13,271 Vehicles Pass Here Daily, Contractor Says

An average of 13,271 vehicles pass through Eastland every day on U.S. Highway 80, M. O. McDowell, superintendent of the highway construction firm of Cooper and Woodruff, told Eastland Lions Tuesday, emphasizing the importance of the highway to the city's economy.

"And there's an average yearly increase of some seven percent," McDowell, a veteran highway builder, told the group.

Complimenting the Texas Highway Department and particularly the local engineering office, Mr. McDowell explained how highway building procedures have changed in the past few years. "It used to be an under-the-table operation," he said, "but no more. Texas has the most efficient highway department in the nation. There are no irregularities."

He carefully explained the procedure whereby companies such as his are awarded contracts, pointing out the various requirements, including experience records, financial ability, presentation of a check for five per cent of the job's cost, performance bonds and having the low bid.

Everett Plowman was program chairman and introduced Mr. McDowell. President Leon Musgrove presided.

The construction superintendent labeled R. P. (Buddy) Haun as a "common sense" resident engineer. Cooper and Woodruff Construction Co. had contract for the Highway 6 job and several of the Int. 20 sections including the Ranger by-pass, now under construction. The company has offices in Ranger.

CJC Course Ends; Next Begins June 7

The first course in automotive mechanics to be conducted by the Technical - Vocational division of Cisco Junior College has been successfully completed by the ten students enrolled, according to G. C. Hogue, CJC president.

The course consisted of six hours combined class room and laboratory work each week, which covered a period of 18 weeks and 108 clock hours. During that period of time, students completed six major overhaul jobs, in addition to other minor overhaul and tune-up repair jobs under direction of W. D. Gentry, instructor.

A similar course in automotive mechanics is being planned for the summer months in the Industrial Engine Technology shop of CJC if the demand justifies, Mr. Hogue added.

Classes will be held four hours a day Monday through Friday, and minimum age limit for enrollment is 15 years. An average of 90 hours training will be received each month, and tuition will be approximately \$30 per month. All hand tools and equipment will be furnished.

Work-study jobs will be available to those who plan to pursue automotive mechanics as a vocation, and job rates are \$1.25 per hour. Students enrolled may work as much as 15 hours per week.

Further information may be obtained by contacting L. E. Jenkins, Director of Technical-Vocational Division, Cisco Junior College, Cisco Texas. Inquiries should be made immediately in order that the schedule may be arranged. Mr. Hogue said. Tentative starting date is Monday, June 7.

LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF EASTLAND ADOPTING A SANITATION AND HEALTH CODE PROVIDING FOR THE ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT THEREOF, MAKING VIOLATION A MISDEMEANOR: DECLARING CERTAIN CONDITIONS TO BE A NUISANCE; MAKING VIOLATION A MISDEMEANOR PUNISHABLE BY A FINE NOT EXCEEDING \$200.00.

WHEREAS, in the opinion of the City Commission there exists a public need or necessity for a Sanitation and Health ordinance to the City of Eastland, Eastland County, Texas, as described below:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF EASTLAND:

LITTERING STREETS: It shall be unlawful for any person to produce, collect or deposit, or cause the same to be done, in any street, ally, sidewalk or elsewhere in the City, any impure or unhealthy substance or thing calculated to promote disease.

NUISANCES GENERALLY

It shall be unlawful for any person to establish, or, where already established, to conduct or carry on any trade, business, vocation or calling which is dangerous or injurious to persons or property in the vicinity, or which occasions annoyance to the public or the inhabitants of the neighborhood, and the same is hereby declared to be a nuisance.

PREMISES TO BE KEPT CLEAN

It shall be the duty of every person within the City to keep the premises owned or controlled by him clean and free of filth or offensive matter, whether the same be solid or fluid, and to remove or destroy, as often as need be, all filth, garbage, offal, hoops, stones, straw, chips and everything calculated to endanger or promote disease, or to become offensive, from such premises and buildings, yards and enclosures thereon and from the sidewalks.

TRASH IN PUBLIC PLACES

It shall be unlawful for any person to throw or deposit in any City lot, Street, ally, sidewalk, gutter, ditch or drain any paper, filth, dung, garbage, broken glass, tins, chips, paring or bits of leather shavings, ashes or other trash.

NAUSEOUS STRUCTURES

It shall be unlawful for any person owning or in control of any premises to maintain or allow to remain upon his premises, any unwholesome or nauseous house, pit, or any unwholesome or nauseous structure or accumulation declared by the Council to be a nuisance.

ORDER TO ABATE UNWHOLESOE STRUCTURES

Whenever the Council shall deem any house, cesspool, pit or any other structure or accumulation to be unwholesome or nauseous and shall pass an order declaring the same to be a nuisance and order its destruction, removal, cleansing or abatement, the Health Officer or someone designated by the City Commission shall deliver to the owner, or person in control of the premises upon which the nuisance is situated, a notice in writing, signed by the Mayor, and attested by the City Secretary, commanding the destruction, removal, cleansing or abatement of the nuisance in accordance with the order. Any owner or person in control of the premises upon which such nuisance is situated who shall fail or neglect to destroy, remove, cleanse or abate the nuisance in accordance with such order within ten (10) days after the delivery to him of the notice, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

INSPECTIONS

It shall be the duty of the Health Officer to inspect regularly the premises of all persons residing, doing business or owning property within the Limits of the City; and should the Health Officer find any such premises kept or permitted to remain in a filthy or unclean manner, he shall notify such persons to purify their premises. Should any person so notified by the Health Officer fail to obey such notification, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

MAINTENANCE OF PROPERTY IN FILTHY MANNER

No person shall maintain any building, premises, lot, vehicle or other place in such an unsanitary condition as to encourage the breeding or harboring of rats, mice, fleas, bedbugs, cockroaches, lice, flies or vermin therein or thereon. Nor shall any person permit any property owned or controlled by him or in his possession, to be so maintained.

NOTICE TO ABATE IMPROPER MAINTENANCE

Where it shall come to the attention of the Health Officer, or such other person designated to perform the duties of

such office, that the condition described in the two (2) preceding Sections exists and should be abated for the Health and safety of the community, the Health Officer shall give written notice to the occupant within ten (10) days from the date he acquires knowledge of such condition. The Health Officer shall then take such action and institute such proceedings as are necessary to effect the abatement of the same.

SEPARABILITY OF PROVISIONS

It is the intention of the city council that each separate provision of this ordinance shall be deemed independent of all other provisions herein, and it is further the intention of the City Council that if any provision of this ordinance shall be declared invalid, all other provisions hereof shall remain valid and in full force.

ON MOTION OF COMMISSIONER TREADWELL

seconded by Commissioner Reed, the foregoing ordinance was passed on first reading this 17th day of May, A. D., 1965, by unanimous vote of the City Commission.

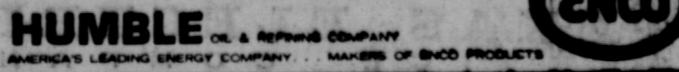

West Texas congressional districts will range from 376,200 for Omar Burleson's District 17 to 456,051 for Clark Fisher's District 21 under the reapportionment bill passed by the Legislature and sent to the Governor early Sunday.

Burleson loses Scurry County to Rep. George Mahon's District 19 (Lubbock), and Parker County to Rep. W. R. Poage's District 11 (Waco). But District 17 gains 12 other counties, bringing the net number of counties up from 14 to 24.

Added to District 17 are two counties from District 13 (Wichita Falls), Haskell and Throckmorton; two from District 19 (Howard and Mitchell); one from District 16 (El Paso), Glasscock; and seven from District 21 (San Angelo-Odessa-San Antonio), Sterling, Coke, Runnels, Coleman, Brown, Concho and Mills.

District 17 thus climbs from 287,889 to 376,200.
