determiner of what constitutes "nuisance." Definition of nuisance is

listed by the ordinance as: "It shall be unlawful for any person to establish, or, where already established, to conduct or carry on any trade, business, vocation or calling which is dangerous or injuri-

ous to persons or property in the vicinity, or which occasions annoyance to the public or the inhabitants of the neighborhood, and the same is hereby declared to be a nuisance. (A complete copy of the ordinance appears as a Legal Notice in another page of this newspaper.) The ordinance was approv-

ed unanimously by the commissioners, who have been plagued for the past several months by complaints from citizens relative to certain conditions that exist in the



Keep this in mind when buying stretch fabric or garments - buy your regular size garment or pattern. There are three types of stretch fabric: 1. Crosswise stretch (some-

times called Filling Stretch) 2. Lengthwise stretch

(sometimes called Warp Stretch) This is good for long pants; however they will need a stirrup under the foot. 3. Two-way stretch. This fabric stretches in both lengthwise and crosswise direction and is primarily used in undergarments and swimwear
