Eastland National Bank Expansions Announced

H.T. Wilson, President of the Eastland National Bank, has announced additional expansion and remodeling of the bank quarters. Final approval of plans was made Thursday evening during the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors.

William L. Bourdeau, General Contractor, was awarded the contract for the job, and construction is to begin immediately. The safe deposit vaults will be expanded to encompass that space formerly occupied by the Chamber of Commerce office, thus

enabling the bank to triple its present capacity for boxes, plus the advantage of affording increased privacy for safe deposit box customers. Construction will proceed in such a manner as to insure complete security of the boxes now housed in the vaults, and current box renters are assured that they will have continuous access to their boxes during this period of expansion. It was stated that bank officials have been embarrassed due to unavailability of boxes to be rented, and this new addition will assure a sufficient supply of all size boxes for those on the waiting list plus a variety of sizes obtainable for all new customers desiring to rent boxes.

The Proof Department and Bookkeeping Department will be moved and enlarged, and the space previously occupied for these two departments will be utilized to expand the Savings Department.

In revealing current plans, President Wilson expressed gratitude and pleasure for the confidence area people have continued to show in the bank, which is evidenced by the steady growth in all departments and the demands for constant expansion of bank facilities. He stressed that all of the changes were designed expressly for the purpose of more efficiently serving bank customers and extending to them the benefit of easy accessibility and more privacy as they conduct their banking business in the various departments.

sufficient office space is rented to justify the improvements.

Official Memorandum By DOLPH BRISCOE Governor of Texas

GREETINGS: "Widen Your World... Read" All over Texas during the week of April 8 through 14 libraries will throw their doors open with an invitation for all Texans to widen their world and to "Get Ahead... Read."

This sixteenth annual observance of National Library Week focuses attention on the year round efforts of libraries to provide informational, recreational and educational services to their patrons. It also provides library patrons an opportunity to show their support for the improvements that are vital if Texas public, school and academic libraries are to provide resources that truly equal patron needs.

Libraries provide an opportunity for self-fulfillment and for continuing education for all who avail themselves of an opportunity to use them. The public library--with its long tradition of service to all, whatever their educational or economic condition--provides real hope for reaching the goal of a well-informed citizenry. At the same time good school and academic libraries insure that adults in the years to come will be able to take full advantage of all kinds of library service.

The greeting during National Library Week welcomes all to come during not only that special week but also the other fifty-one.

Rev. Allison Is Evangelism Coordinator For United Church

NEW YORK, April 5 - The Rev. Grady N. Allison, formerly pastor of St. Thomas United Presbyterian Church in Houston, has begun his new duties here as coordinator for evangelism in the Program Agency of the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A.

Mr. Allison, who started work in his new post April 2, heads a unit which is responsible for giving assistance in the developing, resourcing, servicing, and promoting of evangelism in the six-continent work of the Program Agency. Working primarily with United Presbyterian synods (regional administrative units) in the United States, his unit also has responsibility for working with other denominations and ecumenical agencies in the U.S. and with related churches and church groups in other parts of the world.

Mr. Allison accepted a call from the Gulf Coast Presbytery to organize the St. Thomas Church in 1966, in the rapidly-growing West Memorial area of Houston. He was instrumental there in the formation of the West Memorial Drive Christian Community, a seven-church ecumenical organization providing united efforts for ministering to the needs of the area. He was twice president of the organization, which has a combined membership of more than 17,000 persons.

He also has served as moderator of Gulf Coast Presbytery, chairman of the presbytery's committee on evangelism, and as a member of the Synod of Texas committee on evangelism. A past



member of the presbytery's Upper Gulf Coast Housing Authority, he has been chairman of the presbytery's General Council and its Ministerial Relations Committee.

Before moving to Houston Mr. Allison was pastor of Southern Baptist churches for 22 years. He is a graduate of Hardin-Simmons University and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

Mr. Allison is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J.C. Allison of Eastland, Texas. He was born there and was graduated from Eastland High School in 1945.

He and Mrs. Allison are the parents of two children, and expect to make their home in Manhattan.

Springtime signals the beginning of home gardening activity and good control of sucking and chewing insects means healthier, more productive gardens.

Sucking insects damage plants by inserting their mouthparts into plant tissue and removing plant juices. Heavily infested plants become yellowed, wilted, deformed or stunted and may eventually die. Some sucking insects inject toxic materials into the plant while feeding and some transmit disease organisms to plants.

Some examples of sucking insects are aphids, leafhoppers, stinkbugs, squash bugs, thrips and spider mites.

Chewing insects cause more damage to the home garden than either soil insects or sucking insects. They feed on all parts of plants, destroying both foliage and fruit.

Chewing insects are numerous and include grasshoppers, leafminers, potato beetles, flea beetles, cucumber beetles, blister beetles, pepper weevils,

vegetable weevils, corn ear-worms, cabbage loopers, armyworms, tomato hornworms, webworms, melonworms and pickleworms.

You might prefer using dusts for controlling insects in home garden. Several brands are available which will control both chewing and sucking insects.

Apply dusts when the wind is calm and force the dust through the foliage so it will reach both sides of the leaves. The suggestion rate is 1 1/2 oz. per 50 feet of row.

Sprays are prepared by mixing emulsifiable concentrates or wettable powders with water. Compressed air sprayers, Tumbone or slide sprayers, and garden hose attachment sprayers can all be used. If wettable powders are used, agitate the solution while spraying to mix the insecticide. About one quart of spary should be applied per 50 feet of row.

Among recommended insecticides are diazinon which controls sucking and chewing insects and spider mites. Malthion controls chewing and sucking insects but not all species of spider mites. Dicol (Kelthane), ethion and sulfur are recommended for spider mites only. Methoxychlor is recommended only for chewing insects while carbaryl (Sevin) will control chewing insects but only some sucking insects.

When using insecticide, it's very important to read the instructions to insure proper use and handling. Special attention should be given to restrictions on the length of time form last application of an insecticide to harvesting.

Cultural practices also play a significant role in reducing or eliminating many insect problems in home gardens. Mow lands closely and dispose of any trash, boards or old plant debris in the area. Keep soil at maximum fertility level and well watered. At the end of the season remove all plants and

"Tzimmes" Spells Menu Excitement

In Yiddish, the word, "Tzimmes" means "excitement," menu excitement, in this case. The dish combines vegetables, beef and sometimes dried fruits. Long cooking tenderizes and blends the flavors. The juices are spiced lightly and delicately thickened with corn starch.

Tzimmes

2 tablespoons corn oil
3 pounds beef brisket
4 cups boiling water
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
8 carrots, sliced in 1-inch diagonal pieces
4 yams, peeled and cut in quarters
1/2 cup dark corn syrup
1/4 cup corn starch
1/4 cup water

Heat corn oil in 5-quart Dutch oven over medium high heat; add meat and cook until browned, turning as needed. Add 4 cups water, salt, pepper and nutmeg. Reduce heat, cover and simmer 1 1/2 hours. Add vegetables and corn syrup. Cover and bake in a 350°F. oven 2 hours, removing the cover during the last half hour. Remove meat and vegetables to heated serving dishes. Mix corn starch and 1/4 cup water until smooth, add to liquid in Dutch oven. Bring to boil, stirring constantly and boil 1 minute. Serve sauce with Tzimmes. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

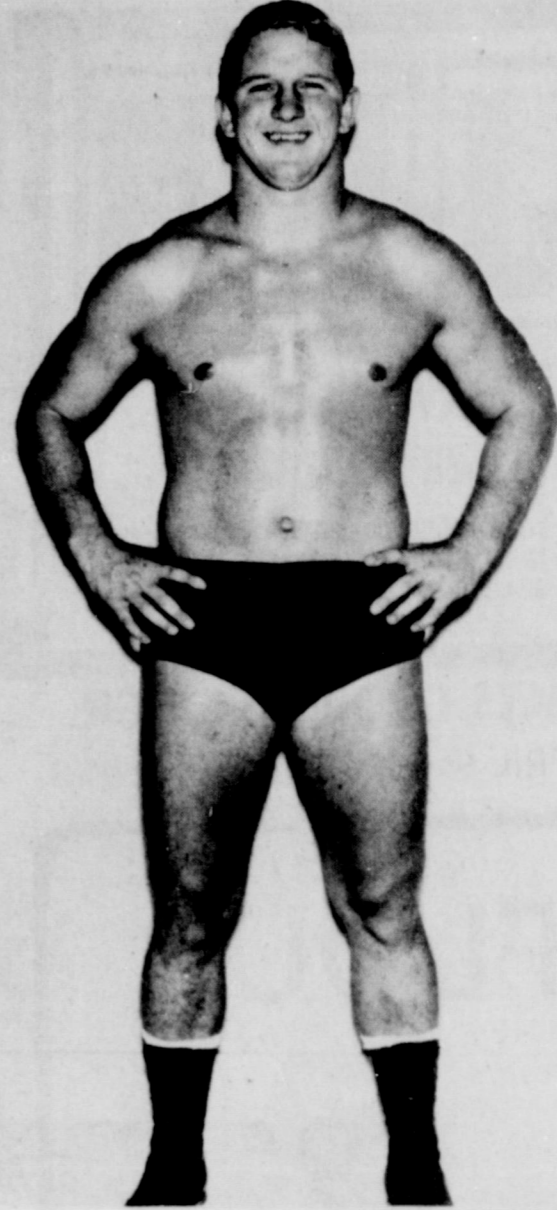
wrestler in the wring today. Jerry will be out weighed by about 30 pounds in this match, but he will be trying to depend on his speed and great wrestling ability to help him win.

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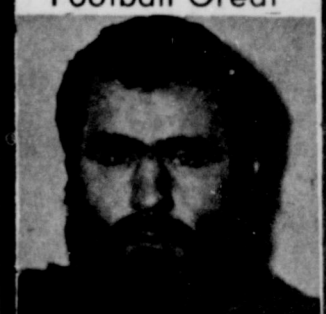

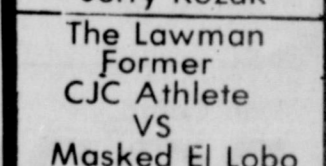

I REMEMBER

By Dick O'Brien

I love to think of the religious life of Eastland County when I was young. I remember that church buildings had only one room. Sunday school classes would be scattered all over this space and the noise was distracting as some teachers spoke very loud, and there would be frequent arguments between members that made it almost impossible to concentrate. Later wires were stretched and curtains installed

to separate the classes. This helped some of the classes could not see each other but noise wise it made no difference. In all rural churches and some small town congregations preaching services were held once or twice a month. They were called "half and quarter time churches." Only two or three churches had pastors who lived on the field and was available between Sundays.

The pastors and visiting evangelists did not stay in hotels, rather they stayed in the homes of the members. Some of the best preaching I have ever heard was done around our fireside by those visiting men of God. Another thing I remember is how we attended each others revival, or if the Methodists or Presbyterians held services on First Sunday and Baptist on second or third Sundays, we attended all of them. As I remember it: it was a foretaste of the heavenly fellowship we shall enjoy throughout eternity when we are done with this imperfect

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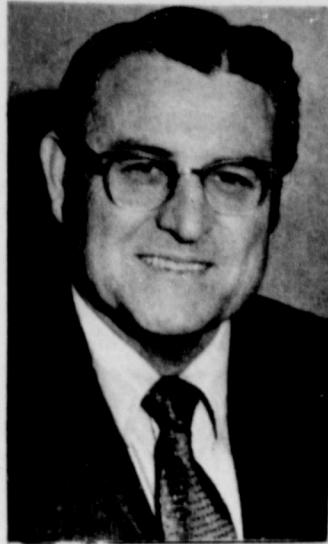

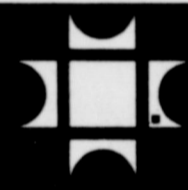
