SENATOR AIKIN WILL ADDRESS LIONS AND ROTARIANS HERE

Sen. A. M. Aikin Jr., candidate for Lieutenant Governor of Texas, will address a joint meeting of the Eastland Lions Club and the Eastland Rotary Club at a luncheon next Tuesday in Fellowship Hall at the First Methodist Church.

The Rotary Club will not meet Monday, according to president Mark Hanna, but will meet Tuesday with the Lions, instead.

Sen. Aikin, a Paris, Texas, banker, was first elected to the House of Representatives in 1932 and served two terms, 1932-1936, before being elected to the Senate where he has served for the past 19 years, for a total of 23 years in all.

At one time or another he has been chairman of every important committee in Austin, including chairmanship of the Finance and State Affairs Committees and the Committee on Education. He was President Pro Tempore of the Senate in 1943 and was Acting Governor for 14 days during that time. During one of his tenures as Acting Governor he declared Martial Law in Beaumont to prevent a race riot and received much acclaim for his action.

Hanson Excels In Tarleton Cinder Meet

Despite J. D. Hanson's three winning events, Arlington State College nosed three other teams at Stephenville Thursday in a four-way track meet at Tarleton State College.

Arlington amassed 46 points in annexing the meet.

Hanson, who was the high individual point-maker, with 17 1/2 points, was first in the 100-yard dash with 9.7; first in the high hurdles with 15.6; first in the low hurdles with 15.6; third in the shot put, and ran on the 440-yard relay team.

TCU freshmen barely edged Tarleton State, 39-38 1/2 for second place. Ranger, despite Hanson's effort, finished fourth with 28 1/2 points. Cisco, who was scheduled to compete in the meet, did not participate.

Hospital Rooms To Be Built With Ford Money

Check For Half Of Money Has Arrived

The Eastland Memorial Hospital announced today that it has received a check for \$5,000 from The Ford Foundation, half of its share of the Foundation's \$200,000 grant program to assist the nation's 3,399 voluntary, nonprofit hospitals to improve and extend their services. The balance of the gift is expected to be paid next year.

Under the terms of the grant, final decision as to the use of the money is left to the hospital's governing board. The only condition made by the Foundation in its original announcement of the grant program last December 12, was that the funds could not be used for repaying past obligations or "operating expenses for services currently being performed by hospitals."

Milton Fullen, chairman of the Hospital Board, said that in making formal application for the grant, it had informed the Foundation of possible uses of the money. Additional patient rooms will be added.

The flexibility of the grant was indicated in the Foundation announcement which permitted the hospital to use its gift in any area of hospital services, including, for example, attainment of accreditation, disaster planning, mental illness, prematurity, rehabilitation, handicapped children, preventive or diagnostic services, outpatient care, or any other area which in the opinion of the hospital's governing board would best serve its community.

The ways in which this goal could be reached were stated as improvement of or addition to facilities or services, additions to or training of personnel, or conducting research.

Fullen hailed the gift as "one of the greatest votes of confidence ever placed in our voluntary hospital system. It now has become our duty to see that this money is put to the best possible use for the benefit of our people. 'The modern hospital is a tremendously complex center of health services. Its responsibility is to keep pace with medical science so that the accomplishments of the scientists are translated into patient care. The financial problems of hospitals have grown particularly acute during the past decade. It has become increasingly difficult to find the funds to improve and extend our services to the extent possible in the light of our present knowledge. The Ford gift permits us to do things which we undoubtedly could not have done without the Foundation's generosity.'"

The Eastland Hospital was the only hospital in the county to receive a grant from the Foundation.

Insurance Reform Author Seeks State Senate

Floyd Bradshaw of Weatherford, candidate for State Senator of the 22nd District, was in Eastland Thursday in behalf of his candidacy.

In announcing his candidacy, he made the following statement: "In announcing as a candidate for State Senator of the 22nd district composed of Eastland, Callahan, Clay, Denton, Jack, Montague, Palo Pinto, Parker, Stephens and Wise counties, I humbly submit the following information concerning my eight years experience as a member of the House of Representatives from Parker county.

"I have served on the appropriations, public health, insurance, education, state affairs and many other important committees. I have been honored with the position of chairman of education, claims and accounts; chairman of sub-committee of appropriations committee that provided money for the operation of our many state-supported senior and junior colleges.

"During the past six years I have sponsored many insurance reform measures. Seven of them have been written into law and played an important part in bringing about proper safeguard for the investing public. As a member of the education committee or chairman, I have authored many bills necessary for the economic operation of our schools.

"It has been my opinion that a member should be aware and as well informed as possible on all phases of state government. I was author of the constitutional amendment allowing Texas Soldiers in the armed forces the right to vote; two bills last session that repealed several hundred special conflicting laws that caused our county officials and attorney general department confusion a great expense.

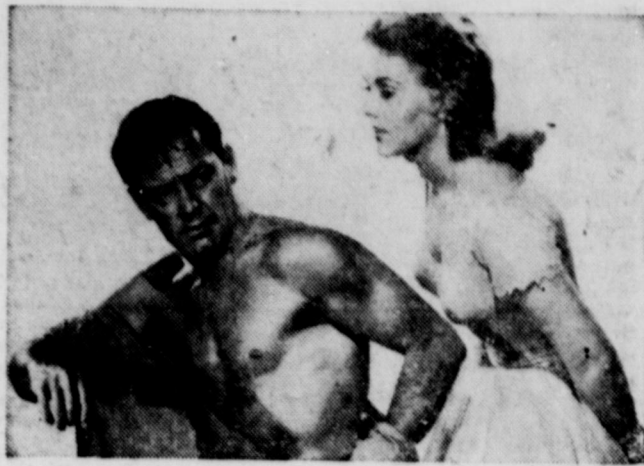

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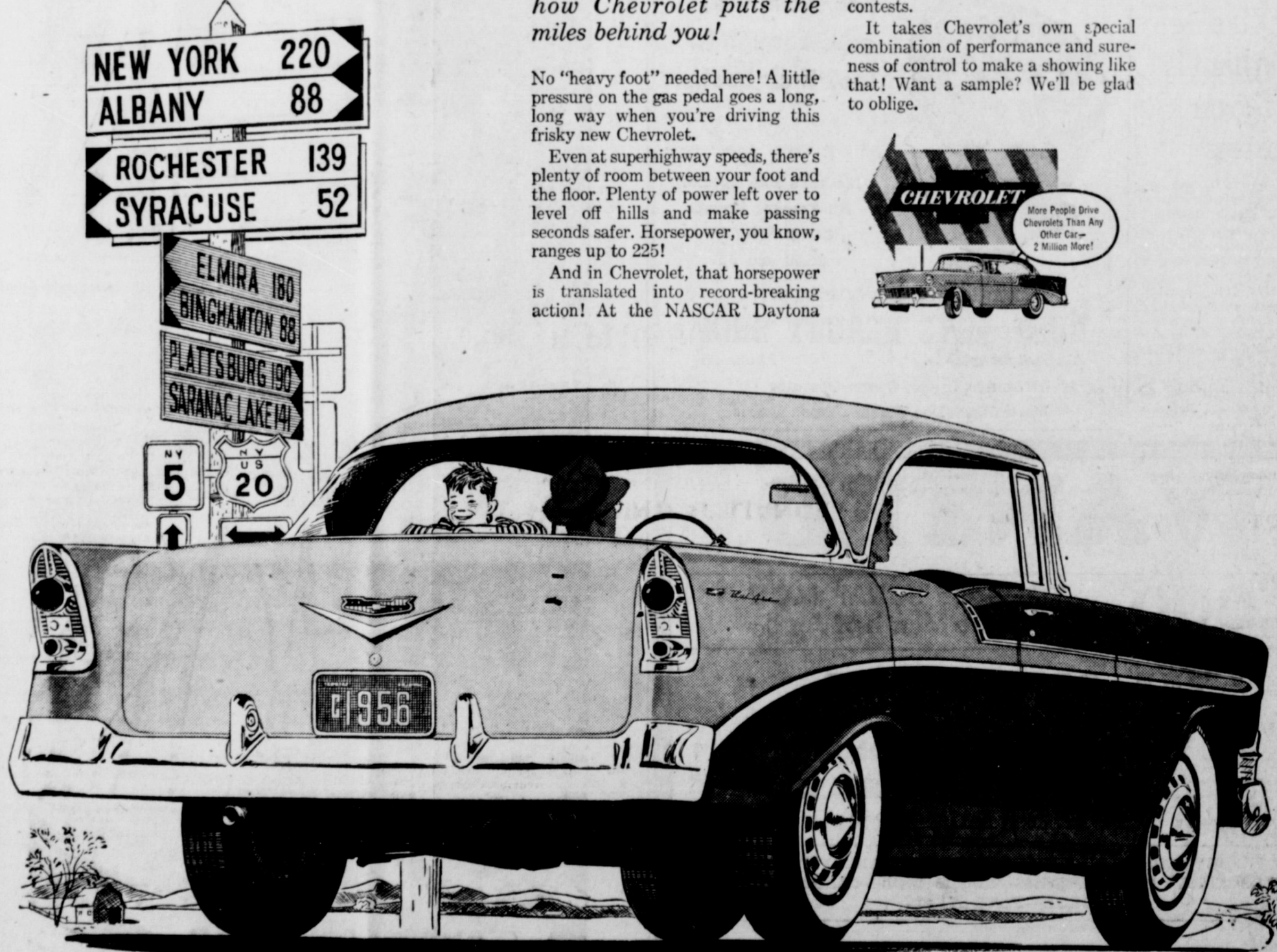
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
