EDGAR ALTOM

...nearing retirement

A long career of public service comes to an end Friday, when Eastland County Tax Assessor-Collector Edgar Altom retires.

A kindly man, Mr. Altom is highly respected at the Courthouse and at the Statehouse in Austin for the thorough and efficient manner in which he has conducted his office.

It is indeed a rare man who succeeds in the intricate business of assessing and collecting taxes. The matter of evaluations, assessments and collections in themselves ends for misunderstandings and confusions. It is to Mr. Altom's credit that he retires with very few such encounters on his record.

## Edgar Altom To Retire From Tax Office

From Biblical times, the tax collector has been an officer of mixed emotion. A necessary evil, many hold, but when officials like Edgar Altom conduct the affairs of the office, most agree that it's done in fairness and with efficiency.

And the county's one revenue-raising office doesn't always have an easy go of it. Deadlines follow deadlines.

If it's not voter registration time; it's automobile registration time and tax rolls must be maintained all the time.

Mr. Altom holds a distinction of having been instrumental in the cooperative working with oil and gas companies over the years in arriving at dwindling assessments of minerals and taxation thereof. He made the roll for years.

"Compliance" is a key word too. Laws and rules are laid down at the state level by legislators and others, and interpretations (often conflicting) on such things as voter registration, auto licensing, etc., have to be made and procedures set up to follow the instructions. Sometimes but not too often, the interpretations haven't always been what the public would have preferred - but it's follow the rules for the tax collector.

Of pioneer stock, Mr. Altom's folks came to this county from Arkansas and settled in the Pleasant Hill area.

Over 50 years ago he married Ada Poe, daughter of the late W. J. Poe, and he set out teaching school. And he farmed, but mostly he taught himself, mainly about being a good man from the good book. These early years were around Cottonwood and Bluff Branch.

One of his colleagues at the courthouse this week summed up Mr. Altom after some 35 years of working together, "I'll tell you one thing about Edgar, he's always dependable."

He came to the Courthouse in Jan. of 1937 as a deputy in the tax collector's office. (He was ordained a deacon in his church the same year).

He became chief deputy in 1940 under the late Clyde Kirlites, but decided on private business later in that term to go to Rising Star where he was with an insurance firm for a while. He later joined the Pipkin Grocery Co. as an accountant where he served for some ten years until the firm was sold, and he and his family decided to remain in Eastland.

That was in 1956, and he joined the county auditor's office where he remained until 1959 when he became chief deputy in the tax assessor's office until 1964. He was then elected county tax assessor-collector and took office in 1965.

He decided to retire this year and his chief deputy, Nancy Trout, announced for the office and was elected.

Mr. and Mrs. Altom live at 607 S. Walnut St. They have two

children and four grandchildren. Their son Garner, is hospital administrator in the Panhandle of Texas. He has two sons. Their daughter, Mrs. Donald (Elaine) Tow lives in

Temple. She has two daughters.

Asked what he plans to do after Jan. 1, Mr. Altom answers in his kindly and friendly way, "Well, I guess I'll do a

better job of keeping my yard."

The yard may benefit, but his friends in the courthouse and around the square and the county, will miss working with him.

## Old Rip 'Flys'

(ED. NOTE: From the December, 1972, issue of South-west Airlines Magazine, still another tribute to Old Rip, who now rests in a permanent tomb, for 24-hour respects on the north side of the Eastland County Courthouse.)

**OLD RIP, THE HORNED FROG OF EASTLAND:**

It is a West Texas tradition that a horned frog can live a hundred years without food or water. So in 1897 when the citizens of Eastland began to build their new courthouse, a live horned frog was sealed in the cornerstone. When the building was torn down, 31 years later, the cornerstone

was opened in the presence of a large crowd and a live frog was found. Scientists say it couldn't be so, but "Old Rip" was acclaimed in the press and became the subject of newsreels, columnists, poets and preachers. He made a triumphal tour, climaxed by a call on President Calvin Coolidge in the White House. After almost a year of fame, Old Rip died. His embalmed body is on view in a glass tomb in the Eastland courthouse.

# LEGAL NOTICES

## AN ORDINANCE

REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES, OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES, OR AMENDMENTS THERETO, THAT CONFLICT WITH THE TERMS OR CONDITIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE AND ENACTING IN LIEU THEREOF A NEW ORDINANCE, REGULATING PLUMBING WORK IN THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS; DEFINING CERTAIN TERMS; PROVIDING FOR THE ENFORCEMENT OF THIS ORDINANCE AND THE ISSUANCE OF PERMITS AND ESTABLISHING CERTAIN FEES; PROVIDING FOR SPECIFICATIONS, MATERIALS AND METHODS OF PLUMBING INSTALLATIONS PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING A SEWER - ABILITY CLAUSE.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Eastland:

### CHAPTER I TITLE CITED

1.1 This ordinance shall be known as the Plumbing Ordinance of the City of Eastland, and may be cited as such.

It shall be unlawful for any person, association of persons, co-partnership or corporation to engage in the business of plumbing, or do or perform any plumbing as defined in this ordinance, without first having procured the necessary licenses and permits as hereinafter provided for, and all plumbing, plumbing work and workmanship and materials shall meet the requirements of this ordinance and shall pass all inspections required in this ordinance in regard to the work done.

### CHAPTER 2 INTENT AND PURPOSE

2.1 PURPOSE: For the protection and preservation of life and of the public health, safety, property and the general welfare of the people, the following provisions are enacted relating to the installation, alteration or repair of pipes, fittings and fixtures for water, sewage and natural gas in all buildings and structures and all property now erected or to be erected, changed, constructed, reconstructed, repaired or altered in the City of Eastland, if same be connected to either the City water, gas or sewerage systems. The intent and purpose of this ordinance is to regulate the construction, erection, enlargement, alteration, maintenance or repair of all piping, fittings, fixtures, etc., about any and all premises in the City of Eastland, and outside the boundaries of the City of Eastland, if same be connected to either the City water, gas or sewerage systems.

26.3 PENALTIES: Any person, either by himself or agent, and any firm, corporation or other entry who violates any of the provisions of this Code shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction of any such violation, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$100.00); and each day during which such violation continues shall constitute a separate and distinct offense. In any case of a violation of any of the terms or provisions of this ordinance by any corporation, the officers and agents actively in charge of the business of such the business of such corporation, shall be subject to the penalty herein provided. Any offense defined herein which has been defined by laws of the State of Texas as an offense and for which penalty has been described shall be punished as provided in said State Law, and nothing herein shall be held as fixing

any penalty contrary to a penalty provided by the laws of the State of Texas.

(Chapters 3 through 26.2 of such ordinance are omitted herefrom for publication purposes.)

## Wonderful World of Books

With the publication of a thoroughly illustrated book entitled MODERN AMERICA Sterling Publishing Company, \$3.95), G. Bruce Woodin has completed the textbook series "A Fresh Look at American History," which educators have been awaiting with interest. This series takes an exciting, innovative approach to the study of history. It brings historical events to life, shows vividly wide ranging contributions from members of all races and religions, and discusses the political, economic, social, and cultural processes that affect our lives.

MODERN AMERICA tells a panoramic story of the years from 1877 to the present, largely through biographies of several of America's great men, stressing the problems they faced, the sometimes brilliant, sometimes faulty resolutions of these problems, and their aftermath. This, like all the books in the series, is written like an adventure story, in lively personal language (Theodore Roosevelt is "Teddy," Edison is "Tom," JFK is "Jack"), and the style quickly creates suspense, intimacy, and a feeling of immediacy.

The series has been set in large type with over 100 photographs, drawings, and political cartoons in each book (over 150 in MODERN AMERICA), making them excellent texts for reluctant readers or adults who want a quick survey of major events. At the end of each chapter, author Woodin supplies a checklist-glossary, review questions, and stimulating projects which get the student involved - experiencing history instead of just reading about it - to develop a deep awareness of the forces at work in our society. In a teachers' section at the end are subjects for classroom discussion. In Volume 5, Mr. Woodin outlines the problems America faces today, and assures the student that he or she, having read the book, is already more knowledgeable than most Americans and has the tools to

take an active part in welfare work, education, government, or even politics, to help to solve these problems. He encourages the additional study which is needed to prepare for one of these important careers.

The four other titles in the series are identical in format to MODERN AMERICA, and each one may be used independently. The first book, THE FOUNDING OF AMERICA (1492-1763) begins with a broad view of the civilizations that flourished on this continent before Columbus, and goes on to present the emergence of slavery, contrasting the barbarous conduct of early explorers, the cruelty and intolerance of the Puritans, with the intellectual courage of Roger Williams, for example, and the wisdom of William Penn.

In Volume 2, REVOLUTION AND CONSTITUTION (1763-1797) the forthright report of what actually went on during the War and in the Constitutional Convention (and after it) makes this period and its famous names come vitally alive.

Volume 3, PIONEERS (1797-1850) traces the expansion of America not only through explorers such as Daniel Boone and Lewis and Clark, but through pioneers in other perhaps more important directions, people such as Frederick Douglass, Henry D. Thoreau, Eli Whitney, and Harriet Tubman.

SLAVERY (1850-1877) is Volume 4 in the series, but it is particularly well structured for independent use. In it Mr. Woodin looks back to the arrival of the first blacks in America and shows clearly how slavery became a way of life, what it was like to be a slave and to live in those days, how

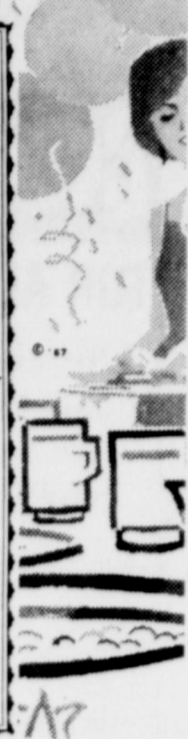

Travel data for the nationwide Interstate Highway System shows that modern roads save lives.

In 1970, 2.68 deaths were recorded for each 100 million miles of motor vehicle travel on the Interstate compared to 5.16 - nearly twice as many - on other road and street systems.

Because of its safety features, the 42,500 mile network will help to save an estimated 8,000 lives each year by the time it is completed in the early 1980's, the Highway Users Federation reports.

## Deadline Extended

AUSTIN - The Texas highway Commission has extended the license and permit filing deadline for owners of signs along Interstate and primary highways.

The Commission extended the filing deadline from December 31 to June 30, 1973. Advertising industry and individual sign owners requested the extension because the previous deadline did not permit sufficient time to comply with the Texas Highway Beautification Act.

The Act requires a permit for each existing or planned sign. Also, anyone erecting or maintaining signs within 660 feet of an Interstate of Federal aid highway must have a license to engage in outdoor advertising.

Sign owners are advised to apply for a license and all necessary sign permits as soon as possible since no further extension of the deadline is contemplated.

The State license fee of \$25 is valid for an indefinite period. In addition, sign owners are required to post a \$2,500 bond in each county in which they have signs. Maximum bonds of \$10,000 are required of owners with signs in more than three counties.
