 acres shall be maintained as the minimum acreage. Present farm acreage history shall be maintained.
8. Production shall continue to be controlled by acreage rather than poundage.
9. The use of Certificates shall be avoided if at all

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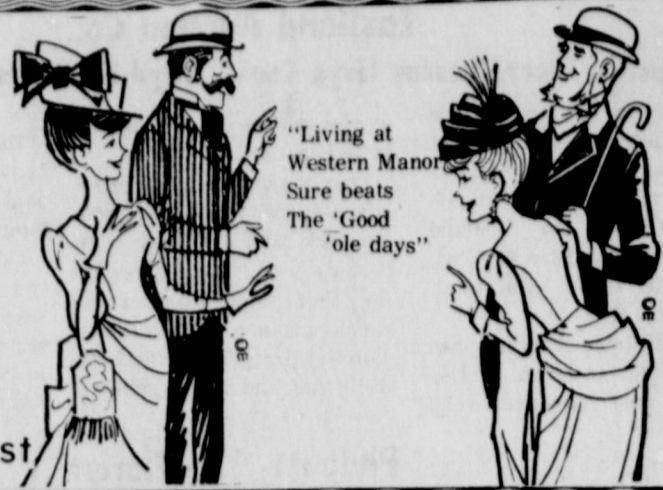

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\$2.5 Million Plant Schedules

The Ranger Industrial Foundation, Ranger Chamber of Commerce and the Texas Railway Car Corporation has scheduled formal dedication of the multi-million dollar railway car shop's new facility May 5 at the site of the new industry for Ranger. Location of the shop is about two miles

north of the city. The dedication ceremonies and barbecue will be held in conjunction with the Centennial Celebration of Eastland County. The dedication ceremonies will be held at 2:00 p.m. at the TRCC site. Several dignitaries of the State have accepted invitations

to attend including Governor Dolph Briscoe, Congressman Omar Burleson, Senator Tom Creighton, State Representative Joe Hanna and J.C. Love general manager of the Missouri Pacific Railroad. Thousands of local and area residents are also expected to attend the grand opening. The new plant will employ up to 350 male employees and is the

most modern in the nation, with facilities to handle any type of railroad car design, construction and repair. The plant is equipped to design and build any type of railroad car, rebuild existing rolling stock and renovate and rebuild damaged cars.

The plant is housed in special designed all metal buildings with three bridge cranes and has 60,000 square feet of inside working space. Twelve miles of railroad tracks with ingress on both East and West ends of the Main Line of the Missouri Pacific railroad are accessible to the plant. The Texas Railway Car Corporation has its own diesel switching locomotive and has completely enclosed sand-blasting equipment, painting equipment and a car straightening stall.

Also at the plant is 1,200 feet of tank-cleaning tracks, complete with All-Hydro Static Testing equipment for tank work and air brake triple test room and an air compressor building housing equipment with a capacity of 2,600 CFM. Three steam generating boilers with a capacity of 425 horsepower is also located in the new plant.
