This is the forecast of Col. Edward S. Evans, Detroit industrialst, inventor, explorer and pioner gliding enthusiast whose job for 25 years has been developing quicker and cheaper methods of oading freight cars.

Tremendous strides have al ready been made by the Army Air Forces, but these developments, according to Evans, are only the beginning.
