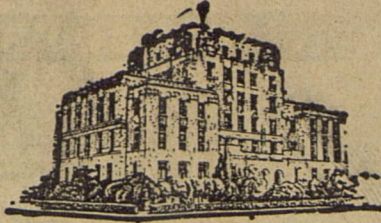

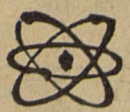

C. C. Brown is Tourney chairman and Neil Day will be starter.

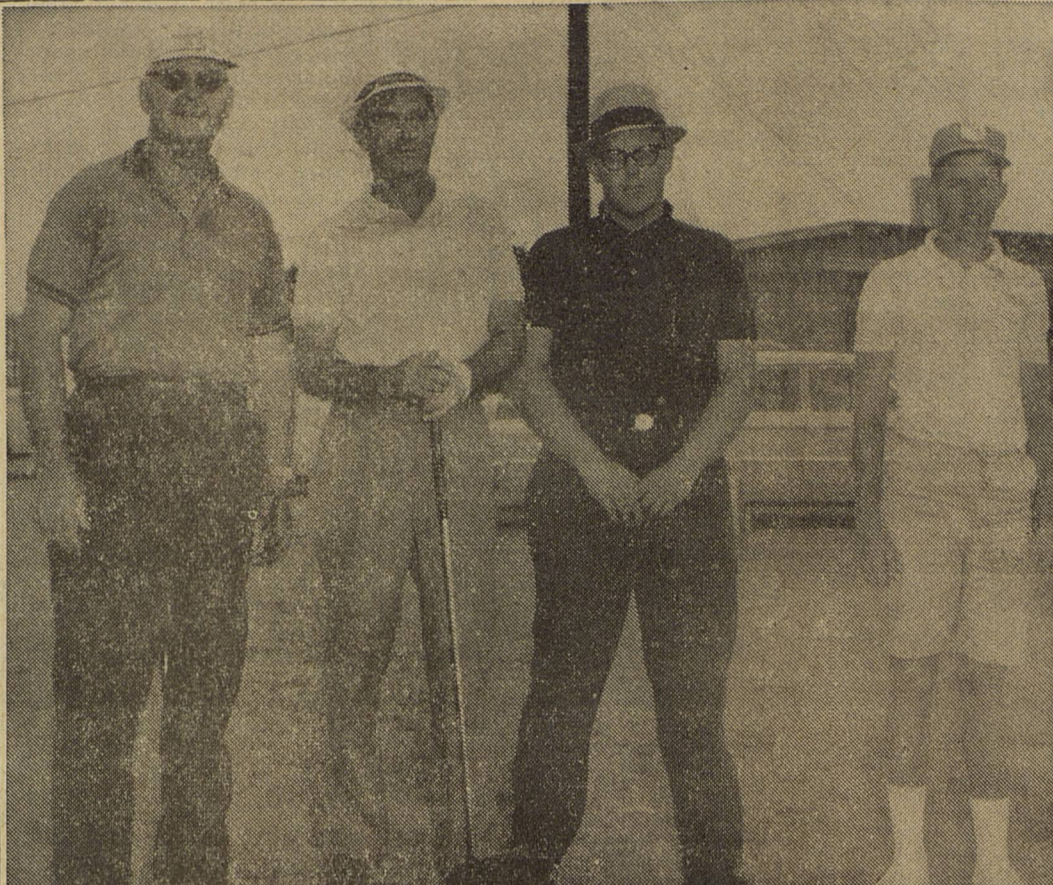

## Deep Wildcat Northwest Eastland Former Minister To Pastor FCC In Irving

A wildcat oil test of considerable interest to Eastland County was rigging up to begin drilling Friday a mile north of highway 80, some three miles northeast of Cisco. The well was E. V. McCright's No. 1 R. S. Lee et al.

Plans called for the test to go to 4,100 feet with Fred McCright of Cisco as the drilling contractor. The drilling firm began moving in equipment late Thursday and hoped to set surface pipe Friday night. The well owner is a Dallas oil operator.

Location for the test was given as 660 feet from the north and 1,760 feet from the west lines of Section 63, Block 4, H&TC Survey. It was understood that the Lee tract contained 80 acres, which was part of the drilling block of several hundred acres.

R. S. Lee, in whose name the well is listed, is a resident of Fort Worth and is a brother of Edward Lee of Cisco. John Harlow of Dallas is the owner of the land surface. The property adjoins the George Fee Ranch.

The test is an offset to a Lake Sand well completed there a few years ago by Anderson et al. It was a small producer and was plugged after producing two or three years. The new test will seek production in the Mississippi time.

## Great Plains Conservationists Hold Annual Meet, Tour In This County

"In Eastland County, as in other areas where conservation practices are being used, we still haven't made enough progress on the land and for the people who use the land," H. N. Smith, state conservationist from Temple, said in Eastland Wednesday afternoon during the opening session of the annual Great Plains Conservation Program committee meeting.

The two-day event which attracted 30 conservation specialists from all over the state, will terminate Thursday with an extended tour of the county to observe Great Plains Conservation practices in progress.

Eastland County was selected as site for this year's meeting and tour because of its unique problems, Smith told the group, meeting in Texas Electric Service Company's conference room.

"This county, one of the earliest settled," he said, "is one of our greatest problem areas because of its erratic climate, wind and water erosion, brush invasion, cash crop farming, poor management and other reasons."

"Its soil is historically low in fertility and has been greatly eroded," he pointed out, adding that much has been accomplished, but that there's still much to be done.

Smith stated that conservation programs state-wide are "losing ground" because of increasing brush land, in spite of continued programs of control.

E. E. McAlister, Eastland work unit supervisor for the Soil Conservation Service, explained the work that had been done under the G. P. program. "The G. P. committee expected maybe '7' applications when we went into this program. We've had 177 to date, and now have a total of 86 projects under G. P. con-

tracts, representing 42,561 acres of land."

"Average size of the contracts is 501 acres," he said, "and we signed 35 contracts in 1963."

Thursday's tour took the visiting conservationists to the S. S. Powers farm at Desdemona, the James V. Fields farm north of Gorman, and Johnnie Aaron's place, south of Eastland, where the group had lunch.

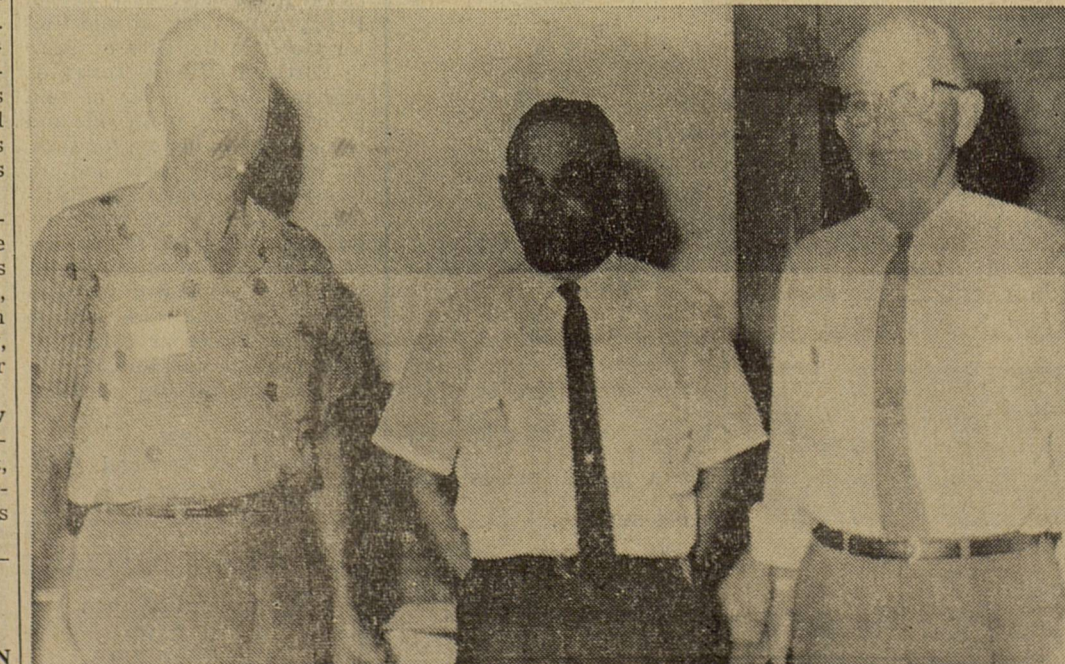
