## City Manager Resigns Post To Return To Mount Pleasant

### Resignation To Be Effective July 1

A. E. Taylor, city manager in Eastland for the last three years, has resigned, The Telegram learned this week.

Taylor's resignation came at a called meeting of the City Com-

mission Tuesday. It was unexpected, according to some members of the Commission.

The resignation will become effective July 1, Mayor George L. Davenport said. Taylor will return to Mount Pleasant where he will resume duties as city manager there. He held the position until accepting his post in Eastland.

Taylor will take advantage of a two weeks vacation and will actually leave two weeks before July 1. Mayor Davenport said no decision has yet been made regarding a replacement for the top City administrative job.

"We haven't actually had a meeting yet," the Mayor said, "and there really isn't any great rush since we have until July 1."

Only three members of the commission attended the Tuesday meeting, which was unannounced. Mayor Davenport, and Commissioners T. L. Fagg and Cyrus Frost were present, according to Mayor Davenport.

## Hanson Quits RJC For McMurry Bid

J. D. Hanson, glittering hurdler and sprinter for the Ranger Junior College track team and a grid letterman, said Wednesday that he would enroll at McMurry College at Abilene this September.

Ranger Junior College Athletic Director Tom Hestand had been counting heavily on Hanson to return to school and football in the fall where he would have been a solid choice for a starting position at halfback and a limited amount of quarterback chores.

Previously, Texas Tech had announced that Hanson would enroll at Lubbock at mid-term but Hanson changed his decision Wednesday.

Hanson would have had to finish the fall semester at Ranger Junior College to be eligible at Tech, whereas he will be eligible at McMurry in September.

He is the son of Mrs. Alice E. Hanson of Eastland and lettered in football, basketball and track for four years before entering Ranger JC in 1954.

The 21-year-old hurdler set new records of 23.3 and 14.7 in the low and high hurdles in the Pioneer Conference meet at Stephenville and was high individual with 14 1/2 points after finishing second in the 100-yard dash, fourth in the shot put, and running a leg on the second-place 440-yard relay team.

Hanson defeated Fischel in 9.7 in a four-way meet but Fischel won the Pioneer 100 in 9.7 after tying the conference record of 9.6 in the prelims.

The former Maverick shared the Class B state schoolboy low hurdles record of 19.4 with two others until Donald Beard of Thorndale ran a 19.3 in the 1956 meet.

In his senior year at Eastland, Hanson won the lows in 19.4 and placed second in the highs at the state meet.

He has lettered at halfback two years at Ranger JC and was a starter last fall.

In the four-way meet in which Fischel lost his lone 100 of the year, Hanson scored 17 1/2 points for high individual.

He was voted the Outstanding Athlete in the junior college division of the ABC Relays at Big Spring this year after scoring 16 1/2 points.

Earlier in the year in a dual meet with Arlington State he had scored 18 points.

## Postmaster Here Attends State N.A.P. Meeting

Postmaster Marene Johnson attended a special Postal Seminar in Lubbock last weekend which was held at the Texas Chapter 18 of the National Association of Postmen of the United States.

Hon. Amos Howard, Lubbock postmaster, was host to over 400 Texas Postmasters assembled to attend the Seminar and hear Norman R. Abrams, assistant post master general, Gerald Cullinan, assistant to the postmaster general, and many others from the department in Washington. The Texas officials were present to answer many of the questions and problems presented in the forum.

Mrs. Johnson said that she was very much impressed with the tremendous stress used to promote an improved service to patrons and at the same time to cut operating costs to eliminate the deficit which has been dominant for so many years. She pointed out that the present rate on second class mail in Eastland office—mailing for one week by one firm which paid less than \$3 to mail it, cost the department \$5.46 in man hours just to handle it, without the carrying charge added for its actual delivery. ### LEGAL NOTICE

#### NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC

Under the Laws, Rules and Regulations governing Lake Leon as passed and put into effect as of July 12, 1955, ARTICLE X, Section 9 has been revised as follows: The doing of any act forbidden to be done by this ordinance, or the failure to do any act required by the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed to be a misdemeanor, which, in case of a lawful conviction thereof shall be punishable by the infliction of a fine of not more than \$200.00 plus cost of court. The fines collected shall be payable to the District and shall be credited to its recreational fund. In case of assessment of fine hereunder and the refusal or inability of the guilty persons to discharge and such fine together with cost of Court incurred by reason of the prosecution of the offense, the Court may order any such person committed to the County Jail to serve out any such penalty at the same rate of credit as would be done in case of correction of a misdemeanor under the Laws of the State of Texas. It, however, is provided, that no such imprisonment shall be ordered by the Court of Jurisdiction unless this District makes provision to reimburse the County for the confinement and maintenance of any such person at the same rate per day as would prevail in the case of confinement of a county prisoner, or upon any other basis of a compensation which may be agreed between the County Commissioner's Court and the Directors of this District. The penalty hereby authorized shall be in addition to any other penalty provided by the Laws of the State of Texas, or by the laws of the United States of America, and may be enforced or imposed under complaints filed by the District, its Peace Officers, or any other interested person, in an appropriate court of jurisdiction.

Any person, persons, firm or corporation found guilty of violation of any section or sections of this ordinance shall upon request of the District, surrender his permit or lease for suspension or cancellation by the District. In event of such suspension or cancellation by the District, any fees which may have been paid by the permittee for such permit, shall automatically be forfeited, and the District shall not, in any event, be liable for the return or refund of any part thereof.

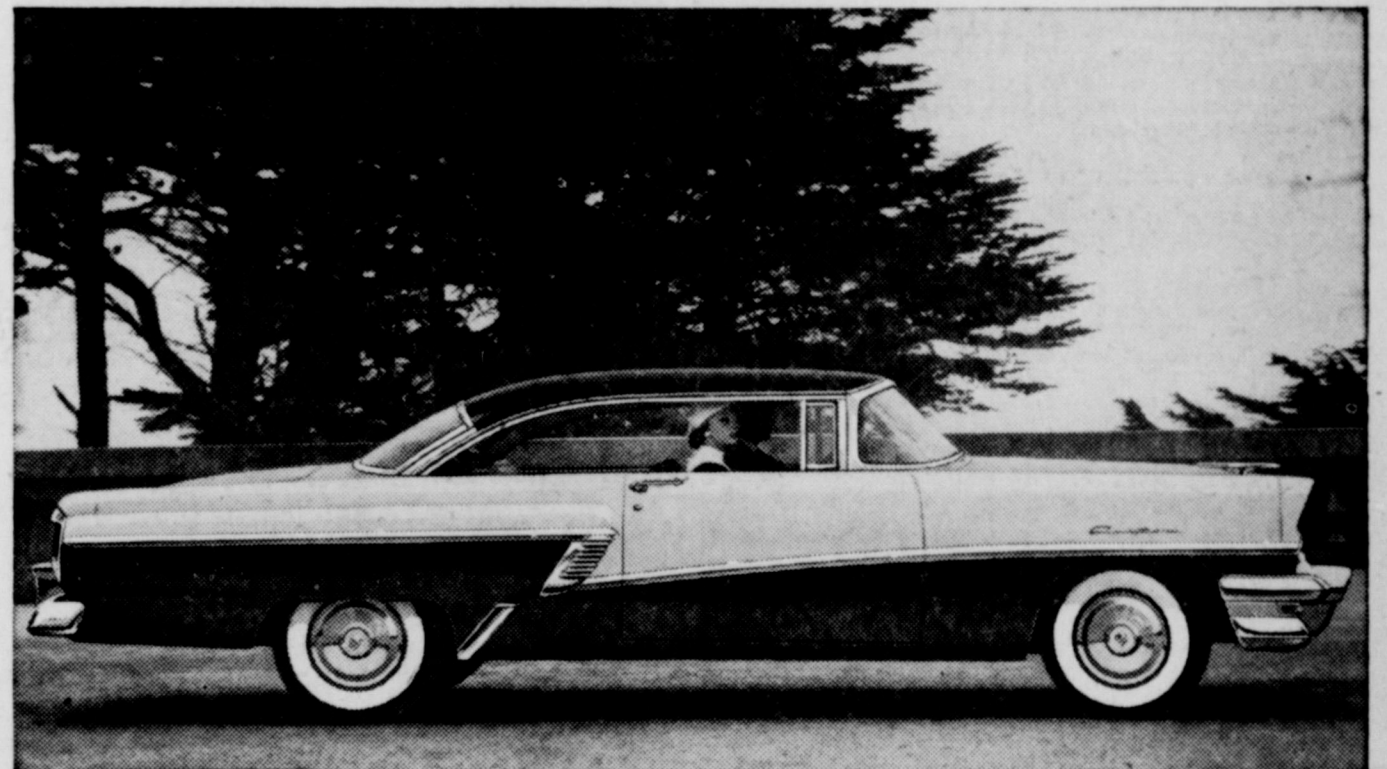

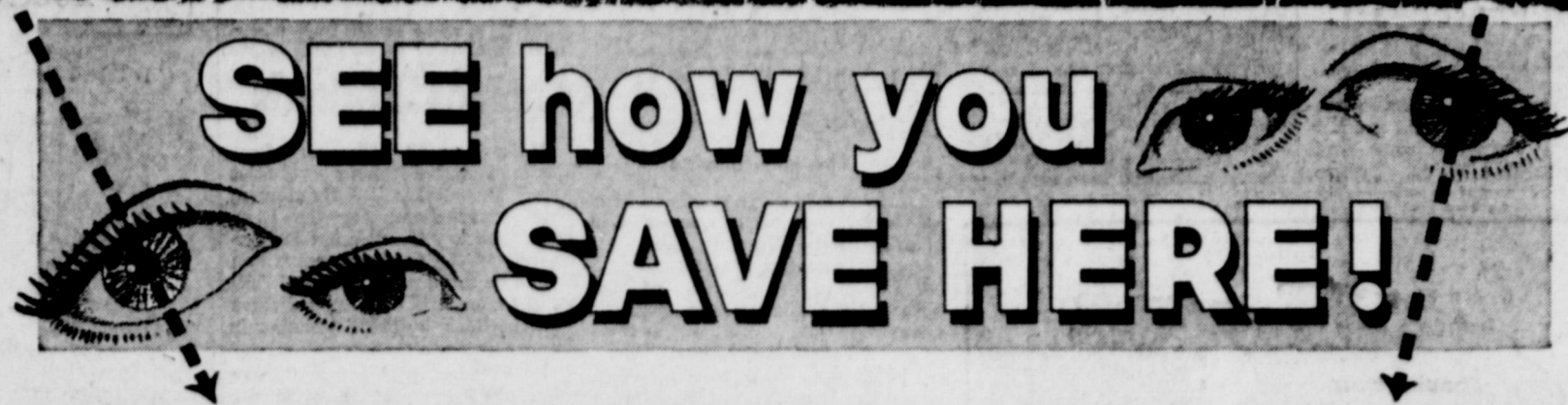

## Veterinarian Tells Of Bang's Disease Control Methods

More than 50 dairymen from Eastland and Stephens counties heard Dr. James B. Henderson, chief veterinarian for the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas, tell of the requirements which had to be met by dairymen of Texas in the control of Bang's disease or brucellosis before September 1, 1958.

Dr. Henderson stated that three years ago a law was passed by the State Legislature giving the dairymen of Texas five years to meet these requirements and have their herds clean of the disease. This five-year period expires in September, 1958, and Dr. Henderson suggested that dairymen start now to accomplish this by having official vaccinations of their herds.

Following the meeting, which was held Tuesday night at the Ranger Community Club House, a discussion period was held for questions and many details of the two plans were cleared for the two-county group.

Dr. Henderson explained two plans and declared that every dairymen in the state must adopt one of the plans to rid their herds of the disease by the deadline.

### PLAN A

Regulations governing the establishment of a certified Brucellosis-free herd:

A herd may be certified as brucellosis-free by conforming to either one of the following two procedures:

1. The owner shall present the entire herd for a periodic blood test at intervals of not more than 60 days, until all infection has been eliminated. The herd may be certified as brucellosis-free when it has passed three consecutive negative tests, with the first and the certifying (or third clean) test not less than 12 months apart.

2. It is provided that where there is no evidence of infection on the first test, a herd may be certified as brucellosis-free when it has passed one additional clean test, conducted not earlier than 6 months from the date of the first test.

a. All suspects must be removed and held separate and apart from the negative animals of the herd and presented for retest between 30-45 days after first showing suspicious, or more often at the discretion of the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas or the attending veterinarian.

b. The owner may, or may not, have his heifer calves officially vaccinated under this plan, but should he decide to have them officially vaccinated, they shall be officially vaccinated as follows:

1. They shall be vaccinated by a licensed accredited veterinarian with a brucella abortus vaccine that is approved by the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas and the United States Agricultural Research Service (formerly called Bureau of Animal Industry).

2. All heifer calves shall be vaccinated between the ages of six and ten months.

3. Each officially vaccinated calf shall be identified by being tattooed in the ear (right ear preferred) with the digit or digits of the month, a "V" and last digit of the year (For example: A calf vaccinated in April, 1954 would be tattooed 4-V-4). Such other means of identification as may later be mutually recognized by the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas and the United States Agricultural Research Service may be used. All official vaccinations must be reported within 48 hours by the attending veterinarian to the office of the Livestock Sanitary Commission for approval.

c. The owner shall make herd additions only as follows and all official health certificates and official vaccination certificates of herd additions shall be forwarded immediately to the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas for approval.

1. Cattle from certified brucellosis-free herds without test, if accompanied by official health certificate indicating status of herd of origin.

2. Officially vaccinated animals up to 30 months of age if accompanied by a certificate of official vaccination; if the animals are over 30 months of age, they shall be required to be negative to the blood test.

3. All other cattle over 6 months of age are required to be negative to a blood test within 30 days

## Food Sense—Not Nonsense



### Heed The Storm Signals

By heeding storm signals one can avoid a deluge of small fry stubborn "No's!" which may rival a hurricane for upsetting mealtime atmosphere. Knowing how to recognize the forerunners of "table time storms" is almost a necessity for parents.

Children with hearty appetites are parted—a fact to remember when otherwise healthy children dawdle over food. The best food can fail to appeal if emotions are in a turmoil. Where meals are peaceful, stubborn feeding problems are not apt to occur. The dining room should never turn into a court of appeals with father forced to play judge and mother is on the jury. Excitement of any kind—particularly anger, fear or other intense emotions—hinders digestion.

The overly hungry, overly tired child does not enjoy his food. School age children, constantly on the go, should have a few minutes rest or quiet before meals.

Children with hearty appetites at mealtimes and who eat a good variety of foods, often are genuinely hungry by mid-morning or afternoon. They need an "extra meal"—a sandwich of enriched bread and a glass of milk or some fruit—eaten at mid-morning or after school to supply required nutrients and energy.

New foods or new ways of serving well-liked foods can help keep mealtime interest high. To avoid an "I won't eat it" storm, only one new food is offered at a time. Only small portions of it are served the first time.

It should be kept in mind that children like simple, colorful foods—foods neither too strongly flavored nor highly spiced.

Youngsters' attitudes follow the course set by mother and dad. Dad's frown or ill-timed comment about a food can bring on a crisis, with mother's plans going around. Happy parents keep family meals a pleasant adventure—in quiet harbors—by steering clear of possible "stormy weather."

prior to movement; after movement they shall be placed apart from the regular herd on the owner's premises for 30 days and then shall be negative to a retest before admittance to the regular herd.

d. Following every blood test all animals designated as reactors shall be permanently branded on the left jaw with the letter "B" according to law and within 15 days the owner agrees to consign them for immediate slaughter purposes only to a slaughtering establishment maintaining either federal or municipal veterinary post-mortem inspection. Immediately following the disposal of the reactor animals, the owner shall clean and disinfect that part of his premises that may be infected at his own expense and as the State Veterinarian or any other authorized representative of the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas may direct. A report of the disinfection giving date and type of disinfectant used shall be submitted to the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas by the supervising veterinarian.

e. After the establishment of an accredited herd, the owner shall have his herd blood tested annually at his own expense, by an accredited veterinarian. If annual tests are negative, the herd will be recertified. Failure of the owner to comply with the provisions of this plan shall be deemed sufficient cause for cancellation of the agreement.

### PLAN B

Regulations governing test, official calfhood vaccination, and the temporary retention of reactors until they can be disposed of for slaughter without excessive loss to the owner under provisions of law—no indemnity:

This plan is designed for herds which show a rather high incidence of infection with some active abortions or herds that contain blood lines which the owner feels he cannot afford to lose.

1. The owner shall present the entire herd for initial test and identification.

a. All reactor animals must be permanently branded on the left jaw with the letter "B" according to law, and if possible, kept separate from all other animals that are negative to the brucellosis test.

b. Present all previously negative animals and official vaccinates over 30 months of age for an annual test and permanent identification until the herd is transferred to Plan A and becomes eligible for certification.

c. When reactor or adult vaccinated animals, that are positive to the blood test, are disposed of, they shall be disposed of for immediate slaughter purposes only, to a slaughtering establishment maintaining either federal or municipal veterinary post-mortem inspection.

d. Known reactor animals, after being identified according to law, may be retained in a herd under this plan not more than three years from the date they react to the brucellosis test.

e. After the last reactor animals, have been removed, the owner shall clean and disinfect that part of his premises that may be infected, at his own expense and as the State Veterinarian or any other authorized representative of the Livestock Sanitary Commission may direct. A report of the disinfection giving the date and type of disinfectant used shall be submitted to the Livestock Sanitary

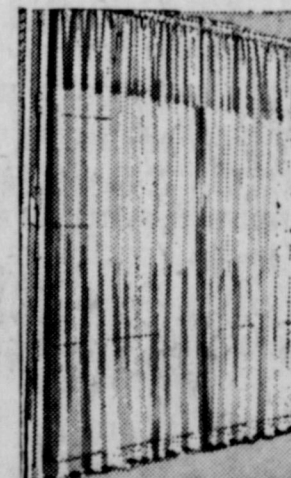

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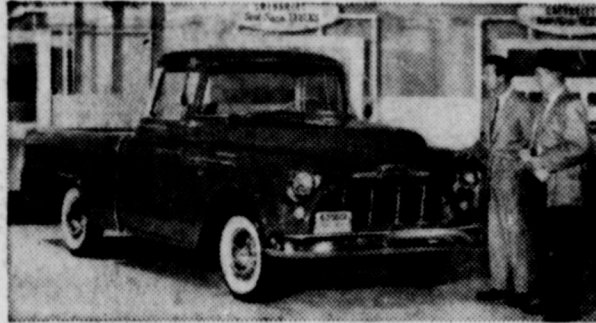

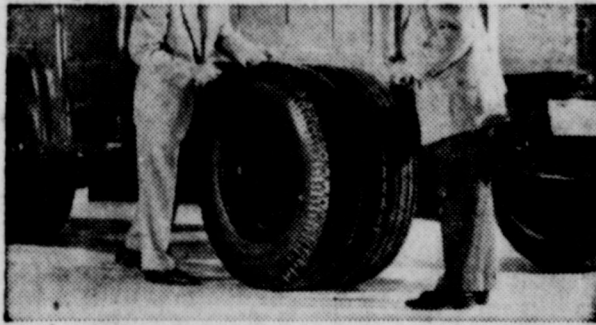

Wheels Carry Books to Army of Child Readers

Who says the nation's children have stopped reading in order to watch television? Detroit's bookmobile, a service of the public library, has proved it isn't so. As long as the kids get the books—they read and read and read.

The bookmobile is not a new idea at all, according to Miss Genevieve Casey of the Detroit Public Library. Before automobiles were invented, a horse and carriage served to bring library books to the public. Now Detroit has several bookmobiles and could use more, so great is the demand for their services.

What is a bookmobile? It looks like a big bus — without any windows, but with two doors — and a bus-type cab in front where the driver sits. Inside it looks like a miniature library, with bookshelves lining both sides. The main advantage of the bookmobile is mobility—it can go anywhere and does, serving 14 communities which are isolated from libraries or branches.

Carries Staff of Five Each bookmobile carries 2,500 books and a staff of five—two librarians, a driver, a clerk and a boy who operates the camera which records all the books taken out. When the "customers" flock in, the staff is kept hopping.

We went along just after school set out the other day to watch. At 3 p.m. several children were browsing at the shelves. By 3:30, the space inside the bookmobile was jammed, and a line half a

block long had formed outside. One boy about twelve stacked up six books, mostly about Indians. We asked him how long it would take him to read all those. "Oh, I'll finish all these by next week when the bookmobile comes around again," he said, and astonished us by saying that he loved to read. He was a healthy outdoor type, too, and what we want to know is—when does he find time to watch TV?

"Business" Is Good The bookmobile does more "business" than most of the city's branch libraries. One day last week, 850 books left the bookmobile in the space of an hour and a half, and 1,400 in all were taken out that day. Of course, about the same number came back so you can see the turnover is tremendous. The central library has a stock of 190,000 books to choose from, and new ones are added constantly.

The bookmobile carries 1,000 books for adults and 1,500 for children, but children account for two-thirds of the activity. So it seems that children will read, and read a lot, as long as they can get the books. That's where the bookmobiles come in.

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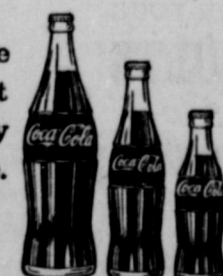


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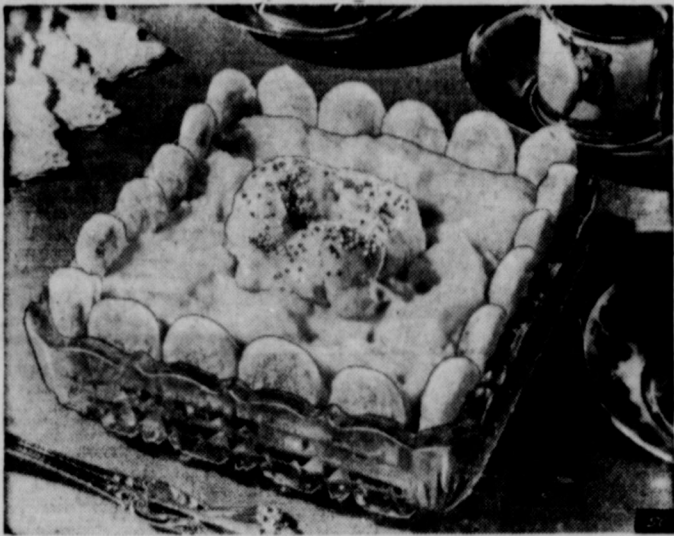

### Firm Shapes Model Haven For Anglers

AUSTIN — Three years from the time it was stocked in May, 1953, a lake created by Aluminum Company of America for industrial purposes has been converted into a fisherman's dream, according to reports to the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

He said a principal attraction is a traffic restriction which bars promiscuous motor boating and gives the angler "some semblance of privacy."

The lake, which is in Milam County near Rockdale, was made originally as a cooling unit for ALCOA's huge plant which produces aluminum with electric power generated through use of local lignite.

Since the water was not contaminated through this particular industrial process, company officials called on the commission for fish management counsel. The lake was so successfully stocked that black bass limits now are common. There also are good catches of channel catfish and bluegills.

The company, under the commission arrangement, agreed to make the lake available to the general public subject, however, to strict regulations designed to aid the angler as well as to safeguard the new Milam County recreation spot. Motors are limited to ten horsepower. Racing is banned.

The 730 acre lake has provided vast material for aquatic biologists since each fisherman registers and reports on such vital statistical data as to time spent angling and the results. For example, records showed that as of January 1, the first year and one half angling yielded 32,500 fish, mostly bass to 30,000 fishermen, and that the prize for the first five pound bass had been claimed.

Also beneficial from the commission viewpoint was the 38 brood bass taken from a small "off limits" spawning lake connected with the main body of water by a narrow channel. The fighting blacks, averaging three pounds were used to reinforce the stock at San Marcos State Fish Hatchery.

Regulations appealing to dyed-in-the-wool fishermen include: no fire-arms or intoxicating liquors permitted; swimming only in designated areas; youngsters under sixteen must be accompanied by parents when fishing from boats; each boat must carry a life preserver for each occupant and no boat may be over-loaded with passengers.

Bird watchers treasure the lake as an observatory during the waterfowl migration periods since the no-hunting rule provides an ideal resting place for mallards, pintails, redheads and gadwalls as well as for countless shore birds.

### Governors Pledge Four Month Safety Campaign

The governors of the 48 states, the Territory of Puerto Rico and the commissioners of the District of Columbia have signed a joint declaration pledging to support the nation's "Slow Down and Live" traffic safety campaign by employing "every available means to make our streets and highways safe from Memorial Day to Labor Day, 1956."

The declaration gives official support to the safe driving program sponsored by the National Conference of State Safety Coordinators. In a separate action, the Department of Defense has sanctioned the program and as a result it will be observed at Army, Navy and Air Force installations throughout the world.

J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association and coordinator of the Slow Down and Live campaign in Texas, said that emphasis this year will be on enforcement and will center around the campaign's central theme: reduction of violations associated with excessive speed, speed too fast for conditions, improper passing, following too closely and failure to yield the right-of-way.

In discussing the program, Musick stated: "Thousands of vacationists will swell our highways during the 'Slow Down and Live' period bringing highway travel and congestion to an all-time high. The declaration by the governors paves the way to greater highway safety through a strong traffic law enforcement program throughout the nation."

"Motorists have a dual interest when traveling by car: to get to their destination and to get there safely. During the active summer months, particularly, they can best do that by careful, cautious driving and by voluntarily supporting the enforcement efforts of public officials and traffic law enforcement agencies and personnel."

Musick said that complete plans for the state's participation will be announced in detail prior to the campaign's opening on May 30.

**BUILDING YOUR HOME**

When you are ready to build, you will find that the law helps in many ways to make your home enjoyable and secure.

Have you decided on the type house you want and the amount you want to spend? If so, then let's go into details!

1. Your lot: Junior's school or your church may be nearby, but find out —
  - (a) Whether they are planning to run a highway through the area or nearby, or make any improvements for which you can be assessed.
  - (b) What "covenants" or restrictions run with the land? To protect residents, the plats or basic deeds of some neighborhoods call on you to build a certain size or type of house. Do you want to and can you afford to?
  - (c) Easements. Either you or your neighbors may need to run pipes, or string wires over each other's land or to share a driveway. Have the abstract checked carefully to disclose any easements.
2. Zoning Ordinances: For your protection the local government frequently zones some areas, for example, for single houses only, for multiple dwellings; for retail stores, for manufacturing, etc. Unless the local governing body changes its zoning ordinance, no filling station, for instance, can go up next to you in a residential area. Neither could you turn your home into a store. In any case, you should find out what your neighborhood zoning rules are.
3. Building Codes: Be certain that the plans and construction will meet the requirements of the local building code as to size, location and structure. Municipal ordinances usually impose strict

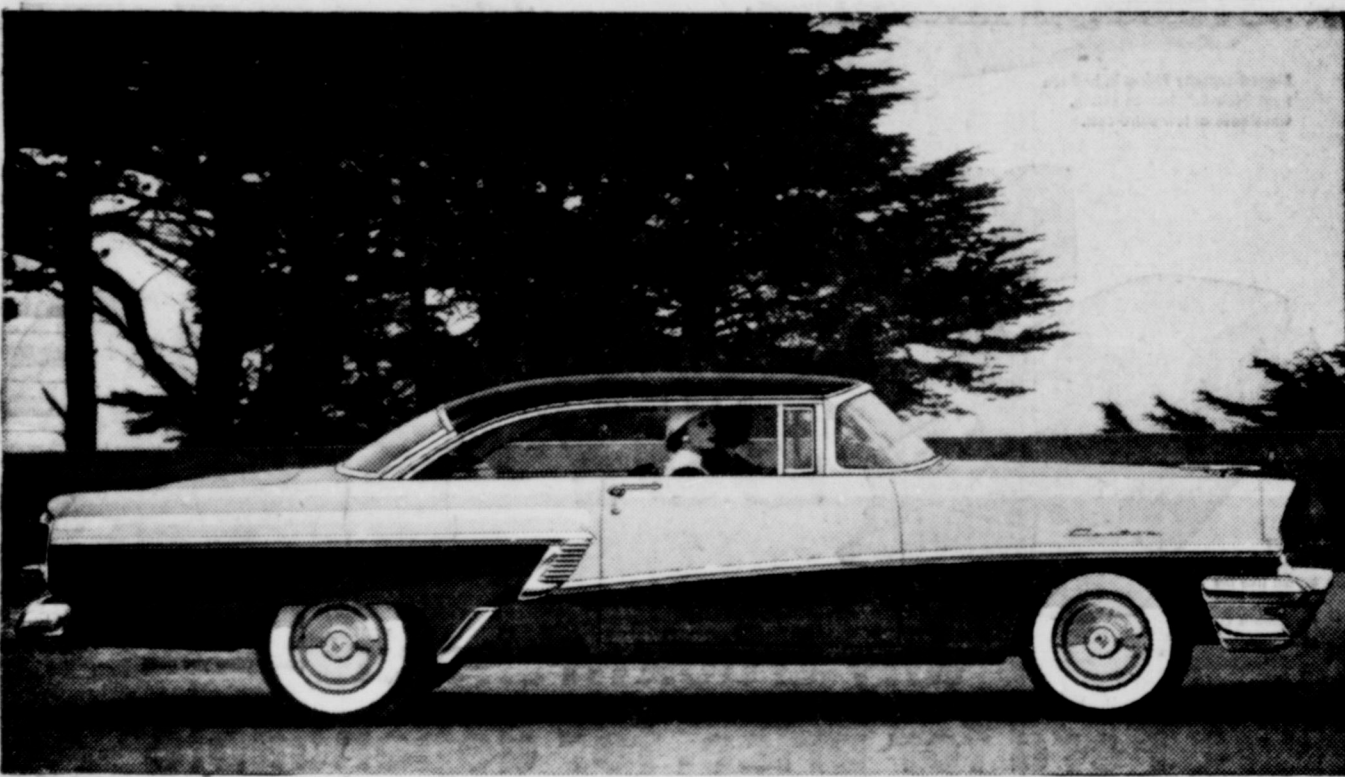
