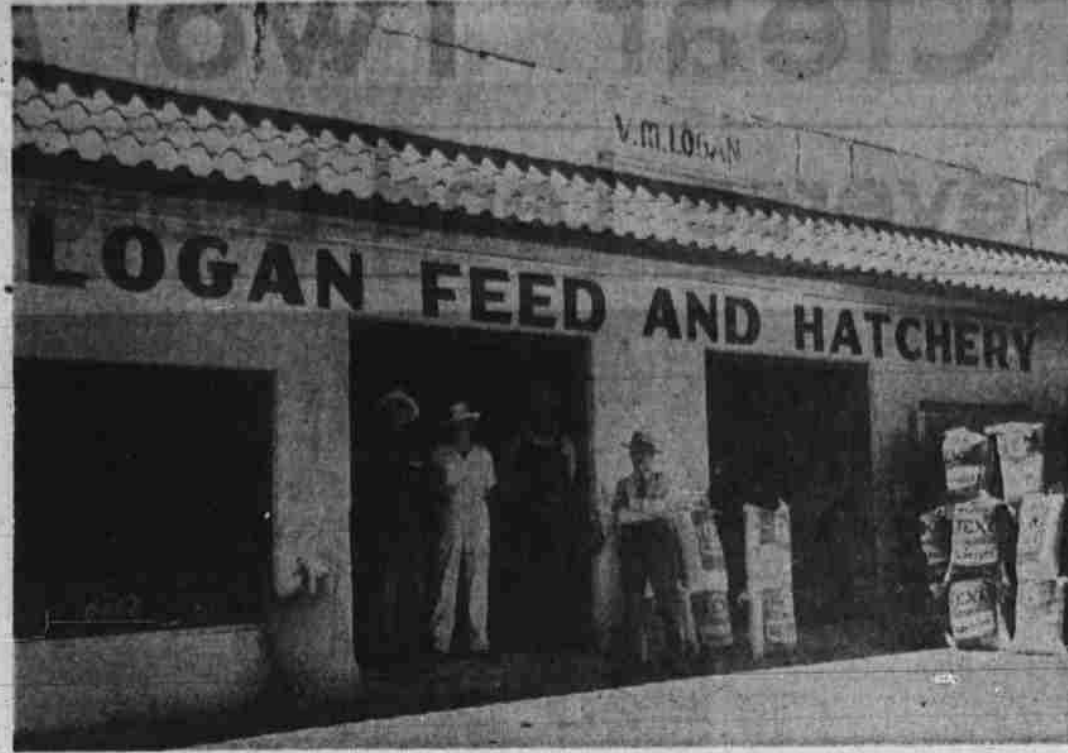
Burrus 'Texo' Feeds Featured By Logan Here

Since it has become impossible for the Logan Feed and Hatchery to mix their own high quality feeds because they can not get the supplements, they are featuring Burrus Texo feeds and a high quality feed produced by the Kimbell-Diamond Milling company in Fort Worth.

Vernon Logan, owner and manager of the feed store at 817 East 3rd, has been in the feed and hatchery business since 1925, and has operated at his present location since 1935.

Logan has announced that he will put on his first eggs to hatch in January of 1944, and the season's output will probably reach 100,000 eggs.

The business of the coming year stands up to former years, Logan will be shipping young chicks just hatched to such distant points as Arizona, New Mexico, Oklahoma and California. He explained that this was done very easily since the chick can live three days on the unabsorbed egg yolk. The normally healthy chicks hatched off here at the Logan hatchery can be shipped to areas where poultry is scarce. Logan pointed out in his interview that a large per cent of poultry is suffering from the "rupe" at the present time. Symptoms are "droopiness" and swollen eyes.

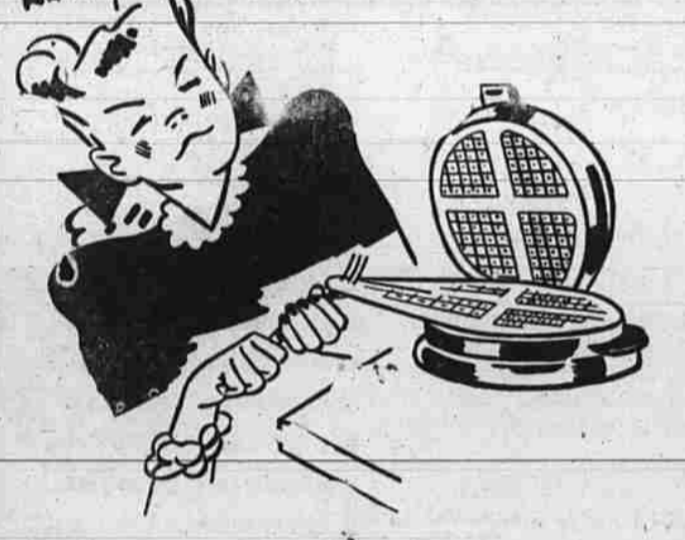

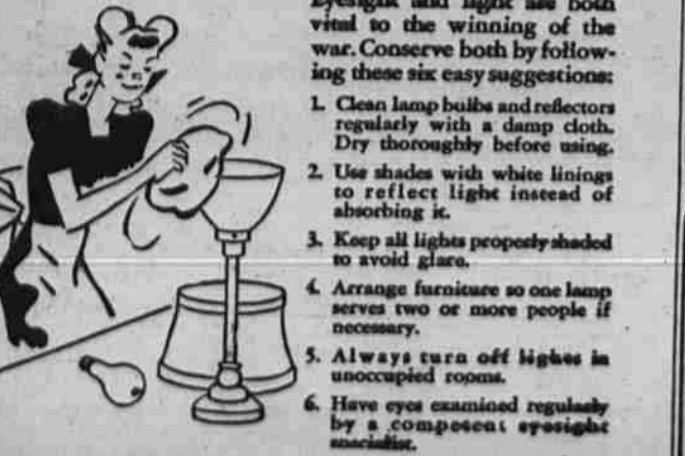
HOW TO CURE A STICKY WAFFLE IRON

A waffle generally sticks because of improper preheating or insufficient shortening in the batter. When this happens, remove particles left on grid with wire brush. Then cover the grids with a thin film of salad oil or melted unsalted fat. Let grids heat until they smoke, pour batter and discard first waffle.

SOME OTHER HINTS ON WAFFLE IRON CARE

- 1 Heat iron to right temperature before pouring batter.
2 Wipe grids lightly with soft cloth or paper towel after each use. Don't wash grids.
3 Cool iron with lid up—never while closed or grids will discolor.

How to conserve eyesight and light!



Eyesight and light are both vital to the winning of the war. Conserve both by following these six easy suggestions:
1. Clean lamp bulbs and reflectors regularly with a damp cloth. Dry thoroughly before using.

October Arrests Announced At 119

Total arrests by the city police department during October was announced at 119 in the round up of departmental reports by the City of Big Spring as presented to the commissioners Tuesday evening.

Of the number 42, paid fines for drunkenness, 19 for gaming, and 17 for unlawful train riding. Seven vagrants were arrested at the venereal disease clinic and five AWOL soldiers were turned over to the military police. Eight cases were transferred to the sheriff.

The case load at the venereal disease clinic rose to a total of 98 for syphilis during October. In addition to these, there were 329 treatments for gonorrhea. A breakdown on syphilis cases showed six new negro female cases and one each for white and colored males. Active cases include 15 white males, 22 white females, 23 colored males and 35 colored females, besides three other types such as congenital cases, etc.

In his narrative report to the commission, V. A. Cross, sanitarian for the Big Spring-Howard county division of the Midland-Ector-Howard County Health Unit, told of visits to dairies (who are steadily improving quality of milk supplies) of checking samples of effluent from the sewer disposal plant, of checking city water samples, and of gradual progress by cafes in improving kitchen conditions.

Buddy Agnell Home On Visit

Capt. P. W. (Buddy) Agnell, stationed in Washington, D. C. by the Air Transport Command, is visiting here a few days with his mother, Mrs. Della K. Agnell.

He plans also to visit in Austin briefly before returning to his post. Capt. Agnell entered the army 17 months ago as a private and has risen rapidly to his present rank. After a brief stay in Brazil, he was brought back to the states and assigned to Washington. Recently he completed an audit inspection tour of ATC bases in countries in the Middle East, North African and European theatres which required 40 days of travel and work. Mrs. Agnell has another son, Lieut. Alvin Agnell, who is stationed in the Aleutians by the navy.

Ten persons witnessed a poultry culling demonstration at the Carl McKee farm Tuesday. County Agent O. E. Griffin conducting the demonstration in checking 200 hens in the flock, cut back around 75 as "boarders."

Army's "Dream" Weapon Is Doing A Good Job

SUMMIT, N. J., Nov. 11 (AP)—The U. S. Army's "dream" weapon—a new electrical anti-aircraft gun director—is doing a good job in helping to blast the enemy out of the skies in far-flung theatres of war, its developers claim.

The device originated in a dream that Dr. David P. Parkinson, physicist of the Bell Telephone laboratories staff, had one night back in 1940 when the low countries were invaded by Hitler's hordes. He dreamed he was a member of a Dutch anti-aircraft gun crew bringing down Nazi planes in bunches with an electrical gun control mechanism.

The MB, which grew from that dream, was exhibited yesterday by army ordnance men at the Bell Telephone laboratories at Murray Hill near here, and was pronounced by Maj. Gen. L. H. Campbell, Jr., chief of the army ordnance department, to be "one of the greatest advances ever made in the art of gun fire control." "Today," Gen. Campbell stated, "our men are knocking down an average of one plane to every 90 shots of 90 millimeter ammunition. In the last war we used to hit a plane on the average of every 17,000 shots, and then rarely knocked them down."

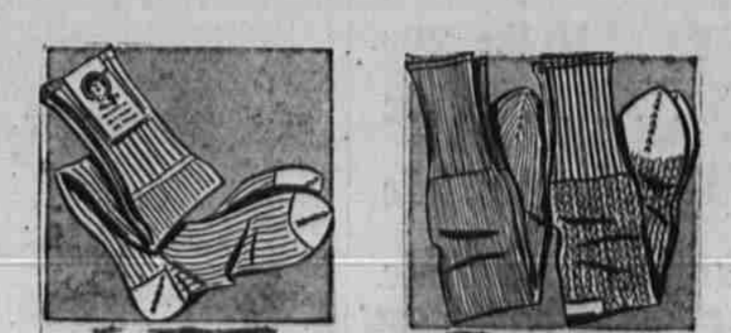

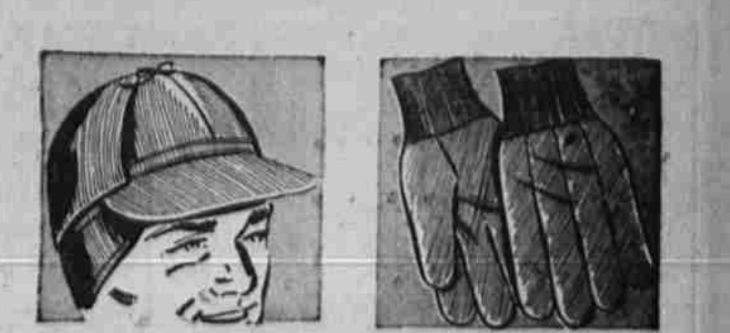

Drinking Citizens Face Acute Liquor Shortage

America's drinking citizens were face to face today with an acute liquor shortage which appeared to be fast enveloping the entire country as the demand for whiskey in some places reached four times that of last year while supplies were down as much as 60 per cent.

More than half the nation's states reported that liquor was scarce and the situation progressively getting worse. Rationing, either by state control or voluntarily, now is in effect in some 30 states. Rations range from one bottle a day per customer to one a month.

Officials looked to a bleak new year as far as easing of present shortages is concerned and there

seemed little likelihood there would be enough whiskey to quench holiday thirsts.

Scotch importers were said to be getting only 10 per cent of their normal supply while nationally advertised brands of rye and bourbon were reported hard to find. Rum, brandy and gin appeared the most in package store windows.

Grumbling on the part of customers was prevalent in many sections, most complaints being that stores had ample supplies but were doing it out only to established patrons and friends.

In Nebraska, where liquor was plentiful a few months ago but now is on the hard-to-find list because, retailers say, residents of neighboring states drained the state dry, one storekeeper said bluntly:

"To people we don't know, we have no whiskey."

Another customer complaint had to do with prices. In Texas whiskey was selling at \$8 and \$9 a pint in dry counties. In Oregon, where a new coupon rationing program was instituted last month allotting one quart of whiskey per person a month, bottled liquors were said to be selling at \$10 a quart.

In Kentucky, home of some of the country's largest distilleries, bottled in bond whiskeys were nearly extinct.

Distillers, however, said they have enough stocks on hand to last until the end of the war provided discretion is used in releasing it.

Practically all western, southwestern and southern states reported a dearth of Scotch, bourbon and rye. Alabama, however, was hopeful of declaring a "Christmas ration bonus."

Exceptions Made In Meal, Cake Sale

By O. P. GRIFFIN

In the new Restrictions on Sale of Cotton Seed Meal and Cake or Soybean Meal and Cake, some important exceptions are made in the case of regular feeders and ranchmen. The regulation provides that only a 30-day supply may be owned at one time, except in the case of regular feeders and ranchmen, who may purchase a truck load at one time to prevent waste in transportation, and "to provide a readily available supply of oilseed meal for ranch feeding purposes."

and maintaining an adequate supply for normal feeding. Here is a quotation from the Food Production Order No. 9. (f) Inventory limitation. (1) No person other than a feeder shall place any purchase order for any oilseed meal if, on the estimated delivery date, the tonnage to be delivered under such order plus the delivery date inventory of such person would exceed a 15 days' supply; and no feeder shall place any such purchase order if, on the estimated delivery date, the tonnage, to be delivered under such order plus the delivery date inventory of such feeder would exceed thirty days' supply. No person other than a feeder shall accept delivery of any oilseed meal which, together with such person's inventory of oilseed meal, would exceed a 15 days' supply; and no feeder shall accept delivery...

Administration may order mills to sell their stocks of cake and meal. The order No. 9 is quoted here: (h) Processors' inventories. If the director shall so order, no processor shall at any time after 30 days from the issuance of such order acquire an unsold inventory of oilseed meal exceeding either (1) the quantity produced by him during the 15 days on which he last produced oilseed meal, or (2) his inventory of oilseed meal on the corresponding day of the crop year 1941-42, whichever quantity is greater. (i) Existing contracts. The restrictions imposed by this order shall be effective without regard to the rights of creditors, existing contracts or payments made.

Orderly Marketing Of Hogs Necessary

Farmers are warned to sell all market hogs of 200 lb. weight before December 1st or as early as possible.

Orderly marketing of hogs is imperative if we are to avoid a collapse of our marketing, processing and distribution machinery. It is entirely probable that during December and January the number of hogs offered for sale will exceed the capacity of plants to handle them. It is also probable that transportation facilities may be inadequate to move all hogs to market when they are offered for sale. As a means of preventing a waste of materials and manpower which would result from excess marketing during December and January, every farmer who plans to market hogs within the next four months should know that:

(1) The 1943 pig crop of 127,000,000 head is by far the largest on record. This year's crop is about 21 per cent larger than the record pig crop of 1942 and about 6 per cent more than the recommended goal for 1943. Hogs are also being marketed at weights which are somewhat above the average slaughter weight recommended as a goal for 1943.

(2) Hog slaughter during the last three months of 1943 will probably be 25 to 30 per cent above the last quarter of 1942. At that time we were marketing record runs of hogs.

(3) Hog farrowings need to be leveled off in line with feed supplies and to meet the increased feed needs of the dairy and poultry industry. Farmers should be urged to feed hogs to no more than average weights as a means of making more efficient use of available feed supplies.

(4) Transportation facilities for marketing hogs are limited. It is urged that every farmer who expects to market hogs make marketing arrangements in advance of shipment, with the market agency through which he customarily sells his hogs on a terminal market or the packing plant to which he customarily sells if he sells direct. Such precaution will return many times its cost by preventing market congestion and enabling the producer to secure the full benefit of the market support program by getting his hogs in when they can be handled properly.

(5) There is a manpower shortage particularly of packing house labor which in simple terms can be stated as the job of handling 20 per cent more hogs with from 10 to 15 per cent less labor.

(6) Storage facilities will be taxed to the utmost and to prevent waste from lack of storage the marketing of hogs must be spread out over wider than normal periods. The help of farmers will be needed in maintaining the government support price for hogs. The support price is \$13.75 for good and choice hogs weighing from 200-270 pounds, Chicago basis. If hogs are marketed faster than packing plants can process them, it would be useless for the government to purchase live hogs in an attempt to hold the price because the only place government could turn to have them processed would be to the already over-taxed packing plants.

It is therefore in part the responsibility of farmers to help maintain the support price for hogs by helping to regulate the flow of hogs to market. Government licenses commit packers to pay not less than the support

price for hogs but packers cannot be required to buy hogs faster than they can handle them.

The government will buy adequate quantities of pork products meeting federal specifications at prices sufficiently high to reflect the support price or higher. If hogs arrive at the markets faster than they can be processed it will be necessary for farmers to withhold hogs until the glut is cleared. The best way for farmers to proceed in marketing is to be absolutely sure that they have an outlet for their hogs before they send them to market.

When facilities are over-taxed and packers have to hold hogs for indefinite periods, it is only natural that they must deduct carrying charges from the price they pay for the hogs.

While farmers have demonstrated their ability to rally to the war needs of the nation by exceeding all previous production records, unless more of these hogs are moved to market early, some of this effort may have been to no avail. More are needed now to meet the war needs. This may mean marketing many hogs at lighter than normal weights.

ter, and reeling under the blows of the Russian forces, the nazis were abandoning huge stores of food and war material in their flight, a Soviet communique declared. The bulletin said that the Russians, fanning out on a 70-mile arc from Kiev, had over-run more than 60 towns—two of them district centers—and captured Komarova, 40 miles northeast of Zhitomir and 48 miles southeast of Korosten, another rail center indispensable to German north-south communications.

The Red army thus was more than 42 miles due west of Kiev, in its possession since last Saturday.

South of Kiev, Red army columns were beyond Vasilev, captured yesterday, and were less than 20 miles northeast of the rail city of Byelaya Tserkov, Moscow declared. These units teamed part of a pincer drive apparently aimed at entrapment of German remnants in the bend west of the Dnieper river.

Meanwhile, Moscow advised said, Gen. Feodor I. Tolbukhin's Fourth Ukrainian army was massing at the top of the Crimea for an all-out assault on the peninsula over the Perekop land bridge and the Tavash sea-caseway.

The Soviet communique also said that Russian marines supported by fighter planes had smashed German tank attacks against Red army beachheads on the Kerch peninsula on the eastern tip of the Crimea. Thousands of nazis soldiers died in the unsuccessful counter-attacks, Moscow said and Red army planes sank two of a fleet of small German torpedo boats attempting to halt Russian landings.

Here 'n There

He was reported missing for a time after the Aug. 17 mission from which his plane failed to return. On that date Flying Fortresses bombed airfields at Marselle, France, and two were lost. S/Sgt. Butler was graduated from Forsan Butler school in 1942 and enlisted in the air corps on July 22, 1942. He trained at Sheppard Field, Douglas Aircraft at Long Beach, Calif., and had gunnery at Las Vegas, Nev., and Boise, Idaho, before going to Casper, Wyo., for Flying Fortress training as a waist gunner. His last station before going to England on July 5, 1943, was Kearney, Neb.

Bricker Is GOP Candidate

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11 (AP) — The 1944 presidential race had its first public entry today — the name of Gov. John W. Bricker of Ohio for the republican nomination—and political observers looked for the recent elections to encourage others so to declare themselves.

Bricker's announcement in Chicago yesterday that he would enter Ohio's presidential primary May 9 was the first such declaration to come from a dozen possible candidates mentioned in both parties and the first from among the three most prominently discussed republican possibilities. The other two republicans are Wendell L. Willkie and Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York.

Bricker's friends here declared he was "really out" for the presidential banner and not merely the first "favorite son" in a stop-Willkie movement.

Willkie, who has been pictured as confident of winning another nomination in 1944, would not comment on the Bricker move, but his supporters here did not appear to be worried. They said he even had strength in Bricker's own bailiwick. Dewey men contended that the New York governor is still the leading man for the nomination.

Others who have been discussed for the republican nomination are former Gov. Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota, now a lieutenant commander in the navy, whose name will be entered in the Nebraska and possibly other western state primaries; Gen. Douglas MacArthur, Gov. Earl Warren of California, Rep. James W. Wadsworth of New York, and Eric Johnston, president of the United States Chamber of Commerce.

Canadian Legation Is Now Embassy

OTTAWA, Nov. 11 (AP) — The Canadian legation in Washington and the United States legation her, were raised today to the status of embassies, with the ministers of the two countries elevated to the rank of ambassadors.

Canada thus becomes the first of the British Dominions to establish an office of the highest diplomatic status in a foreign country while the United States becomes the first nation to establish an office of similar status in a British dominion.

Leighton McCarthy at Washington steps up from the status of Canadian minister plenipotentiary and envoy extraordinary to that of ambassador and Ray Atherton, United States minister in Ottawa, makes the same jump in rank.

McCarthy now will rank with Lord Halifax, the British ambassador, and other representatives of the larger powers at Washington while Atherton will be in a class by himself as the first ambassador in Ottawa.
