AUSTIN. - The state draft quota for June calls for 234 men, compared to 258 for May, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz state Selective Service director, said Tuesday.

The state quota of 234 for June is the Texas share of a national call for 6,000 men, all for the Army.

The state Service director also announced pre-induction physical and mental examinations for 6,000 men in June. Local board quotas for the June call already have been figured and sent to the state's 137 local boards.

The June quota will be filled mostly with men who are volunteers under 26 years old and nonvolunteers ages 19 through 25. Most of them will be 22 years old.




