Soil Stewardship Week Is Observed In County Area

Eastland County churches joined those throughout the state Sunday in observance of Soil Stewardship Week.

A number of local ministers brought special "Soil Stewardship" sermons in cooperation with the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts.

Soil Stewardship Sunday has been observed in portions of the country since 1945 and was placed on a nationwide basis last year.

The following sermonette is typical of those heard throughout the county Sunday.

"Behold, the days come, saith the Lord, that the plowman shall overtake the reaper..." (Amos, 9:13)

"Amos, the writer of the above text, was not a 'city slicker' or a polished theologian, but a common-cowpunching country boy who left his herd to preach God's Word."

"He draws a promising picture of a harvest so abundant that at planting time men were still gathering last year's crop. Whatta crop! But that is not impossible. If it were not for the modern harvesting machinery of our day, farmers would still be picking cotton or gathering corn and other crops at planting time..."

"We are not dependent upon the cities and factories for our existence, but upon God and the soil. Destroy the cities and factories and an industrial people and a fertile soil will rebuild them, but deplete the soil and the cities will perish from the face of the earth..."

"Man in his present state is bound to the earth, for it is from the dust of the ground that God formed him. His first job was to tend a beautiful garden which God had planted with His own hands: his first food and clothes were from the trees of this garden..."

"God's promises and privileges do not come without responsibilities. The soil is God's trust to man; if he treats it well, it will serve him well... The soil is like

Conservation Farmer Of Year Named

H. F. Park, who lives about two miles southwest of Carbon, has been named the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District's conservation farmer of the year.

Park will receive special recognition and will be presented with the winning plaque at the Eastland Lions Club.

He became the fifth farmer in the district to win the coveted award. Last year Indus S. Nichols was winner, in 1954 Ory Beatty of Fairview in Comanche County won, in 1953 John Smith of Route 1 Dublin was winner and in 1952 the award was presented to R. D. Walker of the Ebenezer community, near DeLeon.

Park, Star Route, Carbon, has proved that conservation pays in many ways on his 255 acre sandy land farm. Little or no rainfall was lost from his land and wind erosion on deep sands was very limited. Crop yields more than doubled those of adjoining farms. Conservation farming for Park is not new, in that, from boyhood he has practiced best known conser-

FIVE NEW LOCATIONS POINT TO OIL ACTIVITIES INCREASE

Five new locations have been spotted in Eastland County to continue the upward trend in oil activities in this area.

The No. 1 Cecil Shults, located 5 1/2 miles north of Rising Star, has been re-opened by J. Roy Derrick, et al, and Edwin B. Hopkins Jr. of Abilene. The operators will deepen the test to the Ranger sand after failure to find oil in the Strawn sand. Proposed depth is 3000 feet with rotary and elevation is now 1573 feet.

Butler-Henry and Irish Drilling Co., et al, of Eastland have staked the No. 1 Anderson and McCrea 10 miles southwest of Cisco one-half mile southeast of a 3,600 foot failure. Proposed depth with rotary is 2990 feet.

The No. 2 E. A. Tate has been spotted by Worth Thomson of Brownwood three miles southeast of Pioneer. Proposed depth is 19-90 feet with rotary.

J. E. Connally, et al, of Abilene has staked his No. 2 Charles W. Lamkin in the Lamkin Ranger field six miles north of Gorman. The test is due to go 3500 feet with rotary.

County Convention May Go Either Way Tuesday

Some surprises may come up this afternoon when Eastland County Democrats get together for their county convention in the courthouse at Eastland. The convention is due to get underway at 2 p.m. and neither the backers of Gov. Allan Shivers or those of Sen. Lyndon Johnson are willing to admit they are defeated.

Although the general consensus is that Johnson forces took a "landslide" defeat here, precinct convention reports filed with the County Clerk do not bear that out. So far only 79 of the 103 delegates who could qualify at this afternoon's County convention can be accounted for. Of the 25 precincts in the county, only 13 have thus far filed reports with the County Clerk. All of the big boxes, in Eastland, Cisco, and Ranger, have been filed, but 12 smaller boxes were still unaccounted for at 10 a.m. today. By law the precinct convention minutes can be filed anytime today before the county convention gets underway.

Backers of Shivers grabbed four of the largest boxes in the county while Johnson backers carried Ranger's two big boxes. Actually, of the 13 boxes reported, Johnson carried six boxes, Shivers five and two boxes are unpledged. Shivers has 50 votes pledged to him, 28 are pledged to Johnson, two are unpledged and 24 votes are unaccounted for. That could mean the convention could go either way.

A lot depends on who is named on the credentials committee, for that committee decides who shall have a seat and who shall not, with the approval of delegates.

Some precincts named more delegates than they are due votes. Those include Precinct 1 and 2 Eastland, and Precinct 5 and 6 in Cisco.

PRECINCT 1 (Eastland)—Dr. James C. Whittington was elected permanent chairman and Mrs. Catherine C. Germany permanent secretary. Fifty-five voters were present and they elected 16 delegates. Delegates are Joe Sparks, Steve Potts, Virginia Russell, Jack Germany, Ben Hamner, Ethel Sparks, Sara Whittington, C. W. Hoffman, James Reid, Jessie Lee Ligon, Jim Whittington, D. O. N. Russell, A. J. Blevins Jr., Tom Wilson, Horace Horton and Virgil T. Seaberry Jr. The group passed three resolutions. The first called for "... the right of the separate states to control their internal affairs," and resolved that Shivers be leader of the State delegation to the national convention. A unit rule vote was called for. The second resolution "... strongly supported a constitutional amendment limiting the government income tax at 25 percent of income," and the third condemned the Supreme Court's ruling of segregation.

PRECINCT 2 (Eastland)—H. L. Hassell was elected permanent chairman and Mrs. Arthur L. Murrell permanent secretary. Forty-two voters were present and the precinct elected 15 delegates to the county convention. Delegates elected were Jack W. Frost, H. L. King, L. E. Littleton, Mrs. W. P. Leslie, Mrs. Frank Sayre, J. A. Beard, Frank Crowell, Henry Ferrell, Don Pierson, Wendell Siebert, Earl Bender, Mrs. Hubert Westfall, L. E. Huckabee, I. C. Inzer and E. C. Johnston. Shivers supporters quickly gained control of the convention and easily had two resolutions in his favor approved.

PRECINCT 3 (Ranger)—A. G. Koenig was elected permanent chairman and Lester Crossley was named permanent secretary. Seventy voters were present and the precinct named nine delegates to the county convention. Delegates elected were L. L. Bruce, Lowe Wallace, Lester Crossley, Roy Tackett, J. J. Eschberger, L. S. Waddington, Mrs. John J. Boen, Lee Dockery and W. W. Mitchell. The convention was completely controlled by backers of Johnson who approved a resolution favoring the Senator as chairman of the Texas delegation and as "... our favorite son nominee for President of the United States of America."

PRECINCT 4 (Ranger)—Dr. Price R. Ashton was elected permanent chairman by acclamation and Mrs. Mary Frances Jameson was elected permanent secretary. Fifty-five voters were present and they elected six delegates and six alternates to the County Convention. Delegates were Dr. Ashton, Pat Thomas, V. V. Cooper, Dave Pickrell, Morris Govenham, and Johnnie Bates. Alternates were Earl Brown, R. N. Rogers, Mrs. Dave Pickrell, Ronald Pruet, W. H. Jackson and Owen Bray. The convention was controlled by backers of Johnson, who approved

PRECINCT 5 (Cisco)—C. W. Reed was elected permanent chairman and Beatrice Guthrie permanent secretary. Thirty-four voters were present and they elected 12 delegates to the County convention. Rotary Speaker Points To Need For More Engineers In America

Ronald D. Burton, speaker at the Eastland Rotary Club Tuesday, told Rotarians that Russia is turning out three engineers and scientists for every one the United States can produce.

Burton said that, "There has been a rapid rise in the number of engineers and scientists turned out by our schools and employed by industry and government. The trouble is, the rise has not been nearly fast enough. For instance: In 1941, there was only about \$900 million spent on all types of research. The latest estimate available—1953—was a staggering \$5 billion. Of this, two-thirds of the total research is done by private industry to find new and better methods of production."

The Rotary speaker said that according to the best available information, the minimum need for

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engineers" from graduating classes is 40,000 each year for the next 10 years.

"Last year we graduated only 23,000 engineers," he declared, "just enough to cover replacement needs without allowing for any expansion of the number of active engineers."

Burton pointed to the fact that Russia graduated about 53,000 engineers in 1954 alone. But he said, "It would be a misrepresentation to say that we were in danger of being swamped if we didn't match the Soviet Union's output."

In conclusion the speaker declared that, "Our problem is not producing more scientists and engineers than Russia does, but rather it is the problem of producing as many as we need; not only for our national protection, but for our national growth."
