HINES' PLAN TO PAY VETERANS

Gen. Frank P. Hines is federal administrator of veterans' affairs. He is studying possible means of establishing a sinking fund through which the government might pay the present value of veterans' bonus certificates to ex-service men who desire immediate cash. He made the frank avowal that while possible methods of creating such a fund were under consideration none has been accepted by the administrators.

MANY CONVICTIONS IN DRY LAW CASES

Pro enforcement officers of the federal bureau made 7769 arrests in October, secured 7642 convictions on pleas of guilty with an imposition of fines, federal and state, totaling \$617,490. This record paralleled the results of the preceding month and October, 1931. Since June 30 of this year 17,602 defendants have pleaded guilty and 972 have been convicted. Only 1716 of the cases docketed resulted in acquittals or dismissals. Federal fines for the four-month period totaled \$1,714,047, and state courts assessed fines of more than half a million dollars. In November the repealers came; the repealers swept the country, the modificationists and resubmissionists won control of the new congress, and in the session of that congress in 1933 copy making as well as law repealing and law amending will keep the press correspondents very busy under the big dome on the banks of the Potomac river.

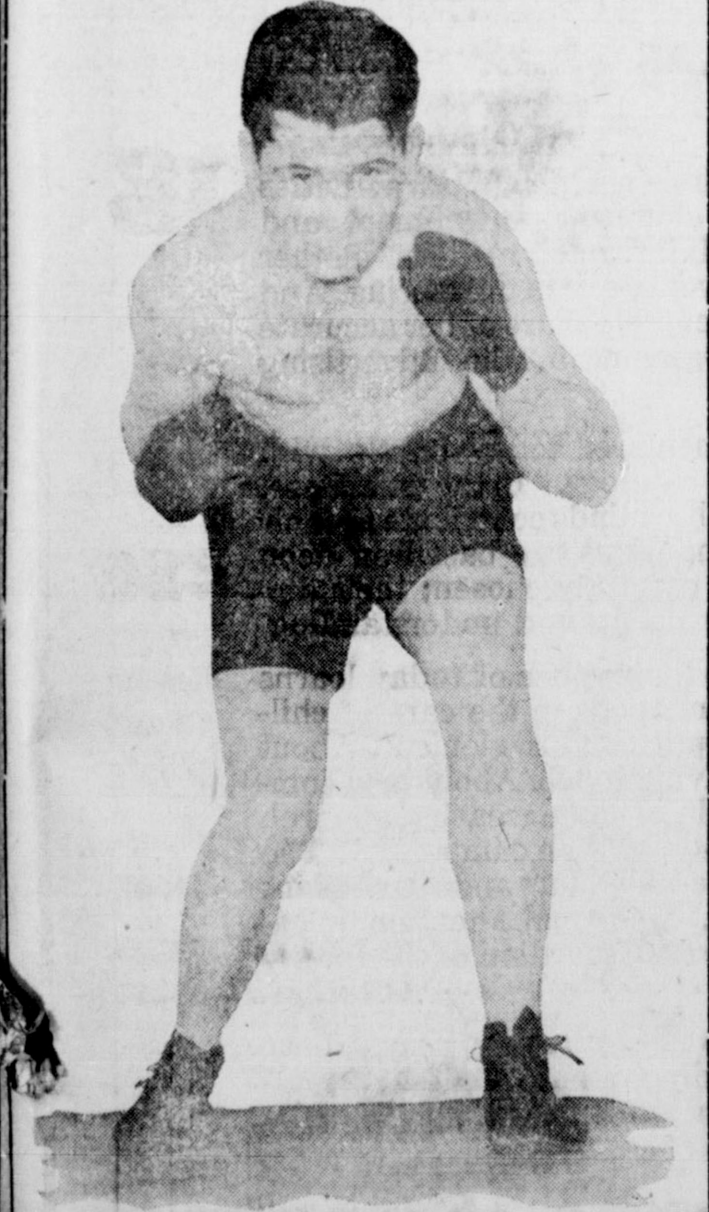

Shophe Moderene To Close Out Stock During This Week

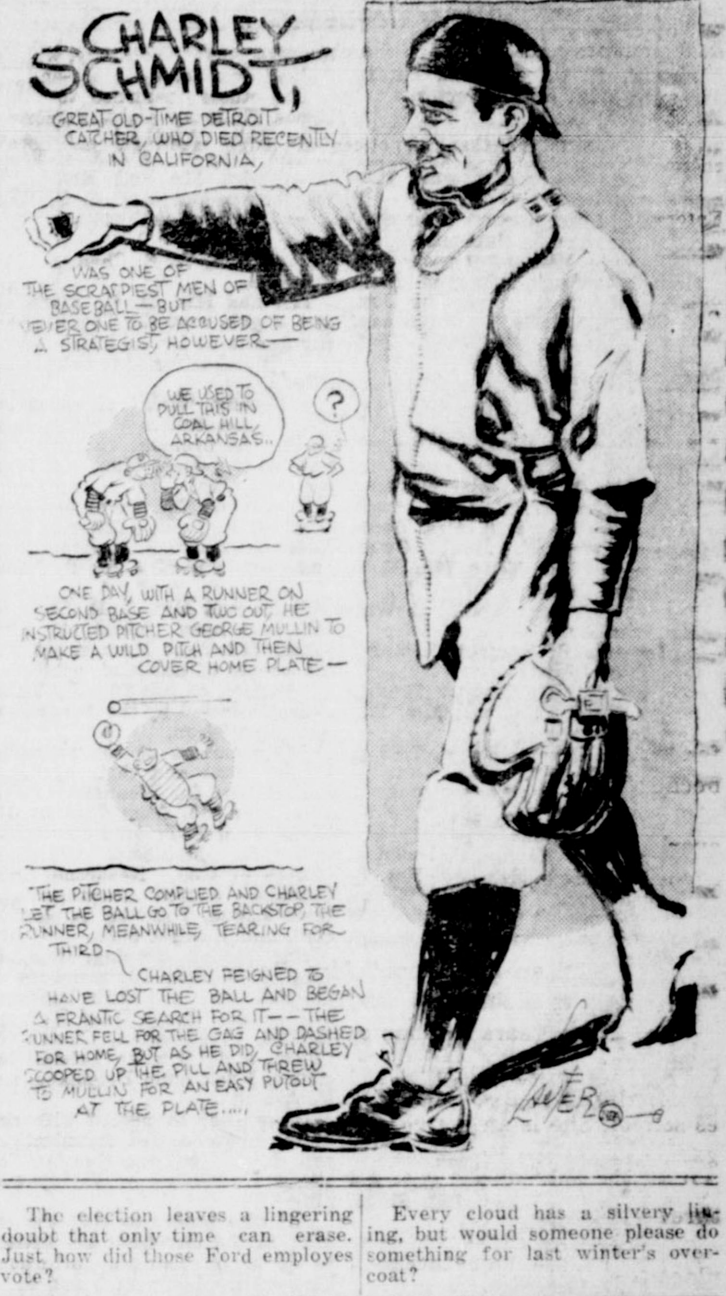

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

NEARLY every mother in the land today is eagerly searching for ways and means to serve meals that will save money without sacrificing nourishment and deliciousness. Perhaps these recipes will help solve the problem because they are for dishes that look attractive and taste delicious, yet cost amazingly little.

Braised Beef
One and one-half to two pounds round steak, ¼ cup diced carrot, ¼ cup diced turnip, 1 onion, 1½ teaspoon salt, ¼ teaspoon white pepper, 2 tablespoons flour.
Trim rim of fat from steak and fry out in frying pan. Cut steak in pieces for serving and roll each piece in flour. Brown quickly in hot fat. Put vegetables into a casserole or deep baking dish and add meat. Rinse frying pan with 2 cups boiling water and pour over meat and vegetables. Season with salt and pepper, cover closely and bake three to four hours in a slow oven, 275 degrees F.
Keep below the boiling point during the baking. Make a gravy with the liquid in the baking dish. Serve with mashed potatoes, buttered beets, head lettuce with French dressing to which chili sauce has been added and old-fashioned bread pudding with liquid sauce.

Liquid Sauce
One-half cup sugar, 2 teaspoons cornstarch, few grains salt, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 teaspoon vanilla or 2 tablespoons lemon juice and a few gratings of nutmeg, 1 cup boiling water.
Mix sugar, cornstarch and salt. Add water slowly, stirring constantly. Cook and stir over flame for five minutes. Cook over boiling water for 15 minutes. Remove from heat and add butter and flavoring.

Old-Fashioned Bread Pudding
The pudding can be baked at the same time the meat is baking. Two cups stale bread crumbs.

Tomorrow's Menu
BREAKFAST: Apple sauce, cereal, cream, browned salt pork with milk, gravy, cornbread, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON: Toasted bacon and tomato sandwich, stuffed celery salad, ginger cookies, milk, tea.
DINNER: Baked spareribs with dressing, sauerkraut baked with mashed potatoes, cranberry salad, prairie whip with custard sauce, milk, coffee.

Scald milk, add bread crumbs and let stand 10 minutes. Add remaining ingredients and turn into a buttered baking dish. Bake one hour or until firm.
