addition, he must be engaged primarily in farming, have suitable farming experience and reasonable prospects for success in the farming operations he plans to carry on with the loan.

Emergency Loans are made to finance normal operations. Loan funds can be used to purchase feed, seed, fertilizer, farm and home supplies, and replacement machinery and livestock.

Repayments are scheduled according to the borrower's ability to repay. Ordinarily, loans secured by liens on chattel property are scheduled for repayment within one to five years. Loans for crop production are due when the crop is harvested.

Applications for emergency loans are made at the county offices of the Farmers Home Administration. The local County Farmers Home Administration committee determines the eligibility of applicants for these emergency loans.

Irrigation To Be Meet Topic, Comanche, 12th

The Comanche County Agricultural Agent Ray Hastings and the Comanche County Electric Cooperative will sponsor an irrigation meeting at the Comanche County Courthouse at 1:30 p.m., Monday, December 12. A number of area farmers who have been actively irrigating are being asked to present the results of their experiences with irrigation and a period of questions and answers will follow these presentations.

The costs for electricity and fuel will be shown and the added yield due to irrigation will be shown from actual experience of farmers in this immediate area.

It is becoming a proven fact that irrigation on a small scale and with limited amounts of water is a good paying proposition and farmers in a wide area of Comanche, Eastland, Brown, and Stephens counties could improve their income nicely with small systems.

Dairymen, it is said, especially could take advantage of irrigation to furnish green food supplements for their cows. There will be additional information on Coastal Bermuda grass, which, under irrigation, will furnish an amazing amount of forage for cattle.

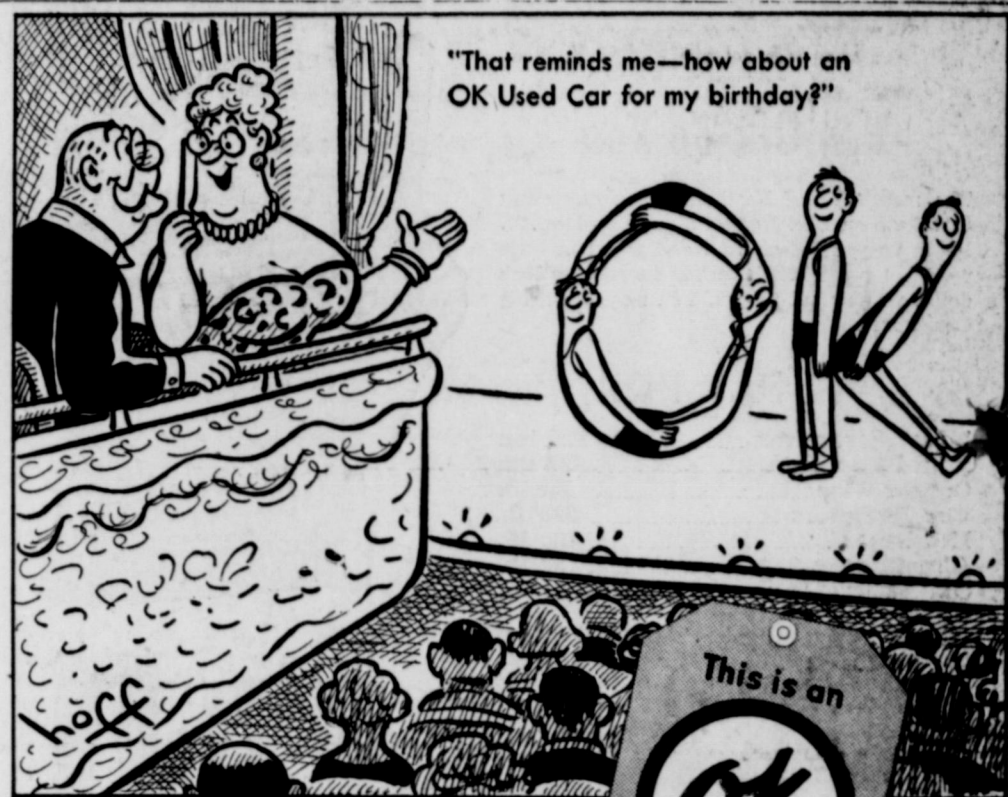

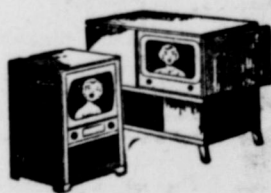

County Does Not Reflect Eastward Cattle Movement

Cattle population in Texas counties has changed considerably since 1900 and 1954.

Preliminary 1954 U.S. Census of Agriculture figures show an increase in cattle numbers in East Texas while West Texas counties continue to decline.

Eastland County, however, has not yet been affected by the general trend. For in 1954 there were 23,591 cattle reported in the county, the highest number for any one year.

The only decrease in the cattle population that the county has shown, was when the herds dwindled to 28,610 in 1950 from 31,259 in 1945.

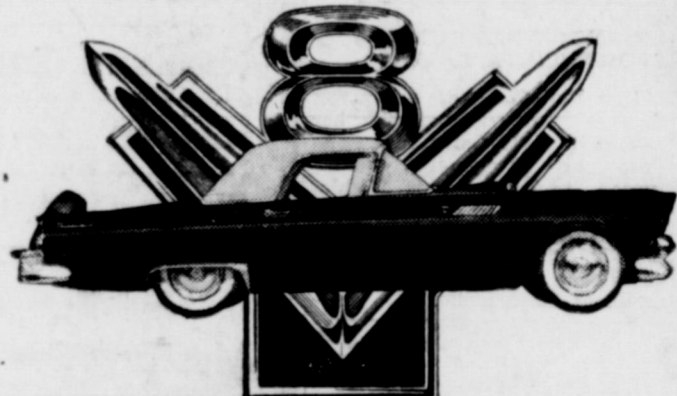

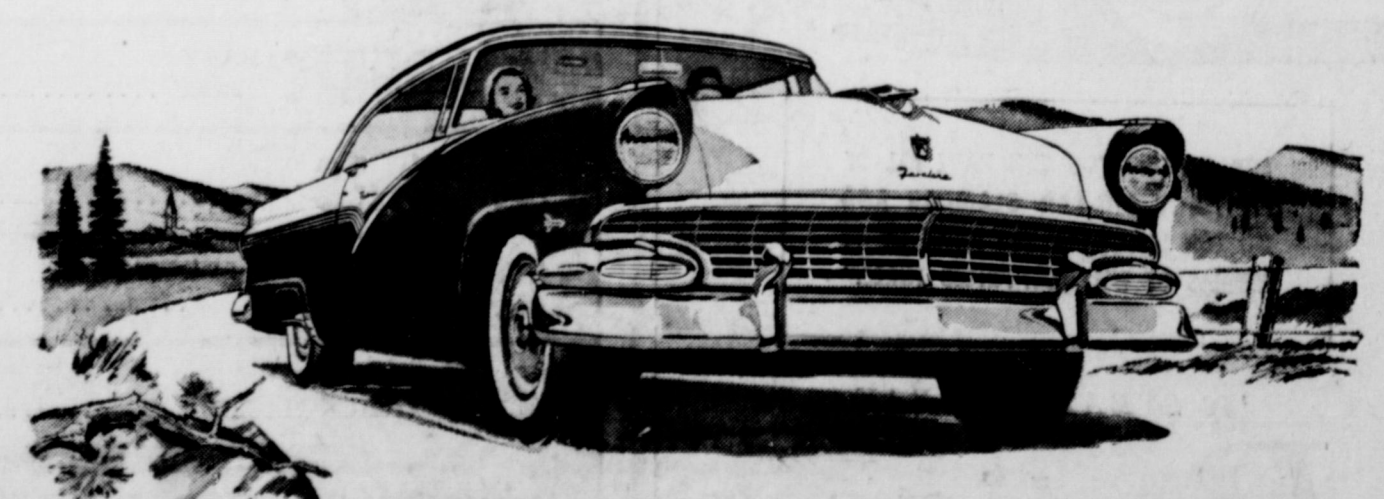
