Mother of Ranger Man Dies Tuesday

Funeral services for Mrs. D. M. Jacobs, 87, pioneer resident of Rising Star who died Tuesday following a long illness, were held Thursday morning at 10:30 in the Rising Star Methodist Church. Rev. R. A. Brooks, Jr., pastor of the church, officiated at the services and burial was in Rising Star Cemetery. Higginbotham Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Jacobs was born on November 28, 1868, in North Carolina. The family moved to Sipe Springs about 1872, where she was married to D. M. Jacobs, who was for many years a merchant in Sipe Springs. Near the turn of the century they moved to Rising Star where Mr. Jacobs operated a store. He went to Okra as a merchant for a short while and returned to Rising Star to establish the Anderson-Jacobs Company in partnership with H. E. Anderson about 1907. After a few years the company sold to Higginbotham Bros. & Co. which established its Rising Star store. Mr. Jacobs died in 1944.

Mrs. Jacobs was a member of the Methodist Church in Rising Star for 50 years.

Survivors include seven sons and one daughter. The daughter is Mrs. Lee Burkhead of Rising Star and the sons are H. O. Jacobs of Artesia, N. M.; M. J. Jacobs of Los Angeles, Calif.; Frank Jacobs of Odessa; Wyatt Jacobs of Ranger; Truman Jacobs of Artesia, N. M.; Eli Jacobs of Big Spring and Paul Jacobs of Ozona.

Two From Here To Get Degrees At Texas Tech

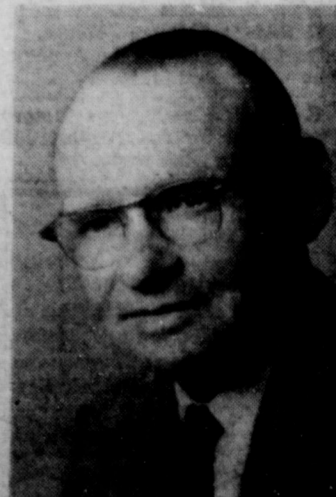
Two Eastland students will be among the 597 students to receive degrees at Texas Tech Monday when the school holds its 30th annual commencement exercise at Jones Stadium.

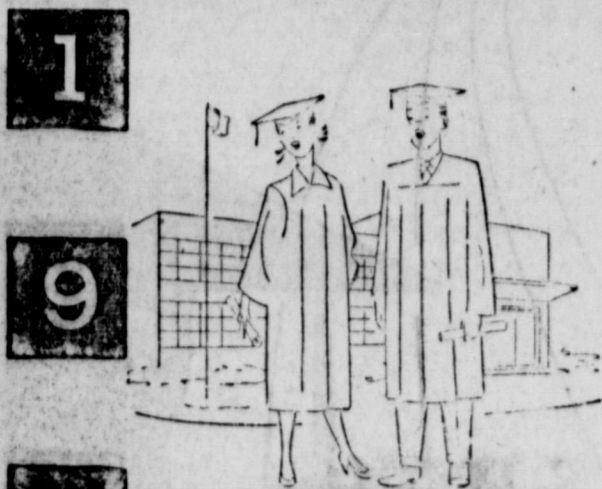

Teachers Wanted Who Have 'What It Really Takes'

WASHINGTON, D.C. — An invitation to teaching — but only for those who really qualify — was issued here today by the National Education Association (NEA) through a new booklet entitled "Invitation To Teaching — If You Have What It Takes!"

Prepared by the NEA's National Commission on Teacher Education and National Association of Future Teachers of America, the publication points out that "teaching in today's schools is an exacting job that calls for top-notch ability. The fact that there is a critical need for teachers is not sufficient reason for just any young person to select teaching as a career. The children, the schools and the nation deserve only those young people who have what it takes."

"Invitation To Teaching" is an attempt to provide up-to-date and accurate information on the teaching profession in as compact a package as possible. It covers today's job openings and opportunities, requirements and responsibilities of teaching and summarizes salary schedules and tenure, leave and retirement plans in all the states. It includes a chapter on preparation for teaching, considering such questions as "How much will college cost?" "How should a prospective teacher select a college?" "What courses should be taken?" and "What are the scholarship, loan and part-time employment opportunities?"

But throughout the publication the emphasis is on the importance of being "cut out for teaching" and answering the question "Would I enjoy teaching?" Many tests are presented for determining teaching aptitude. "But actual experience with children and youth," says the book, "is perhaps the best test. The opportunity to work with children — in Sunday School, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, 4-H, FFA — to help with details of organization, some of them dreary routine, will quickly bring a reaction. If the prospective teacher finds it monotonous, maybe he is not 'cut out for teaching.' However, he shouldn't stop on the first day of that work. Every job has its dull aspects. The real test is whether the inspiring and the thrilling moments offer full compensation for the 'humdrum' ones."

Addressing itself directly to young people, "Invitation To Teaching" says, "Your choice of a career may well determine how you will spend the next 35-40 years of your life. Have you considered the opportunities for building your career in education? There is a growing need for teachers. Opportunities now exist and will continue to exist at all levels. Do you think you 'have what it takes' to become a good teacher? If you do, then you will wish to find out as much as you can about the teaching profession. Remember, it's your life — your decision. Read this presentation carefully — study it. Then, it's up to you!"

Lawmakers Eye War Time Tax On Theatre

COMPO's latest Editor & Publisher advertisement has been inserted in the Congressional Record by Senator William Langer of North Dakota.

Word of this action was sent yesterday by Senator Langer to Robert J. O'Donnell, national tax campaign chairman, who sent reprints of the advertisement on May 18 to all members of both Houses of Congress.

"I agree with you 100 percent," wrote Senator Langer, "as, in my opinion, the theatre admissions tax, the cabaret tax and many of the other excise taxes were enacted solely as an emergency wartime measure and most certainly were never intended to be a permanent yoke around the necks of our people."

Headed "Is It Cony To Talk Of Honor?", the advertisement pointed out that when the admission tax was fixed at 20 percent during the last war Congress stipulated in its resolution of enactment that the tax would end "on the first day of the first month after the date of termination of hostilities."

After reading the advertisement, according to COMPO, several Congressmen wrote O'Donnell that they would support the industry's effort to obtain relief from the admission tax.

Season For White Wing Doves Doubtful

Whether Texas will have birds enough to resume open seasons on white-winged doves this year will not be determined for another six weeks or so, according to the Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission.

He said the once plentiful and popular game bird has been reported in good numbers in upper south Texas but added that the population estimates in the Rio Grande Valley's principal habitat have not been completed.

The season on whitewings has been closed since 1953 because of a severe population slump, dating back to a crisis five years ago when a freeze killed many citrus trees, influencing land owners to convert to field crops. Brush clearing practices have also reduced the birds' habitat.

Meanwhile, plans are going

ahead, said the Assistant Director, for the annual study of nesting conditions in Mexican areas which occasionally bulwark feeding flocks flying northward into the Valley during the early September harvest period.

The Commission moved last year to help relieve the white-wing habitat crisis by arranging with the International Boundary and Water Commission to use a Falcon Lake shoreline area, stretching from Zapata Village to Falcon Dam, for whitewing propagation.

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May the shining years ahead hold great success.

provements and endowment. Last fall, Brown civic leaders participated in the first annual sustaining fund for Howard Payne College. In addition to the Howard Payne Library, students are able to use the Daniel Baker McClelland Library which came to Howard Payne after the merger of the two schools.

Howard Payne has just completed remodeling work on their college theater building. Headed by Dr. McDonald Held, a graduate of Furman, this department is one of the strongest on the campus. The theater itself is one of the best equipped plants in the southwest.

Students relax between classes in the new student center and bookstore building. Modern in every respect, these two fine centers play an integral part in the lives of the Howard Payne students.

All indications point to a new and even greater era in the spiritual, physical, financial, and academic achievement of Howard Payne College. Howard Payne officials are ready to meet the era.

Dry Period Blamed For Nesting Sag

AUSTIN — Temporary relief from dry weather in some Texas areas is counted on by the director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission to check a negative nesting condition among upland game birds in Texas.

Before the April-ending shower period moistened wide stretches of the state, the director received unfavorable reports particularly about mourning doves. These described the popular game birds as forming in flocks which, he said, means at this time of the year that nesting has been abandoned probably because of inadequate food.

"In the hill country, observers noted the last week in April that mourning doves were clustered in flocks of ten to twelve birds," he said. "This is unmistakable evidence that nesting has been abandoned for the time being at least."

The director pointed out that turkeys reflect nesting failure in a similar manner, but said the big game birds still have time this year to set up a hatch provided rain is received on the turkey ranges within the next few days.

He emphasized that turkey and other ground nesting birds, such as quail, require moisture both for the actual hatching of their eggs and for sustenance of the young birds. When it's wet, he said, the poult gets the soft-bodied insects which are so essential to their survival and welfare.

"There is no doubt that turkeys and quail have to make the long haul back," said the director. "And up to now, conditions have not been too favorable. But its amazing how quickly they rally when the weather becomes normal with showers and such to green up the earth."

He went on to observe that the elements seldom are perfect from the animal kingdoms viewpoint any more than it is from the human being's viewpoint.

"Last year, we had some moisture that touched off an excellent mourning dove hatch and a pretty good hatch," he reminded. "But the rains caught the fawn crop at its peak and losses characteristic of moist conditions cost us a tragic share of the young deer due to screw worm infestations."

The director said it is possible that timing of rains could possibly favor ground nesting birds at the present and then taper off and spare the fawns which usually appear in greatest numbers between June 1 and June 15.

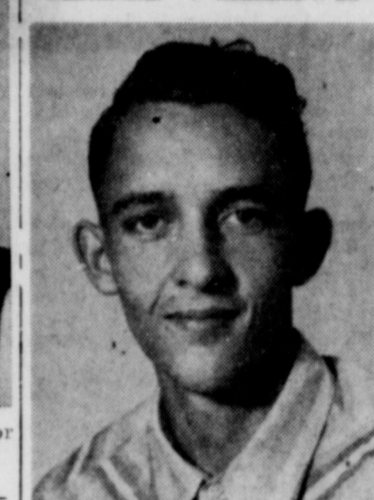

Make Own File Handles
TWO methods of making handles for files are suggested by *Popular Mechanics*, the famous do-it-yourself magazine. Illustrated at the top is a handle made



from part of a wooden coat hanger. Drill a hole in one end to receive a file tang; then file the opposite end and edges smooth.

Curve of the coat hanger fits naturally into the hand. You can cut several handles from one hanger.

A different type can be made by drilling a small hole through the center of a clothespin. After sawing off the tips of the legs, insert the file tang and tape the two parts together as shown.

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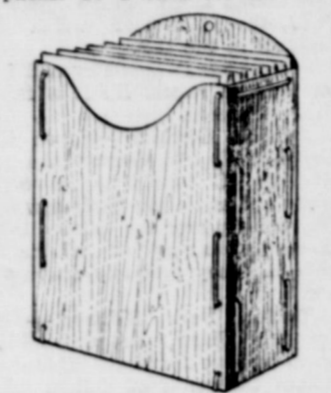
