

North Dakota had been dry since it entered the Union in 1889. Arizona's dry law was 18 years old. Colorado had voted for prohibition since 1914, Michigan and Oregon since 1916. Washington, also dry since 1916, repealed its enforcement act and

New York, in 1923, was the first state to refuse to help enforce the Eighteenth Amendment. Montana and Nevada repealed their dry laws in 1926, Wisconsin in 1929, and Massachusetts in 1930.

By United Press. BOLEY, Okla., Nov. 23.—The attempt of three bandits to loot the Farmers and Merchants bank in this negro town, today, resulted in a gun battle in which three men were killed and one wounded, per-

haps fatally. T. J. Turner, bank president, a negro, was shot down after he tripped over the burglar alarm that summoned a posse to the bank. One of the bandits, a white man, was killed instantly by Assistant Cashier H. C. McCormick, who barricaded himself in the bank vault when the bandits entered. Another bandit, a negro, riddled with gunfire in a pitched battle in the street. The third raider, a white man, whose body

and face were riddled with gun fire, was arrested. All of the loot was recovered.



FUTURE OF PETROLEUM INDUSTRY ASSURED


