Industrialization Project for Entire County Is Launched

Next step toward the industrialization of Eastland County will be taken Saturday morning when the mayor or a representative of each town and community in the county, the county judge and Larry Milner, community coordinator for the Texas Industrial Commission, sit down to map out specifics of a five-point program.

The meeting will be held at the Texas Electric Service Co. Reddy Room, beginning at 9 a.m.

The five points were spelled out Tuesday afternoon for approximately 55 people who met in the county commissioners courtroom to hear Harry Clark, executive director of the commission, and Milner.

Current action is the outgrowth of a promise by Gov. John Connally to make Eastland County the pilot site for his industrialization program.

Clark, during preliminary remarks explained the history of the commission, and explained that its format is being changed — by the planned elimination of the community coordinators and establishing a community development program, set up by a team of commission staff members.

"This is the idea," Clark said, "if Eastland County will agree to go into the program so that we may use it as a test area, we will concentrate our efforts here until next September when an evaluation of the program will be made for recommendation to the state legislature for use in other counties and areas."

The five steps called for by Clark, and which he said, have been proved through actual tests, are:

1. Coordinate data about the entire area including each community in it. (Much of this work has already been done in the Community Development Program, prepared and published by the Community Development Committee, through the local Extension Office)

2. Establish local industry. (Seventy per cent of new industry today, he said, is home-grown.)

Rep. Gibbons Speaks for WSCS, Lions Tuesday

"The greatest thing we have to fear today is that we will not give effective testimony to our youth of just what we have here in America and what it has cost in the history of our people," State Rep. Wayne Gibbons told the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday.

Rep. Gibbons' talk for the Lions followed an appearance before the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the First Methodist Church. His topic for the WSCS meeting was "Christian Citizenship" in observance of that organization's Citizenship Day.

The WSCS meeting was held at 9:30 a. m. Mrs. Harold (Loretta) Bulgerin, president, presided and introduced Mrs. D. L. Kinnaird, Jr., who in turn introduced Mr. Gibbons.

The group sang "America the Beautiful".

There were approximately 35 persons present at the meeting. "The greatness of our nation has demanded the blood and sacrifice of the lives of our bravest and best youths to preserve our heritage, our freedoms and our liberties," Rep. Gibbons said. "Each new generation must be persuaded to keep America strong," he continued.

"Our young people don't just grow up knowing the significance of our Declaration of Independence, our Constitution and other great documents," he pointed out.

Bruce Pipkin was program chairman and introduced Rep. Gibbons for the Lions Club. President Leon Musgrove presided and introduced the one guest, Int. Counselor O. L. Stamey of Cisco.

3. Establish a county-wide promotional program with a paid staff.

4. Create an Eastland County industrial sales team of six or seven persons, each one qualified in a certain area, to be able to sell the advantages of the county.

5. Investigate with a view toward organizing a county-wide financing program, wherein all financing could be handled centrally.

"Prospects will come if you do these things," Clark said. "Larry (Milner) and I will hold your hand as you take these steps," he pointed out.

In answer to a question "Will we have to offer free inducements to industry?" Clark answered that in many cases the county would. But not, he said, as a public offer, but rather on a negotiated basis.

The commission spends some \$70,000 a year advertising in industrial magazines and turns up some 30 "suspect" industries a month, which communities are welcome to contact, he said.

Major item of concern to a prospective industry, he said, is "profit" — whether or not money can be made. Other aspects include community, financing, site and prospects.

Clark compared the job of "getting industry" to a football game — wherein ticket-buying fans root for the team, made up of some 33 suited out players, 11 of whom are three or four "professional" coaches, and with only one man at a time "carrying the ball."

A question about water? "Of the 317 new industries located in Texas last year, 85 per cent used no more water than does a motel," he said.

Purpose of the commission, Clark said, is the coordination of the many efforts being made over the state.

"Primarily, we're not in the prospect recruiting business," he pointed out. "We are presently leaving that to the area, and local professionals (chamber managers, utility industrial specialists, etc.)." "Generally, we've been talking to groups such as yours, telling them "Good luck and good bye," but under our proposed community development program, we'll be able to offer more concrete help.

Lightweight Mavs Battle Heavy 'Cats in Rising Star

The Eastland Mavericks, smarting from an 18-6 loss to Comanche, will be facing a lot of beef when they go up against the Rising Star Wildcats in Rising Star Friday night.

The Maverick starting lineup against Comanche averaged 145 pounds and that same squad will be toying it with what is reported to be a 190-Wildcat team average. The Wildcats are a much-touted team too, being picked as leaders in their Class B district — so the Mavericks have their work cut out for them.

However with the aggressiveness displayed by the Eastland team against Comanche, plus the smart quarterbacking of young Jerry McCullough, quick thinking backfield and hard-headed hitting of the line, the tilt Friday night should be a real tussle.

A large delegation of Eastland fans are expected to make the trip to Rising Star to see their team do battle on foreign soil for the first time this season.

Individually the Mavericks performed well, all agreed after the Comanche bout. McCullough led his teammates, with 85 yards gained; followed by 150-pound fullback Gaylon Griffin for 50; 15-pound Mickey Sargent with 33; and 155-pound John Moylan getting 14. End Mike Miller was credited with five and half-back Ted Martin with one.

Reports are that Rising Star's defensive line against Eastland will weigh about 190 pounds (one of the heaviest in Class B teams in the state) with the offensive unit averaging little less.

The offensive unit will be directed by Veteran Terry Geyer, with Dwight Carter and Danny Wooley at halfback slots and Kenny Butler at full. Mike Donham will be at center.

The defensive unit will be Rex Long, Dick Goldston and Gary Duggan at end; Mike Donham, Russell Botts and James Clark at guards; and Frazer Cox and Kenny Butler at tackles.

Probably starters for the Mavericks include: Mike Miller, No. 10, end, 150 pounds; Jerry McCullough, 12, quarterback, 150; Gaylon Griffin, 22, fullback, 150; John Moylan, 40, half-

back, 155; Bill Boles, 50, center, 150; Garry Rollins, 52, tackle, 170; Wayne Waldon, 65, guard, 145; James Fullen, 67, guard, 140; Butch Phillips, 70, tackle, 172; Larry Wilson, 80, end, 135; Mickey Sargent,

82, halfback, 145.

The Mavericks trounced the Wildcats, 33-6, last year, and 44-6 in 1962, and will be looking for a repeat to bolster their record.

Course In Gasoline Plant Operation Planned At CJC

The Technical - Vocational Division of Cisco Junior College will offer a night course titled "The Charge to a Natural Gasoline Plant" beginning Sept. 15, according to an announcement by G. C. Hogue, college president.

This is one of six courses which are included in a series of Natural Gasoline Plant Operations and Technology. The course will be 18 hours in length and will be conducted from 7 to 9 p.m. each evening on Sept. 15, 17, 22, 24, 29, Oct. 1 and 6. Total cost for the course will be \$16. This will include the cost of the manual which will be issued each class member.

Meetings will be held in the air conditioned lecture room of the new science building. W. A. Robinson, District Superintendent for Lone Star Producing Company, Gasoline Department, Ranger, will be the instructor. Mr. Robinson has had a number of years experience in gasoline plant operations and has completed this entire series in a previous company program.

The course will be limited to 20 to afford better group participation. Persons already in gasoline plant occupations are encouraged to attend. Individuals who are seeking knowledge in gasoline plant operations for the purpose of improving their possi-

bility for employment are also encouraged to enroll. Specific results for those participating in this study will be a better understanding of complex plant operation, increased confidence by those involved in this work, greater opportunity for promotion, improved safety through a better understanding of plant operation, and a better chance for employment in this type operation by those desiring to enter this field.

Gasoline plant personnel in the Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Breckenridge, Graham and Albany areas are being contacted and advised of the course and given an opportunity to register in advance. If the series is continued to completion, it will require several months of intermittent courses.

This is but one of many programs which the technical-vocational division at CJC plans to offer. Many of the programs will be offered in out lying towns and cities. These programs will be designed to assist those not pursuing a college degree to attain skills and knowledge in a vocation or trade and to improve or upgrade their present skills and knowledges for a better and more secure position in life. Any course will be offered where there is a sufficient number requesting it, Mr. Hogue said.

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Former Local Reporter Writes Of Her New Job And Life In New York

Editor:
Well, here I am in New York and I hardly know where to begin to tell you all about how exciting it is. I guess newspaper work is practically the same no matter where you go, because this is my fourth day on the job, and I feel very initiated and in the groove of things. There were several old habits to break and now ones to learn, because naturally style changes from one paper to the next.

There are several different things that the Leader Herald does. They never never use a.m. or p.m., but put last night or tomorrow or today or in the afternoon, which I find w-r-d-y, cumbersome and strange. They never use the word "held" for meetings in the past tense and they never put US before Army, Navy, etc. Of course these are only small things and it won't be long before I'll finally get the hang of it all.

The paper isn't quite as large as I had expected. There are only three regular reporters on duty each day, a city editor, three men on the desk, two proof readers, a sports editor, photographer, managing editor and business manager in the editorial department. Of course it's a lot larger than the ones at home, but not nearly as large as the American Statesman. I rather enjoy it being this small, however. No chance of getting lost in the shuffle.

The people here are wonderful — really as friendly as Texans. All of the Leader Herald staff have been helpful and patient in getting me adjusted and oriented. I know I'm going to like it even more and more.

There is one very unusual thing. We print an afternoon paper and have a deadline, so stories we write all morning are geared to be printed.
