Handicapped to Receive Awards At Annual Meet

AUSTIN — Three Texas employers and a public service worker will get awards at the annual meeting of the governor's employ-the-physically-handicapped committee here Sept. 18.

But what Committee Chairman Laurence Melton of Dallas calls the "big play" will be reserved for the man or woman who is selected as the year's outstanding handicapped employee.

"The physically handicapped workers make this program, not us," states Melton. "The men and women who make good on the jobs we help them get are responsible for more and more job opportunities. The employer who discards

unnecessary restrictions to accept people able and willing to do his particular work comes back for more employees if that work is done well.

"So the outstanding handicapped worker of the year — that is the award which counts. Not for what the employee has done for himself, but for others."

Over 2500 physically handicapped men and women have found jobs through the program in the past year, so picking a champion worker is no simple assignment.

A glance through the committee's records kept by Tom Greening of Austin, secretary, shows hundreds of deserving cases. Picked at random are the following:

Louie V. Barnett, who overcame the handicap of a traffic accident injury to compile a fine record as engineering clerk for the city of Paris;

Herman D. Lambert of Beeville,

who had to change careers when he lost an arm, and who has made good as a radio dispatcher;

George W. Moore, Jr., of San Antonio, who had both legs shattered by artillery fire in 1945 but who now handles public contracts capably for a department store;

Jean Pierre Lequet of Beaumont, who suffered a brain concussion in Korea in 1952, but is rated high by a dealer in household appliances. (In his spare time he is mastering foreign languages and hopes to enter government service as an interpreter);

Horace Lemond of Harlingen, who lost his right arm in an accident but is a crack car body repairman nevertheless;

Mrs. Marilyn Green Page of Tyler, a helpless polio victim in her teens, but a competent legal secretary today.

The list goes on and on. An Abilene man blinded suddenly. A Wacoan crippled by an accidental gun shot. A Corpus Christi juvenile worker who found a new trade when osteomyelitis meant the end of his carpentering days. A Longview oil field switcher who gave up training Tennessee Walkers because a strep infection in his left ear destroyed his sense of balance.

Out of hundreds of such Texas cases of courage and ambition will come the "champ-peen" here Sept. 18.

Melton will call the state-wide committee to order at the Commodore Perry hotel at 9 a.m. Some 50 heads of local committees will be in attendance. The group will appraise results of the 1956 campaign and plan its 1957 activity. Gov. Allan Shivers will present all awards.

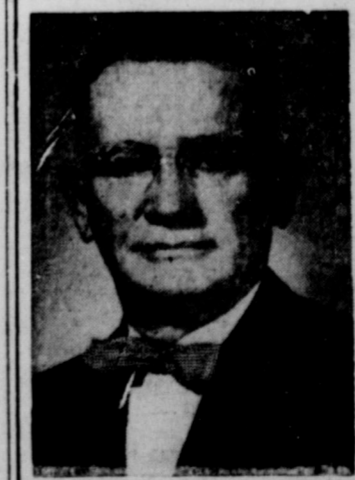
