Test On Major Discovery Due

Completion of the No. 1 Crawford Thruwell, being drilled by the Jack Grace Drilling Co. of Wichita Falls, is still in the "cleaning stage" but has produced some oil.

The well was shut down Thursday when available storage was used up, but more storage has been brought in. Official test on the well, located about 16 miles southeast of Eastland on the Leon River banks, is expected early this week. The new test has been described as a "major discovery."

In other area oil news: **CALLAHAN COUNTY** Moore and Gilmore of Midland have staked their No. 1 H. W. Wooten as a wildcat try. The test is located 1650 feet from the north line and 2310 feet from the west line of Section 62, L. A. L. Survey, seven miles northwest of Putnam on a 320 acre lease. Proposed depth is 2500 feet to the Moran sand with rotary.

For instance, most county seats end up with a picture of the courthouse on the front of the phone book. We just happened to be using the phone a lot the other night and noticed that Maw still hadn't taken the "Spirit of Communication" off the front and replaced it with the courthouse, or maybe even Old Rip. It's about time for the new phone books, and what with Bell asking — although not openly — for a rate increase, it looks like we could get one, doesn't it?

Anyone want to question the fact that Eastland is fast becoming known as Texas' fishing capital? The following article, along with a picture of three Lubbock fishermen holding a huge string of fish, recently appeared in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal: "A three day trip by three Lubbock fishermen has furnished information which will be worth your consideration. The three fishermen are pictured above.

Cotton Gordon explains that it's an easy four hour drive to Eastland, Texas. Eastland is surrounded by excellent lakes that yield every type of fish this state has to offer. Within 50 miles of this city the following lakes are located: Eastland Lake, Lake Leon, Powerhouse Lake, Lake Daniel, Lake Tucker, Clearman Lake and Lake Cisco. Until this past week, Gordon wasn't aware these lakes even existed, but three days of plug tossing makes them very real now. He reported the lakes are full and running over with bass, channel cats and crappie.

"These fishermen three took 12 crappie, averaging two pounds from each — a lake just opened up — on artificial lures. The best successful lures were A. J. Reflex, Spinners and Olympic Spinners. In three days of fishing they took 60 bass, the largest being in the three pound class, and the others from one to one and a half pounds to two pounds. Most were taken on L&S Mirrolures and Swimming Minnows, Johnson Shoons and Smokey Joe Dymie Doodles.

"While three lakes were tried out, best success was on new Lake Leon. Clearman Lake gave the group some excellent fly fishing. There they found an abundance of bluegills and zoogles eyes that went better than a pound and in a hungry way to snap up flies and spinners.

"Thanks, fellows, for letting us know of this new lake which looks like a real comer in the realm of the fishermen. You can rest assured that the South Plains anglers will find the road to Lake Leon before the summer's end."

Jack Carter's No. 1 N. H. Williams, et al., has been spotted as a wildcat. Location is 1650 feet from the south and west line of Section 301, S.P.R.R. Survey, two miles west of Putnam on a 320 acre lease in the east central part of the county. It is spotted one-half mile south of a 3312 feet failure.

The No. 5-A G. A. Bowden, being drilled by R. Denny Jackson of Brownwood, is located five miles northwest of Cross Plains on a 100 acre lease. Due to go 1900 feet with rotary, the try is located 1050 feet from the north line and 1625 feet from the west line of the G. M. Vigal Survey 798.

Chapman Oil Company of Cisco, has staked the No. 7 Schultz-Turner as a wildcat try 12 miles southeast of Abilene on a 160 acre lease. Elevation is now 2185 feet and proposed depth is 3990 feet with rotary to the Strawn sand. The try is spotted 1260 feet from the south line and 2289 feet from the east line of Section 5, Block 7, on SPRR Survey, 12 miles southeast of Abilene on a 150 acre lease.

Gilliland and Co. of El Paso have staked the No. 1 R. D. Williams Est. "B" 450 feet from the north line and 1124 feet from the east line of Section 2269, TE&L Survey, three miles northeast of Putnam on an 83.5 acre lease in the northeast part of the county, one-half mile east of a 4115 feet failure, and west of shallow marginal producer. The test is due to go 2200 feet to the Strawn sand with rotary.

SHACKELFORD COUNTY Kendrick Oil Co. of Abilene have spotted the No. 9 Hooker Trusts Lee Reynolds "A" as a regular field try three miles south-west of Albany, on an 80 acre lease. Location is 200 feet from the north line and 1000 feet from the east line of the southeast fourth of Section 23, Block 11, T&P Survey. Proposed depth is 1500 feet with casing tools.

The No. 2-C W. P. Newell "C" has been staked by James F. Evans Jr. of Breckenridge six miles west of Albany on a 160 acre lease. The well spots 1150 feet from the north line and 150 feet from the west line of Section 13, Block 11, T&P Survey. Proposed depth is 1400 feet with rotary.

A wildcat try 10 miles south of Albany has been staked by Barron Kidd of Dallas. It is the No. 1 Dyer Estate lease, which spots 150 feet from the south and west lines of Section 84, Block 12, T&P Survey on a 40 acre lease. The well is three-fourths of a mile west of a 900 feet producer. Proposed depth is 2000 feet to the Tanehill sand with casing tools.

JONES COUNTY Nelson and Adreus have staked the No. 1 W. D. Baker 510 feet from the north line and 1470 feet from the east line of Section 215, ETRR Survey, 3 1/2 miles southeast of Lueders on a 100 acre lease. Proposed depth is 1700 feet with casing tools.

The No. 1 L. O. Garrett has reached 1585 feet. Proposed depth is 1850 feet with rotary. The Marshall Pipe and Supply Co. test spots 650 feet from the south line and 150 feet from the west line of subdivision 76, G. W. Mahoney Survey 138, 4 1/2 miles southwest of Santa Anna on a 100 acre lease.

BROWN COUNTY H. O. Watts and J. D. Franklin of Bangs are drilling the No. 1 J. D. Franklin as wildcat test 3 1/2 miles west of Bangs on a 59 acre lease. Proposed depth is 1500 feet to the Fry sand with rotary. The well spots 607 feet from the north line and 2490 feet from the west line of the J. H. Grimes Survey 352.

The No. 3 W. G. Thomas has been spotted by T. G. Burgess, et al. of Fort Worth as a shallow regular field try. The well spots 1050 feet from the south line and 1700 feet from the east line of the James H. Grimes Survey 611, four miles southwest of Brownwood on a 193 acre lease.

Eugene Talbot of Tator has received permission to drill a 1700 foot well in the No. 1 Thomas and Ashburn and spots 875 feet from the south line and 150 feet from the east line of V. B. Jennings Survey 355.

Foul Play Hinted In Train Death

Mrs. George C. O'Sullivan, whose husband was found dead in the Texas and Pacific Railway right of way near Santo early Wednesday morning, has hinted that robbery may have been the cause of her husband's fatal plunge from a train.

Mrs. O'Sullivan has revealed that an unidentified man in the men's room of a T & P coach was the last person to see her 70-year-old husband alive. She said that she believed that \$80 or \$90 of her husband's money was missing from his billfold.

When discovered on the right of way, Sullivan's billfold contained \$97.18, but Mrs. O'Sullivan said he had \$200 when they left California and that he had spent only about \$20 on meals en route.

Mrs. O'Sullivan, both former residents of Jack County, were enroute to Dallas, where O'Sullivan was going to have a check of a skin cancer on his face.

Mrs. O'Sullivan reported that she last saw her husband about 4 a.m. when he told her that he was shaving in the men's room and mentioned having an interesting conversation with a man he had met there.

Mrs. Sullivan, falling back to sleep, did not miss her husband until the train arrived in Fort Worth. A brother from Azle was there to meet her and when they found that O'Sullivan was not on the train they asked railway officials to help them.

O'Sullivan's body was found by a T&P signal maintenance man in the meantime. Arrangements have been made for O'Sullivan's body to be shipped back to the West Coast for burial.

City Eyes \$30,000 In Unpaid Overdue Taxes

Legal Steps To Be Taken To Get Money

Eastland City Commissioners Thursday night turned their eyes toward the \$30,000 in outstanding back taxes due the City and voted to begin procedures immediately to get the money "even if it means going to court."

Commissioners, in their regular monthly meeting, gave City Manager A. E. Taylor the go-ahead sign to immediately begin mailing out notices to property owners who have delinquent taxes pointing out to them the steps the City plans to take to collect the money.

Step one will be a series of notices requesting that the back taxes be paid. If taxes are not paid by then the City plans to get the services of an attorney to begin legal steps. Commissioners Cyrus Frost and Horace Horton were named as a committee to check with local attorneys in an effort to get the services of one of them.

City Manager A. E. Taylor told the commissioners that little if any of the back taxes would be paid unless the City got rough. Commissioners agreed and ordered Taylor to collect the money. The City Manager asked that no part payments be accepted by the City, but Commissioners ended up by agreeing to accept partial payments by one plan. If full payments cannot be made, the City will accept a third of the money due, with another third to be paid in two months and still another third two months following. If one of the follow-up payments are missed, the City Attorney will immediately be asked to file suit.

Taylor pointed out that the City needed the money and that many needed things could be done if it were paid. The group agreed to pay the attorney who accepted the job 15 percent of all money collected by him.

In other action, the City Manager rubbed from the agenda an expected request from Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. No representative of the company was present, although some commissioners had been approached.

Taylor was asked by Commissioners to request that the State place a traffic light at the corner of Main and Daugherty, in front of the Post Office.

All members were present, including Mayor George L. Davenport, Commissioners Frost, Horton, Norris Wilson and T. L. Fagg.

Cisco Swimming Pool Opens For Summer Business

CISCO (Spl.)—The biggest swimming pool in Texas (at least Ciscoans will tell so) is open and brimming full of youthful fun seekers these balmy May days. The Lake Cisco pool, 300 feet wide by 600 feet long, opened May 1.

The pool is a mecca for high school and college classes and club groups for their annual school year end outings. For example, the 100 student senior class from Sweetwater spent Friday in the pool, along with smaller groups from "Strawn and elsewhere.

Manager L. D. Reynolds reports that the pool, which is operated by the Cisco American Legion post, has had from 100 to 200 swimmers daily since it opened. The big pool was built shortly after Lake Cisco Dam was finished in the late 1920s.

The pool is divided into two sections. The upper end slopes down to five and a half feet, while the other section is known as the deep end with water to 15 feet. A new tower is being built in the deep end.

The pool is located three miles north of Cisco at Lake Cisco Park. The park includes a dozen native stone cabins owned by the city, the remains of an old zoo, a huge encampment with facilities for several hundred owned by Mid-Texas Presbyterians, a state fish hatchery, enough barbecue pits and tables for several hundred persons to enjoy themselves, a miniature golf course, and a skating rink.

May is always "the month" at Lake Cisco Park. The Legion Post is now laying plans for a bathing girl revue and program at the park and pool on July 4th.

First of the last group, 30,000 in all, were poured into the newly-filled lake last Saturday.

The attendant from the State Hatchery at Possum Kingdom said that another group of bass would be put into the lake in the next few days. Also, more than 100,000 channel catfish are to be added after mid-June and 107,000 Georgia Red Ear Perch are to be poured in this fall.


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Colonel Dan Pitt Tells Civic League Members of Tour Through Europe With Texas YMCA Members

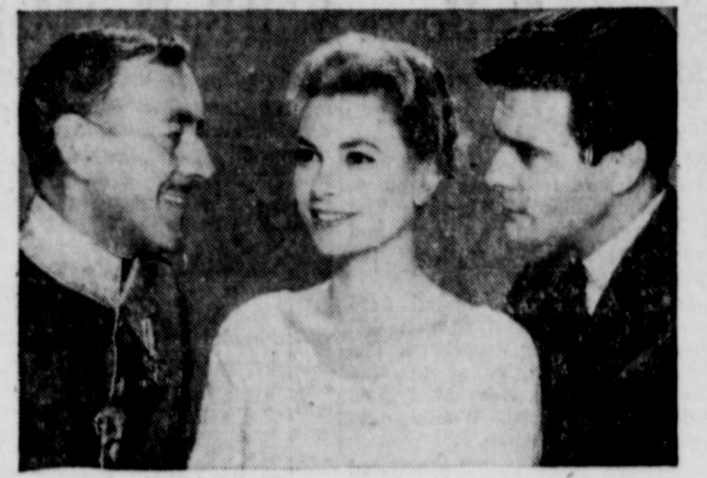
