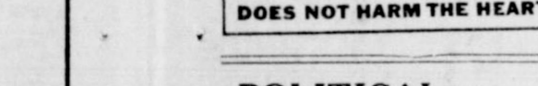

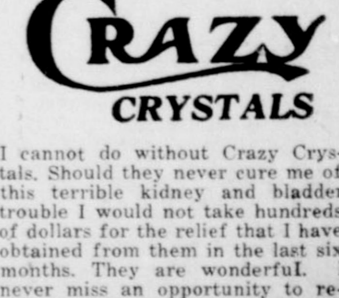
STAFF NEWS
