Bill Mack Due Here For Saturday Concert



The Bill Mack Country Show will be held at 9 p.m. Saturday at the Kendrick Amphitheater between Eastland and Cisco.

Proceeds from the special show will go to help construct the Religious Diarama Museum.

Bill Mack, WBAP's midnight cowboy, is one of the more well known disc jockeys. He has been voted as the top country and western disc jockey in the nation twice in the past seven years.

Mack, who is heard nightly on the Open Road Show on WBAP in Fort Worth, is also a song writer. His song, "Drinking Champagne," has become something of a classic, having been recorded by more than 50 artists in both the country and western pop fields.

Other songs Mack has written include "Clinging to a Saving Hand," "Ladonna" and "Today I'm Bringing You Roses." He has written more than 300 songs and recorded about 100 records.

Tickets cost \$2 for reserved seats. There are only about 1,000 reserved seats for sale. General admission tickets cost \$1.50 for adults and \$1.00 for children ages 6 through 12.

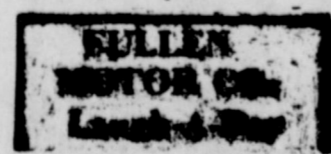
Mr. Edmund Hare Funeral Services Held Tuesday

The younger group will attend the second 90 days. It is important that all register who plan to attend this year in order to carefully survey the number who will attend.

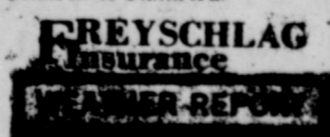
Funeral Services For Robert L. Smith Held Thursday

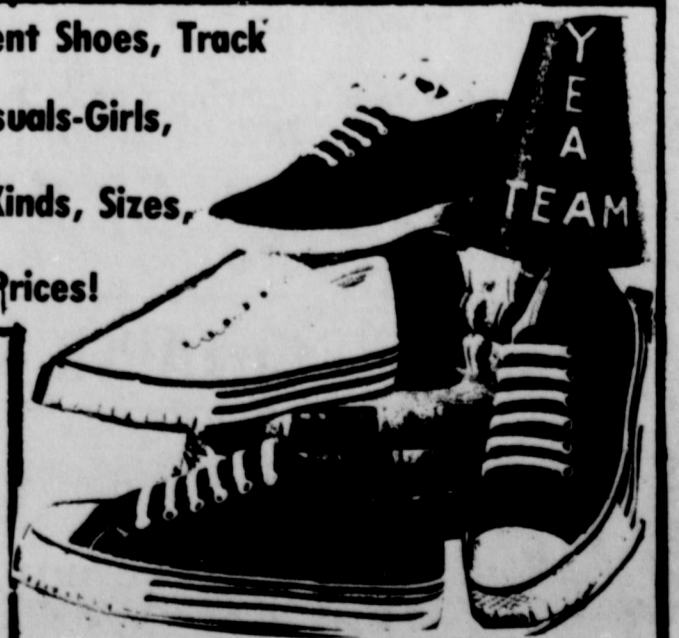

larger during its boom days, look forward each year with anticipation to the return of old-settlers, ex-students and teachers to reminisce and relive many events and experiences of the past.

The Desdemona oil field, described by many as the greatest ever discovered in the nation, developed after the Joe Duke discovery well brought in on September 2, 1919.

The settlement in early days was named "Hog Town" after near-by Hog Creek. The town, although officially named Desdemona in 1882, has never completely lost the title "Hog Town."

Stories attribute the name "Desdemona" to several different origins. Supposedly an investor of the oil boom days, after many days of waiting, saw oil spouting toward the sky and shouted, "Deah's De

Money."

Cutchen of Robert Lee wished he hadn't told his neighbors what he had come across on his ranch 19 miles southeast of Brownwood along the Colorado River. They all laughed at him.

McCutchen was out on horseback one day gathering muttons and heard the tinkle of a tiny bell. Then a coyote crossed a nearby ridge. McCutchen would swear it had a bell on its neck. The coyote moved away from him but didn't seem unduly wild.

At the time he hadn't noticed he was losing sheep, but he began watching closer and found that he had. He called on Goldthwaite trapper Hammond Humphries, who put out traps and snares. A little more than a week ago McCutchen came across the coyote again in an area a little away from the place where

Humphries had been working. Humphries moved his operation and caught the coyote in a snare almost immediately.

Sure enough, it was wearing a small turkey bell, attached to a dog collar. The collar bore a name that appeared to be Oscar T. Scherhart, Devine, Tex., southwest of San Antonio.

How the coyote got the 200 or more miles from Devine to Brownwood is a matter of considerable interest to McCutchen and Humphries.

The West Texas Livestock Weekly contacted Scherhart by telephone Wednesday. Scherhart, a Devine rancher, said he caught the coyote in a trap last Nov. 10 and put the collar and bell around its neck as a curiosity. He thought she would probably stay around the place, but he stopped hearing the bell after a few days.

"I just didn't want to kill it," he said. "I like to see wild things." He gave up sheep some time ago because of coyotes.

Like the others, Scherhart was baffled by the long distance she traveled since November.

Anyway, McCutchen says the neighbors' laughing has stopped.

TAKE AIM AND FIRE

What would happen to my spiritual life if there were no revivals, crusades, church fellowships, or retreats?

Now they bear no fruit and barely stay alive. What has happened? Before, someone with those watersed them several times a week; now, the hose is gone and they must live from one rainfall to the next. The rain keeps them alive but they bear no fruit. The church is doing their part in watering you. Unless you do some watering, you will awake one day to find your Christian life is only skin deep. You lack the depth that comes from reaching into the storehouse of God's riches and departing with treasures eternal.

Maybe you are not concerned with your spiritual life. If you are a born again believer in Christ, you are only half a person when you do not care. I enjoy watching a good horror movie. As a teenager, I remember staying up to all hours in the morning watching a horror show on television with my sisters. Several times, the setting would be Africa or South America. The theme of the show centered around native zombies that would attack and kill villagers. G.K. Chesterton said that a Christian is a dead pagan. After becoming a Christian, you must begin to grow as a Christian or your life will be hollow. A Christian, who is not a living witness of Jesus Christ, is one of the most miserable people alive. With one hand, they have reached up and grabbed God; and with the other hand they have reached down and grabbed the world. They have just enough of God to make them miserable in the world and just enough of the world to make them miserable with God.

The Christian pilgrimage is a hard road, but you will find it a welcomed way the longer you walk in it. Satan will work on you harder if he sees you begin to think serious about living for God.

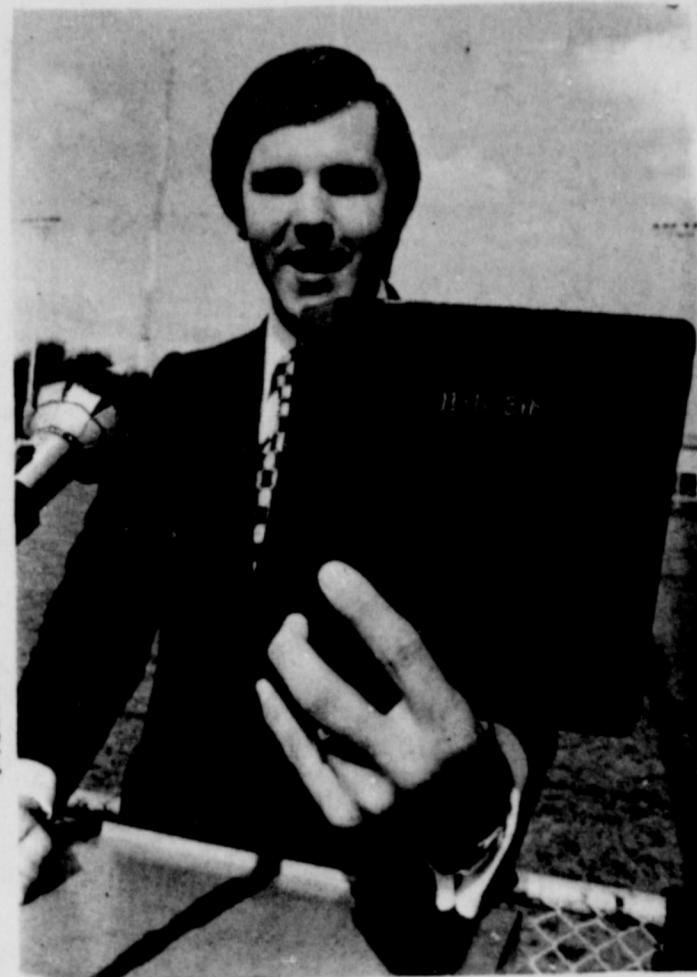

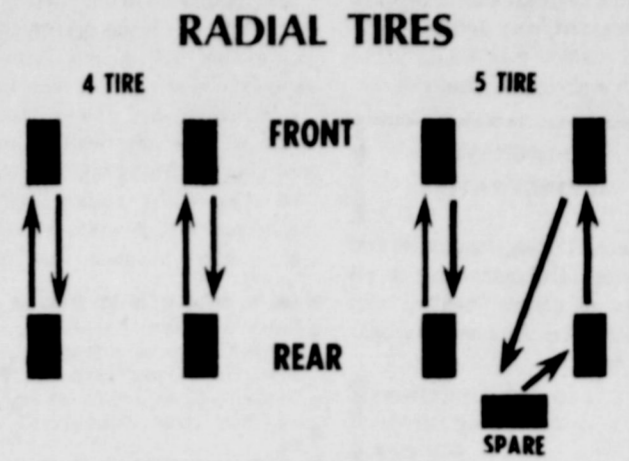
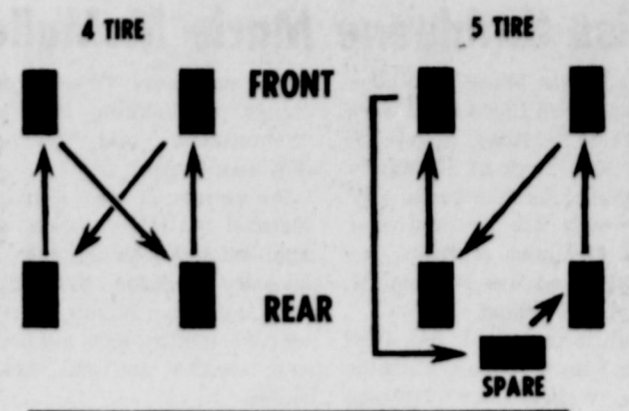
