

Commissioners Vote Selves \$75 Expenses; Await Ruling

action is expected from attorney general's of the legality of a motion by the Eastland Commissioners this which would give each commissioner a \$75 a month expense allowance.

The motion, recorded as Ord. No. Six of the Commissioners Court meeting of the 29th of January, with all members present, is as follows:

Order fixing salaries and expenses for the calendar year

of 1965 providing further that members of Eastland County Commissioners Court shall receive such expense salaries as is provided for in Article 2350 of Vernon's Civil Statutes. Upon a call for the vote by the County Judge motion declared passed."

The county judge, who is not furnished a vehicle by the county, has been receiving the \$75 expense money, it is reported.

Each commissioner presently

drives a county-furnished pickup.

Salaries of the court members is as follows: the county judge receives \$230 twice monthly, for an annual salary of \$5,220 plus the \$75 per month expense money.

The four commissioners are each paid \$192.50 twice monthly for an annual total of \$4,620. A check of official public records at the courthouse reveals that:

Sec. 2. (Pertains to counties with populations over 21,500).

Sec. 3. (Pertains to counties with populations over 124,000).

Sec. 4. (Pertains to counties with populations over 600,000.)

Sec. 5. The term "members of the Commissioners Court" when used herein means the County Commissioners and the County Judge.

Sec. 6. The provisions of this bill shall apply only to those counties not furnishing an automobile, truck, or by other means providing for the traveling expenses of its commissioners, while on official business within the county.

Commissioners Okay Renovation Of Appeals Court Up To \$40,000

Authorization has been given and negotiations have begun for the renovation of the quarters on the fifth floor of the county courthouse.

A motion authorizing and undertaking construction of improvements to the quarters was adopted unanimously this week by the County Commissioners Court.

The motion, made by Commissioner C. B. Dill, "provides that the total of said improvements shall not exceed \$40,000."

Work is expected to include air conditioning and expanded library facilities.

Action followed lengthy discussion and an on-the-spot inspection of the court facilities, by the commissioners Monday.

The court further signed an agreement with C. N. Burt & Co. of Richardson to handle the financial arrangements for a three per cent commission.

In other action, the court: Approved the bond for Justice of the Peace B. A. Butler of Rising Star.

\$1,000 Pegged by C-C For Highway Promotion

A \$9,234.52 budget has been adopted by the board of directors of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

The budget includes \$1,000 earmarked for use by the chamber either this year or in years to come for "highway promotion". This will include highway signs and other ideas. Also included is a \$50 allowance for a fire prevention survey to be conducted with a view toward having Eastland's insurance key rate of 28 cents reduced perhaps by some one or two cents, which will amount to a substantial savings in years to come, it was reported.

Also tentatively set is a chamber banquet, expected to be held during the week of April 12, with plans and further details to be worked out.

Special Events Chairman Marlene Johnson is in charge.

President Don Vieregger presided when directors met for their regular monthly luncheon at the White Elephant Restaurant Thursday.

Finance Chairman Bob Perkins presented the budget and it was approved with minor revisions, and explanations.

At the suggestion of Director H. T. Wilson, Vieregger named a four-man committee to set up an executive committee to function on matters between board meetings

to commence Jan. 1, 1965, and end Dec. 31, 1966.

A 91st District Court grand jury will be called for Feb. 12 and the court's criminal docket is set to begin Feb. 22. District Attorney Perry T. Brown has announced.

The murder case involving a Ranger woman, charged with killing her husband, is set for March 15, he said. A number of cases, one of which is for forgery, naming an Eastland young man, is set for the 22nd.

Prosecutor Brown has announced his Justice of the Peace schedule as follows:

First Friday of each month, he will be in the Rising Star JP court; in Gorman on the second Thursday of each month; in Cisco on the third Friday; in Ranger on the fourth Friday; and at any one as needed, he said.

EC-65 Site Seminar Is Scheduled For Thursday; Group Will Tour County

Three experts on industrial property will participate in the next EC-65 Seminar to be held in Rising Star on Thursday, February 4 at the American Legion Hall. EC-65 is the industrial development pilot project which is being conducted by local Eastland County leaders in cooperation with the Texas Industrial Commission.

The panel on "industrial sites" will include Robert L. Shaw, Representative of Watson and Watson Industrial Realtors of Dallas and a member of the American Society

of Industrial Realtors; Homer Tanner, Manager of the Brownwood Chamber of Commerce; and L. P. Vinet, Assistant Director of Industrial Development for the Texas and Pacific Railroad.

This is the third in a series of five seminars which are being conducted for EC-65. This seminar will begin with a tour of industrial properties in the county starting at 8:30 a.m. at Cisco. The meeting place for the tour is the Cisco Chamber of Commerce office.

The panel of experts, Industrial Commission staff mem-

bers, and local EC-65ers will board the bus which is being loaned by Cisco Junior College and will visit sites in Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Gorman and Rising Star. Then they will have lunch in Rising Star at the American Legion Hall with a critique on the sites by the three experts.

75 Meters Are Updated

Been downtown lately and noticed anything new along the sidewalks? Their looks are improving with the addition of new parking meters being erected around the square where most cars park, according to City Manager Lewis Tiner.

There are 75 new meters to be put up, the City purchasing 50 of these and the remaining 25 being on a loan basis, Tiner said. They cost \$47.50 each, he said; however, the revenue taken from the eight meters, placed on the west side of the square about a year ago, is (or almost is) enough to make the payments on the new meters.

For some unknown reason, the meters placed on trial test a year ago take in from 30 to 40 percent more than did the old ones.

Taking into consideration what those eight meters did for the city, just think what the addition of 75 more will do!

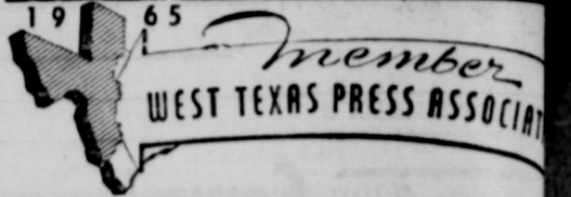

Commissioner Precinct Two (Gorman, Carbon) has six men employed with seven pickups and/or trucks, one of which is a truck-tractor.

Commissioner Precinct Three (Rising Star) has six employees and eight pickups and/or trucks.

Commissioner Precinct Four (Cisco) has five full-time and one part-time employees with seven pickups and/or trucks.

The expense accounts would cost county tax payers an additional \$3,600 a year.

Other county officials and employees are paid at the rate of 10 cents per mile when it is necessary for them to use their personal vehicles on official business.

Text of the agreement entered into with the Burt Co. is as follows: "Honorable County Judge and Commissioners' Court of Eastland County, Texas

"Gentlemen: "It is our understanding that you are considering the issuance of \$40,000 more or less, of Permanent Improvement Warrants payable from your county's 80 cents Constitutional Tax for the constructing improvements to your Courthouse, and in connection therewith, we wish to submit for your consideration the following proposal:

"We will study carefully with you the present financial condition of all of your county funds and the probable future income to these funds. After these matters have been studied, we will make recommendations with reference to the maturities of the proposed Warrants and later the proposed Refunding Bonds.

"We agree to assume all charges made by recognized commercial Bond Attorneys, agreeable to you, to prepare and furnish all the necessary legal proceedings to authorize and issue the proposed Warrants. The Warrants are to be dated on or about the date they are authorized and are to bear interest at a rate of 4 per cent and mature serially over a period not to exceed 10 years.

"Simultaneously with the authorization of the Warrants, we will provide funds at the American National Bank, Austin, Texas, or your local banks, to pay for the contract or contracts entered into for the construction of said permanent improvements. The payments of the contracts are to be made at their face value and upon approved estimates of your architect. It is agreed that you will request the contractor or contractors to deliver the said Warrants to us and execute receipts of payments, as furnished by the Bond Attorneys, for said Warrants.

"For the foregoing services and expenses in connection with the issuance of the Warrants we are to be paid a fee

"After all of the Warrants shall have been issued and delivered to us, we agree to refund them into Permanent Improvement Refunding Bonds, maturing over a period of years to best fit in with the financial condition of your county's funds and to bear interest at a rate or rates in line with the then prevailing municipal bond market.

"We will assume the expenses of the same Bond Attorneys employed to furnish all legal proceedings necessary to authorize and issue the proposed refunding bonds in one or more series, obtain their approval by the Attorney General of the State of Texas and approve them as to their legality. We also agree to furnish the printed warrants and refunding bonds and attend to all details of having the legal proceedings, properly executed. No additional charges are to be made in connection with the refunding of the warrants into bonds unless otherwise negotiated.

TOMORROW'S TEACHERS

ED. NOTE: This is the first of a series of articles taken from a speech delivered this week by County School Supt. O. L. Stamey before the Eastland P-TA. Succeeding articles will appear in following issues.)

Today's educators have a huge task in seeking to select what to teach, especially in cumulative fields, such as, natural and behavioral sciences.

If this accumulation is plotted

on a time line, beginning with the birth of Christ, it is estimated that the first doubling of knowledge occurred in 1750. The second in 1900 — the third in 1950 — and the fourth in 1960. When will the fifth doubling occur?

It is no longer difficult to select and package for instruction the most important bits and pieces of knowledge — it is impossible. The search is on for something more lasting than the bits and pieces.

Clearly a massive reformulation of what is to be taught and learned in the schools of the U. S. is under way. The new Math — new concept in reading — science — including biology, physics, and chemistry, English and foreign language. We've been making abrupt changes, even two suggestions to change the calendar have been made. Innovations — in audio-visual aids — closed circuit television — telephone or telephone-teaching have been made.

Team teaching and many new practices have come into being but we must recognize that the whole responsibility of training our children lies with the administrators and teachers of today and tomorrow. For this reason, I should like to talk on the subject — TOMORROW'S TEACHER.

Samuel Taylor Coleridge had a character in a play utter these words: "Often do the spirits of great events stride on be-

fore the events, and in today already walks tomorrow."

We are the spirits who will determine the shape of things to come. The contributions the teacher makes tomorrow will be determined by the greatness of spirit we as citizens (and teachers) possess today, the degree of wisdom we share, and the creative planning we do in a free country.

Eleanor Roosevelt said, in her last book, "We face the future fortified only with the lessons we have learned from the past. It is today that we must create the world of the future, for in a very real sense, Tomorrow Is Now. Nothing has value unless it is a preparation for what lies ahead."

Somehow, tomorrow, educators must change the image other people have of America. The organization man; the status seeker; the other-directed man; the conformist; the self-centered individual striving for comfort, security and status — these are not the goals of most Americans. They were never the goals of most Americans. They were never the goals of the founders of our nation.

No longer can we afford to let a teacher teach just to make a living — no longer can we tolerate the teacher who teaches only math, or English, or Texas (or United States) History! We must demand that teachers have a deepening appreciation of the values by which free people everywhere think and live, and understanding of responsibility of free people to other free people; professional maturity, and a passion to idealism which the founders of our country possessed. Moral values, spiritual values, courage, stability and insight must be our goals for modern children if our democratic society is to endure.

We would all be appalled if we knew how few of our students (and teachers and citizens as well) are familiar with the background of our American Constitution, the Bill of Rights, and the Declaration of Independence. Certainly we can't defend our American institutions and our

American Way of Life if our young people do not understand what they are, and what makes them essential to the maintenance of freedom and human dignity.

If we are to cope successfully with our revolutions in science, in the economy, in social areas, we must prepare for a revolution in education. We must equip our young people for the coming world, whose face no one knows. We must tell them bluntly that the best we can do for them is to give them skills. We must endeavor to train their minds so they become flexible tools, and provide them with techniques for learning and for finding information that will help them solve new problems. We must strive to give them the creative element — that element which implies freedom: freedom of thought, freedom of expression, freedom of activity. Creativity implies, also discipline — discipline of thought, discipline of expression, discipline of activity. Creativity is not haphazard. Creativity is the result of thinking, planning, and experimentation based on sound ideas, concepts, and procedures. Thorough Today's Teacher must do these things — thus "In today, will walk tomorrow."

Often I think our young people are not properly trained to see where the real values of life are to be found. In school we stress play and having fun. There are, by statistics, some 200,000 to 300,000 teachers in the United States who are teaching "fun and frill" subjects. Children rush from school to ball games, to television programs, to numerous other extra-curricula activities — and so do adults!

Lewis Todd reminded us recently that we have seen more inventions, new developments, and world-shaping events than the grand total of all the human beings who walked the earth from the beginning of time until the dawn of the twentieth century. But greater than any of these technical and scientific achievements, perhaps, are the explosions of human aspirations that are changing the world.
