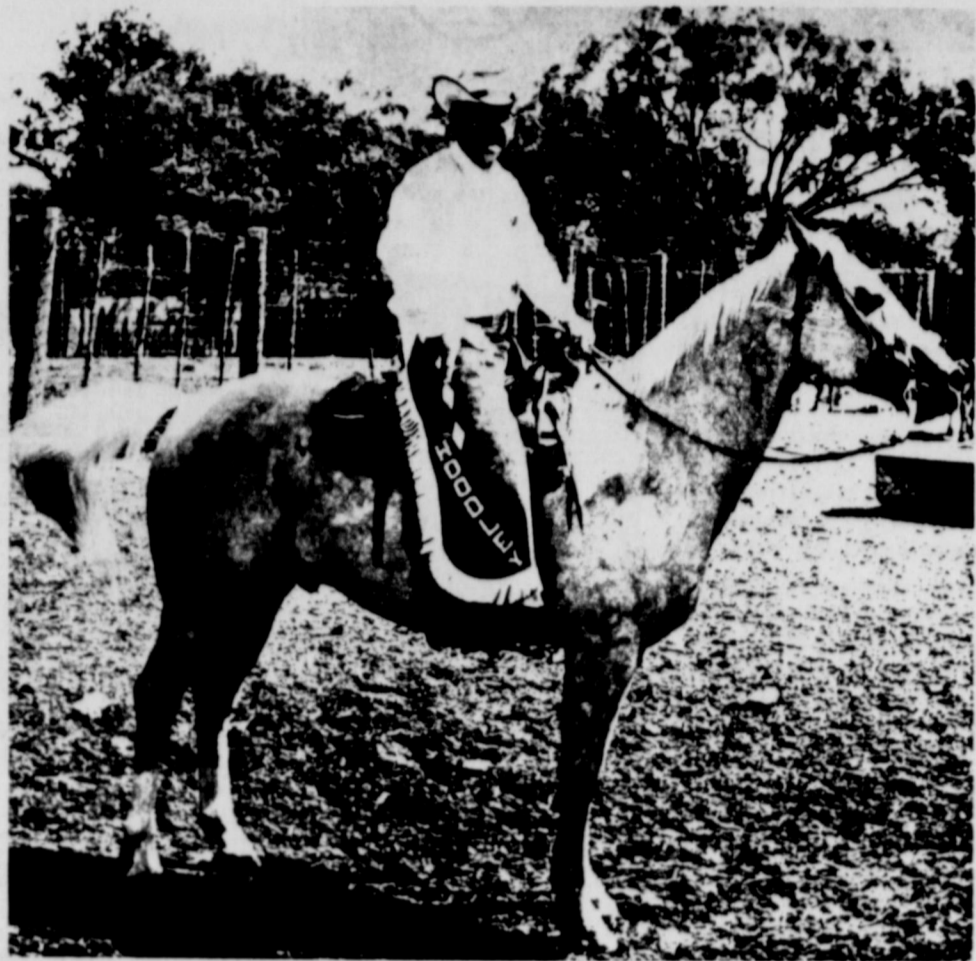

## Accent on Health

It's vacation time, the time of the year when Americans take to the highways. It's the time of the year when people spend a lot of their time in automobiles. As a result, traffic accidents are more frequent.

On an annual average, someone dies in a traffic accident every ten minutes - 150 every day - and thousands more are injured.

Many of these accidents are avoidable, say traffic safety officials at the Texas State Department of Health, and many serious accidents could be reduced to minor collisions if drivers learned and practiced "defensive driving." Here are a few tips taken from the National Safety Council's Defensive Driving Course.

In order to improve your driving ability you must first evaluate your driving skills, using "perfect" driving as a standard.

Perfect driving simply means that you complete every trip without accidents without traffic violations, without vehicle abuse, and without discourtesy.

Perfect driving means always avoiding "preventable" accidents. Most accidents are preventable by one or both of the drivers involved, even though this sometimes involves letting the driver in the wrong have the right-of-way. To do this you must learn to give a little, to drive defensively and not as if you were on the offense. You must tailor your driving behavior to the unexpected actions of others and to other unpredictable factors such as light, weather and road conditions.

To do this, you'll need to know and apply the standard accident prevention formula, which involves three interrelated steps:

1. See the Hazard: Think about what is going to happen as far ahead of encountering the situation as possible. Never assume everything will be "all right."
2. Understand the Defense! Learn the appropriate defensive reaction so you can apply it when the need arises.
3. Act in time: Never take a "wait and see" attitude. Included in these steps are other ways of preventing an accident:

**Stay Alert:** Never take a "wait and see" attitude. Included in these steps are other ways of preventing an accident:

**Stay Alert:** Watch for signs from other drivers as to what they intend to do. Is his turn signal on? Are his brake lights lit? Has he been gradually drifting to the right or the left as if to prepare for a turn?

**Stay ahead of the situation:** Look beyond the driver ahead to see situations that may force him to act quickly and thereby become a threat to you.

**Stay back:** Allow one car length for every ten miles of speed - even more in adverse road conditions. Apply the "two-second rule" to insure a safe distance. As the car ahead of you passes a highway sign or some other marker, count off two full seconds before your car passes the same marker. This applies for in-town driving also.

**Start stopping sooner:** Apply your brakes the instant you see a hazard developing, but apply them gradually so you don't throw your car in a spin or come to a stop so quickly that you risk a rear-end collision.

WASHINGTON, D.C. - On June 18, the U. S. Supreme Court rendered a decision in the case contesting the State Legislature's action in reshaping Congressional Districts.

A three-judge Federal Court in Dallas threw out the Legislature's action and adopted a plan of its own, which was appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court.

The judgment of the lower Court in Dallas was reversed and instructions issued for the Court to adopt what is known as Plan B, which is neither the apportionment decided by the Texas Legislature nor the Federal Trial Court. Plan B was an alternate arrangement to the adopted by the Dallas Court and varies from the legislative plan.

The 17th Congressional District, composed of 31 Counties and represented by Congressman Omar Burleson, was altered by placing Saba, McCulloch and Brown Counties in the Congressional District represented by W. R. (Bob) Poage of Waco. To partially make up the loss of population, Knox, Baylor and Lynn Counties were added on the north and west to District 17.

leman, Coanche and Erath Counties were also placed in the 11th District. The main portions of these three Counties will continue to be in the 17th District, represented by Omar Burleson.

In the case of Parjer County, Weatherford and north is placed in the 17th District and the remainder in the 6th District, represented by Olin E. Teague of College Station.

Cooke County is divided between the 4th District, represented by Congressman Ray Roberts of McKinney, and Congressman Omar Burleson of the 17th District.

A small part of Dawson County is placed in Congressman Burleson's 17th District. Dawson County, with this arrangement, is shared between Burleson and Congressman George Mahon.

It is still possible the three-judge Federal Court in Dallas, which retains jurisdiction, could yet make some changes on its own, but it is not likely.

Following the U.S. Supreme Court's decision, the Texas Delegation in Congress, meeting with Senator Lloyd Bentsen, was of the opinion not to ask for a re-hearing, under a good assumption that it would not be granted and under the further assumption that something worse could happen.

Commenting further, Burleson said that it is painful to lose people whom he has represented for so long and with whose area and problem he is familiar.

"In this arrangement, with more than 30,000 square miles making up our Congressional district, it is difficult to see people and know them, which I think is fundamental and essential to

the best representation in the Congress. Naturally, one regrets to lose the relationship with friends and constituents in the areas lost to other Congressional Districts. I should add that in all cases where my present constituents are represented by these other Members of Congress, they will have able and dedicated men."

In the new areas added to the 17th district, Burleson said that he welcomed these additions and in the arrangement a community of interest is maintained which is all for the good. The Congressman said that at the earliest opportunity he would be making visits to Baylor, Knox, Lynn, Dawson and Parker Counties, where he looks forward to making new friends and contacts.

Prior to the U.S. Supreme Court's decision, the 17th Congressional District, as drawn by the State Legislature, had a population of 446,912. The ideal number, based on the 1970 Census, is 466,530. Under plan "B," favored by the Court, the 33 Counties involved in the 17th District will have 466,432.

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Gordon Spot

Peanut planting is just about completed in Eastland County. The soil moisture needed for planting has been adequate in most areas of the county. The warm sunny weather has been ideal for good growth of peanuts and other plants.

In regard to our moisture and water storage the county is in good condition going into the two hottest and driest months of the year. Most farm stock ponds are full and summer

At the end of the first six months of 1972 Eastland had recorded 6.21 inches of rain. Rising Star and Gorman reported a little more. Through the first six months of this year the rainfall has produced more than 16 inches, only two or three inches short of the total rainfall for 1972. In case you are interested, the average rainfall for the first six months in Eastland County is 13.85 inches.

So you see - that's why the county is in good condition on July 1st! However, most of us would welcome a good rain now.

A lot of homeowners are having black spot, a fungus disease, on roses. The disease causes dark spots on either side of the surrounding leaf area. The darkness of the spots and yellow margins distinguish black spot from other diseases which also cause black spots.

Black spot, which may weaken plants and make them more susceptible to other disorders, causes premature leaf drop and sometimes severe defoliation. Continued attack results in unattractive plant foliage as well as reduced size, number and quality of blooms.

Rose varieties may vary in susceptibility to black spot but none are completely immune.

The first step toward controlling black spot is sanitation. If only a few leaves show symptoms, remove and burn them. Remove all diseased leaves from around plants, particularly at the end of the growing season since the fungus overwinters in such leaves. The canes are also a frequent overwintering place so it is sometimes wise to prune them before new growth starts. However, do not cut too close to grafts.

Many commercial fungicide preparations are also available to control black spot and other rose diseases. One new fungicide that is very effective is benomyl, known by trade name as Benlate. This is one of the fungicides peanut growers used to find in a small package. It sells in the farm supply stores in two pound packages, but this is more than most homeowners would use in a life time. It only takes 1/2 teaspoon in three gallons of water. It

- REFRIGERATOR OR FREEZER:** Change thermostat control to slightly warmer (or "Vacation") setting according to the manufacturer's recommendations.
- DISHWASHER:** Make sure it's empty. Shut the door, but do not latch.
- DISPOSER:** Run and flush with cold water.
- ELECTRIC RANGE:** Make sure all switches are in the "Off" position.
- WASHERS:** Turn off water supply at faucets.
- WATER HEATER (ELECTRIC):** Turn off at circuit breaker panel. When you return, run a small amount of water from a hot water faucet to make sure there is water in the tank before you turn the circuit on.
- TRASH COMPACTOR:** Remove any accumulated trash.
- TELEVISION SETS:** Unplug from electric outlet and disconnect the antenna lead-in cable.
- CLOCK RADIOS, ETC.:** Check these and all other items with automatic "On-Off" controls. Disconnect the ones that won't be needed.
- LIGHTING:** Be sure that all lights are off except those needed for security, such as: 1) yard light and/or other exterior lighting with automatic controls — on at dusk, off at dawn; 2) portable lamp in living area with automatic control; 3) hall or bathroom light.
- AIR CONDITIONING:** Normally, air conditioning should be turned off completely while on summer vacation. However, if there is anything in your home that might suffer heat damage, the thermostat setting could be raised 5 to 10 degrees above normal operation and the unit left on. For comfort, you might have a friend or neighbor turn on the unit the day of your return.

phasizing -- United States citizenship. They declared that it was important lest we forget the rights and privileges of American citizenship -- and lest our obligations as loyal citizens be overlooked.

The urgency of the day and what to do about it were developed at a large gathering of authors, artists and editors in New York City early in 1917. As consequence of their concern a nationwide contest was proposed to promote the creation of a creed which would set forth faith in American freedom principles -- something that would reflect our cherished traditions and loyalty.

The press and many magazines publicized and lauded the contest idea. Patriotic individuals offered cash awards for the best. In March 1917 the city of Baltimore, home of the "Star Spangled Banner," offered a \$1,000 award for the winning creed.

**Who Composed It**

About 3,000 statements were submitted. They came from every state in the Union. The one by William Tyler Page, clerk of the U.S. House of Representatives, was selected as the winner. His "creed" was expressed in 100 words.

The William Tyler Page "American's Creed" is remarkably comprehensive. It reflects American ideals, history and tradition. The words are not Page's. They are the words of America's greatest statesmen and authors.

**How He Wrote It**

What Page did in a masterful and intelligent way was to select and arrange the most pertinent thoughts and expressions from several historic

sources. These included the words of George Washington, Daniel Webster, James Madison, Everett Hale and Abraham Lincoln. Also came from our Declaration of Independence, Constitution, Great Seal, National Anthem, Oath of Allegiance and from federal statutes. These were set forth in the eight phrases of the American's Creed.

It is interesting to note how the original thoughts were chosen and arranged by Page. Here they are -- and where they originated:

**From Many Sources**

"I believe in the united states of america" -- from the preamble to the Constitution of the United States.

"A GOVERNMENT OF THE PEOPLE, BY THE PEOPLE, FOR THE PEOPLE" -- from the preamble to the Constitution of the United States, Daniel Webster's speech in the Senate of January 26, 1830, and Abraham Lincoln's Gettysburg speech.

"WHOSE JUST POWERS ARE DERIVED FROM THE CONSENT OF THE GOVERNED" -- from the Declaration of Independence.

"A DEMOCRACY IN A REPUBLIC" -- in substance from No. 10 of the Federalist, by Madison, and Article X of the amendments to the Constitution of the United States.

"A SOVEREIGN NATION OF MANY SOVEREIGN STATES" -- from "E pluribus unum," the great seal of the United States, and Article IV of the Constitution of the United States.

"A PERFECT UNION" -- goes back to the preamble to

the Constitution. "ONE AND INSEPARABLE" -- goes back to the preamble to the Constitution.

"ESTABLISHED UPON THOSE PRINCIPLES OF FREEDOM, EQUALITY, JUSTICE, AND HUMANITY" -- from the Declaration of Independence.

"FOR WHICH AMERICAN PATRIOTS SACRIFICED THEIR LIVES AND FORTUENS" -- from the Declaration of Independence, and Lincoln's Gettysburg Address.

"I THEREFORE BELIEVE IT IS MY DUTY TO MY COUNTRY TO LOVE IT" -- in substance from "The Man Without a Country," by Edward Everett Hale.

"TO SUPPORT ITS CONSTITUTION" -- from the oath of allegiance, section 1757 of the Revised Statutes of the United States.

"TO OBEY ITS LAWS" -- from Washington's Farewell Address and from Article VI of the Constitution of the United States.

"TO RESPECT ITS FLAG" -- the national anthem, the Star Spangled Banner; Army and Navy regulations; War Department circular on Flag Etiquette, April 14, 1917.

"AND TO DEFEND IT AGAINST ALL ENEMIES" -- from the oath of allegiance, section 1757 of the Revised Statutes of the United States.

The speedometer in our car was broken, so we had no idea we were going at an unsafe speed. The Patrol officer took me to Judge Wales Dalton who told me to pay a \$42 fine or go to jail. I explained to the Judge that I had \$35 to my name to take my fiance' and myself to Pecos, and that we couldn't afford to pay a fine, especially one that steep. I was told that I was going to jail and he, Judge Dalton couldn't care less if my girl was left on the streets with no money and no place to go, she didn't even have money to place phone calls to our families. After making insulting comments and reminding me that he didn't want to hear my problem, Judge Dalton asked one of his associates: "Think I should let him go for \$35?" and then answered his own question by saying: "Well, I'm hungry, so I'll take your money and eat." He mentioned he was "giving me a break" by leaving me with my charge, a total of 29 cents.

My fiance' was waiting for me in the car. She had asked to see the judge and had been refused. We went to the hotel located near the Eastland jail and called Rhode Island and California to see if we could get some money. We couldn't receive help until (at least) the following Monday, which left us with nothing for two days. The gentleman at the desk went out of his way to call Chief John Moren, who immediately came to our aid. He made sure we had gas, and then took us to the Super Save Market on South Seaman St., where we purchased food and drink on the Salvation Army account. The store clerk Mr. White and Chief Moren both gave us financial help from their own pockets to insure us of a good trip.

The Constitution has a clause about making people suffer unduly at the han of the law, and in this case I feel that our rights had been violated. Texas Law does not require that a fine be levied against a person for speeding \$0 to \$200, and I still cannot believe that Judge Dalton was inhumane enough to do what he did to us with such

That's 19 miles over at \$2 per, for \$38 plus a \$2.50 court cost fee, making a total of \$40.50, indicating that if the man paid \$35 then Judge Dalton probably made up the \$5.50 deficit himself.

open lack of care and consideration. All of our taxes are high enough as it is, and I cannot see the sense in our taking money from the United Fund (Salvation Army) because a tax paid p. official like Mr. Dalton felt he could be unjust.

The only good thing I can say is that some people are true Christians, and it is because of the concern and brotherly attitude of people like Chief John Moren, the hotel registrar and the people at the Super Save Markets that we can keep our faith in the people of Texas, and especially those residing in Eastland. It is unfortunate that Judge Dalton had almost succeeded in losing that faith.

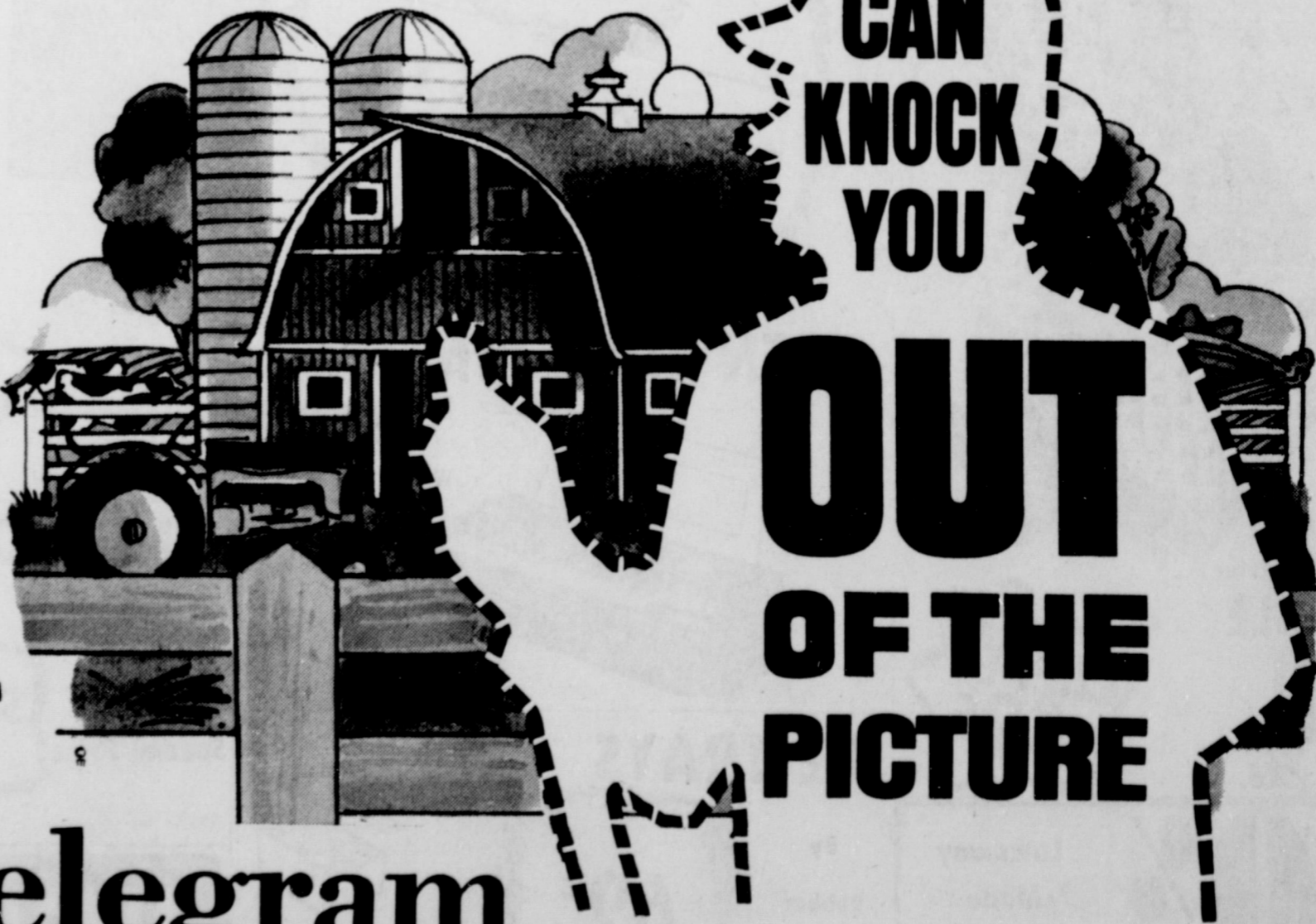

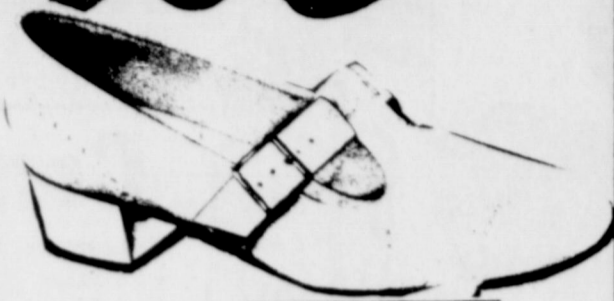

Publication of a new book, "You Can Be a Trick Rider," has been announced by the Longhorn Press of Cisco. The book was written by Rosemary Scott, veteran magazine writer of Simi Valley, California.

The book traces the history of trick riding from the days of cowboys who developed tricks for their own amusement when they were not busy on range chores to modern day trick and fancy riding that has become a part of most rodeo programs.

In writing the book, Mrs. Scott spent several months following trick riders to rodeo shows and to practice arenas. The various tricks that have been developed by championship riders are outlined in the "how-to-do-it" book. Some 40 pictures of riders in action are included in the book.

The trick rider gives much of the credit for his program to his horse, Mrs. Scott says. Training trick riding horses is given special attention in the book.

"You Can Be a Trick Rider" is the third book on horse training subjects published by the Longhorn Press. Others are "Hackamore Reinsman" by Ed Connell and "You Can Break Your Own Horse" by Lyle B. Chamberlain. Both are well known veteran horse trainers.

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**Disabled Vets  
To Receive  
Benefit Increase**

Some veterans who are receiving Veterans Administration payments because of disease or injury incurred during military service may soon receive an increase in their monthly benefits. This announcement was made today by Charles Annett, Veterans Service Officer for Eastland County.

For many years, the Congress has authorized the Veterans Administration to pay one rate of disability compensation for veterans whose diseases or injuries were incurred during periods of wartime, and another for veterans who were in military service during a period of peacetime. Under the laws, the peacetime veteran received twenty per cent less compensation than the veteran who served during wartime.

Effective July 1, 1973, the monthly rates of disability compensation paid to peacetime and wartime veterans will be equalized at the regular wartime rate. This means that all veterans who are presently receiving Veterans Administration compensation at the peacetime rate will automatically receive a twenty percent increase, which will be reflected in the July checks, which will be received about August 1, 1973.

This adjustment in the rates of disability compensation for veterans will be automatic. There will be no need for each

individual veteran to apply for the increase. The local Service Officer does suggest, however, that each veteran who is currently being paid at the peacetime rate should be sure that the automatic increase is shown on his July check. Any peacetime veteran who does not receive his increase should contact the Service Officer as soon as possible after August 1, 1973, in order that an inquiry might be made.
