Olden-Eastland Water Contract Is Specific And Protects Both Parties

The mechanics and hardware of the Olden Water Supply Corporation are presently in the engineering stages and the system will probably be "turned on" soon after the first of the year in January or February, sources report.
The City of Eastland, from whom the newly-formed water supply group has contracted to buy water at cost plus ten per cent, will have passed another fiscal year (Sept. 31) by then and will be able to pin down exactly what the rate for the new system will be.
In calculating the city's cost, officials have included the actual cost per thousand (seven cents) charged by the Eastland County Water Supply District; the flat fee assessed by the ECWSD on Eastland and Ranger for bond retirement; and the ECWSD tax of some \$12,000 a year. All tallied and divided by the number of thousand gallons purchased, makes for a rate presently somewhere in the neighborhood of 32 cents per

Jeff Harbin Presently On Farm Bureau Midwest Tour

This "Institute on Wheels" is designed to give a first-hand look at programs carried on by effective county Farm Bureaus in some of the most important farming areas of the U. S. 24 Accidents Injure, Damage But Kill None

The June traffic accident summary for Eastland County has been reported as follows: No fatal accidents, three personal injuries and 21 accidents resulting in property damage, making a total of 24 accidents.

There were no deaths, five persons injured and property damage estimated at \$14,950.

A comparison of traffic accidents in Eastland County, reported by the Texas Department of Public Safety for the first six months of 1965 with the same periods of 1964 is reported as follows:

During 1965 — fatal accidents, 2; personal injury accidents, 23; property damage accidents, 68; total accidents, 93; deaths, 3; injuries, 38; and property damage, \$63,500.

During 1964 — fatal accidents, 5; personal injury accidents, 32; property damage accidents, 64; total accidents, 101; deaths, 5; injuries, 45; and property damage \$81,434.

County Has 6 Students, City of Eastland 2, In OEO College Program

By HOMER TERRY

Eastland County and the City of Eastland are participating in the Federal College Work Study Program to provide part-time employment for certain college and university students.

Some of the jobs these students participate in are with agreement of private or public non-profit organizations. They do secretary and maintenance work.

The courthouse at the present time has six students working. Cheryl Sosebee is doing secretarial work for Agent J. M. Cooper. Cheryl plans to enter Cisco Junior College this coming fall. She works a maximum of 20 hours a week and is paid \$1.10. The county pays 10 per cent and the Federal Government pays 90 per cent.

Also working at the courthouse is Susette Hagan from Ranger. She is employed in the ASCS office.

The Commissioners Court of Eastland also uses one male student in each precinct. They work a maximum 20-hour week and help with the precinct crews over the various county roads.

The City of Eastland has employed two boys with a contract from Ranger Junior College. They are Bennie Rodgers and Ronald Patton, both from Olden. They work with the maintenance department for the city.

Across the country the College Work-Study program is helping more than 45,000 students stay in college and earn an average of \$275 a semester. Some \$11.9 million in Federal funds and matching college contributions of \$1.3 million supported the spring semester programs. The balance of the \$56 million for fiscal 1965 was to be committed by June 30 to support summer and fall semester programs. For the 1965-66 college year and the summer of 1966, it should be possible to assist some 100,000 students, an Office of Economic

Opportunity bulletin reports. Eastland County's Cisco and Ranger Junior Colleges are among 34 participating colleges and universities in Texas.

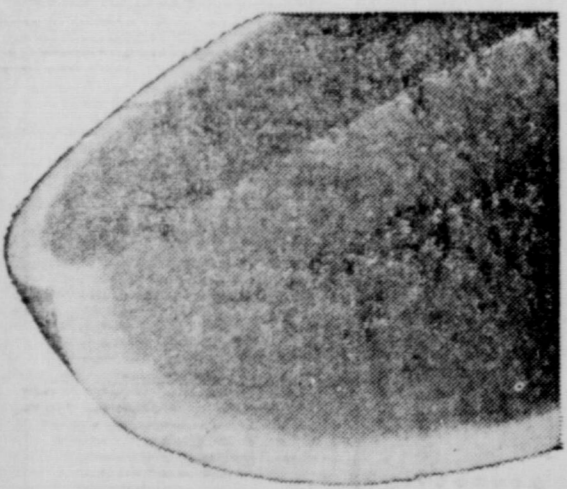

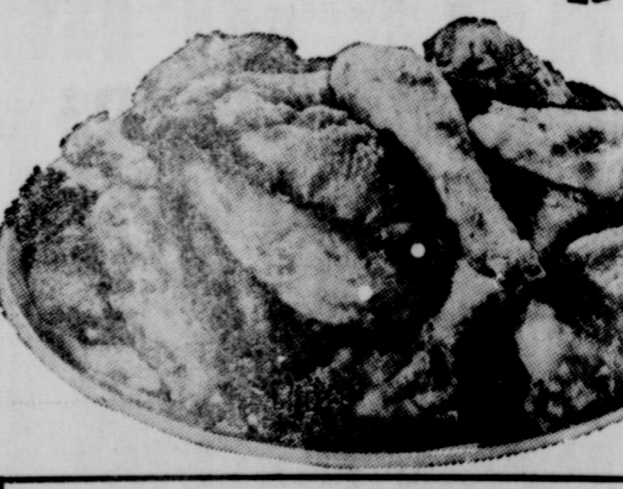
