Seaberry, State Bar Vice-President Nominee, Has Distinguished Career

Virgil T. Seaberry, who has recently been nominated for vice-president of the State Bar of Texas, was born at Poolville in 1892. His parents and grandparents were pioneer settlers of Parker County. He finished high school at Poolville, was graduated from the Southwest Texas Normal at San Marcos, taught school two years and attended the University of Texas from 1912 to 1915.

Mr. Seaberry was admitted to the bar by examination in 1913, and later received his LL.B. degree from the university in 1915. While a student in the university, he was a member of the student assembly, tutor in public speaking and on the debating team.

He practiced law for a short while in Paint Rock and Fort Worth prior to his entry into the Army where he was an artillery officer during the First World War. While in the Army, he and John W. Turner of San Antonio became intimate friends.

Upon their discharge they came to Eastland during the Ranger oil boom and organized the firm of Turner & Seaberry on January 1, 1919. They practiced civil law as partners until Mr. Turner's death

in 1952. From 1923 to 1941 Carl P. Springer was a member of the firm then styled Turner, Seaberry & Springer. Mr. Seaberry and his son are partners still operating under the name of Turner & Seaberry.

During his residence here, Mr. Seaberry has been head of the American Legion and Red Cross, and has served as chairman of the city commission. Otherwise, he has not held or sought public office.

Mr. Seaberry has been admitted to practice in the courts of New Mexico, California, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Indiana, Ohio, and the Supreme Court of the United States.

He has been active in bar work for years. He has served as vice-president of the Eastland County Bar Association. In the State Bar, he has served on the resolutions committee, was a director from the Seventeenth District from 1952 to 1955, chairman of the board of directors in 1954-1955. During this time he took an active part in the trials of Judge Woodrow Laughlin of Alice. At the present time he is chairman of the State

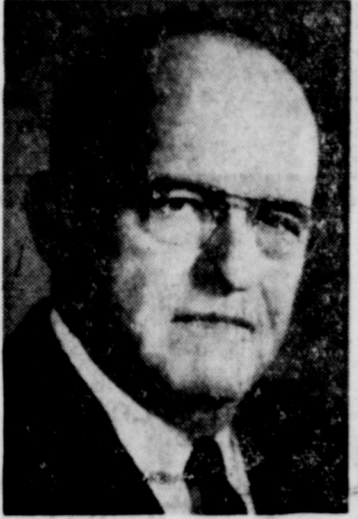
Bar Rules committee.

In 1949 he was appointed chairman of the citizens committee on the Constitution of Texas, and later spent considerable time with others studying the need and advisability of writing a new constitution for the state.

He is a delegate to the Federal Judicial Council for the Fifth Circuit at New Orleans, which holds annual meetings of attorneys and federal judges looking to the improvement of procedure and the administration of justice.

Mr. Seaberry is now a member of the Supreme Court Advisory Board of the state. This board consists of four lawyers and one engineer to assist in securing a location and approving plans and specifications for our new Supreme Court building in Austin at a total cost of about \$3,000,000.

Chief Johnson said contributions were being made, but coming in slowly.

"We know that the resuscitator is important to the saving of human lives — from smoke suffocation, drowning, gas poisoning, electric shock, drug poisoning, carbon monoxide, alcoholic coma, and so on — so we are very anxious to provide it for the community, as a public service."

"So if the amount sufficient to buy it isn't donated within the next week or so, we plan to make a solicitation, as we consider it that important. There is no doubt in my mind — and in the minds of the department — that it's a wonderful thing."

The machine is four in one: resuscitator, inhalator, aspirator and assistor.

Clinton Humphrey's Steer Wins 1st At Show In Abilene

Clinton Humphreys, son of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Humphreys of Eastland, won a first place blue ribbon with a classy Hereford steer in the Abilene Fat Stock Show Thursday and came as close to winning \$1,000 as he'll ever come again in his life without actually winning it.

Humphreys' win was one of the biggest surprises in a full afternoon of judging in the middle-weight class of drylot calves. His \$55 pound 16 months old calf had stood at seventh place through most of the preliminary placing by judge Dr. Robert Black of Texas Tech, but on the final "walk-around" Humphreys' steer moved

up to first place and the blue ribbon award.

That threw Humphreys in competition with Donald Kemp of Roby, for championship of the drylot calves and a prize of \$1,000.

In a full 20-minute period filled with breath-taking suspense, Dr. Black went over the two calves inch by inch, unable to make up his mind. After what seemed to be an eternity, the judges pointed to the Humphreys' steer, saying that it was the hardest decision he ever had to make, and pointed out that the only difference he could find in the two calves was that the Roby calf might have had a little heavier hair along the ribs.

Humphreys is an Eastland County 4-H Club member, and was a prominent basketball player at Eastland High School this year.

Lee Weaver Cf Carbon Dies At Age 80 Years

Lee Weaver, 80, retired farmer, died Thursday afternoon at his home in Carbon, after having been ill for some time.

Mr. Weaver was a native of Coryell County, Tex.

HOW A TRUST CAN SERVE YOU

When property is placed in trust it is turned over to a trustee who will see to it that it is properly managed for the benefit of a person or persons you name as beneficiaries. It is a method of disposing of your property and may be used in conjunction with a will.

Trusts have many advantages. A trust may be used to provide income for persons unable to support themselves, to provide funds for a child's education, as a means of establishing an annuity, or to provide a gift for a charitable institution.

In these days of high taxes, a trust may be utilized to minimize the tax burden. If carefully planned, a trust may decrease income and inheritance taxes.

A trust arrangement works roughly in this manner. A person who desires to create a trust is called a grantor. The grantor chooses a trustee. The trustee may be a bank, an individual, or a trust company. The grantor through a trust instrument tells the trustee how to distribute the trust property or income. The trustee will then manage and distribute the trust proceeds or property in whatever manner the grantor desires.

A very common arrangement is to place the property in trust with directions to pay the income from the property to a wife for her life, and on her death the trust is to be distributed to the grantor's children.

The effectiveness of a trust is dependent largely on its proper certain sum of money to be given out to another at a definite rate per month or per year, or under definite restrictions.

This type of trust is generally used in wills where a person desires to leave money to an individual. To avoid the pitfalls and dangers of lawsuits and ineffective trust operations, a trust instrument should be properly prepared. A poorly planned or carelessly drawn trust instrument can not only defeat the objective of its creator, but may prove costly as well.

Your lawyer can advise you whether a trust arrangement will be advantageous in your particular situation, and is qualified by education and experience to prepare properly the legal papers necessary to set up a trust. If you have in mind some bank or trust company to act as trustee, that firm's trust officers will be glad to discuss the matter in a conference with you and your attorney.

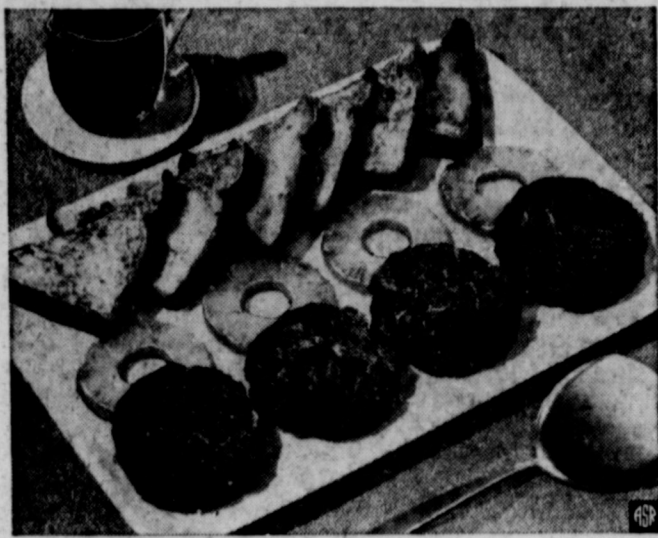

So easy to do—the French toast and pineapple slices cook to a golden-brown on the same griddle while the juicy lamb patties sizzle in a frying pan alongside. So good to look at, in their gold and brown dress. Such good eating—this appetizing nourishing meal!

Savory Breakfast Lamb Patties

Yield: 6 servings
To 1 pound lean ground lamb, add 1/4 teaspoon salt, dash of pepper, 1/4 teaspoon powdered savory or thyme (sage or poultry seasoning may be used), 1/4 cup milk. Mix together, shape into 6 balls, then flatten each to 1/2 inch thickness. Stack between squares of waxed paper or foil and place in refrigerator until ready to use. It's a good idea to let patties stand overnight to "season", refrigerated of course. To cook: melt 1 tablespoon butter in heavy frying pan. When moderately hot, brown lamb patties in the butter, allowing 3 to 4 minutes to a side. Turn and brown the other side about the same length of time. Lamb can well be a bit pink inside. Top each patty with a dot of butter and of tart jelly, if you like. Serve on heated platter with slices of drained canned pineapple and French toast, each browned on both sides in butter. Serve with maple syrup or with warmed honey or melted jelly to drizzle over the French toast.

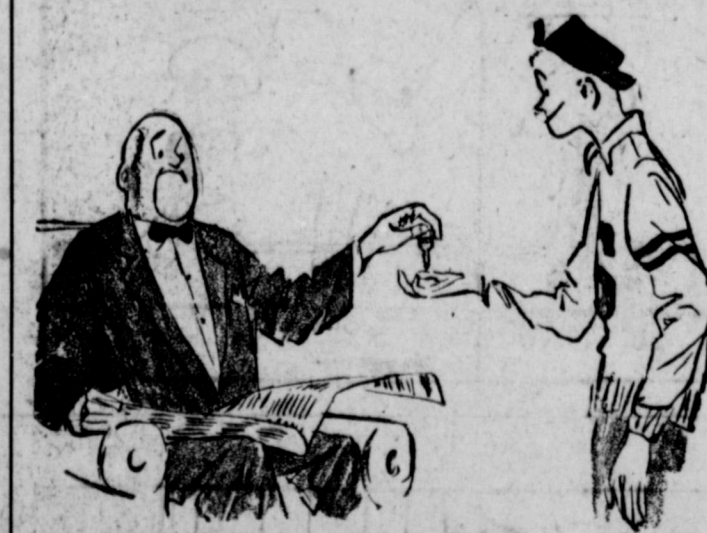

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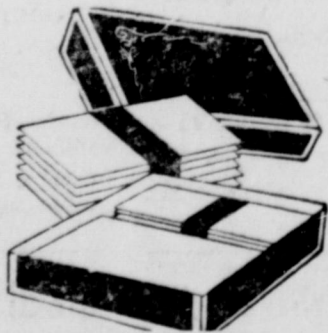

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Graham Penetrates Bamboo Curtain of Communist China

HONG KONG — The Far Eastern tour of Billy Graham has penetrated the bamboo curtain of Communist China.

Billy didn't go behind the curtain, but came as close as law allowed. He knocked on the front door with a big rally at Hong Kong, fabulous free port located just 28 miles away from the barbed wire border of Red China.

Penetration was in the form of prayer and printed material. Christians in Communist-held Shanghai sent word that hundreds there were playing the Hong Kong rally might strike a spark that would blaze across China. They also sent word that many copies of his book "Peace with God" were being distributed behind the Iron Curtain.

One missionary, who will go unnamed, told Billy that a copy of one of his sermons was mailed to the pastor of a church in Shanghai. It just so happened that on the following Sunday the preacher hadn't taken the trouble to prepare a sermon. He walked into the pulpit and read the one written by Billy. Like all his sermons, it ended in an invitation for people to accept Christ. A Russian officer was the first one to get out of his seat and make the decision.

Hundreds of thousands of refugees from Red China have poured into Hong Kong. Emergency housing has been thrown up for them but there are about 60,000 people in Hong Kong today who are sleeping on rooftops under the most miserable living conditions. According to the refugees, rooftops are far better than the things they had under the Communists.

Bringing word of rising discontent behind the barbed wire, they said soldiers took practically everything they could grow on the land and paid with worthless receipts. They reported sentiment among the people of Red China was swinging back to Chiang Kai-shek and that many thousands would revolt behind the lines if he invaded the mainland. Rumors from top sources are that such invasion isn't as fantastic as it sounds.

Hong Kong is probably the world's busiest listening post. It is from here that the free world listens to Red China and vice versa. Agents from many countries sit around in hotel lobbies and look like a convention of furniture salesman. But they aren't talking about chairs.

Some may wonder why Communists left the rich plum of Hong Kong for the free world when it could have been taken with a minimum of effort. It isn't so strange. Hong Kong is far more valuable to Red China as a free city than

otherwise. It is through Hong Kong that the millions of dollars in war material flow from Great Britain.

Britain rules Hong Kong, a red China is tickled pink. John Bolten, Boston businessman, and I rickshawed up to South China football field, thirty minutes late for Billy's Hong Kong rally with 17,000 overflowing inside. Police had locked the gates.

When we posed as members of the team, officers said, "There are 20,000 people down here in a nearby field who couldn't get in. Go down and start a song service for them." We pleaded guilty to not being singers and got in.

Billy was introduced by the governor of Hong Kong, Alexander Grantham.

There were an estimated 1,000 decisions.

Sidelights: Dr. Paul Maddox, aide to Billy Graham, almost talked his way through a British checkpoint with a Texaco credit card. Remarkable Charlie Riggs: "You could have gone to Peking if the card had been 'Good Gulf'."

Billy's European documentary film was banned in India because it referred to Russia as "Godless and ruthless" and mentioned the "Iron Curtain". It's supposed to be a secret.

Six people were on the plane with music director Cliff Barrows when he flew from London to join the Billy Graham team in Delhi, India. One of the passengers introduced himself to Cliff and said he had become a Christian during Billy's Glasgow meetings last year. The plane changed crews in Karachi. The pilot who took over had made his decision for Christ during the same meetings in Glasgow.

A picture of India's women, in most cases, is one of hopeless despair. Over 2,000 of them gathered in one hall to hear a member of the Graham team. Their faces formed a sea of hopelessness, reminding an American of the women in "Tobacco Road". Under complete domination of their men, women seemingly just get up, live and work from dawn to dusk with no hope for a better tomorrow. They are shackled by a social system hundreds of years old. Missionaries said they had found little success in changing the system.

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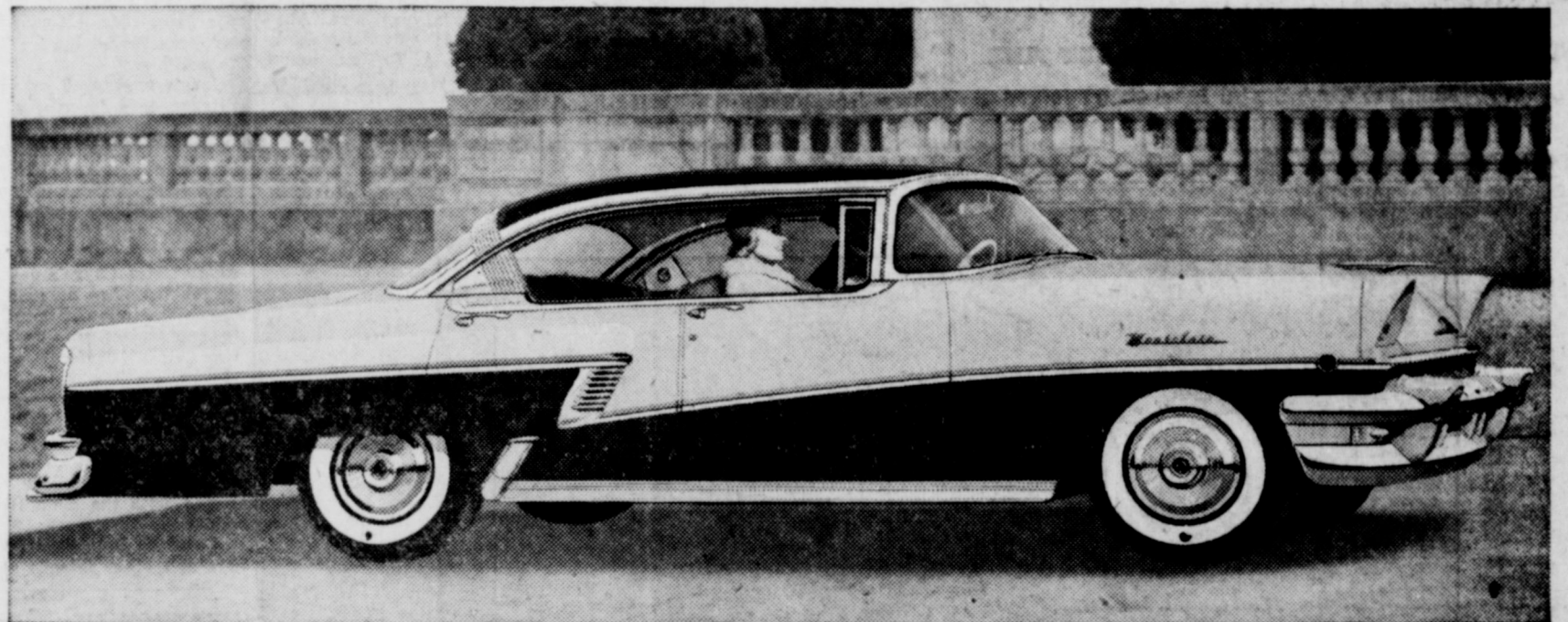
