Camp Inspiration Grew From Warner Memorial


Camp Inspiration, is located 1 mile west of Eastland, Texas on land that was originally granted to the Houston & Texas Central Rail Road Co. in 1880 by Texas Governor O. M. Roberts. The land grant was part of 6080 Sq. miles given by the State of Texas to build a railroad from Houston to the Red River. The H&TC RR sold the land in 1889. The land changed ownership several times before being given to Warner Memorial University in January 1929 to build a University. Like many other businesses the University went broke in the early 1930's and the university was sold at a public auction on the Court House steps April 2, 1935.

Board of Church Extension and Home Missions of the Church of God, Anderson, Indiana, bought the property. In 1946 the Texas Ministerial Assembly of the church of God, bought the property. The Texas State Camp Meetings were held on the grounds for several years. In 1956 the two story brick building was badly damaged by fire. The building was later torn down. In Sept. 1962, the West Texas District of the Church of God, acquired the

property from the State organization. The West Texas District mens Fellowship organized to restore the camp grounds. Men from the District Churches began working together. In 1963 the summer youth camps started. As the Camp enlarged its facilities, District Camp meetings were held. Now the Camp is host too the State Camp Meetings for the Church of God, General Offices in Anderson, Indiana. The following is a brief history of expansion at the camp
1962 - Two Cabins and a bath house were built
1963 - Camp name was chosen as "camp Inspiration"

1964 - Third Airconditioned Cabin was built. Gate brick walk was completed. Kitchen cabinets installed
1965 - Concrete floor put in tabernacle. Entrance road was graveled.
1966 - Tabernacle was enclosed - The 30 foot cross was erected over the ruins of the Warner Memorial University Building. Camp Dedication Service was held in May
1967 - Plans were made to

build the first half of a new dining hall. It would be 30x60 feet. Cabin No. 4 was built 1968- 69 All work concentrated toward building the dining hall. An 8000 gallon water storage tank was hauled to the camp from Odessa and connected because of no water during the summer.
1970 - A new water line was laid to the camp, solving the long existing problem of water. The 30x60 foot first half of the dining hall was completed
1971 - The second half of the dining hall was completed making the building 60x60 foot and capable of seating 250 at one time.
1972 - A trailer camping area, was completed. Roads were improved over the entire camp. The trailer park will park 45 vehicles with water and electricity. The fifth cabin was completed.
1973 - Plans are underway to expand the Tabernacle facilities and to build Cabin No. 5
Camp Inspiration is situated on 58 acres of land on the west edge of Eastland

Centennial '73 To Change Course

A hard look was taken at Eastland County's plans for its 100th birthday celebration Wednesday, and indications are that certain revisions will be made to more fully coincide with the wishes of the majority of the people in the county.

In an executive board meeting Wednesday afternoon it was determined that because of a lack of participation to this date, that certain changes will have to be made in preliminary plans for the celebration scheduled to be held in May.

The Eastland County Centennial Corp. officers agreed to cancel the spectacular portion of the planning and concentrate on the other areas of program.

Therefore the Corporation ended its agreement and other areas of program.

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To date the corporation has paid the Rogers Co. about \$500 and has had the benefit of its recommendation in staging

celebrations. Mr. Pat Hagarty of the Rogers Co. was present at the Wednesday meeting and assured the group that there

would be no further obligation to his company. Coins, plates and books will be distributed.

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Let's Take a Good Look at Rural Scene Today

Rural families will be able to stay closer together in the future because of the opportunities possible through rural development.

Rural development simply means "making rural America a better place to live and work," says William Erwin, Deputy Under Secretary of Agriculture for Rural Development. He adds, "A lot of people in rural areas are tired of watching their young people move away to cities to find work."

Thirty-four percent of the

people surveyed in a poll said they would prefer to live in open country. Yet only 12 percent live there. This indicates that many men and women living in the city today would much rather be back in the country where they started, if only they could find a decent job. Some return even without one, so disillusioned are they with city life.

One rural community made special efforts to train its youth for "export" - for specific jobs available in surrounding cities. But even with such

preparation, 25 out of 40 graduates of the program turned around and went back home.

"City life simply wasn't for them," said Mr. Erwin, who, on Jan. 4, was nominated by President Nixon to fill the new post of Assistant Secretary of Agriculture for Rural Development.

One rural development effort local people can undertake is to try to create more jobs in their local areas. That way, young people don't have to leave.

The deputy under secretary

has talked to thousands of rural people across the country about rural development. "When you talk about rural development in a little community, people often say 'we don't want those big city problems brought out here,'" he reports.

"But when you say 'how about giving your sons and daughters a chance to stay home,' they get enthusiastic about development."

Figures bear out the importance of a greater variety of jobs to all rural people, farmers as well as nonfarmers. For

instance, 62 percent of farmers make more money from off-farm work than they clear from their farm business.

In fact, more farmers, as well as their sons and daughters, are finding a job in local industry a good way to hold on to the rural way of life they like while enjoying incomes that come closer to matching city levels.

Communities don't stay the same.

They get better or worse. Four key areas for helping

make rural America a better place to live and work are people building, community facilities, environmental improvement and economic development.

You can rate your community - "score" it - on these four essential ingredients to development, says Will Erwin, Deputy Under Secretary of Agriculture for Rural Development.

People building includes such things as education, health services, cultural satisfaction, outreach to the disadvantaged and leadership. For instance, score your community on the adequacy and availability to all of schools.

Community facilities include housing, transportation, utilities and public services. To score your community in housing, for example, consider all sectors in terms of living conditions - crowding, sanitation, upkeep and appearance, availability and costs.

Environmental improvement covers conservation, recreation and community initiative. Economic development deals mostly with jobs, business and industry. But it also considers credit availability and use of natural resources.

After rating your community from poor to good or superior in

these four essential areas, ask others if they agree. Get several opinions, Mr. Erwin suggests. Exchange views. If you and others think change is needed, you may wish to form an action group to work toward community goals.

There is help available to communities in this task. Throughout America, county, state and regional rural development groups are prepared to help.

To get rural development committees and organizations involved in your community improvement programs, see your local representative of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q. How can I tell if I'm eligible to use the short form 1040A?
A. Basically, the short form 1040A may be used if all your income was from wages, salaries, tips and not more than \$200 in dividends and \$200 in interest and you do not plan to itemize deductions. If you receive the short form in the mail, it was sent to you based on the return you filed last year. If you did not receive a short form 1040A in the mail and want to use it, a copy may be obtained at any Internal Revenue office and most banks and post offices, or you may use the order blank in the form 1040 package to obtain a copy.

Q. Is every taxpayer who is eligible to use the short form 1040A required to do so?

A. No. Use of the short form is optional. If you had sizeable expenses for such items as medical and dental care, interest, taxes, contributions, alimony, child care, etc., it may be to your advantage to itemize deductions. This can only be done on Schedule A of your Form 1040 and not on the short form.

A formula for determining whether or not you should itemize deductions is found in your tax form instructions.

Wonderful World of Books

After your initial investment, you will seldom need to buy seeds or plants because most of them propagate themselves! The book shows which herbs can be dried and which should be frozen, and how to grow some of them indoors in pot or planter for fragrance throughout your home. (Try

Q. I'm retired and eligible to receive the retirement income credit. Will the IRS compute it for me?

A. Yes. If you elect to have the IRS compute your tax and you have a retirement income credit, the IRS will also compute this for you. Just follow the directions in your tax form instructions.

Q. How do I go about ordering free IRS tax publications?

A. Just fill in the order blank on the back of your tax forms package, choosing the form or free publication that you want from the list shown, and send it to the IRS office shown on the package.

Q. Are there any limits on how much you can deduct as a charitable contribution?

A. Yes. In general, contributions to most charities, such as churches, educational organizations, hospitals, etc., may be deducted up to 30 percent of your adjusted gross income. However, contributions to certain private non-operating foundations, veterans organizations, fraternal societies, and cemetery organizations are limited to 20 percent of adjusted gross income. The organization itself can tell you which of the two categories it falls into.

There are also certain limitations on contributions of property, such as stock. For details, see IRS Publication 526, "Income Tax Deduction for Contributions," available free from your IRS district office.

Look, Ma! No cavities . . . Impossible? Not according to a band of dental enthusiasts who are preaching the new gospel of preventive dentistry. They claim: "You can keep all your teeth all your life. You don't have to suffer from cavities or bleeding gums." The secret is a technique known as "plaque control." And recent research has proved it can stop gum diseases—and save teeth. Plaque is a transparent, sticky coating formed by the mixture of saliva with the accumulated microscopic germs on the teeth and gums present even in healthy mouths. These germs infect the gums and make acids which attack the teeth. Often they are the cause of bad breath.

Plaque takes about 24 hours to build up on clean teeth, so the solution seems obvious: Remove the plaque once a day. Easier said than done, however. Plaque is transparent, hard to see. It's possible to brush and brush and still leave traces of plaque on the sides and backs of the teeth. Many of the plaque control dentists are teaching their patients how to remove plaque. Some advocate use of a red food-coloring — some anise over your bed, our ancestors said it makes you fair and youthful.) The Mrs. Doole presents a potpourri of craft delights: you can pot some of your herbs (they are best sellers at bazaars and much cherished gifts), you can put together "tussie mussions" (herb bouquets with a tender message), sachets, a "kitten's delight," and dozens more. She suggests recipes for jellies and sugars, teas and tall cooling drinks, and dozens of ideas for decorating your garden and using its yield in appealing, creative ways simple enough for young children to try. Have you a tin can, some seeds, and a few minutes? You can start.

As It Looks From Here

Announcement is made by Congressman Omar Burleson that the Farmers Home Administration has approved a grant of \$124,600 and a loan of \$13,800 to the Staff Water Supply Corporation for the second phase of its development of a rural area water system in Eastland and Stephens Counties.

Project plans call for extension of Staff water System lines to serve areas south of Eastland and north and north of Ranger Communities benefited by the system will include Staff LaCasa, Kokomo, Freedom, and New Hope. Water supply for the rural system will be purchased from the city systems of Eastland, Ranger and Carbon.

The grant and loan will be provided under the rural community facility program administered by the Farmers Home Administration, a department of agricultural rural credit service. The loan will be repaid in 40 years at an interest rate of five percent. Mr. R. C. Reeves of Rt. 2, Eastland, is president of the staff Water Supply Corporation, a county non-profit organization.

Washington, D. C. - DR. HENRY KISSINGER HAS GIVEN Members of Congress assurances that no commitment has been made to assist in rebuilding damages inflicted on North Vietnam. He is, however, going to Hanoi in the next few days and there is no doubt this will be the principal subject of discussion. In the months ahead this will become a major issue in the congress.

Although this policy may not directly contradict President Nixon's general statement in his second inauguration, he brought into focus the question of cutting America's massive overseas burden in a changing world. As a matter of fact, in the President's first inauguration he indicated his determination to ease our military expenses by ending our role as the "global policeman."

There is a beginning, aside from ending our presence in South Vietnam, of cutting back on the Nation's costly military commitments in a number of places. At the present time we are parties to agreements which commit us to help defend 45 countries all over the world. In what is known as the "Rio Treaty," we are pledged to help defend any one of 20 nations which asks for help. These are countries from Mexico to the tip of South America.

Under the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization (SEATO) the commitment is to eight nations - Pakistan, the Philippines, Australia, New Zealand, Thailand, Laos, Cambodia, and South Vietnam. As members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) we are militarily bound to come to the aid of Belgium, Britain, Denmark, France, Ireland, Italy, Luxembourg, The Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, Greece, Turkey, West Germany, and Canada, being a member, is included.

A separate treaty arrangement, known as ANZUS, pledges us in a special arrangement to come to the defense of Australia and New Zealand if requested.


We also have separate treaties of mutual defense with the Philippines, Japan, South Korea, and Taiwan. All these commitments came about because of our foreign policy of containing communism. Taken into account now is what is considered to be the success of the early pphases of agreements with the Soviet Union on reduction of strategic arms. This is taken as one big factor in being able to reduce military expenditures. Another prominent factor is the rift in the communist world between Russia and Red China. It is thought that if hostilities in Southeast Asia extricate us from that area, there will be good chance of reducing American forces overseas far below the 600,000 men now in uniform. As it is now, these

operations represent an outflow averaging about \$3 billion a year, aside from Vietnam. Our Government has major military bases in the zones, Canada, Belgium, Germany, Greece, Greenland, Iceland, Italy, Japan, the Philippines, South Korea, Spain, Turkey, England, Bermuda, Guantanamo in Cuba and hundreds of similar installations overseas. Even with our mission ended in Southeast Asia, it is difficult to see how our military cost can be greatly reduced in the current year. The cost of military personnel, increased to encourage a voluntary service without the draft, will be higher, even with a greatly reduced numbers in uniform. The need for refurbishing our material dissipated in Vietnam should be an absolute requirement. There is no assurance that threats around the world will not continue and to let our defenses down could be suicidal. At the same time, we can not take care of the whole world and this is generally the new policy. Neither can we condone the idea that we can live apart from the rest of the world. But it is time for us to retrench and shift a major part of the burden to those for whom we have made it possible to defend themselves. It is a good question as to why we should feel obligated to spend massive sums of money to restore the communist aggressor nation of North Vietnam.

I REMEMBER

I remember a rather interesting chain of incidents which reminds me that living a relatively long life can develop.

One Sunday in May, while we were pastor at Munday, Texas, I volunteered to supply the pulpit of the University Baptist Church, Abilene, for Brother C. A. Powell who was ill.

When the announcement appeared that I would be there that day, Paul Poe and Mae Broughton called me and asked me to unite them in marriage that day. It turned out that seventy five years previous, my grandfather, who was a Baptist preacher in Arkansas had married Paul's grandfather to his first wife.

And Paul's grandfather being a justice-of-the-peace turned around and married my grandfather to his second wife. Here we were nearly a century later carrying on the relationship.

That is not the end of the story. Paul and Mae gave the world a fine creative family, and when Paul passed away, I was called to conduct his funeral and he was buried in the Long Branch cemetery, on land which my mother and father pre-empted from the federal government when they moved to Texas from Arkansas in the 1870s.

Later I became the pastor of the W.J. and R.L. Poe families, and the relationship has been sweet and creative as far as the O'Brien side of the bargain has gone.

Another wedding in the string of incidents was that of Edgar Altom and Ada Poe, and the contribution this union has made to the world is too well known to need recounting here. Ah! Pleasant memories.
