BOARD OF WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT DISCUSSES NEW PUBLIC INFORMATION PLAN

The importance of periodic information releases for the citizens of Ranger and Eastland — the two cities comprising the Eastland County Water Supply District — was one of the major topics discussed during the monthly meeting — Thursday, Mar. 26 — of the ECWSD board of directors held in Ranger.

A spokesman for the board said the purpose of such releases would be "to afford the public a better understanding of the operation of their district."

The district was created by a special act of the Texas Legislature and operates under a Trust Indenture and the trustee of Mercantile National Bank of Dallas. All operations of the ECWSD board are strictly controlled by the trustee for protection of the bondholders.

All funds received by the district from the sale of water to Eastland and Ranger and the Lone Star Producing Co. are remitted to the trustee bank after operating expenses have been paid. The money is placed in a number of funds by the trustee and cannot be used for any purpose other than for paying bonds and interest.

The district has always been

prompt — never even a day late — in making bond and interest payments.

"The operation of Eastland County Water Supply District has been very good and the directors have been highly complimented on their capable and efficient operation by R. A. Underwood & Co., the brokerage firm which handled the sale of the bonds," a board spokesman said Friday.

The ECWSD board is comprised of eight members—four from Ranger and four from Eastland. The directors serve two-year terms with a referendum held each spring for election of two directors from each city.

The present board is composed of C. B. Pruet, E. H. Mills, James A. Smith and E. F. Arterburn of Ranger and M. H. Perry, T. M. Fullen, Charles Freyschlag and Tom Wilson of Eastland.

"At the time the District was formed it was thought that the money to construct the lake, filer plan and pipe lines could be raised throughout the issuance of Revenue Bonds, without having to assess a tax," it was explained. "However, prospective bond buyers would not consent to a revenue only trust bond and insisted that the Trust Indenture provide for the assessing and collecting taxes from the two towns in addition to receipts from the sale of water. Until all the bonds have been paid off it will be necessary for a tax to be assessed each year. The Board of Directors do, however, have the authority to lower the rate when it is apparent that enough money will be collected to meet bond and interest payments at a lower rate. This was done this year. Taxpayers for the 1964 tax year will be paying 20 per cent less for Water District taxes than in previous years."

"While the primary purpose of the lake is for municipal water supply, with recreational aspects being a secondary benefit," the spokesman continued, "the Board of Directors also, of course, control the recreational facilities of the lake and since money spent for such facilities can come only from receipts from the sale of licenses and per-

Water Board Vote Slated Tuesday At Courthouse

Four directors of the Eastland County Water Supply District are to be elected during balloting to be held in Ranger and Eastland on Tuesday, April 7.

Eastland voters will cast ballots in the office of Justice of Peace No. 1, County Courthouse. Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. J. H. Pittman will be election judge.

Terms of four directors — C. R. Pruet and E. H. Mills of Ranger and Milton Fullen and Charles Freyschlag of Eastland — are expiring. Pruet, Fullen and Freyschlag are seeking re-election to the ECWSD board. Fullen and Freyschlag, both of Eastland, are unopposed.

Mills is not seeking re-election during Tuesday's balloting.

Four candidates in Ranger are vying for the two places on the board. They include incumbent Pruet, W. F. Creever, D. T. Lowe and M. E. Owen.

Holdover members of the Eastland County Water Supply District's governing body include M. H. Perry of Eastland, who is president of the board, Tom Wilson, also of Eastland and James A. Smith and E. F. Arterburn, both of Ranger. David D. Pickrell of Ranger is secretary of the board.

Qualified to vote in the coming referendum will be qualified voters who reside within the city limits of Ranger and Eastland. They must own taxable property.

Habeas Corpus Hearing Sought In Couch Case

A habeas corpus hearing will be sought in Palo Pinto County in the next week in an effort to free Chester E. Couch, 40-year old Abilene man who has been in jail there for several weeks due to his inability to make a \$10,000 peace bond.

This information was reported by A. L. Rhodes of Abilene attorney for Couch, placed under the peace bond after he allegedly threatened his ex-wife, Helen Couch, by telephone.

Couch was given a suspended sentence in 91st District Court recently on charges that resulted from a shooting scrap in Cisco.

County Attorney Earl Conner reported his office would not take part in any habeas corpus proceedings since the offense for which Couch was jailed took place in Palo Pinto County.

Polls will open at 8 a. m. Tuesday for the Eastland city commission election, which has attracted five candidates for two places to be filled. Seeking city posts are James Reid, Curtis Koen, W. Q. Verner, A. V. Cartledge and Charles Lucas. Terms of Commission Chairman Don Pierson and Virgil T. Seaberry Jr. expire and neither are seeking re-election.

Terms are for two years. Voting will be at the city hall.

Polls will remain open until 7 p. m., it has been announced. Election judge is Charles Freyschlag and clerks will be Hoover Pittman, Mrs. Marcus O'Dell, Mrs. Ed Layton, Mrs. Pete Parker and Norris Wilson.

Eligible voters are those persons living within the city limits for at least six months and the county for at least one year, it is reported.

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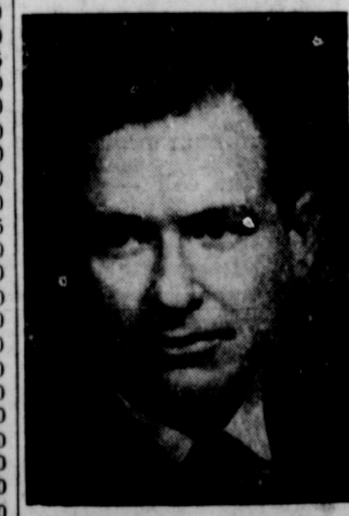

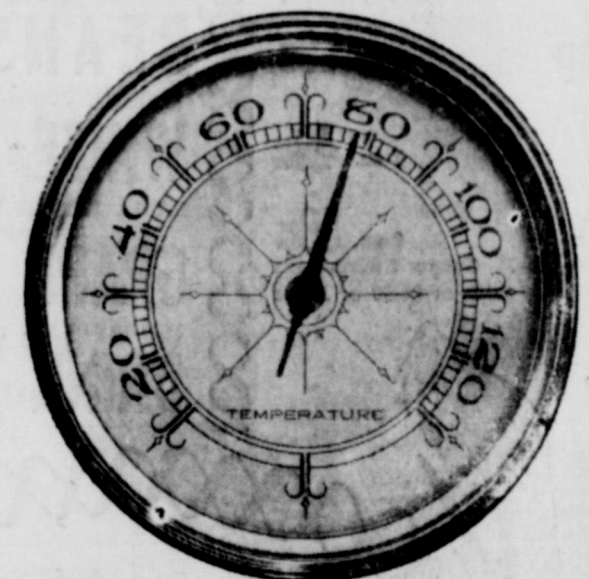

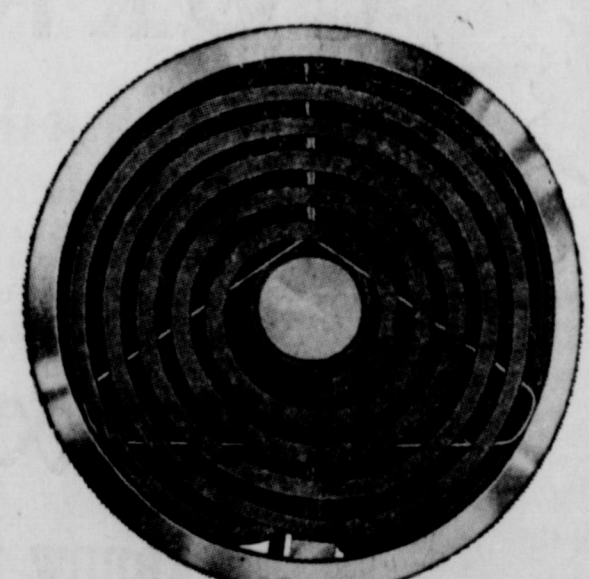

mits they must use the money available wisely in order to provide for the public facilities that will benefit the most people. They have provided four boat launching ramps, constructed two picnic areas and two separate rest room accommodations. They plan to do more in this line as money is available keeping in mind at all times that adequate reserve funds must be maintained in order to be able to meet emergencies that may arise.

"The Board is proud of the splendid safety record that the lake enjoys. There have been only two persons drowned on the lake since it was built, and there is some question regarding one of those instances as to whether death occurred from drowning or natural cause. Fees collected from the sale of licenses and permits are used to police the lake and adjacent shoreline, inspect the sanitary facilities and conditions, and to render aid and assistance, if necessary.

"The original Board of Directors comprised of C. B. Pruet, Dr. P. M. Kuykendall, Grady Pipkin, Dr. James C. Whittington, Wilson Guest, L. E. McGraw, F. P. Brasher and headed by C. B. Pruet as president with David D. Pickrell as secretary can be justly proud of their endeavors," the ECWSD spokesman said.

"Undertaking as they did, to build a lake costing \$1,500,000 in a community with a very poor bond record was a job that many thought was impossible was a tremendous task and called for a long hard hours of work and personal expense, as well as taking them away from their respective businesses for conferences with members of the Legislature, consulting engineers, and bond people. Fortunately for the people of Ranger and Eastland they persevered and as a result the two cities are assured of a wonderful pure permanent water supply, as well as a beautiful lake for recreation.

"The Bond Indenture makes it mandatory for the books and records of the district to be audited each year. This is primarily for the protection of the bondholders, but es also to protect the taxpayers of Ranger and Eastland.

"Ranger and Eastland have been very fortunate in having dedicated, capable men serving on the Eastland County Water District Board. These men are interested in every phase of the Water Board operation and welcome any questions or suggestions anyone might have regarding the operation," the spokesman concluded.
