Boom Time's Best Time to Fight 'Next' Slump

A burnt child fears the fires, according to the wisdom of the ancients, and it looks very much as if the American people have not in any way forgotten the scorching they took when the 1939 boom went up in smoke.

For an odd phenomenon is observable these days. The business indices show us to be approaching a new boomand people everywhere are looking away beyond it and seeing another slump coming. They are approaching this new boom cautiously, keeping their fingers crossed.

Going up is pleasant, and the view from the top is elegant, but when you slide down on the other side, the bump is something awful, and the people have not forgotten what happened the last time.

This must be the first time in our history that we have approached a boom with anything but unbounded hope in our hearts, and the sign is a good one. A good part of the history of the next generation will be written by the way in which we handle this coming boom.

If we treat it merely as something to be exploited, as a high, wide, and handsome period in which anything goes so long as it makes money, the dark story of the recent depression will begin all over again in a few years, and the things that happen in it will be apt to produce some disastrous consequences.

If, on the other hand, we can work out a way of making the boom truly productive—if we can remember that the problem of the last few years need solution just as badly when the stock market is going up as when it is coming down, and act accordingly, we can help to insure the happiness of American for many years to come.

A depression is supposed to be a good time to make reforms, because during a depression the people are willing to experiment, whereas they tend to be opposed to change in time of prosperity.

But a depression creates an atmosphere of fear. It brings extremists and crackpots to the top, and they get a following they cannot command at any other time. Their excesses, in turn, make conservative folk feel that any concession to change is likely to lead to disaster.

It is different when times are good. The pressure to do there. Men of opposing beliefs can meet calmly and discuss what needs to be done. There is time to take the long view. For that reason, the coming boom is our opportunity While we are enjoying prosperity, we can look ahead to the next slump and take steps to make our country as nearly slump-proof as a land may be in this uncertain world. If we go into the boom with that determination constantly in mind, we need not be afraid of that long slide down the other side of the mountain.

Q. Who was Col. James Power and under what conditions was he granted the right to colonize the **Coast lands** between the Lavaca and Nueces Rivers? K. L.

A. Col. James Power was a native Irishman, who, with Dr. James Hewetson, was granted empresario rights to ten littoral leagues between these rivers on condition that half the colonists should be Irish and half Mexicans. Power brought over 200 families from Ireland, in the winter of 1833-34 and located them on the grant. He represented the Refugio municipal ity in the convention of 1836, and rendered valiant service in the revolution.

Q. What caused the decline and final closing of Rutersville College?

A. For a time it was the leading school in Texas, but its location was isolated, its management was changed, a conflict arose between local and church authorities, and competing schools attracted its students.



Gasoline Tax Be **Discontinued Soon**

States Ask Federal

WASHINGTON-Withdrawel of the federal government from the field of gasoline taxation by re pealing the duplicating federal gasoline tax of 1c per gallon has been asked by the states through the general assembly of the Coun cil of State Governments.

All states were represented at the recent Council meeting at Washington, D. C. at which this resolution was adopted:

"Resolved: The original temporary emergency nature of the federal gasoline tax, improving vields from federal levies, the vital importance of gasoline state revenue sources, and the essential role of gasoline as a commodity utilizin transportation and comnunication, prompt the Third Assembly of the Council of State Governments to request and urge that the Congress of the United Opens In Texas States relinquish this recognized field of state taxation at the ter-States relinquish this recognized mination of the current fiscal vear, or as soon threafter as pos-


