Eastland National Bank Controller James Reid polled an impressive 353 votes to lead the slate of five candidates.

Curtis Koen, owner-manager of East Koen Salvage, received 178 votes for second highest.

Koen and Reid will be sworn in at the next commission meeting, Monday, April 20, to replace Virgil T. Seaberry Jr. and Don Pierson, whose term expire this year.

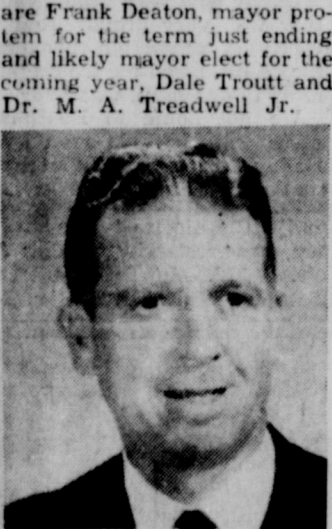

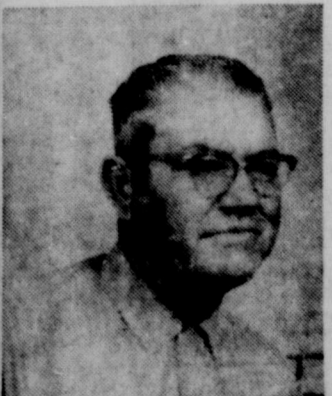

Monday morning we walked everywhere. That is, mother and daddy did; I rode in the stroller an never saw so many knees in my life. Mother had fun looking in the windows, but I noticed Daddy kept leaning awfully heavy on the stroller.

Karen Taylor, who goes to school in Austin, came to see us. Her mother, our neighbor, Mrs. A. D. Taylor, had sent her a package by us. It must have been shoes, because Karen didn't offer me any cookies.

Chill Wills, the movie star, was staying in our hotel, working for some politician. Daddy asked me if I wanted his autograph. I asked why should I, and that was that.

Monday evening we went to the Capitol and went to the court building where big decisions are made. Daddy was nervous and mother tried to keep me quiet, but I just talked to everybody in Attorney General Waggoner Carr's reception room. We then went into Mr. Carr's office and there were a whole lot of men there. I was probably the youngest of the bunch.

One man talked about some things daddy had written and then gave him some pieces of paper. A man with a camera then lined some men up, including daddy, and took their picture. One of the men said, "Why don't we put Vance in the picture?"

Actually at the time, I was visiting with Mr. Homer Garrison, a man daddy had told me all about. Mr. Garrison has been head of the state's safety department for a long time, and he must be a very nice person. He reminded me of a very special granddaddy-type man.

After the picture was taken, everybody drew chairs into a circle and talked for quite a while. Mr. Carr said how important it is for everybody to appreciate good law enforcement and wished that more people believed in and practiced justice.

Daddy told Mr. Garrison what a good bunch of highway patrolmen he has working for him in our county at home. As we started to leave the nice room, everybody was very kind and congratulated daddy on what he'd done, and shook hand, both right and left.

Daddy was very proud. Mother was very proud. And I was very proud too, because they'd promised me ice cream after the meeting was over.

We got home to Eastland about midnight Monday. Daddy was very tired. Mother was very tired. I felt great.

National Issues Being Discussed By Mr. McLendon

AUSTIN—Gordon McLendon gave special attention to civil rights and other domestic issues this week in his fast-moving campaign for the Democratic U. S. Senatorial nomination in the May 2 Primary.

The Dallas radio executive emphasized his support of equal voting and educational rights for all, but elaborated on his opposition to provisions of the pending civil rights bill which he contends would deprive members of all ethnic groups of the rights of trial by jury, private property and civil liberties.

In its present form the so-called civil rights bill poses the greatest threat to our constitutional liberties since the Supreme Court overthrew an almost identical act in 1883," McLendon declared.

He asserted that increased job opportunities, a problem which figures in both the civil rights debate and the administration's "war on poverty," can be assured only by freeing business from bureaucratic restraints to promote business expansion.

McLendon said Texas has found a satisfactory solution to the problem of medical

care for the aged by implementing the Kerr-Mills law and the Texas-65 program, both based on the principle of voluntary health insurance.

Reiterating his opposition to federal aid to and control over schools McLendon advocated encouragement of a "realistic tax exemption for families supporting students in higher education." McLendon pointed out that his opponent, incumbent Senator Ralph Yarborough helped defeat an amendment which would have written a \$1200 college exemption into the new tax bill.

February Bond Sales Total \$19,700 In County

February Savings Bond sales in Eastland County totaled \$19,700. This announcement was made recently by Mr. Guy P. Parker, Chairman of the Eastland County Savings Bonds Committee.

Sales for the first two months of 1964 were \$57,793 which represents 13.1 percent of the 1964 sales goal.

Bond sales in Texas for the first two months of 1964 were \$28,293,907 and 18.8 percent of the 1964 sales goal of \$150,000,000 has been achieved.

This campaign will be highlighted during the months of May and June. We are confident the citizens of our county will respond to OPERATION SECURITY and purchase extra Savings Bonds during the drive," Chairman Parker reported.

Rules Revised For State Parks

AUSTIN. — Two key regulations for state parks have been revised according to J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

The new regulations, effective April 1, will permit camping and shelter occupancy for a 14-day limit during the regular park season between May 1 and September 15.

Radios, recorded music and musical instruments will be subject to a 10 p.m. curfew in picnic, camping, shelter and other overnight facility areas of the parks; however, they may be permitted in the concession buildings and immediate concession areas until 11 p.m.

Our new regulations which conform generally with those in national parks, have been well received by the public," said Watson.
