Col. Luke Lea was a famous citizen of Tennessee. He was the publisher and editor of important daily news papers. He was a gallant soldier in the World war. He was United States senator for six years. He was a power in the politics and business and finance. While the gambling era was on, he attempted to become a Napoleon of finance. Then the crash came. He was stripped as the dead branches are stripped from a fallen oak. He was indicted with charges of conspiracy to violate the state banking laws of North Carolina in connection with the failure of the Central Bank and Trust company of Asheville. His financial ramifications covered several states. He was convicted by a jury and is under a six to 10-year prison sentence behind the bars. His son, Luke Lea, Jr., was given the alternative of a two to four-year prison term or the payment of \$25,000 in fines and costs. Wallis B. Davis, president of the bank and a co-defendant, was given a sentence of four to six years in prison. Well, the Leas appeal-"ed to the supreme court of North Carolina, asking for an order staying their sentences. They asked for a new trial on the grounds of new evidence. They lost, Now Davis has bowed to the inevitable. He will shortly begin serving his sentence. As for the Leas, they are on the way to prison. Think of the fall of the mighty from the Alpine heights. Luke Lea was widely acclaiemd as a scholar and a gentleman. He was a gallant soldier. He was a noted publisher of important newspapers. He was a United States senator. His appetite was not appeased. His ambition was to become a Napoleon of finance. He covered a lot of territory in that field. Now he is broken, his fortune has disappeared and the gates of the pen yawn to receive him. Money is not all in this life of yours.


