Youth Charged In Robbery Of Two Cisco Businesses

Charges of burglary at night have been filed against John Joey Jones, 20, in connection with the recent robberies at White Auto Store and Ray's Trading Post in Cisco, Sheriff L. E. Sublett reported Friday. Jones was charged in papers filed in Justice of the Peace W. L. Lewis' court in Cisco. His bond was set at \$2,000 and he was still in the county jail Friday night. A 15-year old Cisco boy also was in the jail awaiting action by juvenile authorities in the same case.

The youths burglarized the two stores last April 11, taking \$110 in cash and a large number of watches and other items. They took \$80 and bought a used car in Abilene, loaded up their merchandise and headed west. They traded watches for gasoline and food along the way.

The car broke down in Los Angeles, Calif., and police took over. They were booked for investigation when a number of watches was found in the car.

Sheriff Sublett drove to Los Angeles for Jones last week, returning last Wednesday. The 15-year old boy was flown back and authorities met the plane in Dallas.

The Jones boy had lived in this area much of his life.

The judges advised County Agent J. M. Cooper on Friday that Seranton had won 1st place in the district for first-year clubs. In addition to a \$100 cash award, the club will be judged again soon in the statewide contest.

Nimrod won 4th place in their district, which included some 20 clubs. Olden placed 5th in another district.

Olden was one of three Eastland County communities to be judged Wednesday in the Texas Community Improvement Program, sponsored by the electric utility companies operating in Texas in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University.

Nimrod and Seranton were also judged.

This program has been set up to stimulate individual family and community effort toward farm, home and community improvement. The objectives are to make farm and ranch life more desirable and satisfying as well as more profitable and stable for farm families.

In judging, credit is given for individual family and group effort within the communities to improve farms, ranches, homes and communities. Scoring is made on the progress the community

makes in a 12 month period. The Olden tour began at 8:30 a. m. in the Community Center with coffee being served to those present. Gilbert Copeland, vice president of the Community Center and Vocational Agriculture teacher of Olden High School, welcomed the group and introduced judges and guests.

Dr. Harris Isbell Is Addiction Authority

Many people have had the honor of receiving an award from a famed person such as the President of the United States, vice-president or attorney general. Few of these persons, however, are from the surrounding area of Eastland.

One of the few is Dr. Harris Isbell, son of Mrs. F. T. Isbell of Eastland. In September of 1962, Dr. Isbell was awarded the PHS Commissioned Corps Meritorious Service Award emblem at ceremonies in the State Department auditorium. Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy made the presentation, given to Dr. Isbell to recognize his outstanding work in drug addiction research. Occasion of the ceremony was a White House Conference on Narcotics and Drug Abuse, of which Dr. Isbell is one of the world's outstanding authorities.

A 1927 graduate of Eastland High School, Dr. Isbell was for 17 years Director of the Center at the Public Health Service Hospital in Lexington, Ky. The Center gained world-wide recognition under his leadership. He is currently head of the Section of Clinical Pharmacology at the University of Kentucky, where he organizes and conducts a course in Therapeutics, including mechanism, application, evaluation, side effects and effectiveness of drugs.

Graduating from the Tulane University of Medical School of New Orleans in 1934, Dr. Isbell designed a test for the purpose of detecting narcotic addiction called the "Nalline Test," among other developments of great importance.

Dr. Isbell has lectured in health organizations in numerous foreign countries and was extensively quoted in the recent article, "Sleeping Pills and Pep Pills — Handle with Extreme Caution!" appearing in The Readers Digest.

Jim Smothers, manager of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, was in charge of local arrangements. He said this was the final training seminar and that Mr. Clark would give a summary for the five sessions.

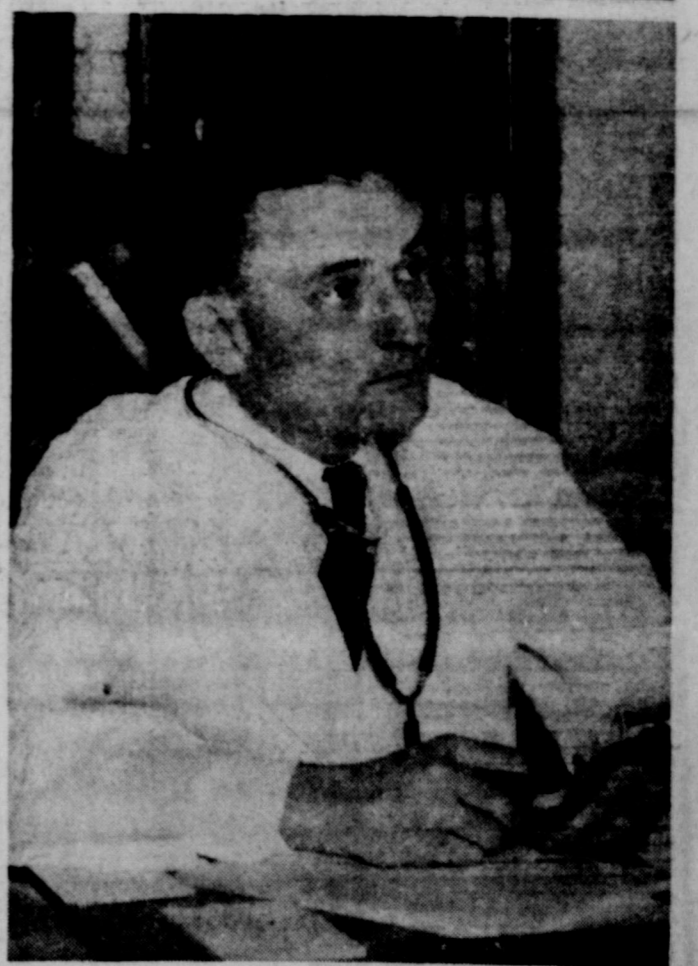

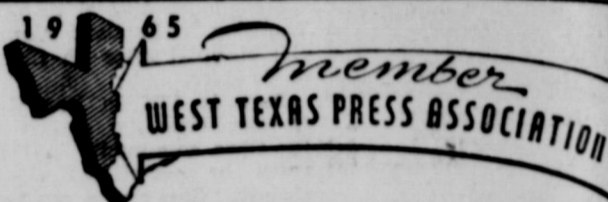

Paint And Be Fire Safe

If a paint brush figures in your Spring Clean-Up plans, keep these fire safety pointers in mind, urges Fire Marshal Guy Robinson. 1) For paint removing and brush cleaning, solvents labeled "non-flammable" are safest. If you must work with flammable ones, better use them outdoors. Indoors be sure windows are open, stoves are off, and no smoking in the room. 2) In storing paint materials, keep them well away from furnaces and also away from exits or under stairways — so you will not be blocked from escaping should these highly combustible materials catch fire. 3) Get rid of old paint and solvent containers and those with small left over amounts. Store paints and solvents only in capped metal containers — glass jars and bottles break easily, creating a definite fire hazard. 4) Safest practice with rags used to wipe up paint or solvents is to dispose of them immediately outside the house. If you must store them, use a metal container with a tight cover. Another fire safety tip for do-it-yourselfers is this: Any time you use mastics or adhesives — to cement counter-topping or floor tiles, for example — use extreme care. Some mastics are highly flammable, and they may involve you in a serious flash fire.

Women as well as men are cordially invited. Out of the county pecan growers are also invited, according to Schaefer, who is looking for a large group to attend the annual affair.

Besides the spring field day, the association also sponsors a fall tour, the county pecan show and the midwinter meeting. It was organized in 1956 by County Agent J. M. Cooper to help in the development of the pecan industry in the county.

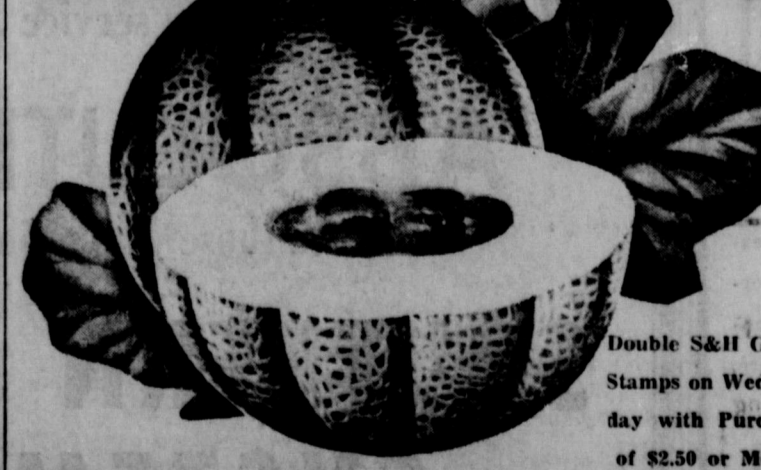

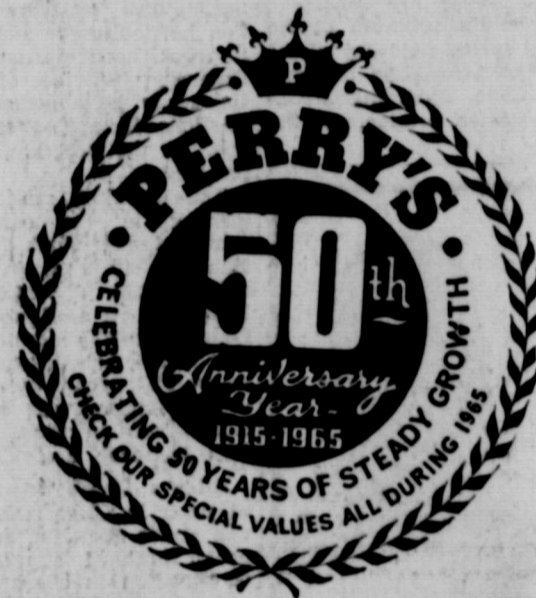

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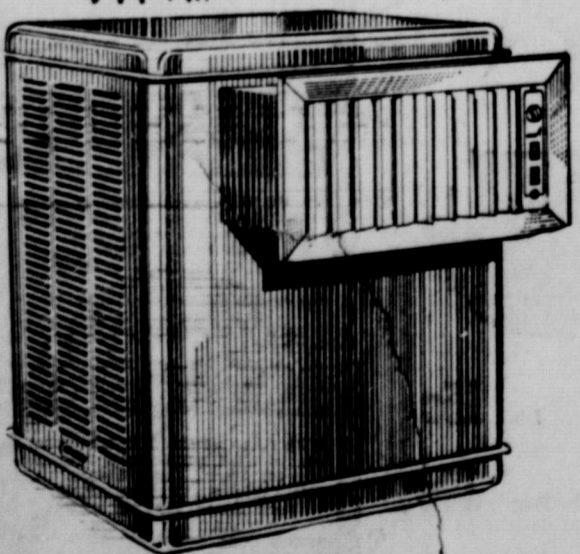

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Notary Public Requirements Expelled Out by State Official

Secretary of State Crawford Martin announced that all Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the term ending June 1, 1967, must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and filing of a new oath and with the County Clerk at his residence between May 1, 1965 and May 15, 1965, inclusive.

Martin emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk before May 20, 1965. Application during this period will assure that the appointment will be made in sufficient time for the applicant to qualify at the beginning of the new term.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished to the County Clerk.

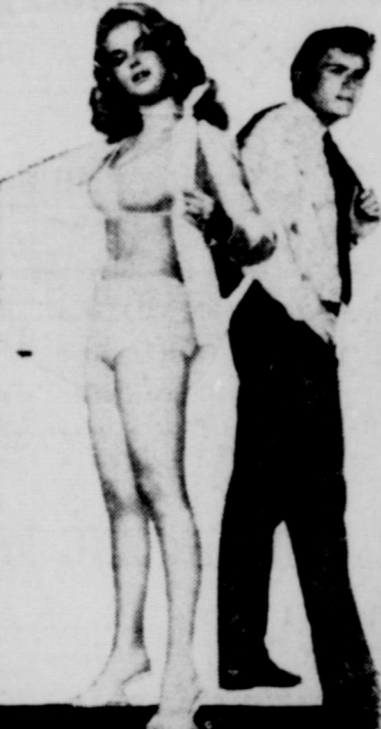

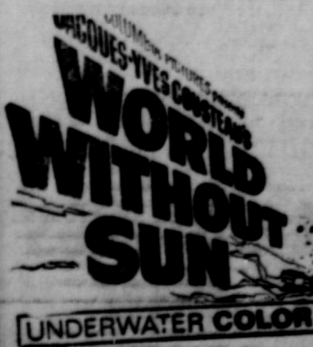

early party of 1918. During the boom, Olden had an estimated population of 10,000 and Magnolia Oil Company had 2,000 persons on the payroll. Businesses during the boom included a hotel, two banks, two shows, three drug stores, two dry good stores, five grocery stores, barber shop, post office, doctor office, hardware stores, and a YMCA.

Mr. Copeland also told of the purchasing of the present Community Center building and how it was paid for with a membership fee of \$2.50 per family per month. The fee has now been lowered to \$1.00 per family per month.

Improvements to the building has included the installing of two restrooms and kitchen cabinets. During the past year, members conducted a test of 65 water wells in Olden, thus leading to the project of forming an Olden Water System and buying water from the City of Eastland. To date, 131 Olden families have signed for the water and the plans are now in the hands of the engineers.

Also achieved during the past year was the securing of a fire truck, building of a fire station and forming a volunteer fire department. A community homecoming planned and held in November, with 600 persons registering, and the construction of a football field are also projects of the Community Center.

First step on the tour was the fire station, where Bert Kent, fire chief, explained the use of equipment. The following homes were toured:

Gilbert Copeland, Lee Williamson, L. J. Williamson, Carl Boustead, Onous Dick, I. E. Talley, and Gaylon Ashton. Also noted throughout the community were vacant lots that had been cleaned and improved.

Officers of the Community Center are president, L. J. Williamson; vice president, Gilbert Copeland; treasurer, Gene Woods secretary, Desie Hooks.

Letters TO THE EDITOR

EDITOR:

How well do I remember April 28, 1893, the night Cisco had that awful storm. I lived 10 miles from Gorman. Our dad had all of us to get in the cellar. He stood out and watched the cloud. At last he called us to come out, that the storm wasn't going to strike here. Of course there wasn't a telephone anywhere then in the county so the next morning here came a boy on horse back from Rising Star telling of the awful storm that hit Cisco.

My dad hitched his mules to the wagon, drove to Gorman, put his team in the livery stable, got on the train, and came to Cisco. He said it was an awful sight. By that time it had cleared off and was a quiet beautiful day. Twenty people were killed and lots of houses blown down. He stayed and helped all he could.

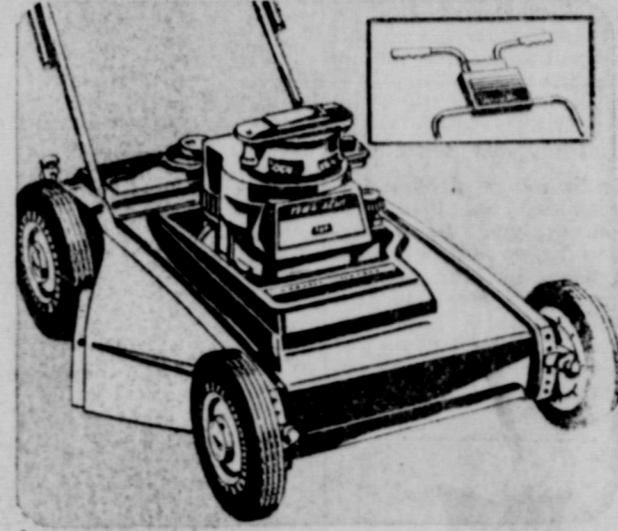

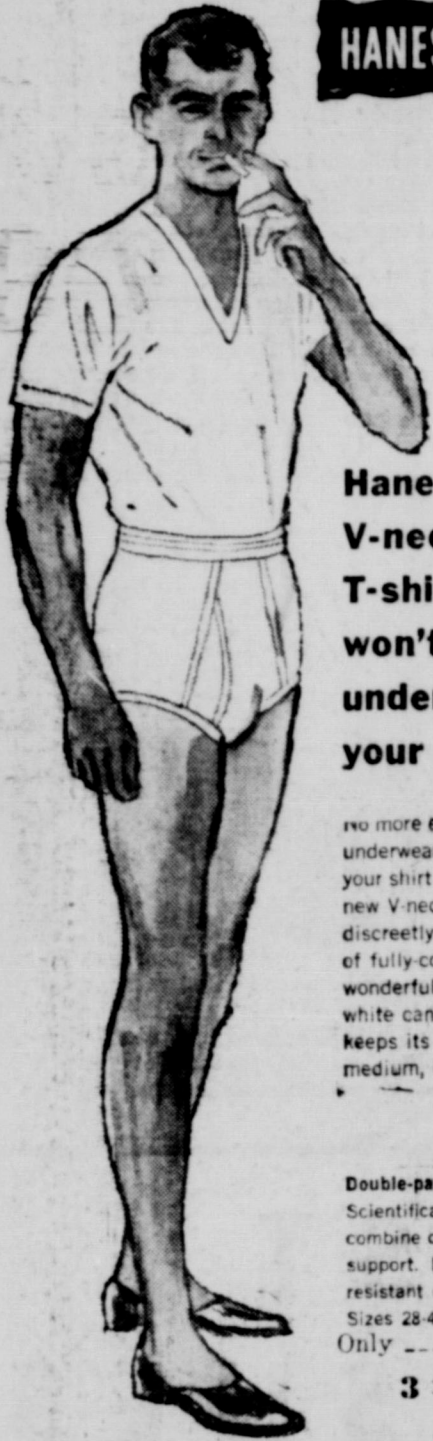

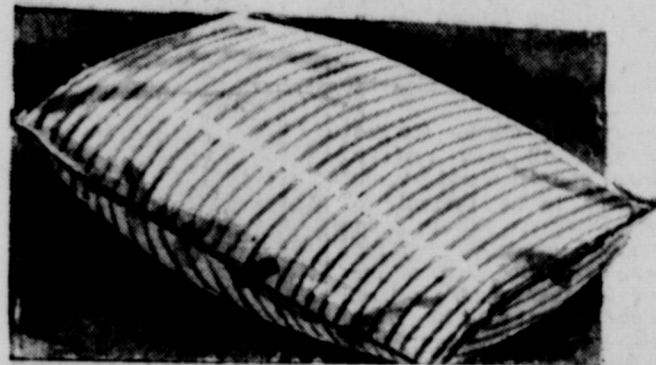
