"Moisture penetration tests by Soil Conservation Service workers showed that on mixed upland range land moisture only penetrated three to eight inches land without a grass cover. This type of soil will hold about one and a half inches of water per foot depth. Thus this land without cover retained only four to seven tenths inches of rainfall or 10 percent to 20 percent of total rainfall. On the same land with a fair cover of grass moisture penetraon was 30 inches and over. Thus this land with cover held three and eight tenths inches of moisture or over 75 percent of the vater which fell.


