With increased altitude the density falls off so rapidly that at a height of three and a half miles have at sea level. Above about five miles it is too rare for breathing; hence aerial travelers who go higher must carry a supply of oxygen with them. 

AUSTIN .- Although the total number of new firms which received charters from the secretary of state during 1931-was 3.6 per cent under that for 1930, there was an increase in total capitaling un for the year of about 16 pe cording to the Bureau Research of The Un-Texas.
"The total capitalization of the

"The total capitalization of the 2,116 companies which were incorporated during the year was \$86,096,090, or practically \$12,000,000 more than in 1930," the Bureau's report said. "Even with this increase, however, total capitalization for 1931 is small as measured by the totals for the ten years beginning with 1920 and pales before the record set in 1927, 1928 and 1929 of \$260,000,000, \$390,388,000, and \$285,612,000 respectively. The number of new corporations, on the other hands, showed up rather well in comparison with previous years.

Oil companies accounted for 463, or about one-fifth of all of the new charters granted in 1931, and the number for the year made the public they can depend on the federal government. 


