Peanut News

WASHINGTON, April 5- -The minimum national average support level and other major provisions of the 1973 Peanut Program were announced today by J. Phil Campbell, Secretary Agriculture.

The support level is \$310.50 per ton for 1973- crop peanuts and represents 75 percent of the peanut parity price for April 1973. The support level for 1972- crop peanuts was \$285 per

The 1973 Peanut Program differs from the 1972 program in that (1) there will be no sheller purchase program. 
