You remember that of the some 800 persons checked for glaucoma in the recent Eastland County screening, 26 were referred to specialists for further tests? Well, according to a report here this week, at least three of those 26 persons definitely have glaucoma. Marcus O'Dell citing a report by the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness, which assisted with the screening, stated that 11 of the 26 have had further tests and from these the Society has learned that three are positive cases, three more are still suspect, five were negative and two others are being sent for re-checking . . . ELECTION SECOND THOUGHTS: When you put a pencil to what it costs to count votes in Eastland County, you come up with some interesting notes. Saturday's run-off, for instance. With 3,915 votes cast, cost the Democratic party in the County, \$869 to count. High, but less than the \$1,433 for the first primary when 5,931 votes were counted.

Broke down by precincts, it gets more surprising. Not surprising, of course, is that it costs less to count votes in Cisco (the largest box) where Saturday's counting cost 12 cents a vote, (\$116 paid to eight workers to count 929 votes). Just a cent less though than in Ranger where eight workers counted 812 votes; total cost \$105, or 13 cents each. Eastland votes cost 15 cents each to count (11 workers, counting 958 votes, total cost

Woods Elected As Commissioner

Winning the Democratic nomination in Eastland County is virtually equal to election and L. E. (Lefty) Sublett, first deputy in the sheriff's department, will most likely be sworn in as county sheriff on Jan. 1st, after Saturday's run-off primary.

Sublett downed veteran former county Sheriff J. B. Williams in all but two precincts. Sublett got 2,467 and Williams 1,412. Williams carried only home-town boxes of Gorman and Desdemona.

A new county commissioner will be sworn in on Jan. 1st too, after Danny Woods of Olden beat Earl Blackwell of Ranger. Woods got 1,317 and Blackwell, 710, in the three boxes and absentee vote that make up Precinct One.

A total of 3,863 voters went to the polls Saturday — compared to 5,805 in the May first primary.

Incumbent Joe Pool carried Eastland County with 2,815 to his run-off opponent's 988 for Congressman-at-large.

County vote counting was completed by 8:30 p.m. Saturday with all boxes complete. Sublett will be filling the job now held by Lee Horn, who did not seek re-election. Woods will be replacing Tip Arther, who also didn't seek re-election.

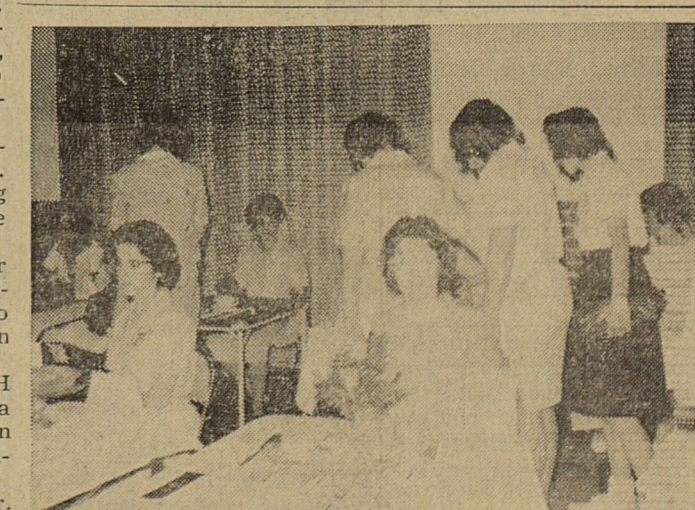

Shortwave Radio Hookup Installed By ECWSD Board

The board of directors of Eastland County Water Supply District has installed efficient shortwave citizens band radio equipment at Lake Leon, according to C. B. Pruet, Ranger, ECWSD president.

The base station is located at the lake custodian's home at the dam, which also serves as an information center. A mobil unit is installed in the patrol boat and is capable of contacting the Ranger and Eastland police departments and the state game warden.

In case of snake bite, the patrolman can arrange with a doctor to meet him at a hospital in either Ranger or Eastland in a matter of minutes.

According to Pruet, this is another action by the board to maintain an enviable safety record and enables the lake custodian to immediately call for help in any kind of emergency. It also is beneficial not only to the custodian but to sportsmen and others taking advantage of recrea-

tional facilities.

In addition to this safety measure, the volunteer fire department at Eastland has a rescue unit with emergency resuscitation equipment that can be contacted immediately by radio. It is against regulations for any boat to be put on the lake without a life preserver for each person in the boat, and this rule will continue to be rigidly enforced, Pruet said.

Lake Leon has one of the best safety records of any lake in Texas. Only one drowning has occurred at the lake since the formal opening on Labor Day in 1955. Another death occurred at the lake, but a physician's examination failed to reveal any water in the victim's lungs, and his death was evidently attributed to other causes.

The Eastland County Water Supply District board is composed of four directors from Ranger and four from Eastland, the two towns having jointly built the lake, and both cities receive their water supply from the lake, is piped from a central filtration plant.

Pruet also announced that the board is contemplating in the near future—improving the park areas by cleaning brush and weeds and erecting more picnic tables.

The State Highway Department has erected a large concrete launching ramp at the bridge on Highway 2214, and the board also has built several launching areas around the lake. The launching ramp at the bridge is continuously lighted with two large spotlights.

About 250 cabins dot the 35-mile shoreline, and the abundance of shade trees surrounding the lake, including elm, oak and other species, make a wonderful setting for a cabin most anywhere on the lake.

Many permanent homes have been built on its shores, some costing as much as \$20,000, and many citizens have permanent homes there.

The board has done extensive repairs on the roads around the lake, including some recent black-top construction.

"We are gratified at the constructive progress our board has made, and the wonderful cooperation we have received from the citizens of Ranger and Eastland," Pruet said.

(Continued from Page One) \$140. Now down at Pioneer where seven (7) workers, worked 80½ hours, counting 32 votes, your cost-per-vote really goes up — \$2.66 per vote. (Total cost there was \$85.50, highest, except totals at Cisco, Eastland and Ranger.

Naturally, the small boxes are going to have higher per-vote cost, but wow? Nimrod, 31 votes, costing \$38, or \$1.22 per vote; Kokomo, 32 votes, costing \$38, or \$1.18 per vote.

Totals for the county are like this: 70 workers in the 13 precincts (including absentee) who worked 799 hours, counting the total 3,915, for the \$869 total. And averaged across the county, cost per vote for counting was some 22 cents.

Election workers Saturday night during the returns observed once again that "absentees tell the tale" or "as goes the absentee vote, goes the election." Take the sheriff's race for example: Sublett got 63 absentee votes, Williams, 37. Add them together and you get an even 100 votes, and that makes the percentage easy to figure — Sublett got 63 per cent of the absentee and Williams, 37 per cent. And when the returns were in from all boxes, that same percentage ratio was reflected. Elections are interesting, aren't they?

Truck Driver Is Killed In Three Vehicle Mishap

A Marietta, Ga., truck driver lost his life in a three-vehicle accident during rainy weather Wednesday night on Highway 80 in the west edge of Cisco. He was Jesse Von Williams, 33, who was asleep in the rest compartment of a big Burnham Van Service truck, and he died almost instantly in the mishap.

Injured was James Blue, 24, who was driving, and his condition was described as satisfactory Saturday morning at Graham Hospital in Cisco.

Mrs. J. A. Sparks of Alabama, driver of a station wagon that was pulling a concession stand on wheels, was arrested by State Highway Patrolmen from the Eastland office in connection with the mishap.

She was fined \$100 and given a three-day jail sentence by County Judge Scott Bailey as she entered a plea of guilty to charges of negligent homicide in his court Friday. She was given credit for Thursday and Friday on the jail sentence and was "let off" Saturday due to good behavior.

The Sparks car was headed west and, the report said, the Burnham truck swirled to miss it, plowing into a parked truck loaded with sheep. The livestock truck was owned by Bill Taylor of San Angelo and it was damaged. The Burnham truck was demolished, and the Sparks car had a front fender damaged.

The two children of Mrs. Sparks, 5 and 11 years old, were given into the custody of Rev. Jesse Cassie, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Cisco, as police arrested their mother. Their father was in another vehicle ahead of them and was notified of the accident at Monahans. He returned here Friday.

Rust Funeral Home of Cisco sent the body of Mr. Williams to Georgia by train at 1 p.m. Friday. Blue was expected to remain in the hospital several days.
