"April 15, 1956, is the deadline for having 1956 motor vehicle inspection stickers placed on your windshield," it was pointed out today by Carl B. Boustead, inspector for the Motor Vehicle Inspection Division of the State Department of Public Safety.

All vehicles operating after that date without the 1956 sticker will be in violation of state law and subject to disciplinary action, he explained.

"As of Dec. 31, 1955," said Mr. Boustead, "only 12 per cent of the vehicles registered in Eastland County had been provided with 1956 inspection stickers."

"To avoid waiting in line and overloading official inspection stations, get your 1956 inspection sticker now."

**Singing Association To Elect Staff At Session In Eastland**

**New Programs Established By Navy Announced**

The Navy has recently announced the establishment of two new programs giving many more sailors the opportunity to specialize in nuclear power and guided missile fields.

Career enlisted men who are qualified submariners now can volunteer for nuclear training and eventual assignment aboard atomic-powered submarines. Petty officers in engineering ratings may volunteer for training for service aboard the Navy's first atomic surface ship.

The increased emphasis on guided missiles has created a great demand for qualified personnel in that field. Men in 22 ratings may now apply to change their rates to guided missilemen and training in that field.

These two great fields of the future along with the electronics field are only three of the many fields of opportunity available to young men in the Navy.

Chief Tompkins, local recruiter, starting the New Year with great expectations, wishes to emphasize that the Navy has an interesting program of education and training. "From the day a navy man enters recruit training he finds the modern navy provides him the best programs and facilities for studying. Many technical schools are available to qualified men and qualified high school graduates are assured training in one of over 50 specialist schools.

"No other organization in the world has as many educational opportunities for the individual as the Navy. In addition to schools, there is a constant opportunity for self-study and improvement through correspondence courses. Then there is the important on the job training for learning a trade and advancing skills."

**Money Order Gyp Warning Is Sent Out**

The Eastland postoffice has received notice from Postal Inspector L. H. Stephens, Fort Worth, that this and other communities should be alert against the probable operation in North Texas of a money order raiser.

The report states that Jan. 10 the following money orders were purchased at the main postoffice, Dallas:

Nos. 11-16,705,210 through 11-16,705,219 — all for \$2.00 each.

Nos. 11-16,705,220 through 11-16,705,229 — all for \$1.00 each.

The warning explains:

"There is reason to believe the purchaser will raise and attempt to cash these orders, possibly in amounts just over or under \$100. The purchaser is described as: white, male, 50 years, 5'10", 165 lbs., reddish complexion, medium brown topcoat, dark grey hat.

"Although descriptions are not identical, it is possible the person is Louis Roland Hoog, white, male, 32 years (but older in appearance), 5'10", 187 lbs., sandy hair, brown eyes, believed to be traveling in 1955 light grey 4-door Ford, with Kansas dealer's License D-501-1, Motor No. U 5 KG 106773. Hoog has been identified as a money order raiser who operated in Missouri and Kansas during the last few days. The U.S. Marshall, St. Louis, Missouri, holds a warrant for his arrest.

"Postmasters receiving this notice will please furnish copies as soon as possible to filline stations on main highways only; downtown retail jewelers; grocery supermarkets; banks; and all money order personnel.

"Issuing clerks should notify the nearest inspector if any person unknown to them attempts to purchase a series of orders in small amounts after making every effort to record a description of the person and any auto used, including license number.

"Merchants should bear in mind that the orders described above were rubber stamped in hold type to show they are good for not more than ten dollars. Some raised orders have been presented showing an additional "hundred" stamped before the "ten" and an additional "dollars" stamped over the word "dollars" printed on the form. **Meetings Are Set For District And Council Presently**

A general council meeting will be held in Brownwood Comanche Trail headquarters city, Jan. 15, when goals for the council will be established and announced.

### Moisture Deficiency Hurts Entire State

Torture of a seven-year drouth has become more evident in this area as weeks of dry weather begin slipping by.

Small grains and winter crops, struggled through another period of mild dry weather in Eastland County during the past week. For the most part, these crops continued to hold on surprisingly well in spite of state-wide drouth conditions.

Moisture is urgently needed in all parts of the state. Some field work, preparatory to the 1956 season, was underway in spite of the lack of moisture. These worked fields will be in good condition to take moisture when it comes.

In the northern Blacklands, planting of spring oats was underway but rain is needed to get them up.

Movement of commercial vegetables, especially cabbage, carrots, cauliflower and spinach, was active from all winter irrigated areas. Conditions favored improved quality from crops coming into production and good development of young lettuce. Planting of spring-crop vegetables was underway in most irrigated areas.

Seeding of lower valley cantaloupes, sweet corn, tomatoes, and watermelons was active. Lack of moisture in the early non-irrigated areas was becoming general. While onions in these areas continued to do well from the good sub-soil moisture, planting of other spring vegetables will be delayed awaiting favored conditions.

Continued dry weather in the north Texas onion areas was delaying the start of transplanting.

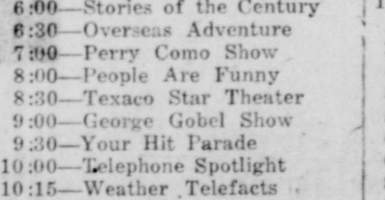

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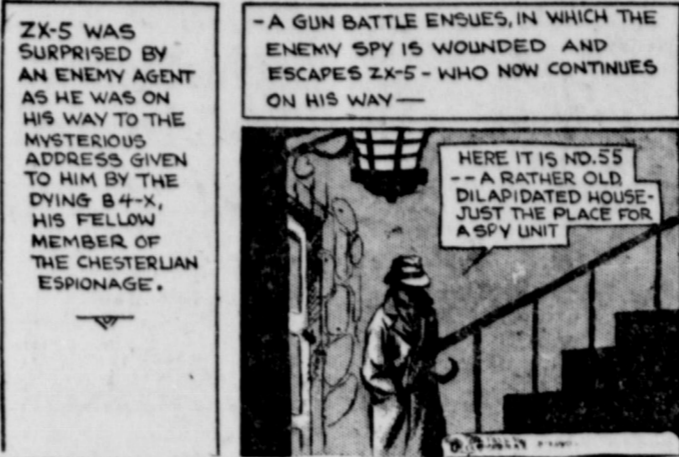

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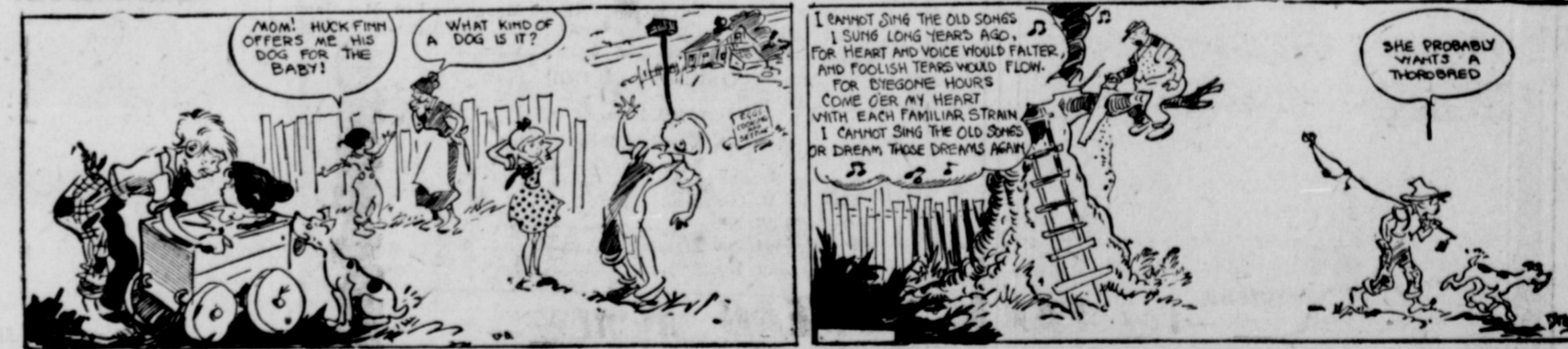

**Mr. Perkins, Scientist, Speaks To League on Minerals in Texas**

Joseph M. Perkins, prominent consulting geologist, was the speaker at the Civic League and Garden Club program-tea Wednesday afternoon at the Woman's Club, his theme being Texas resources, with emphasis on the soil and its minerals.

Mr. Perkins' talk followed a film projected by Wendell Siebert, after Mr. Perkins' introduction by Mrs. Horace Horton, vice president and program chairman.

The film had been shown the afternoon before at the high school and also at the colored school. It depicted the contrast between early Texas and its present day cities and industrial enterprises.

The film showed the vast natural resources of Texas, such as natural gas, iron ore, and such by-products as synthetic rubber, ammonia and the modern miracle of various chemicals, all of which were discussed by Mr. Perkins following the film.

Texas ships about a fourth of the chemicals of the United States. Oil is found every place—in the marshes, off the Gulf Coast, on the plains, in the deep east—and seventy-five per cent of the oil produced in Texas is refined in Texas, it was pointed out.

Mr. Perkins, who served the past year as research scientist for the University of Texas, explained that some of Texas' natural resources are not renewable, such as oil and gas, sulphur and mercury. These are being conserved, by proration, he said. Those that renew themselves are the wonderful climate, water, timber and others, he added.

Mr. Perkins told about the mercury produced in Texas, the new less expensive method of mining sulphur, about lignite mining, iron ore and the mining of table salt.

Texas University, in cooperation with the United States Bureau of Reclamation desired and investigation and estimate of the amount of certain minerals available along the coastal plain and in East Texas and this was the work Mr. Perkins engaged in for the university the past year. In telling of the various minerals

in Texas one extremely plentiful one he mentioned was common table salt, saying that one cubic mile of salt would last the world 185 years and we have 240 cubic miles less than two miles below the surface of our coastal plains of Texas. Some of the other known minerals, however, are half used, he added, naming some of them.

There is orderly production of natural gas, he said, with carbon black as a by-product. A small amount of magnesium may be extracted from a large amount of sea water.

Mrs. Horace Horton presided at the business session in the absence of the president, Mrs. Arthur Murrell, and Mrs. Jack Frost, secretary, read the minutes. Reports were made by Mrs. B. W. Brewer, treasurer; Mrs. Frank Castleberry, membership chairman; and Mrs. Billy C. Frost of the spring clean-up committee who said the campaign would be in April.

The club voted to send a letter to the city officials asking them to clean up the streets and curbs in the residential sections and haul off the dead trees, in the same manner in which the downtown streets are cleaned.

Also the group voted to have a committee meet with the city commissioners asking that sewage be arranged for the colored section of town.

It was suggested that something be done to see that the streets in the residential sections are marked and that houses are numbered properly and a member was designated to write to the Lions or Rotary Club asking that the project be undertaken.

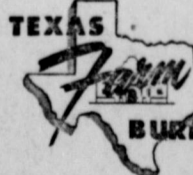

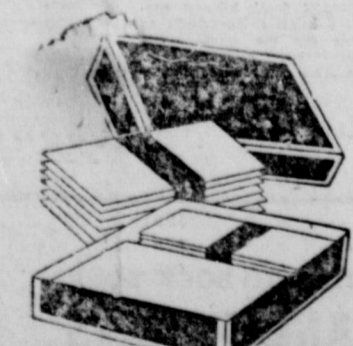

From breakfast to midnight buffet, yeast breads appear as menu stand-bys. Top Snails with confectioners' sugar icing and serve with hot spiced tea or coffee for holiday callers. A basic sweet yeast dough lends itself to many variations by shaping and by additional ingredients. To make Snails, add a little grated lemon rind to the basic sweet yeast dough. You'll be delighted by the perky flavor. Snails take only minutes to shape. Pinch off portions of dough and roll under your hand about 1 1/2 inches long and slightly less than 1/2 inch thick. Starting at the center, wind each strip of dough loosely, round and round.

Hot breads turn the simplest menu into a festive meal. Occasionally, when you haven't time to make your own breads, use packaged mixes or "brown 'n serve" rolls. The baker, too, saves you time by offering a tempting selection of breads during the holidays.

**SNAILS**

1 package yeast, compressed or dry  
1/2 cup water (lukewarm for compressed yeast, warm for dry)  
1/2 cup milk  
1/4 cup sugar  
1 teaspoon salt

2 tablespoons shortening  
1 egg  
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind (if desired)  
3 cups sifted enriched flour (about)  
Confectioners' sugar icing

Soften yeast in water. Scald milk. Add sugar, salt and shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Add 1 cup flour. Mix well. Add softened yeast, egg and lemon rind. Mix well. Add enough more flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board or pastry cloth and knead until smooth and satiny. Place in greased bowl. Cover and let rise until doubled. When light punch down. Pinch off portions of dough and roll under hand until about 1 1/2 inches long and slightly less than 1/2 inch thick. Starting at center, wind each strip of dough loosely, round and round. Let rise until doubled. Bake in moderate oven (375°F.) 20 to 25 minutes. If desired, frost with confectioners' sugar icing. Makes about 1 1/2 dozen rolls.

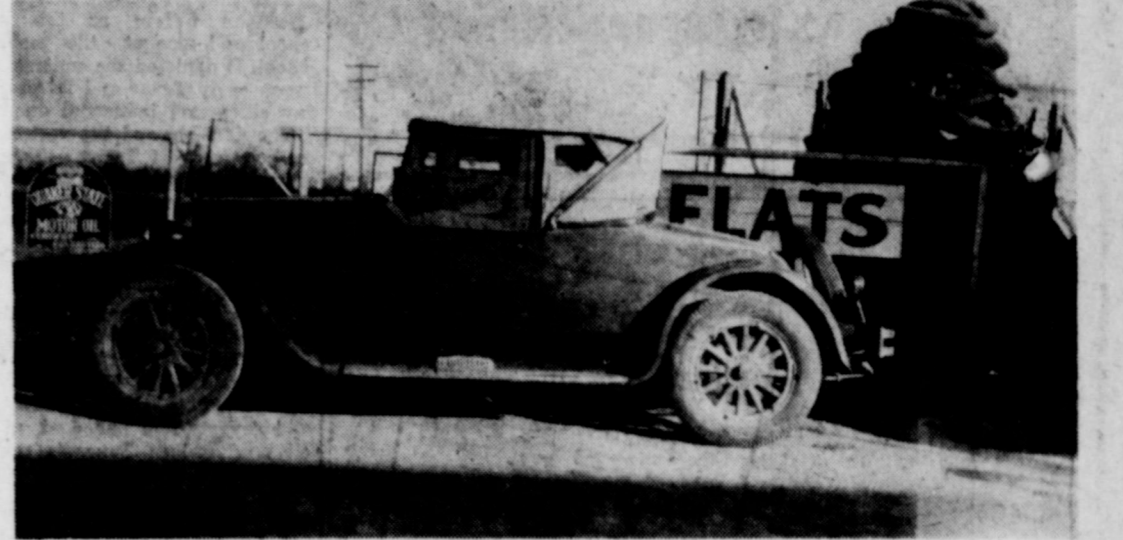
