Bids Opened This Week for Vocation Shop

Bids were opened Thursday afternoon for a proposed vocational building for the Eastland Public School and seven contractors bid for the job. Low bid of \$20,973 was submitted by E. B. McGown, Abilene builder, and high bid was \$24,850, submitted by Gail Galbraith Co., also of Abilene.

The building is to be of concrete block construction with 3,300 square feet with classrooms, rest rooms and office facilities, as well as a shop. Roof will be flat, utilizing material owned by the school system.

It will be located just south of the tennis courts on High School Hill.

Bids were generally higher than anticipated, a school board member said. The board will meet this week to consider the bids. Provisions allow 30 days for the board to accept or reject any or all the bids.

Other bidders included three others from Abilene, and one from Dallas Kinnard-Beck Co., contractors on the elementary and gymnasium buildings, nearing completion, had specifications for the shop building, and who were expected to bid, but did not submit a bid because of lack of time to prepare an estimate, it was reported. Another bidder from Abilene submitted a bid, but was disqualified because his cashier check to guarantee performance had been mis-placed.

Local Residents Up Water Usage During Drought

Eastland water consumption is up considerably this summer due unquestionably to the extreme drought conditions.

Consumption for June in Eastland was 23,112,000 gallons and increased in July to 30,650,000 gallons. That was a total of all water billed by the city hall. A large amount was used in addition to that figure by the city pool, the fire department and the water hydrants, all of which receive water free from the city since they are city owned and operated.

Water rates this summer are \$3.65 for the first 3,000 gallons; 45 cents a 1000 gallons for the next 7,000 gallons and 30 cents a thousand gallons for all over 10,000 gallons. Last summer all over 10,000 gallons was 25 cents a thousand gallons.

Summer rates, which Eastland residents are being charged, continue through August with winter billing, which is 40 cents for all over 10,000 gallons, to begin with September billing.

Scrappy, Young Mavericks Begin Drills Monday at 8

When the aspiring Eastland Mavericks get together Monday morning at 8, it will be a get-acquainted session, Head Coach Millard Glass says — but after that, each drill session and workout will be a competitive round to see who earns slots on the coveted Mav team for the 1964 season.

First game for the Mavericks will be on home soil when they clash with Comanche Sept. 4.

Accustomed-to-winning Albany is being picked by the area pickers for the top spot, which is, if not a sure-thing, a reasonable assumption, but as district-watchers know, down the line and as the season progresses, things have a way of becoming surprising.

Lending Coach Glass valuable assistance and counsel again this year will be Coaches Denson Moody and Harold Price. After Monday's "get-together," sessions will be held daily at 7 a.m. and again at 5:30 p.m. (And the Mavericks are undoubtedly second only to the area farmers and ranchers in hoping for cool, damp weather.)

Senior stalwarts include: Wayne Waldon, Gaylon Griffin, Mickey Sargent, Mike Miller, Garry Rollins and Norman Rhodes.

And the Junior aggregation, from which a quarterback in Jerry McCullough will probably be chosen, includes: David Hazard, Rodney McCoy, Johnny Moylan, James Fullen, James West, Layne Gregory, Billy Culpepper, Bill Boles, Ted Martin and Charles Moon.

Sophomore hopefuls include Gene Wilson, Tommy McCullough, Stanley Wilson, Jim Herridge, Danny Cox and James McKinzie.

The freshman line-up hasn't been compiled yet, but will be announced soon.

Gorman Liquor Vote Petition Is Issued

Sept. 19 is guesed to be the most-likely date for a wet election in Gorman with spokesmen from that town indicating that "they don't expect much trouble in getting their petitions signed."

The completed petitions probably will be presented to the county commissioners court Monday, Aug. 24, and that body must call the election in not less than 20 days and not more than 30, if the petitions are found to be in order.

An application for petition to legalize sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption in Gorman was filed Wednesday with Eastland County Clerk Johnson Smith by a delegation of Gorman residents.

The application bore 12 names, and only 10 were required. It was signed by some of the leading citizens of the community. The petition was issued at 4 p.m. Wednesday.

Approximately 136 signatures will be required on the petition, which is 25 per cent of the qualified voters in the county precinct in which Gorman is located. The election is for the city limits of Gorman only.

A 30-day period is allowed for securing the required names. The petitions are to be returned to the clerk's office by Sept. 10. According to law, the Commissioners Court must order an election to be held not less than 20 days after the return of the petition nor more than 30 days.

Fire Department Burns Off Hazards

Eastland Fire Department burned off a number of fire hazards in Eastland Wednesday, according to a report from Fire Chief Guy Robinson.

The areas included a large dry grass area behind the White Elephant Restaurant.

Chief Robinson said the precautions were taken in an effort to avoid blazes caused by discarded matches or cigarettes in the extremely dry weather Eastland has been experiencing.

Cattle Grazing Soil Bank Land As Emergency Program Begins

Drought-plagued livestock in Eastland County began grazing soil-banked acreage late this week in a U.S.D.A.-approved emergency measure to help farmers and ranchers during the dry spell.

The Agriculture Stabilization Conservation office at the courthouse was literally swamped all day Friday, and Office Manager Gilbert Meredith reported that the staff accepted applications as quickly as possible, and began granting approvals about 2 p.m. as land-owners signed statements to follow the rules of the program and payed the office for

the right to graze the land.

The U.S.D.A. has already paid the landowners for "laying the land by" and now, with scarcely little rain this summer, the owners are turning to the "saved" grassed lands for emergency help to keep stock fed.

It's costing the landowners a minimum of \$1 an acre per month for land with poor cover. And \$1.25 an acre per month for fair cover and \$1.50 for good cover. The ASCS office has records of the type of cover, and field men will begin Monday making spot checks of the participating

time of the quality of the cover.

Approximately 30 applications were handled Friday, Meredith said, indicating that landowners began responding to the emergency help as soon as they read about its availability in Thursday's newspapers.

Meredith warned against grazing of diverted acres before permission is granted and payments are made. The office will continue to take applications, he said. The program was authorized by the Washington Department of Agriculture headquarters to extend through Oct. 31.

sponsored by the school. Examples of such activities are listed below:

1. Interscholastic League Activities (Academic and Athletic).
2. Student office staff.
3. Library assistant.
4. Band and choir.
5. Annual or newspaper staff.

6. Any elective or appointive honor or office such as cheerleader, fireboy, class officer, FHA or FFA officer, band sweetheart, football sweetheart, FFA sweetheart, class officer, manager of athletic team, or a part in the production of a class play, etc.

7. Social functions sponsored by the school or other activities specified by the school administration such as the Junior-Senior Banquet.

8. Represent the school in any contest or pageant sponsored by an outside organization.

Married students will be eligible to be named valedictorian, salutatorian or other academic awards.

Married students will be required to meet all obligations required of other students, and will be expected to carry a full academic load.

Students who become pregnant while enrolled will be allowed to complete the semester in which they become pregnant, but will not be permitted to enroll in school for the next semester.

The policy will become effective at the beginning of the 1964-65 school year.

Lizziebeth Wheeler started a beautiful "basket of flowers" quilt in 1881 and finished it the following year. The quilt was handed down to one of her daughters and will eventually be handed down to her granddaughter.

The talented seamstress and needleworker never owned a sewing machine until a year before her death, when her husband finally purchased a machine to help in the enormous task of making clothes for 11 children. The beautiful "basket of flowers" quilt was made from hundreds of pieces of green basket material and red rese material hand cut and pieced together. The delicate green stems of the flowers were sewn on with a hand

We have been asked to describe our trip to New York City and the World's Fair. The trip was arranged through Fugazy Travel Agency, even to smallest detail, for about 60 people. The agency will arrange tours for one or one hundred persons. As our group was this large, a guide, George Giftos, was assigned; he stayed in our hotel and made every effort to see that we were comfortable and happy. George was a native New Yorker, and accepted our ribbing graciously about the "damn Yankees."

At Southwest Air Motive Terminal in Dallas, we joined RCA Victor dealers from San Antonio area and flew to La Guardia Field in 6½ hours.
