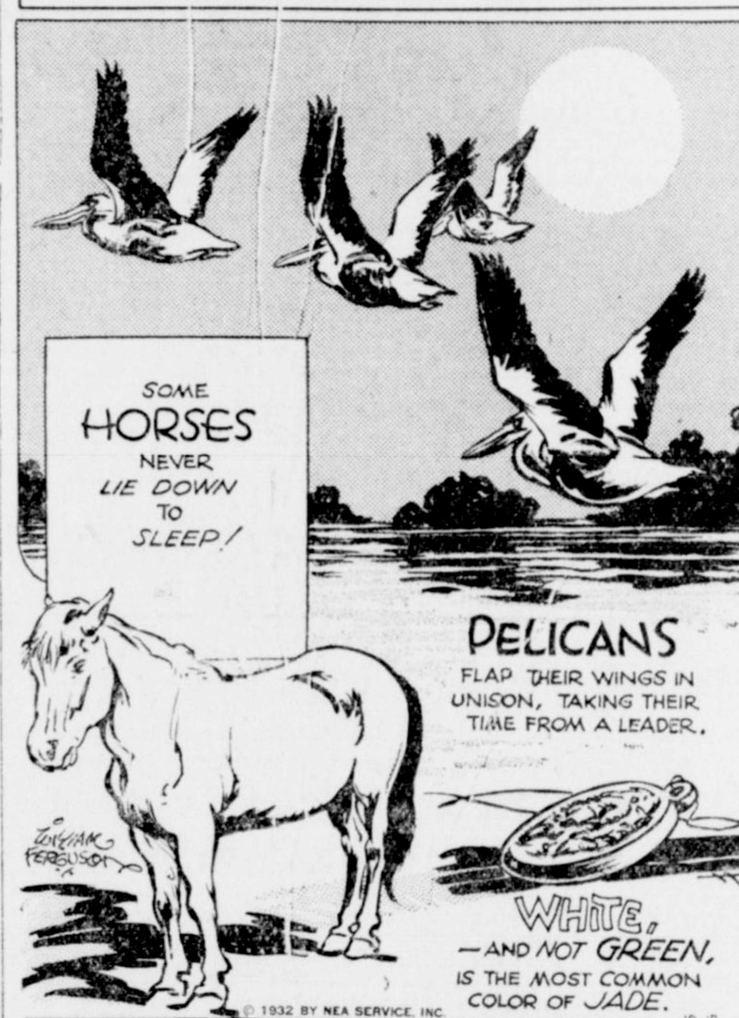

BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

THE Republicans are now sputtering about these straw votes just as the Democrats did in 1928, when the poll returns showed Hoover defeating Smith by a large margin.

Catholic Church History In Texas Is Now Completed

By United Press. AUSTIN—Preliminary work on a six-volume history of the Catholic church in Texas, closely imbedded with the early history of the territory, has been completed after six years.

This material is to be assembled and the volumes written by Dr. Paul J. Foik of St. Edwards university here. The first volume is now in manuscript form and the entire set is to be completed by 1936.

More than 50,000 pages of original and photostatic documents have been gathered under the direction of the Most Rev. Arthur J. Drossaerts, archbishop of San Antonio, who is honorary chairman of the Knights of Columbus historical commission.

The Rev. Gabriel Tons of Waco has contributed a pamphlet on the early church explorers and another with the Espinosa Olivares on the Aguirre expedition in 1769 and still another translated from the diary of the Asperosa expedition in 1716.

A translation of the diary of Father Mansant, founder of the missions at Nacogdoches, has been contributed for the second volume and another on the Ponce De Leon expedition into Texas has been written by the Rev. Francis Borripa Steek.

French Planning A Congress For All World's Ills

By SAMUEL DASHIELL. United Press Staff Correspondent. PARIS—Believing that business depression can be remedied thru the combined study of both practical and theoretical leaders, the Association for Economic Expansion has announced the organization of an International Congress of Industrial and Commercial Expansion here in November.

Having received a favorable response to the first circular, the association definitely has started plans for the meeting. It is announced that the world crisis will be treated in two ways; namely, from the viewpoint of practical business men engaged in industry and commerce, and also from the viewpoint of notable economists, who have devoted years to the application of theoretical principles to the fundamental of natural laws in production and consumption.

The reunion of these two elements has attracted wide attention and the response so far has been sufficiently international in scope to assure the organizers of the representation they had hoped for.

The work of the Congress will be divided into three sections: FIRST—With the organization of production on an international plan, concerning prices, produc-

State Teachers Are Opposed to Home Exemption Measure

By United Press. FORT WORTH.—Fearful for the safety of Texas' public school system, the executive committee of the State Teachers association has declared opposition to the homestead tax exemption amendment.

The proposal is one of the nine changes in the state constitution to be voted on in the general election. It would free approximately 500,000 homes assessed at not more than \$3,000 each from the state ad valorem tax.

Passage of the amendment would stop the flow of tax monies into the public treasury, contended schoolmen who voted for a resolution petitioning the legislature to offset effects of its passage.

Grain Hearing to Be Held November 4

FORT WORTH.—Division of grain fields in the Texas Panhandle into three of four shipping areas will be submitted to the interstate commerce commission at a hearing here Nov. 14.

The proposal has been advanced by a sub-committee of the central grain committee. At a conference here, members went on record as opposed to any rate increase within Texas.

HOKY AND SLIDES

Henry L. Farrell. Clagg's Successor. AMOS ALONZO STAGG'S successor as director of athletics at the University of Chicago is not exactly a "chicken" at the coaching game himself. Oberlin men will tell you something about that.

Oberlin men also will tell you that his name may be officially Thomas Nelson Metcalf, but that they always knew him as "Nellie."

Nellie was quite an end at Oberlin in the year preceding his graduation in 1912 (an A. B. degree). For two years after his graduation he coached football and track at his alma mater, and his 1912 team was Ohio champion.

Now that's 20 years ago, so it is not hard to figure that Metcalf has had plenty of experience.

Revenge on State. IN 1915 he went to Columbia as a graduate student of educational psychology. And coached the football team. Meanwhile his old school fell upon evil days.

In 1916, the prospects were bright for a winning football team at Oberlin. It was discovered before the season opened, however, that most of the members of the squad, at least the stars, were members of sub rosa fraternities, and fraternities were forbidden fruit at Oberlin.

Does Something About METCALFE

METCALFE returned to Oberlin in 1918 as coach and acting director of physical education. The material suddenly picked up. By 1921 Nellie had a crackerjack team on the field—and a game with Ohio State.

Oberlin's team was last but not least, and was second choice in the warring.

It appeared Oberlin was in for another drubbing, however, when the first half ended with the score 6 to 0 favoring Ohio State. But Metcalf's "educational psychology" administered to the squad between the halves had an electrical effect, and it was a dynamic machine, rather than a football team, that came out to fight Ohio in the third period.

That team marched down the field for a touchdown, kicked goal and went home with a 7 to 6 victory over Ohio State to its credit.

That year anybody on the campus would have jumped off the end of the earth for Nellie.

Rewards Scrub. AT the football banquet, when he was handing out the sweaters bearing their proud "O" to the members of the team, one sweater was left over after all those who earned their monograms had received the awards.

"This sweater," said Nellie, "is for a man who hasn't played a game for Oberlin. But he has done more. For three years he has been a scrub, and has faithfully taken the abuse and suffered the hardships a scrub must take."

And did the boys whoop it up for Nellie then?
