Truck Wreck Slows Traffic On Highway 80

A big refrigerator truck, enroute to California on U. S. County Considers Challenge For Work To Attract More Payrolls

The communities of Eastland County had a challenge from leaders high in the state government today to use the know-how given them by 25 experts in a wide variety of fields in seeking new payrolls for a more stable economy.

The advice on how to seek new industry was given to the towns of the county in five training seminars in an EC-65 program that was concluded in a five-hour session Tuesday at the Corral Room of the Victor Hotel in Cisco.

Remaining on the schedule is a final wrap-up seminar that will take the form of a huge county-wide meeting, probably in mid-June, with Governor Connally as the speaker. The EC-65 project was organized and personally supervised by Director Harry W. Clark of the TIC as a pilot program for Texas counties.

as has had better training opportunities than Eastland County in the five seminar programs. He noted that competition was increasingly keen for new payrolls, pointing out that 1500 new plants were built in the nation last year "with 15,000 communities after them."

Executive Secretary Ed C. Burris of the Texas Manufacturers Association, Houston, was presented by Mr. Clark as the first speaker.

With the decline of job opportunities in agriculture and mining, only manufacturing offers hope for the future, that the number of jobs in Texas factories increased from 210,000 in 1940 to 547,000 in 1961 and that there was some two billion dollars worth of new manufacturing plants on the drawing boards of industry for Texas at this time.

Alert communities with a limited economic outlook can grow through attracting industry, Mr. Burris said. He pointed to Lubbock, which was a small agriculture community in 1930. Today it's a diversified city of over 100,000. Odessa has grown from a town of 2,500 in 1930 to over 90,000 people due to oil and chemicals.

Eastland County was one of the state's most prosperous Texas counties in the 1920's, Mr. Burris noted, nothing was obtained over the years to replace the dwindling oil industry jobs.

"Industry expects only fair treatment and will pay its fair share of the costs," Mr. Burris said. "Industry expects fair opportunities to earn a reasonable profit . . . expects fair tax valuations and levies . . . expects good schools and churches and good government and a good atmosphere.

Texas needs 70,000 new jobs each year for the annual population increase, Mr. Burris said. He expressed the hope that the Texas Legislature now in session would help create a more favorable atmosphere for industry by overhauling the workman's compensation law and in the unemployment field.

James J. Kelly of the Texas Industrial Commission spoke on "The Man with the Idea." He pointed out that an idea of a local man usually was behind most Texas factories. He said the TIC has started semi-annual inventors' congresses for the purpose of uncovering local ideas. The first was held in Odessa recently and another is planned Oct 15-17 in Odessa. He pointed out that too much importance could not be placed on encouraging local people to bring their ideas forward.

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The June meeting will be held at the new high school in Cisco in the form of a catered dinner, County Judge Scott Bailey announced after the final Tuesday session. It will be held at the school due to the availability of the large air - conditioned auditorium in the event of bad weather. Details and committees will be announced in the near future, the judge said.

Judge Bailey's statement, "these fine seminar programs that the Texas Industrial Commission has made possible leaves us with a very definite challenge to put our knowledge to work in a determined effort to improve our economy through more payroll," was applauded by representatives of Ranger, Eastland, Cisco, Gorman and other areas of the county at the Tuesday meeting.

(Continued from page 1) the various companies and organizations whose services are available without charges.

These include the railroads, who have active industrial and public relations departments; the Lone Star Gas Company, which has an industrial agency that is busy serving the towns on their lines; the electric companies, which have growing departments with facilities to help locate pay-rolls; banks, who are anxious to help in providing financing information and the like; the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, which is active in the field and which has a community clinic program available to any town in their area; the TIC, whose work has been described previously; the Small Business Administration, which provides government financing to small manufacturers and home grown industries; and the various state agencies, departments and colleges that have valuable information and specialists.

Mr. Sayles stressed the fact that the utility company work in strict confidence with any town seeking their services. He urged that they be kept up-to-date with information about the various towns. Dr. Robert B. Williamson, head of the Bureau of Business Research at the University of Texas, told the seminar that 1964 was the best that Texas has had since 1957. Personal income went up six percent last year as compared with an average of five percent in the previous six years.

Employment in Texas factories was up four percent last year as compared with the two percent national average, Mr. Williamson said. Building permits were up over 100 percent last year. The fight of communities of 5,000 or less to avoid a loss in population can be successful with planning, he said. Mr. Williamson believed that factories in the plastic, furniture, apparel, chemical and electronic fields had the most appeal for small towns where location did not appear as important as labor conditions and a good atmosphere.

The concluding discussion was led by Paul Marable, executive vice president of the "Waco Chamber of Commerce, on "Organizing Your People" to seek prospects for payrolls. He spoke at a luncheon that was attended by seminar visitors. Mr. Marable commended the TIC for the planning that had gone into the extensive program of the five EC-65 seminars. He said that seeking payroll prospects was a time-consuming, tedious task that needed dedicated people for a big committee.

He suggested reading trade papers and magazines, contacts with local industries, working with regional CoC and others, and appealing to everyone in the community to be alert. He urged the committee to watch for plants with problems, those who appeared in need of expanding, shifting markets, raw material sources, and unusual circumstances that might affect a plant. Mr. Marable pointed out that the proper CoC industrial committee or group was composed of specialists who devoted much time to public service. "Lucky breaks are important," he concluded.

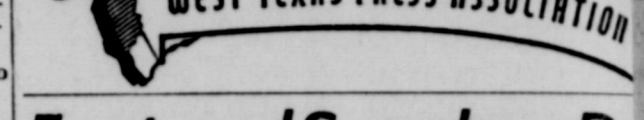

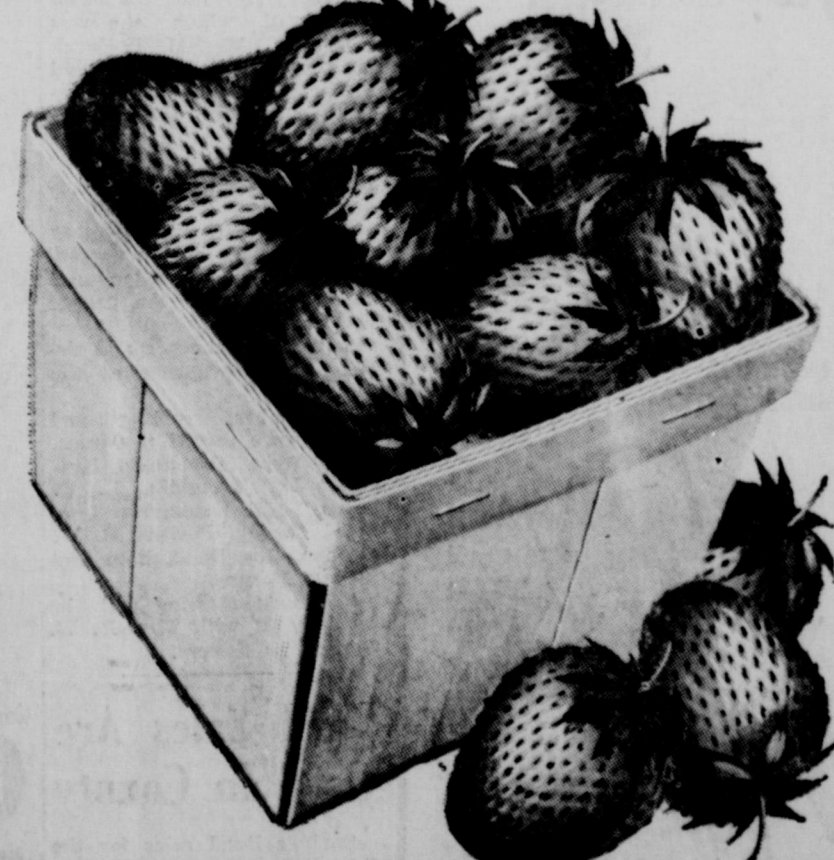

Lea's King Ranch Review Given By W. B. Wright

Texas' King Ranch as described in a Texas-written and published book by Tom Lea was program for the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday as W. B. Wright of Cisco reviewed the 1957 book about the well-known Texas ranching institution.

Born in 1824 in New York of Irish parents, Richard King had but eight months of education, Attorney Wright explained, but was the "right man at the right place" to parlay his investments into a million-dollar operation. King, who was first a river-boat captain, first bought Texas land at two cents an acre, and his first stud horse for \$600, died in 1885 at which time the ranch owned 40,000 cows, 7,000 horses and 12,000 sheep.

His widow continued to acquire land and in 1906 the ranch comprised an even million acres grazed by 75,000 cows and 10,000 horses.

In 1954 there was 287 miles of paved roads, 381 water wells, 1,200 people living on the ranch, 564 of which were employees, and 100 riders.

Income from oil equalled that of livestock sales for the first time in 1952 and from 1925 to 1932, the beef production of the ranch was doubled. In 1951, \$5,000,000 in cattle was sold.

Painful Sunburn Easy To Come By On First Day Out

Want to get a deep painful sunburn? It's easy. Just stay out in the sun too long on your first visit of the season to the beach or pool. Of course gradual tanning with a minimum of discomfort is possible. Just keep in mind that the physical benefits of tanning are almost nil and that there is strong evidence that continued exposure to the sun weathers and ages the skin. The only beneficial effect of sunlight other than the psychological lift of sporting a good tan is the formation of vitamin D and the American diet already provides an ample supply.

Despite adverse physical indications physicians are aware that many of their patients still will continue to work on a suntan each summer and thus the American Medical Association offers some pointers on how to do it without burning too much.

Gradual exposure to the sun is the safest and simplest method of acquiring an attractive tan. As a general rule begin with 15 minutes exposure the first day and increase the time by a few minutes a day. The time of day is important with the midday period when the sun is directly overhead being the hottest for burning purposes.

Continuing tanning brings gradual changes in the blood vessels of the exposed surfaces. The connective tissue of the skin degenerates causing wrinkles and a coarsening of texture. The "V" of the neck becomes a permanently reddened and freckle-like dark spots appear on the skin. These spots can sometimes be the start of skin cancer.

Sun bleaches the hair too and over a period of time the sun-bleached hair becomes brittle and unmanageable. However the damaged hair will eventually grow out.

If you feel you must get a tan start with 15 minutes the first day increased by about a third each day. With care it may be possible to tan without too much burning and a minimum of peeling.

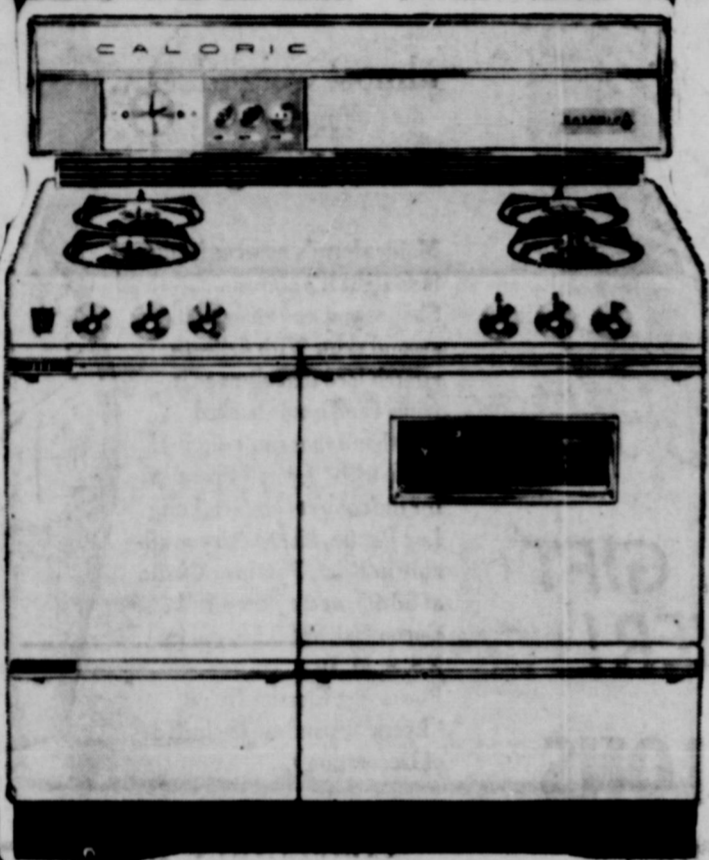

May Good Month To File Social Security Claim

Eastland County residents 65 or over who have not yet applied for social security benefits were advised today to file a claim now even if they are not planning to retire right away.

In issuing the above advice, R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene social security district manager pointed out that several local people who applied last year found that they had lost some benefits by not applying earlier. "We have found," said Tuley, "that the best way for a person to protect his social security benefit rights is to apply at 65 whether or not he intends to go on working. Even if no benefits are payable right away, there's an advantage in having your claim already approved when you actually retire. With entitlement already established, the benefits can be started immediately when we are notified of the retirement date."

He said that according to the latest figures there are nearly 19 million Americans who are 65 or over. Of that total, more than 14 million have already established their entitlement to social security monthly benefits, and 11 million are insured for benefits but have not yet filed their claims. The latter figures includes the wives of insured workers.

Noting that President Johnson has designated May as National Senior Citizens Month, Tuley extended a special invitation for all over-65 residents who have not applied, to talk with H. L. Weatherly, the field representative who services Eastland County, by going to the Cisco Chamber of Commerce on Wednesday, May 5 or 19 at 10 a. m.

Parasite Mistletoe Hard To Control

Most shade trees have now shed their leaves and the presence of mistletoe can be noted more easily. This parasitic plant when present in excessive amounts may weaken or slowly kill its host trees.

It frequently grows on the limbs of hackberry, osage, orange, oak, elm, mesquite and other trees, obtaining water and plant nutrients from its host.

No chemical is available for mistletoe control, says Wendell Horne, plant pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. However, if a tree has only limited infestations, the mistletoe and branches can be pruned.

Young branches should be pruned a foot or more below the point of infection. On older branches, the bark and a small amount of wood should be removed for a foot or more from the infected spot. A tree paint disinfectant should be applied to the cut surface at regular intervals to prevent wood rot infection while the wound is healing.

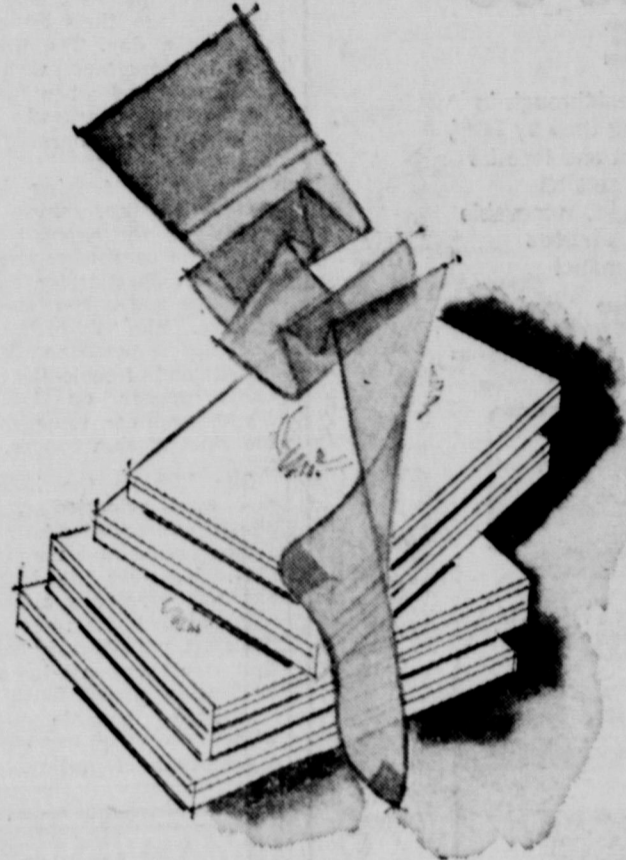
Horne points out that control may be more difficult if only one individual tries to eliminate mistletoe when it is plentiful nearby. However, an attempt should be made to remove the parasite from valuable shade trees by pruning or by breaking off with a hook fastened to a long pole. New sprouts may grow from the original infection and should be removed.

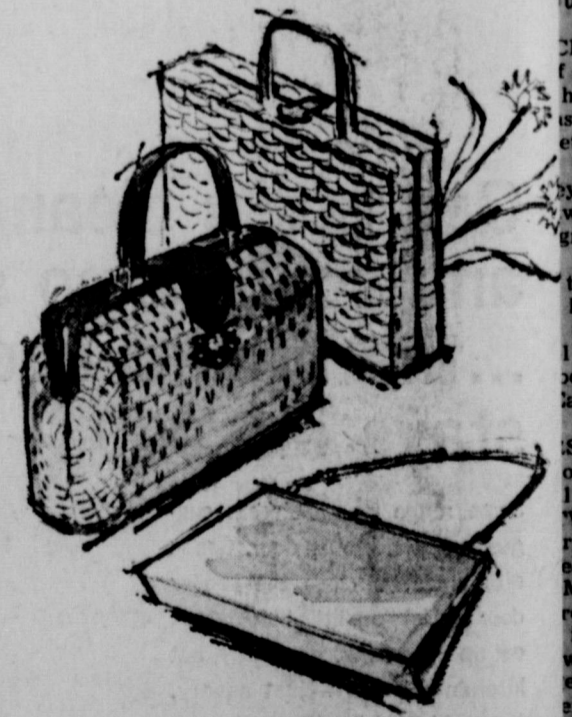
