Chamber President James Smith pointed out it will be wise to secure tickets early because only 215 persons can be seated at the club, and it will be first-come, first serve basis on tickets.

## State Has Draft Quota Of 234 In Month Of June

AUSTIN. — The state draft quota for June calls for 234 men, compared to 258 for May, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz state Selective Service director, said Tuesday.

The state quota of 234 for June is the Texas share of a national call for 6,000 men, all for the Army.

The state Service director also announced pre-induction physical and mental examinations for 6,000 men in June.

Local board quotas for the June call already have been figured and sent to the state's 137 local boards.

The June quota will be filled mostly with men who are volunteers under 26 years old and nonvolunteers ages 19 through 25. Most of them will be 22 years old.

## Rush Creek Flood Control Planning Is Approved

The Soil Conservation Service of the Department of Agriculture has been authorized to assist all sponsoring local organizations in preparing a watershed work plan for the Rush Creek Watershed, under authority of the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act, according to an announcement by Cong. Omar Burleson this week.

C. M. McCain of Eastland, chairman of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District, was advised by letter by Cong. Burleson that final approval for planning has been okayed.

Irvin Poff, Area Conservationist of Stephenville, contacted late this week in the Eastland Soil Conservation, stated that most of the work involved in this project would be in

Comanche County. He pointed out that Rush Creek headquarters are in the Rising Star Area, flow toward the De Leon area when Rush Creek joins and enters the new Proctor Reservoir.

Mr. Poff and E. E. McAllister, Eastland SCS manager, explained that the project involves small water shed reservoirs and might possible include some 15 or 20 small dams for flood protection. The Rising Star area is level, they pointed out, and there probably wouldn't be any need for basins there.

The present authorization is for planning, it was stated.

Cong. Burleson's letter further stated:

"As you know, of course, the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act authorizes the Department of Agriculture to give technical and financial assistance to organized groups of farmers living in small watersheds where floods, droughts and soil erosion are causing serious damage. Of course, the application has been approved by the Texas State Soil Conservation Board, which was necessary before the Soil Conservation Service could take this action."

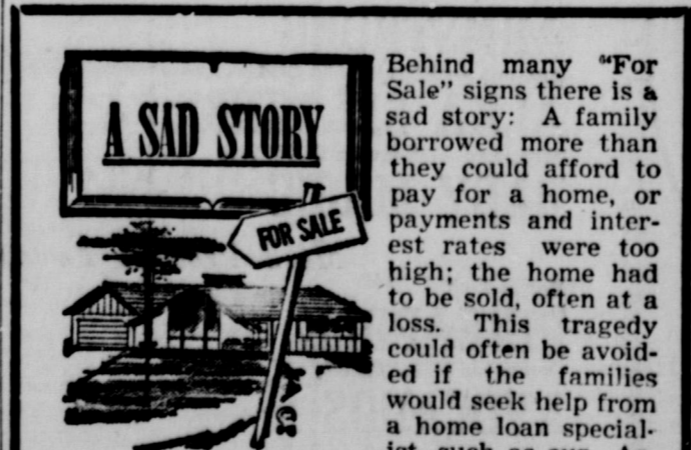

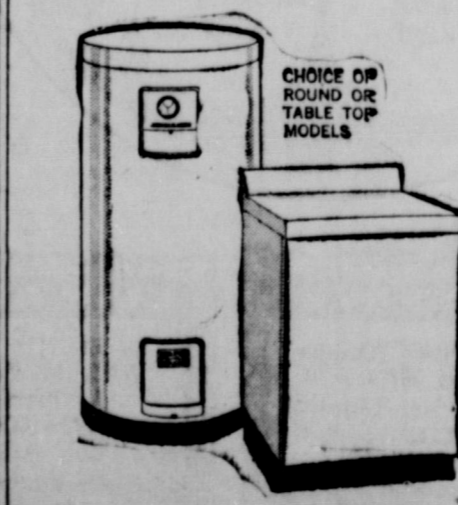

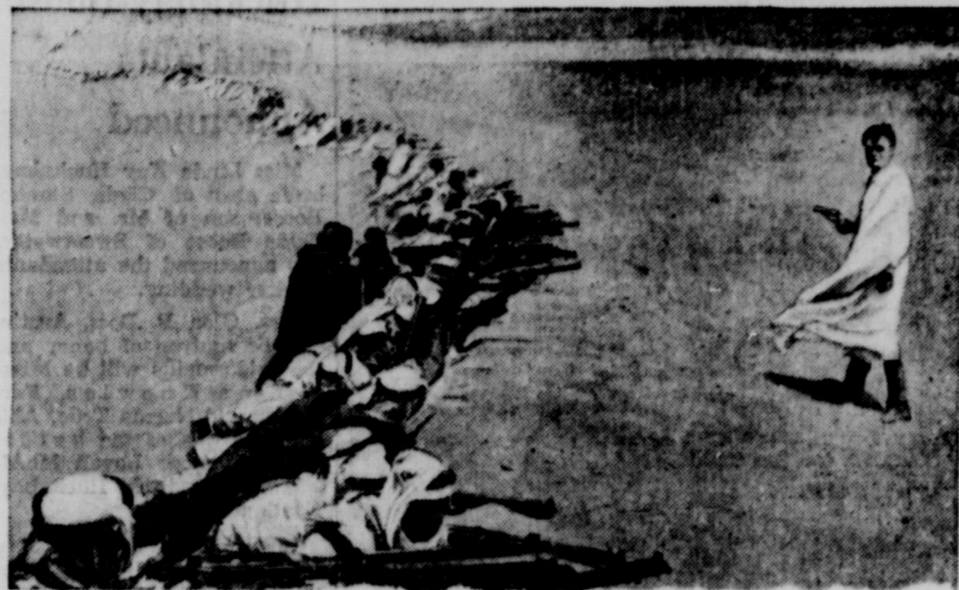

## Doctors Offer Suggestions On Working In Yard

With the return of warm days, millions of home gardeners once again are getting out to spade beds, plant seed, spread fertilizer, mow grass and the other countless minor tasks attendant to keeping the lawn neat and attractive.

Your doctor recommends gardening as excellent therapy, for both body and mind. For those who enjoy digging good exercise, fresh air and sunshine after a winter of being cooped up indoors.

Your doctor also offers a few suggestions on keeping gardening fun and safe:

Take it easy, at least for the first few sessions. Don't try to work a 10-hour day at hard manual labor on the first warm weekend. Take frequent rest breaks and work at a pace that isn't too tiring. As the season advances, your muscles will limber up and toughen and you will be able to do more with less discomfort.

Cuts, scratches and bruises are the fate of most gardeners. Usually they aren't serious. Clean minor cuts with warm water and soap and cover with a light bandage. Tetanus lurks in the soil, and a booster shot of tetanus toxoid is recommended at the onset of the gardening season for all who have not kept their immunization up-to-date.

Stop and think, briefly, about safety before handling garden tools — especially power tools such as lawn mowers. Power tools are great labor-saving devices, properly used. Used carelessly, they can slash off fingers and toes. Always turn off the mower when it is left unattended, even briefly. Always turn it off when adding gasoline to the tank. If the motor is electric, don't use the machine in wet grass. Power tools usually are accompanied by safety instructions. Read them carefully.

Modern gardening is made plants. Careless use and storage of pesticides can cause serious accidents. A cardinal rule is to read the instructions on the package carefully and obey their safety warnings. Pesticides are safe, if used properly and kept away from children.

Poison ivy, poison oak and poison sumac also sprout up in the spring, to the great discomfort of many amateur gardeners. Look for the three-leaf sprigs that mark poison ivy and poison oak. If in doubt, consult a botany handbook or garden encyclopedia. If you find poison ivy in your yard, dig it out — roots and all — being careful not to touch. If you burn poison ivy avoid the smoke. The poisonous oils vaporize in the smoke and thus expose your whole body, eyes included. If you get a poison ivy rash, your doctor can suggest soothing medications to ease the itching and discomfort while healing progresses.

If you wear glasses, take along an extra pair. Or, at least a copy of your prescription. If you're taking a regular medication, make certain of your supply before you leave.

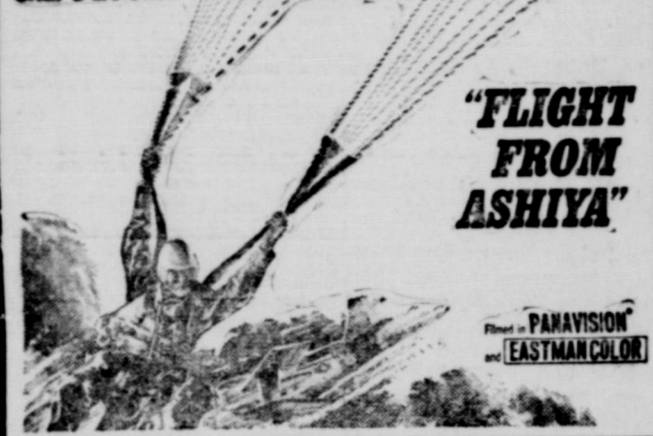
