

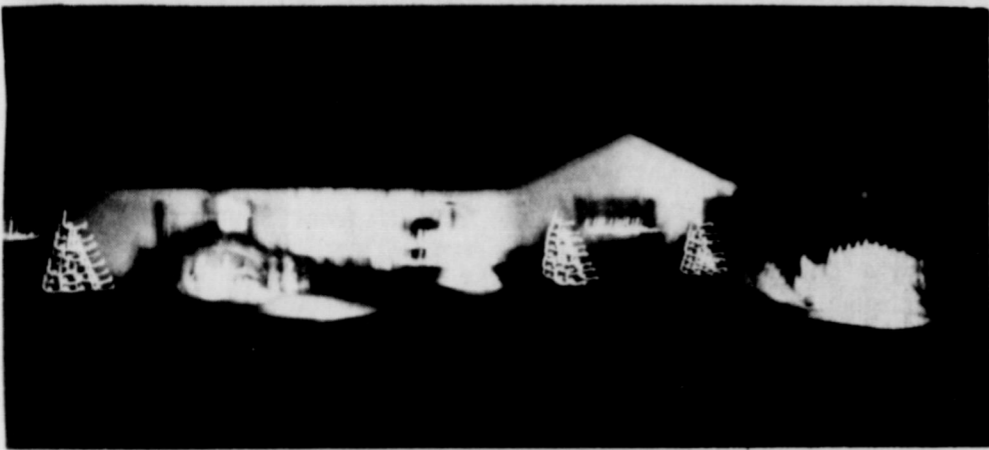
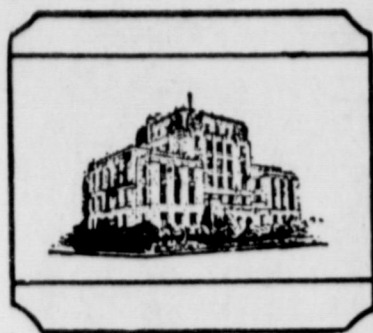

## THE SHEPHERDS ARE TOLD OF A SAVIOR LUKE 2:8-17

From THE LIVING BIBLE

"That night some shepherds were in the fields outside the village guarding their flocks of sheep. Suddenly an angel appeared among them, and the landscape shone bright with the glory of the Lord. They were badly frightened, but the angel reassured them.

Wonderful World of Books

S.L.A. (Slam) Marshall has had a distinguished career both in the military service and as a military critic and historian. He is the author of more than thirty books, including PORK CHOP HILL, NIGHT DROP, SINAI VICTORY and BLITZKRIEG, and his syndicated

column on military and world affairs appears in newspapers across the country. Now a brigadier general (USAR - Ret.), he has been involved in every American War since his service as a buck private in World War I.

On Dec. 18, 1972, Charles

Scribner's Sons will publish S.L.A. Marshall's newest book CRIMSONED PRAIRIE (\$8.95), an account of the Indian Wars on The Great Plains between 1860 and 1890. Maintaining that these wars were unavoidable because of conflict of interest, Marshall, who has personally visited all the battlefields, provides the first thorough-going military analysis of the fighting. CRIMSONED PRAIRIE, the winter selection of the Military Book Club, is receiving advance praise. Cornelius Ryan calls it "a masterpiece of its

kind, a small classic in fact." And General Matthew R B. Ridgway comments: "The master military historian ... cuts through the accumulated tissue of myth and legend, accusation and exculpation, laying bare the fundamental and irreconcilable differences between the way of life of the white man and the red which made war between them inevitable." Publishers' Weekly states that Marshall "writes with his usual wary eye for romantic myth and exaggerated nonsense in the eminently readable narrative history of the 'wars' fought by U.S. Army troops against the Plains Indians."

S.L.A. Marshall was born in Catskill, New York, on July 18, 1900, and educated in the public schools and Texas College of Mines (now University of Texas) at El Paso. He began his writing career as a Reporter, Sports Editor and City Editor for the El Paso Herald, 1922 - 1927. From 1927 - 1961, he was military critic and editorial writer for the Detroit News. He served The News and NANA as Foreign Correspondent in Latin America from 1927 - 1935 and he then covered the Spanish Civil War, 1936 - 1937. One of the founders of the War Department Historical Division and a pioneer in the area of battle field research, he became Chief Historian of the European Theatre of Operations in World War II. His numerous military honors include the Legion of Merit, the Bronze Star with Cluster, and the Croix de Guerre with Palm. Among his academic honors are a DHL from Wayne State University, 1959, an LD from St. Bonaventure University, 1958, and in 1964 he was Regent's Lecturer at the University of California. He is married to Cate Finnerty of Sarasota, Fla., and they live in Birmingham, Mich. S.L.A. Marshall is currently at work on his memoirs BRINGING UP THE REAR which Scribner's will publish in September 1973.

Take this position just as the pitcher is ready to pitch, and you would be in almost the right catching form."

**Tips to help you use electricity more efficiently for cooking.**

You can get the most value from your electric range by following these tips.

**Use flat-bottomed pans**  
The flatter the pan the better the contact with the electric unit. Also, be sure the pans have tight-fitting lids to reduce cooking time and moisture loss. And match pan size to unit size to avoid heat loss.

**Don't open the oven door unnecessarily**  
Opening the oven door when the oven is hot can cause heat loss and extended cooking time. It also can result in undercooking.

**Use minimum amount of water**  
The more water you use, the longer it takes to get it hot. Many foods can be cooked with little or no water. Once water starts to boil, use the lowest heat setting that will keep it boiling.

**Cook and freeze**  
Bake two cakes or pies, or make double recipes of such foods as stews and spaghetti sauce. Then freeze one for future use. Also, when you're baking, prepare an oven meal at the same time so no surface cooking is necessary—simply choose foods that will cook at about the same temperature.

**Thaw before cooking**  
Thawing meats before cooking reduces cooking time. Also, when recipes call for a preheated oven, don't turn it on too far in advance—usually 10 to 15 minutes will do.

**Gordon pot**

Several folks have called my attention to a mistake made in the news article which gave the results of the pecan show. I made the mistake. We had 217 instead of 117 pecan entries in our county show. This was one of our largest pecan shows, but not quite as large as the 1970 show. That year we had 219 entries. Last year were 200 entries in the show.

We had pecans of all sizes and shapes. The largest pecans, a Choctaw entry, weighed 31½ nuts per pound. They were owned by Mrs. C.E. Smith of Rising Star. In contrast the smallest pecans were so small that it took 907 to weigh a pound. They were entered by Mrs. Clyde Garrett of Eastland.

I would like to thank the Eastland Chamber of Commerce and all the people who helped shell pecans and process each entry. Our volunteers shelled 2140 pecans or approximately 40 pounds.

First, clean the mower. Remove the hood or blower housing from over the fly - wheel, remove dirt and trash from the cooling fins and other mower parts. Clean dirt and oil from the engine and housing by using a grease remover chemical, kerosene or hot soapy water. Don't use gasoline to clean. Don't get water or cleaning agents inside the engine.

Next, change the crankcase oil, drain the old oil through the drain plug or through the oil filter plug. When tilting the mower, keep the carburetor on the high side. Also, if the

mower has an oil bath air cleaner, remove it before tilting. After draining, refill the crankcase with fresh oil recommended in the operator's manual, usually 30 weight detergent oil.

Clean the air cleaner. For the oil bath type of air cleaner, pour the oil out, wipe the bowl clean and refill with clean oil to the full mark.

Some mowers use a polyurethane sponge air cleaner. If your mower has this type of air cleaner, wash it in kerosene or hot soapy water. Squeeze out all excess cleaner and allow the sponge to dry. Add a small quantity of oil to the sponge and squeeze out excess oil. Replace the sponge.

Drain gasoline by removing the fuel line between the tank and carburetor. After draining, reconnect the gas tank, start the engine and let it run until all fuel is removed.

Remove the spark plug and place a small quantity of oil in the cylinder. This allows the oil to coat the cylinder walls and piston rings. Replace the spark plug.

Store the mower in a dry place and it will be ready to go next spring.

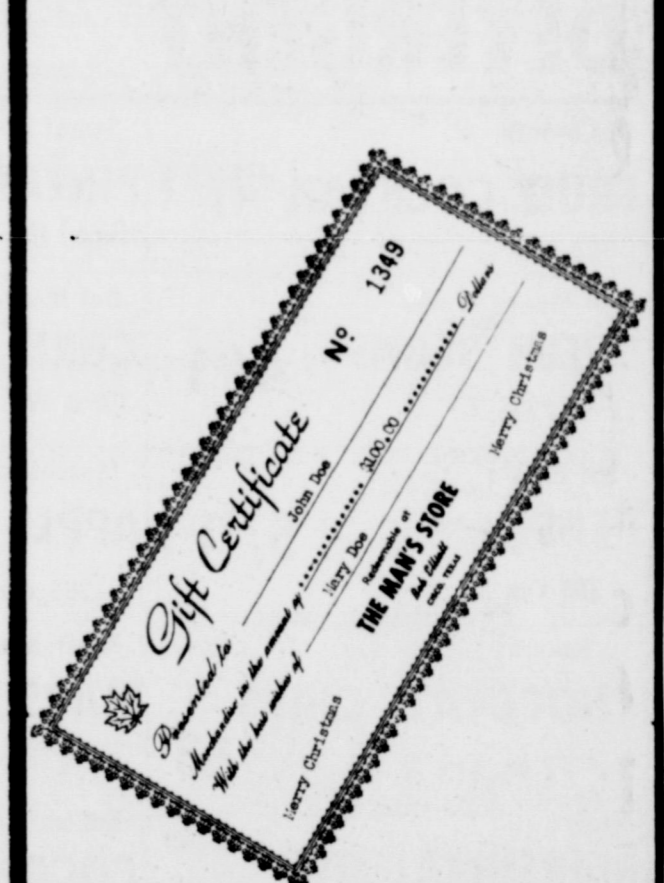

The men who wrote the Bible were of many sorts - doctors, priests, historians and lawgivers. Nonetheless, they spoke a common language when they praised the wonders of creation: clouds, stars, mountains, animals, and especially the trees, flowers and other plants. They were all understanding of nature.

Perhaps more attuned to nature than some, however, were the Wise Men, whom we hear so much about during the Christmas season. As shepherds, they led a simple life away from others. In their solitude, they had much opportunity to observe and reflect on the workings of nature. And, at night with their flocks, they watched the ever-changing pattern of the stars in the sky above.

The Wise Men, from the land of Arabia or some part of the Parthian Kingdom, were also knowledgeable about the prophecies of the Old Testament, which told of the coming of the Messiah. Thus, with divine guidance, they became convinced that a certain star which they beheld in the heavens was a token of the birth of the great King.

Part of the wonderful Christmas story of the Wise Men is preserved for us in the writings of St. Matthew. The Wise Men had seen and followed the star that went before them to where Christ was born in the city of Bethlehem. And here they came to pay Christ homage through worship and offering of gifts.

To quote St. Matthew: "And when they were come into the house, they

saw the young child with Mary his mother, and fell down, and worshipped him; and when they had opened their treasures, they presented unto him gifts: gold, and frankincense, and myrrh."

Looking upon gift-giving in a materialistic way, we might question why the Wise Men presented gifts of frankincense and myrrh to the young child. Gold, of course, could provide financial needs. But what made frankincense and myrrh so special? Detailed answers to this question can best be left to theologians. Some of them say the gifts were emblematic of divinity, regal office and manhood of Christ. Another theologian states, "they offered him incense as their God; gold as their King; and myrrh as united to a human body subject to suffering and death." Still others say that the Wise Men offered what they held in most esteem among themselves - products produced in their own country.

It is particularly interesting to note that both frankincense and myrrh are the products of trees, the uses of which go back into antiquity.

Frankincense is an aromatic gum resin with a bitter, acrid taste that exudes from several trees of the genus *Boswellia*. Such trees are abundantly found on the Somali coast and in South Arabia. Cuts or wounds are made in the tree trunks, where the accumulated resin coagulates in globules. These are then easily scraped from the tree.

Frankincense was used as an incense in religious ceremonies by the Egyptians, Persians, Babylonians, Assyrians, Jews, Greeks and Romans. It is still widely used today as an incense. It is also used in the East as an ex-

ternal application for tumors and sores, and in China, as an internal remedy for leprosy and other diseases.

Myrrh is a bitter, resinous exudation obtained from trees of the genus *Balsamea* or *Commiphora*. These spiny plants grow in Arabia and Abyssinia.

Since ancient times, myrrh has been used as a perfume, for embalming purposes and as a religious anointing oil. It is occasionally used in medicine to increase appetite and stimulate the flow of gastric juices, and as a constituent of mouth wash.

It is of interest to note that myrrh played a part at Christ's crucifixion and upon His mortal death. As reported by St. Mark: "and they gave him to drink wine mingled with myrrh: but he received it not." In St. John, the story is told: "And there came also Nicodemus, which at the first came to Jesus by night, and brought a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about a hundred pound weight. Then took they the body of Jesus, and wound it in linen clothes with the spices, as the manner of the Jews is to bury."

Although we do not know the true significance of frankincense and myrrh as gifts to the Christ Child, we know that they were commodities of commerce highly valued for use in religious ceremonies and for their medicinal properties.

As men close to nature, it is possible that the Wise Men collected, in their wanderings as shepherds, the same myrrh and frankincense which they presented as gifts.

Whatever their significance, they were gifts from the heart to one whose coming they sought. ☐

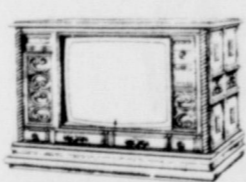

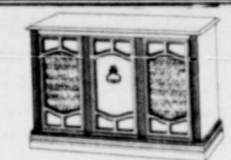
