We Meant What We Said

"We owe it, there fore, to candor . . . to declare that we should consider any attempt on their part to extend their system to any portion of this hemisphere as dangerous to our peace and safety."

No, that is not President F. D. Roosevelt speaking of Greenland in 1941. That is President James Monroe speaking of the whole Western Hemisphere in 1823.

But the passing of 118 years has not changed the essential wisdom of Monroe's Doctrine. In fact, it has heightened it. With rapid transportation and the bombing plane, it is more than ever necessary that no European or Asiatic nation be allowed to get a new foothold on Western Hemisphere territory.

It is a simple fact that Canada and the United States would not feel safe if a German air base were to be set up in southern Greenland. It is less than a thousand miles to the North American seaboard from that point—just a hop-skip-and-jump for a modern long-range bomber.

Experience of the past two years has amply proved that the only way to assure safety in these matters is to move first. The British hesitated to violate the neutrality of Belgium and Holland and Scandinavia. And while they hesitated, mediating on niceties of international law, the Nazis acted. Seizing the initiative in each case, they were "there fustet with the mostest." And they won.

President Roosevelt would seem to have learned the lesson. Germany might well want Greenland because of its value as a base to attack British shipping as a weather observation station, as a source of cryolite. Her planes have soared over it. The President obviously determined that this time the Germans should not be first. Greenland, almost all of it, is clearly in the Western Hemisphere. Its occupation by Germany would be a danger to the United States. We act, therefore, in our own interest, determined for once to "be there first."

Europe and all the lands in it may be merely a set of prizes to be raked in by the strongest, like chips in a poker game. But the lands of the Western Hemisphere are not to be fought over in this way.

The United States so determined 118 years ago. The American republics, all of them, are like-minded today.

This we have said—and we meant what we said.

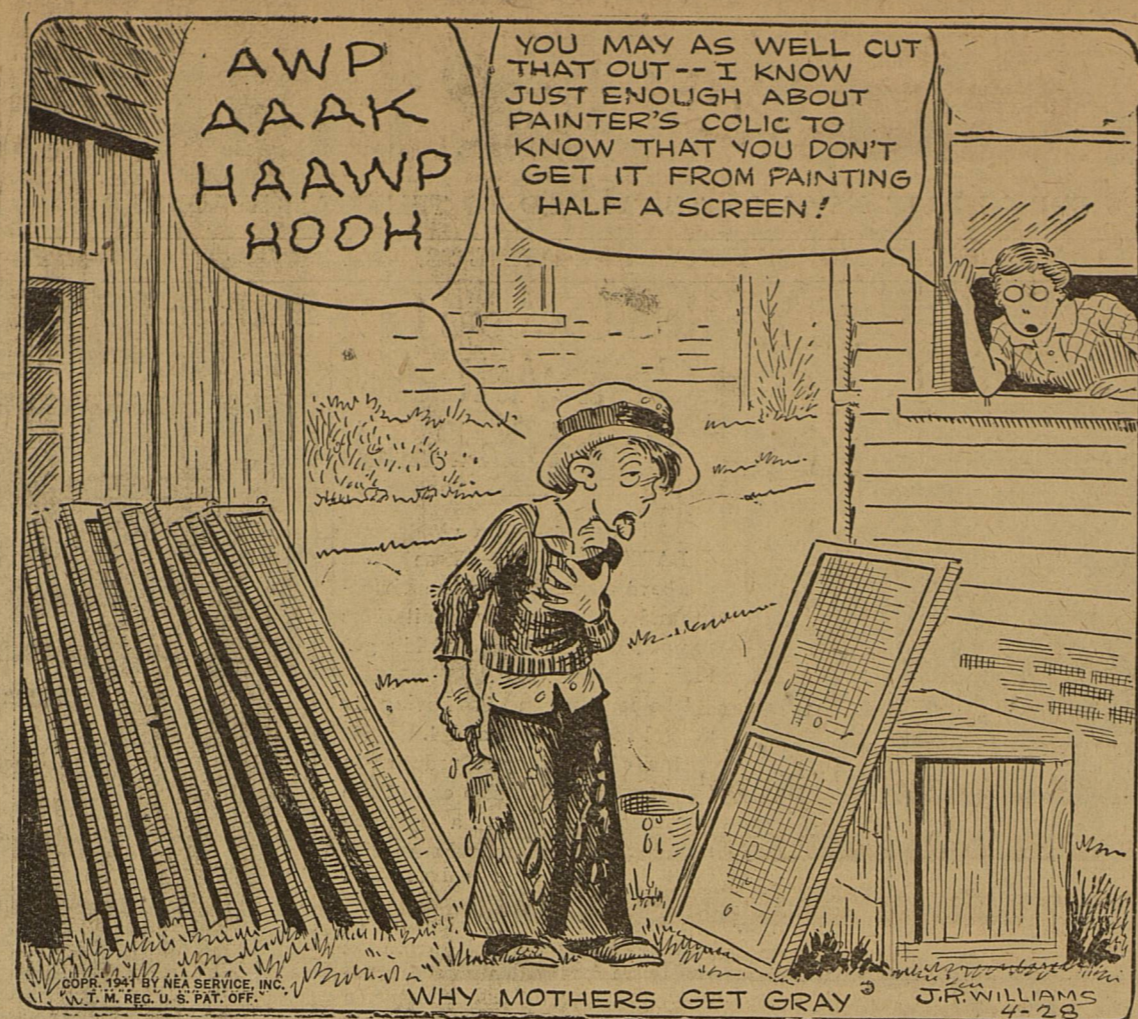

Lifting Of Ban On Laborers Is Urged

By United Press SAN ANTONIO, Texas—Relaxation of the ban on importing labor from Mexico was urged by South Texas groups today to meet the purported threat of a farm labor shortage.

The South Texas Chamber of Commerce said the shortage might become acute during the cotton picking season. It has been aggravated by the draft and by an increasing flow of workmen to defense industries.

Chamber officials said they might be able to cope with the problem as they did four years ago. At that time, a publicity campaign brought sufficient labor from other localities. Relief officials cooperated by temporarily discharging able-bodied persons who could find employment in the fields.

Four-fifths of the value of all the crude oil produced in Texas each year is paid to Texas oil workers and farmers and ranchers in wages and lease and royalty payments.

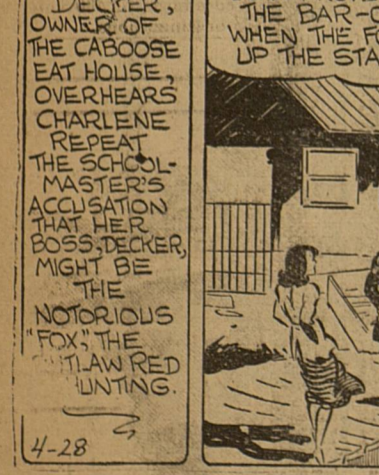

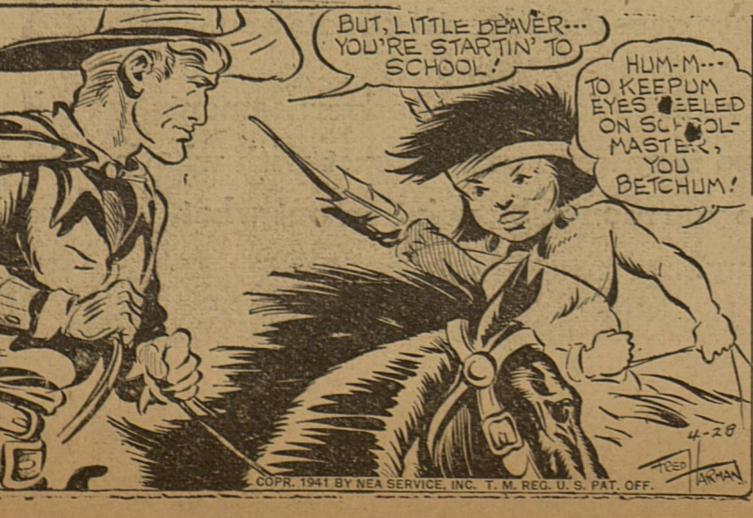

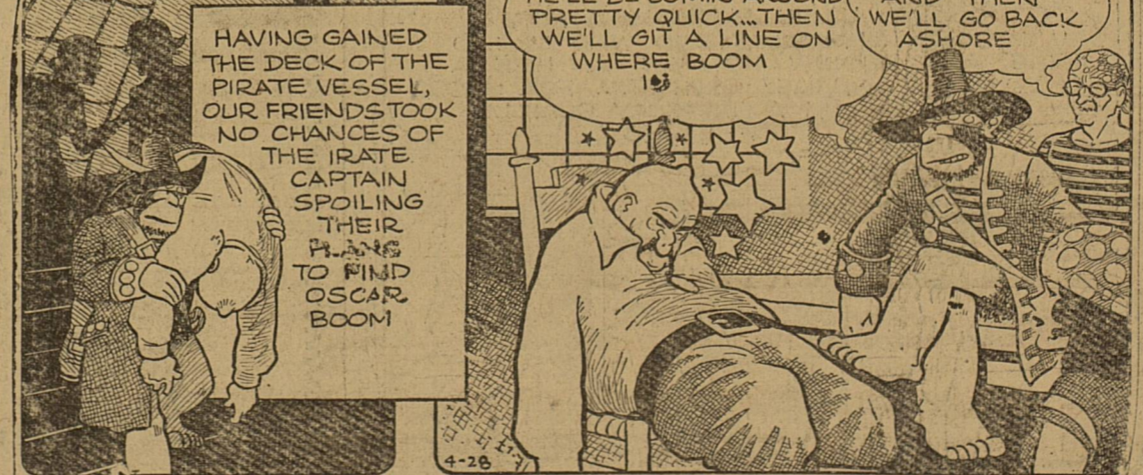

CANADA—OUR NEIGHBOR

American artists are being invited to Ontario to aid Canadian painters in their efforts

WE may not appreciate what the rank and file of American artists have achieved during the last few years but definite recognition is being given by Canadian artists to the need of greater understanding among themselves for the general welfare of the profession along the lines accomplished in the United States. With this thought in mind a conference of Canadian artists will be held in the Province of Ontario and meetings will be conducted in Kingston and Ottawa from June 26 to June 29, inclusive. The purpose of the initial meeting is three-fold. First, it will be national in scope, bringing together for the first time artists from every province of the Dominion; second, to study painting techniques that have been developed as a result of recent discoveries and chemical improvements and, finally, to devote some discussion to the position of the artist in present day society. In addition, it is planned to give a tangible value to the conclave by awarding four traveling fellowships for each province, all artists living more than 200 miles from Kingston being eligible.

Another feature creating more than usual interest in this session will be the presence of a number of American artists, technical experts and critics. Replies to invitations extended indicate there is a strong feeling of cooperation and a desire on the part of Americans to foster the spirit of good-will between the neighboring countries.

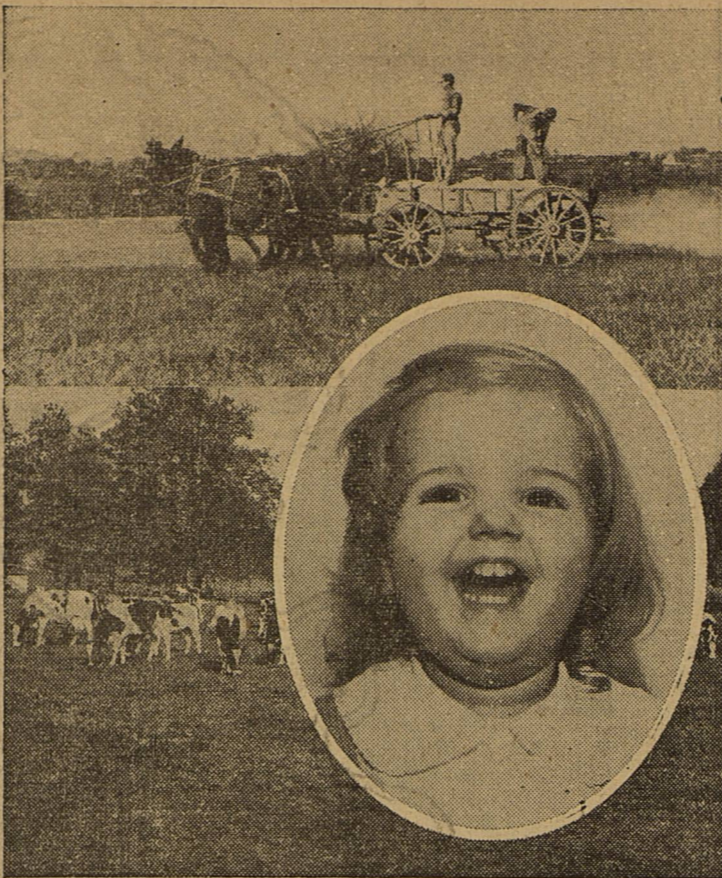
The conference is being held under the joint auspices of Queen's University, Ontario's outstanding educational institution, and the National Gallery of Canada, with the collaboration of the Carnegie Corporation. The sponsorship was accomplished by Andre Bisier, resident artist at Queen's, who found that a national Canadian interest could be developed if properly noted, after he had lectured

throughout the country last year. The consensus of opinion seems to be that Canadians will appreciate the opportunities to be offered by attending the meetings and that from the latter will evolve a clearer conception of purpose among artists in a nation at war as well as a coherent and constructive plan which may be presented to the Government. It seems that much interest has been aroused by the progress of the artist in the United States in connection with Federal art projects. Further, it has been said, the United States has produced better war posters than have been offered in Canada and the time has arrived for the Canadian artists to do something about it. For these reasons are the American artists being invited to Kingston and Ottawa to share their experiences, but, most important of all perhaps, to explain how the American artist has been able to approach the position held by the painter in the days of the Renaissance when he was considered a useful producing member of society.

Following the meeting the National Gallery is arranging to hold exhibitions of Canadian canvasses throughout the Dominion.

This convention is one of a number of meetings of Canadian professional men to be held this year and to which Americans in similar lines of endeavor have been invited. It is felt that much can be accomplished through an interchange of ideas between the two neighboring, English speaking countries, and, although Canada is at war, no efforts are being overlooked to seek greater understanding at a time when it will be most beneficial and citizens of the Dominion are unable, because of restrictive war measures to come down into the United States. There are no handicaps to Americans entering or leaving Canada.

Texas Can't Save On It's Elections

AUSTIN, Tex.—Texas will be unable to save money by holding the election for United States Senator at the same time proposed constitutional amendments are submitted to the people for a vote.

The senatorial election had to be within 90 days after Sen. Morris Sheppard's death on April 9 and a constitutional amendment wouldn't take their cars or trucks out that night. But if the date were kept secret and the enforcement started without warning, the cars and trucks that would be required to put on proper equipment would reduce accident danger for months.

No legislator has been hit yet in going to the capitol. One state employe is permanently disabled from an accident at the north entrance. A former mansion watchman was killed at the south entrance.

Austin, too, gives the legislators a liberal demonstration of the way the headlight and tail-light law is ignored by both motorists and police.

The state has citrus weeks, potato days and "eat meat" periods. One night devoted generally to enforcement of the vehicle light law probably would save many lives.

Any community could afford to station one officer at the city or town limits to stop every automobile or truck that tried to enter without the required two headlights and a tail-light. State police could catch them in between cities.

Of course, the night could not be proclaimed or be publicized in advance, for its effect would be limited to providing one night of safety from the violators. They

The delay on constitutional amendments is to give time for public acquaintance with the proposals. Each must be published once a week for four weeks commencing at least three months before the election is held. The publication must be in one weekly paper of each county where there is a newspaper published.

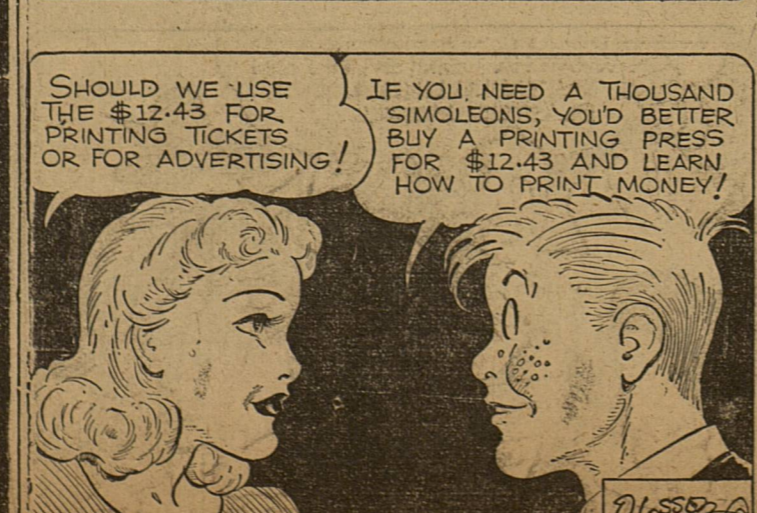
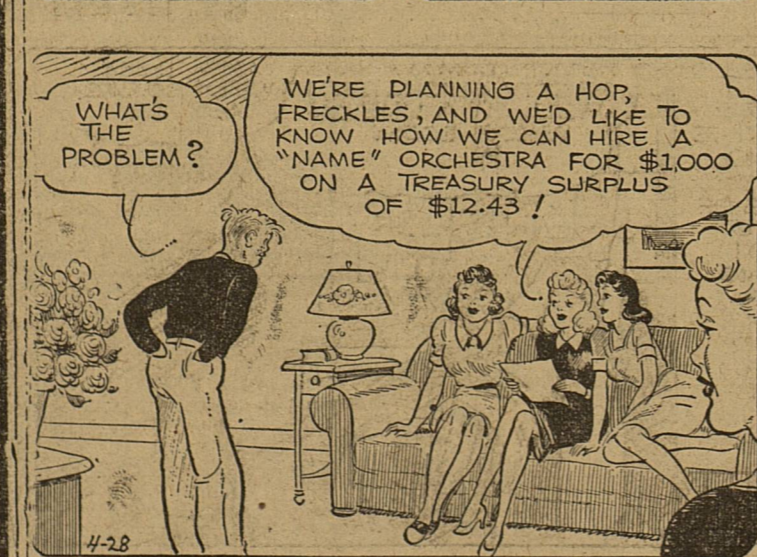
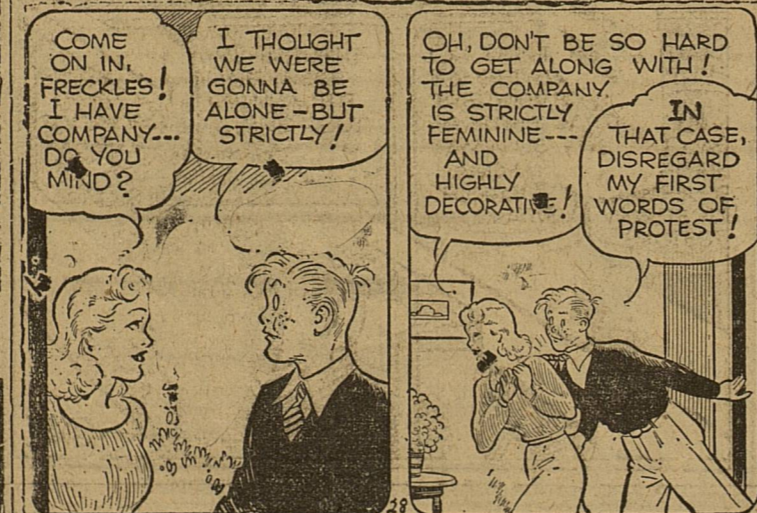
