Emergency loans are made in areas where the Secretary of Agriculture finds that there is a need for credit that is not available from other sources. The need may be due to the damage done by a natural disaster, such as drought, flood or hurricane, or to economic

To be eligible for an emergency loan, a farmer or rancher must be unable to obtain the credit he needs from any other source. In (Continued on Page 2)

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
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
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
