JAPAN IN THE SADDLE.

Secretary of State Stimson notified Japan it cannot permit the legality of Japan's occupation of Manchuria, nor recognize any resulting regime imperiling the open-door policy. No voice of the administration would forecast what actual steps might follow for the protection of American interests and the terms of all the international agreements invoked are vague with respect to penalty. A Japanese army occupies Manchuria. "To seize and to hold" has been the policy of all European nations of the Orient and the real master of the Orient. Now how will Secretary Stimson go about it to drive the Japanese from Manchuria and maintain what the late John Hay was pleased to call "an open-door policy" in

As for poor old China, with its population of 500,000,000, it has been the fat oyster for the European nations for ages and ages; it is the hot bed for revolutions and revolutionists, and a stable government has been unknown since the royal house was toppled over and rival heads of rival armies of Chinese have been plucking the golden flowers by the wayside and playing havoc with many sections of Mongolian land.

Japan is a very large buyer of American cotton. Japan has a vast surplus of population. Japan always knows what she wants. She is getting it, and if she continues to control Manchuria, she will at least give it a stable government and protect to the utmost life and property of natives as well as foreigners.

HOOVER READY WITH HIS AX.

Speaker John N. Garner and Joseph Taylor Robinson and their close co-workers are responsible for the democratic tariff bill. They predict that it will be sent from the house to the senate and that the senate will enact it as it comes from the lower branch of congress. President Hoover has promised to veto it. Andrew W. Mellon is opposed to its enactment. Speaking through Under-Secretary Ogden Mills of New York, the administration has announced its flat opposition to the measure and promises to give it the ax, should it reach the White House.
